The original Bootle F.C. were formed in 1880 and played at Hawthorne Road. They were in fact Everton FC's biggest rivals. In 1889–90 Bootle became founder members of the Football Alliance. narrowly missing out on the football league to the blues. That season was the

most successful as we finished league runners-up, reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup, where we lost to Blackburn Rovers (0-7). When the Alliance merged with the Football League in 1892, Bootle became founder members of the new Second Division. However, despite a respectable 8th place final position, the club dropped out after one season (and were replaced by neighbours Liverpool) and seemingly disappeared due to financial problems.

Football returned to Hawthorne Road when a new club, Bootle Athletic, was later formed with the new team initially playing in the Liverpool Leagues. In 1948 when the club were elected to the Lancashire Combination 2, which was won at the first attempt. However, Bootle struggled in the top-flight and

after several tough seasons withdrew and folded during the 1953-54 campaign. In 1953, the current club was formed as Langton and played in the local leagues. After a very successful spell in the Liverpool County Combination (which we



won on numerous occasions) the club reverted back to it's It's better known identity of Bootle F.C. in 1973; and a year later joined the Lancashire Combination, which we won in 1976 and 1977. Bootle then joined the Second Division of the Cheshire County League, which was won in our first season, and we were promoted to the First Division. In 1982 the Cheshire County League was one of the leagues that merged to form the North West Counties League, which Bootle duly joined, becoming a member of the First Division. The club spent most of their time in the First Division until 2000 when we unfortunately dropped into the Second Division, However, despite finishing 6th in 2002, the club

dropped into the Liverpool County Combination. In 2006 the club, with a new ground, were elected back into Division 2 of the North West Counties League. In 2009 Bootle won promotion to the NWCL Premier

Division and also won the Championship. In 2009/10, our first season back in the NWCFL Premier Division Bootle finished a NWCFL highest placing of 3rd. In 2010/11 finished 6th place. They equalled the 3rd place again in 2012. With the ground arading and charter standard status established in 2011/12 the club are looking to progress to the next level.

Cheetham, Charnock and Seddon bossed the midfield from the first whistle and chances came and went. A sweeping move saw Pruden get in behind the Gateacre defence and deliver a great deep cross that was met well by Loughlin only for the keeper to make a great save. Rowlands was then put clear in



the opposition area and seemed to be unceremoniuosly dragged back round the neck and then buried into the turf, only for the officials to wave away cast iron appeals.

A further penalty shout was turned down when Charnock clevely worked himself into the box. He was clearly clipped from behind but chose to stay on his feet and cross the ball. 

The lads have been absolutely fantastic this season and I would like to personally thank every single player who have played their part, even the lads who have moved on over the course of the year have played their part.





### STATEMENT FROM THE LEAGUE COMMITTEE

Over the past few weeks, certain decisions made by the Management Committee have been criticised in local newspapers and on social media (Twitter, Facebook and various forums). I would therefore like to put some perspective on the matter.

The Management Committee are all elected into their relative position by the Member Clubs. Those Committee Members have a vast experience in football as players, referees and club officials, at all levels of the game, internationally, professionally, semi-professionally and senior amateur level.

They certainly are not "Jobsworths" as described by one local alleged journalist. I say "alleged" journalist, as he certainly has no understanding of football administration and has not done his homework to find out as to why a decision has been made.

The role of the Management Committee is to make sure the league is run on a fair and equitable basis, while operating within the laws of the game, which is administered through the FA, both nationally and through the respective County Associations. Our role is to ensure that all clubs operate within these rules, in order not to gain an unfair advantage over other sides within the competition. During the course of a season, the Management Committee are called on to make various decisions, which to the offending club are not popular, but are made because the rules which all clubs have agreed to at the start of each campaign have been broken.

Whose fault is it for playing players whilst under suspension, without international clearance, who have previously had their registration cancelled by the club concerned, or played whilst being cup-tied? It's not the Management Committee. The blame is squarely with the poor administration of the Club.

No one wants to see a club denied promotion or an appearance in a Cup Final due to an administration error, but rules are rules and are there for the benefit of all Clubs. To turn a blind eye or take no action would be unfair on the innocent party. Likewise, being a Member of a League within the National League System also brings responsibility from the Clubs, playing at all levels within the system.

Clubs are required to achieve and maintain FA Ground Grading Standards, and where a Club clearly has not, they are now placed in a relegation position.

It is nothing new to be denied promotion on ground grading issues. Atherton LR to the Northern Premier League, and Maghull from our then Second Division to the First, are just two examples that have affected this League.

More recently, last season Woodley Sports, now Stockport Sports, were relegated to us from the Northern Premier League due to ground grading issues. Clubs have regularly been warned throughout the season concerning ground grading standards, but unfortunately one Club has failed due to various reasons. Again

the alleged journalist mentioned above has not done his research, and I am not at liberty to disclose any further information, as the Club state that they are to appeal against the League's decision to the FA. That's their right, and the Management Committee do not have a problem with it.

