

History of the Bucks



The original Bootle F.C. were formed in 1880 and played at Hawthorne Road. They were in fact Everton FC's biggest rivals. In 1889–90 Bootle became founder members of the Football Alliance, narrowly missing out on the football league to the blues. That season was the

most successful as we finished league runners-up, reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup, where we lost to Blackburn Rovers (0-7). When the Alliance merged with the Football League in 1892, Bootle became founder members of the new Second Division. However, despite a respectable 8th place final position, the club dropped out after one season (and were replaced by neighbours Liverpool) and seemingly disappeared due to financial problems.

Football returned to Hawthorne Road when a new club, Bootle Athletic. was later formed with the new team initially playing in the Liverpool Leagues. In 1948 when the club were elected to the Lancashire Combination 2, which was won at the first attempt. However, Bootle struggled in the top-flight and

after several tough seasons withdrew and folded during the 1953–54 campaign. In 1953, the current club was formed as Langton and played in the local leagues. After a very successful spell in the Liverpool County Combination (which we



won on numerous occasions) the club reverted back to it's It's better known identity of Bootle F.C. in 1973; and a year later joined the Lancashire Combination, which we won in 1976 and 1977. Bootle then joined the Second Division of the Cheshire County League, which was won in our first season, and we were promoted to the First Division. In 1982 the Cheshire County League was one of the leagues that merged to form the North West Counties League, which Bootle duly joined, becoming a member of the First Division. The club spent most of their time in the First Division until 2000 when we unfortunately dropped into the Second Division. However, despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club

despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club dropped into the Liverpool County Combination. In 2006 the club, with a new ground, were elected back into Division 2 of the North West Counties League. In 2009 Rootle was promotion to the NWCL Premier

the club are looking to progress to the next level.

Bootle won promotion to the NWCL Premier Division and also won the Championship. In 2009/10, our first season back in the NWCFL Premier Division Bootle finished a NWCFL highest placing of 3rd. In 2010/11 finished 6th place. They equalled the 3rd place again in 2012. With the ground arading and charter standard status established in 2011/12







MVCff.COM The beginning - 30 years ago Part 1:

Sporting fans taking a nostalgic look back at the sports headlines during the summer of 1982 wouldn't have much difficulty in finding some big news stories.

Jimmy Connors defeated John McEnroe in the Men's Singles final at the Wimbledon Championships, in golf the Open Championship was won by Tom Watson, and it was a World Cup finals year with England, Scotland and Northern Ireland all competing in the World Cup Finals in Spain.

But as August dawned, and just as Dexy's Midnight Runners began a four

week run at the top of the UK singles charts with "Come On Eileen", those involved in non-league football in the North West were looking forward to a new era, as the league structure was about to change forever.

As the League history page on the website tells, the amalgamation of the Lancashire Combination and the Cheshire County League led to the formation of the North West Counties Football League, and 30 years ago right now everyone was looking forward in anticipation to the start of the new league, on Saturday 14th August 1982.

The League Management Committee charged with the responsibility of managing the league during its inaugural season was comprised of officials who, in the main, had held down similar roles with the Lancashire Combination and Cheshire County League.

Bob Eccles was a Vice-President on the Cheshire County League committee and was also Ground Grading Chairman. As Chairman of Darwen FC, he had headed up the decision to move the club from the Lancashire Combination into the Cheshire County League, so he had a good working knowledge of both leagues.

Bob, of course remains a Life Member of the NWCFL to this day, and back in the early 80s, his role with the Cheshire County League meant that he was involved in all the initial meetings that were set up to begin the amalgamation of the two leagues. Another Bob still involved with the NWCFL also attended the first meeting between the two organisations – Daisy Hill Secretary Bob Naylor, who was a member of the Lancashire Combination's management committee.

Bob Eccles recalls "The meetings to discuss the constitution of the new league first began in 1980. It has to be said that, at the time, the Lancashire Combination was struggling, because clubs were leaving to join the Cheshire League, which was seen as being a better and more competitive league with stronger teams.