However, the League has continually helped clubs achieve the suitable ground grading requirements for promotion to a higher level – our record is second to none, and we don't believe standards should drop as improved facilities can only benefit clubs and supporters in the long term. I am proud of the fact we had no fewer than ten clubs apply for promotion to the Evo-Stik League for next season, all meeting the required standard for that division. This was the best representation of clubs from any league in the country.

To promote clubs who fail to meet the standards would be an insult to those clubs who have spent a small fortune on improving their facilities, and would only store up trouble for the future, potentially leading to relegation the following season. Finally, abusive remarks made by players and/or club officials against Management Committee members, Match Officials, other Clubs and other Club Officials through social media is totally unacceptable. The Management Committee are volunteers who put in a tremendous amount of time and work, often at their own expense, to keep the league operating. If there were no committee, there would be no League. I am informed that the FA and County FA's are taking a more serious approach towards the problems faced by abuse through social media, and in the light of recent events this is something that I am now sure the Management Committee will also pursue.

## Our Visitors today....

Lying on the River Weaver, south of Northwich and west of Middlewich, where the salt mining industry was cause for the settlement in the eighteenth century.

Winsford United were founded in 1883, as Over Wanderers and played football in the Welsh Combination Football League. They changed their name and moved to their current ground, the Barton Stadium (then called the Great Western Playing Field), a few years later. However, after excessive spending, the club soon folded.

They re-formed just before the outbreak of the First World War, and regrouped after this had finished under a committee led by Mr. R. G. Barton, becoming a founder member of the Cheshire League. From then until the late 1970s, Winsford United played football locally in Cheshire.

# WUFC WUFC Unification

Highlights of this period included one FA Cup first round appearance, against Peterborough United, and Cheshire league wins in 1920–21 and 1976–77. During this period, in the late 1970s, the club also reached the guarter finals of the FA Trophy

and featured future Welsh international goalkeeper Neville Southall. The Cheshire League merged with other regional divisions to become the North West Counties Football League in 1982, with Winsford doing sufficiently well to enter the Northern Premier League Division One upon its formation in 1987. They were promoted from that in 1992, and enjoyed their highest ever finish as runners up of the Northern Premier League Premier Division in 1992–93. They also reached the FA Cup First Round for a second time, losing to Wrexham, and won the Northern Premier League Challenge Cup.

The successful team was broken up, however, when manager Mike McKenzie moved on to local rivals Witton Albion.

After a few more seasons in the bottom half of the Northern Premier League Premier Division, and another local derby in the FA Cup first round – this time against Chester City – the club were relegated three times in four seasons. At the start of the 2003-04 season, they found themselves in the North West Counties Division Two.

They were finally promoted on April 24, 2007 to the North West Counties Football League Division One and secured the Division 2 title on April 28, 2007. Manager Joe Gibiliru left in the Summer of 2009 and Terry Murphy, former Middlewich Town F.C. manager, was brought in as replacement. Although at the back end of August 2009 Murphy left the club due to family reasons and his assistant, Mike

Sal Terrae Alcock, was promoted to Manager. Alcock did not, however, last long as at the beginning of September 2009 he

was forced to resign due to ill health and coach Tony Ledwards was promoted to manager. In March 2010, Ledwards stepped down as manager after a poor run of results and the club was taken over by a comanagement team of Mike Alcock and Dave Twite, who

effectively saved the team from relegation. At the end of the 2009/10 season, Alcock and Twite decided not to continue as managers and became involved in coaching and scouting roles instead.

Chris Willcock was announced as the new manager and later named lan Street as his assistant, it was to be Willcock's second spell in charge of the club after leading them to promotion from North West Counties Division Two in 2007, Chris Willcock resigned as the Blues manager in early 2011 and assistant Ian Street was appointed as the new boss.

Street was to remain in charge of the team in for the rest of the season and under his management, Winsford won the North West Counties Football League Challenge Cup, defeating New Mills F.C. in the final.

Street managed the team for the whole of the 2011/12 season, guiding them to 7th place. However, in June 2012 it was announced Street had left the club to take over as manager of Ashton Athletic F.C. On 17 June, it was announced that Lloyd Morrison had joined the club as the new manager, he had been at Flixton F.C. for the past two

seasons. Kevin Bircumshaw decided to stay on as assistant manager.11

. ### Under 16's - Two words... LEAGUE CHAMPIONS!

In scenes reminiscent to the last day of last year's Premier League title race, the Bucks win title as Woolton Rangers let a two goal lead slip away.

Grosart and Groves had a full seventeen man squad to choose from and brought in Jack Antonio to bolster the centre midfield area and also started with Brandon Groves and Lewis Culshaw up front; the dangerous front man, Jay White having been injured in the previous week's narrow defeat was on the bench, if required.

Given the nature of the importance of this game, one may have expected both teams to have been somewhat cautious in their play in the opening couple of minutes; scared to possibly make an early costly error. However, the Bucks players appeared to relish this additional pressure as they were quickly on the front foot and taking the game to their opponents.

The first chance of the game fell to Jack Antonio, but his right footed shot went straight at the keeper who was able to make a comfortable save. Charisma won an early corner but Scott Munro made a brave, towering header to clear the danger. Anthony Beckett had a right footed snapshot easily saved. The hosts should have taken an early lead; as an unmarked Charisma forward had a free header on goal, but his header went wide of the Bucks left post.

Unfortunately, following an injury to Mutch, he was unable to continue and was replaced by Jay White, which meant some positional adjustments

Minutes later, Woods almost turned provider as his fine, long pass proved to be just too long for the chasing Culshaw and the keeper came sharply off his line to collect on the edge of his box.

Totally against the run of play, the hosts were to take a surprise and undeserved lead. In their first attempt on target, a 25 yard shot from outside the box, on the Bucks right hand side, beat the Bucks keeper Adam Fairchild and crept into the far left hand corner of the net. 0-1.

The Bucks players and their many travelling fans were shocked by this goal that came almost completely out of the blue; having totally dominated possession up to this point. However, the goal seemed to spur the Bucks on and they were to be behind for only a couple of minutes.

Unknown too many, the FA Cup 2012/13 started in August 2012, with the extra preliminary round. The final of course is 11th May 2013 and one man has followed every single step of what would have been Bootle Football Club's road path to Wembley! Liam

Delaney has charted each round since a sunny summer day at the Delta Taxis Stadium.

The first opponents in the extra-preliminary round for Bootle were Alsager Town on 11th August at Bootle's Delta Taxis Stadium where the Bucks' ran out 4-1 winners through two goals each from lee Thompson and Daniel O'Connor. Bootle's next tie in the preliminary round was at Evo-Stik side Mossley. This was probably Bootle's most complete performance of the season, and they ran out 3-0 winners, with two goals from Jak Gray, and one from player/manager Neil Prince.

Bootle were in the first qualifying round and where drawn at home against another Evo-Stik side in Bamber Bridge. However they could not reach the performance level of the last round, and bowed out 1-2, with the Bootle goal coming from Michael Young.

So this is where Bootle's FA Cup dream ended. But what if that run had continued? Who would the Bucks get in each round after?

Liam followed this path and Bamber Bridge were home at the QED Stadium in the 2nd qualifying round versus Guiseley who beat 'the Brig' 1-0. And so onto the 3rd qualifying round where after a 1-1 draw away at Llanelian Road; 360 people, including Liam, witnessed Guiselev beat Colwyn Bay 3-1 on their home

> ground at Nethermoor Park. Guiseley's run continued through the qualifiers, with a 2-0 at home to Buxton in the 3rd qualifying round

which saw them into the first round proper! As you can see the road to Wembley is a long road to take and so far Liam has witnessed SEVEN games before the 1st round! Bootle's would-be path so far

was Alsager, Mossley, Bamber Bridge, Guiseley, Colwyn Bay and Buxton! But who would it be in the 1st round?!

Guiseley's opponents were Barrow in the first round proper, held on 3rd November a crowd of 1,605 witnessed a 2-2 draw. The replay would see Barrow triumph at home 1-0.



Barrow were then drawn against Macclesfield Town in round 2, and after several postponements and a 1-1 draw, they eventually succumbed to a 4-1 defeat. And so to the big boys coming into the competition, and Macclesfield were drawn against the eventual Championship winners, Cardiff City, and Liam witnessed a true giant killing. Macclesfield winning 2-1 at home! Unfortunately for Town, they were defeated by Premier League Wigan Athletic 1-0 at home in round 4.

So far the Bucks opponents could have been Barrow, Macclesfield and now Wigan Athletic!

So Liam travelled to the McAlpine Stadium, or is it the Galpharm Stadium; no sorry it is the John Smiths Stadium for the 5th round as Wigan met Huddersfield in what is usually a massive game in the Rugby

circles, but not as glitzy in the football world. Wigan ran out 4-1 winners and progressed to the quarter final where they met Everton at Goodison Park, 2 miles from where Liams journey started!

With champions league chasing Everton the hot-favourites against the relegation-threatened Latics, it was a big surprise for Liam that the visitors came away with a worthy 3-0 win.



And so onto the semi-final at Wembley. What an experience for Liam Delaney and what a story. The Bucks road to Wembley was nearly complete. Semi-final versus Milwall, and again Wigan triumph 2-0 and book a place in the 2013 FA Cup Final against last seasons Premier League Champions Manchester City.

Unfortunately, our game has come too soon for the final part of this

magnificent journey for Liam, but what a journey. Starting at Bootle; to Mossley; to Bamber Bridge; to Guiseley; to Colwyn Bay; to Buxton; to Barrow; to Macclesfield; to Cardiff; to Wigan; to Huddersfield; to Everton; to Wembley versus Milwall; to Wembley versus City!