"I was Chairman at Darwen and took them to the Cheshire League in the late 1970s, and I can remember Jim Kenyon and Ken Dean, who were with the Lancashire Combination at the time, coming round to my house to try and persuade me to change my mind. But it was the right thing for the club to do at the time, and along with several others we made the move.

"There was talk at time that if the two leagues hadn't amalgamated, the Lancashire Combination would have been in trouble because of the number of teams leaving or rumoured to be leaving. So once that was recognised, it meant that everyone realised something had to be done".

And so the talks began to try and create a framework to amalgamate the two leagues, and after some early difficulties, the process started to move forward.

"The early meetings were held in what was then The Crest Hotel in Bolton, which is now the Britannia Hotel", said Bob. "To get the process started, we needed an independent Chairman, so Bob Lord chaired the first meeting. "As many people will remember, Bob was Chairman of Burnley and was on the Football League committee for many years. He was also President of the Lancashire FA. He was a wonderful man, a tremendous character, and I can recall Jim Kenyon once saying that anyone who didn't like Bob Lord was jealous, which summed him up perfectly.

"I remember in the first meeting there was a bit of debate and humming and hawing going on between representatives of the two leagues as we went round in circles a bit, and Bob Lord banged his fist on the table and said "Come on gents, let's get down to brass tacks". We needed an independent Chairman like him to get things moving, and although he only chaired the meeting right at the start of the process, he set the tone and it all moved forward from there.

"Looking back now, considering that both sides were always going to try to fight their corner, we did well to get together and become as friendly as we did, and I think all things considered, the coming together of the leagues was managed very well".

When the league began there were 58 member clubs, across three divisions, but of course it didn't take long for that number to fall, and Bob remembers there were a number of contributory factors.

"There was a feeling among members of the committee that there were too many clubs, and that some of the clubs whose facilities weren't up to scratch would have to go.

Another solid start in the league saw the team move into fourth in the table a position they never went below throughout the season. In the Wigan Cup WRP progressed to the quarter-final stage but went out in the first round of the Lancashire Shield to

Crookland Casuals. WRP then went on a remarkable league run which saw them lose on the 14th October then go all the way to the end of the season undefeated.

But the aim at the beginning of the season was achieved with promotion to the Manchester Premier Division finishing in second place behind Walshaw Sports.



This season an important decision was made to re-introduce the

reserve side here at Bootle FC. The new reserve team manager Joseph Doran explains the reasoning and how he thinks this decision will help the 1st teams cause.

"I am looking forward to the challenge and will working closely with Neil (Prince), James (Olsen) and Liam (Blakeman) on the assessment of players when they are in the reserves. The reserves will be used in the truest sense, players who are progressing through the youth teams and more seniors players who need game time in preparation for returning to the first team along with some other players I will recruit and believe they may have what it takes to get into the first team one day.

I have appointed Michael Carragher to the position of assistant manager and he will be helping me put the lads through their

paces in training and assessing the squad. Michael has lots of experience as he guided Sacre Coeur from the old I-Zingari 3rd division to 3rd in the Liverpool County Premier Division which to anyone who has played or watched games in that league will no it is no mean feat.

Our home games are Thursday nights and we start with Curzon Ashton which will be tough because they are an Evo-Stik League team. The calibre of the of the teams in this league will be a real test for our club as most play at a higher level such as the Evo-Stik League or the Blue Square Leagues.

I will also be working closely with both Ritchie Boswarva (under 18's manager) and Ste miller (under 17's manager) both have already provided lots of players available for selection and I'm sure you will see some in the first squad in the reserves game on Thursday 16th august at home KO 7.45 against Curzon Ashton.

The 06/07 season saw WRP start slowly but suddenly turn the corner and eventually went on an excellent run which saw them lose just once in 24 games in all competitions resulting in final appearances in the Gilgryst Cup and the Lancashire Shield. Another good run saw WRP lose just once in 13 games and it all came down to the last game of the season for the league title. Wigan saw off Breightmet 4-1 and Gregorians lost 3-2 at Atherton Town handing Wigan Roll

Gregorians lost 3-2 at Atherton Town handing Wigan Robin Park the title at the first attempt.

In there inaugural season in the NWCFL WRP made a decent start winning 7 drawing 3 and losing 2 in their opening 12 fixtures. The highlight of this was being the first team to defeat title contenders AFC Liverpool in front of what would be the highest home crowd of 603 at Valerie Park. The Vodkat Challenge Cup paired Wigan against Premier division outfit Bacup Borough at home. After leading twice in the game Bacup scored with the last kick of the game to take it into extra time. The game finished 3-3 after extra time forcing a replay which Bacup would eventually win. The league cup saw WRP bow out at the first hurdle at the hands of Norton Utd. The team then lost some consistency but stayed in the top 5 most of the season including top but eventually finishing in a

respectable fifth position.

Last season was their best season yet as they took the 1st division by storm, winning the league in style with 25 wins, 6 draws and only 3 defeats..




WIGAN v. BARROW. Barrow pressing hard after Wigan's score in the F.A. Cup first round match, won by Wigan.

"As Ground Grading Chairman of course, I was involved in that process and obviously I wasn't exactly popular with some clubs, who saw me as being responsible for them being removed from the league on ground grading issues.

"But that wasn't the only reason that the number of clubs dropped. The committee had hardly got their feet under the table when the Northern Premier League decided they wanted a Second Division, and that played a part in us losing a lot of clubs in the mid-eighties. We lost a lot of good strong clubs during that period, the likes of Stalybridge Celtic, and of course that has continued over the years.

"You only need to look at the Evo-Stik League and the league above and count how many of our former clubs are there now, to assess the contribution our league has made to strengthen the Non-League Pyramid over the years".

Looking back over the 30 years, Bob believes that the original committee would be satisfied with the progress that the NWCFL has made over the years.

"There have been highs and lows, but I think that everyone would have been happy with the reputation the league has established over the years. We are not as strong as we used to be perhaps, but that can be said about many other leagues at our level, because of the numbers of clubs we have lost to higher levels of Non-League football due to restructuring.

"But I believe we are still a good league, we are renowned as a good league, and some good teams have left us to progress upwards, so I think the committee in 1982 would be very happy with the way things have gone".

In the next part of our look back to the early days of the NWCFL, we'll take a look at the process that was undertaken to amalgamate the two leagues.





Change is afoot!

Joe Doran explains his version of what has happened behind the scenes in the summer:

"Hello and welcome back to the new season with the bucks, as you will know there have been a few changes during the close season. Not least the departure of Chris O'Brien. I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank him for all his efforts over the last 7 seasons, I played for Chris during most of his time in charge and I can honestly say that I have never encountered a more enthusiastic, committed and driven individual, his attitude was infectious and he certainly changed some aspects of my approach to playing football. I would like to thank him for all his efforts and the success he brought to the club. I'm sure I talk for all of the committee when I say thank you and he is always welcome here."

"Once the managers position became vacant I faced a tough decision on whether to apply for it or not. With no obvious experience in a manager's position at first I was reluctant, but after a few sleepless nights and long consultation with the people closest to me I decided to apply. Once I applied I had removed myself from the decision making process. During the process I was aware of who had applied but I was treated the same as all the other applicants and was informed of the committees decision to appoint Neil. Once the decision had been made I got on with liasing with Neil in my role as club secretary. I have known Neil since we played in the same Sefton team when we were 13. We also attended the same England trials when we were 15; and at Oldham athletic when we were 19."

I had not seen him since then until last season when I got a phone call from him regarding a business proposition. Most of you know what followed, Chris signed Neil and he came in and scored 13 goals last season. He had to leave before the end of the season for personal reasons. But obviously he's back now at the helm."

"One of the first things I discussed with Neil was something that both Dave Miley senior and I have been discussing for many years; the reformation of the reserve team. I had asked Chris O'Brien and the committee if I could take the reserves this season and both agreed, this was before the committee decision to remove Chris, once the decision had been made to appoint Neil I saw no reason to change my plans, an I went about arranging for us to join the www.galaxyfootball.co.uk Lancashire league. We were accepted at their AGM and the fixtures for august have been published. The major difference between the Lancashire league and the NWCFL reserve division is that most of the games will be midweek, which helps us with preparation for the first team games."
