Wheatley's day to remember

FOUR tries by nimble footed Malcolm Swain (Wales B), a hat-trick by David MacKay (England trialist) and others by England's most-capped number eight Andy Ripley were just some of the highlights as president Geoff Windsor-Lewis' XV beat Wheatley 48-14 in a match to celebrate the opening of their new clubhouse at Holton yesterday.

The only disappointment was that television person-ality and former England scrum half Nigel Starmer-Smith, who later performed the official opening cere-mony, did not take his chance of getting on the scoresheet.

He was put clearly away by Tony Hooper, cutting in from the wing, midway through the second half but, heading in to a strong wind simply hadn't the steam to make the try line.

The scratch XV settled down and tightened up taking a 16 points lead with a try by Swain, who deftly swept past a midfield defender to go in under the posts; Seretse Williams made an opening to put over MacKay, then Andy Ripley pulled down a high ball and charged through ball and charged through for the line. Ray Tapper kicked two conversions, the first with a drop kick. Wheatley hit back with a fine break by Jerry Axford supported by Julian Hanks, who went in under the

verted a try by MacKay early in the second half, with a speedy break from his own 22, but Wheatley replied with a fine oppor-tunist try from flanker Richard White.

Between a hat-trick of tries by Swain who has an unquestioned touch of class unquestioned touch of class and another by MacKay, Axford pulled one back, and also landed the conversion for Wheatley. Swain also converted one of the four tries, but "Starmer" missed a conversion from in front of the posts.

In the closing minutes Swain broke clear again and found Peter Carroll, former Oxford University captain in support, to score

In the beginning

The origins of the Club lie somewhere between my missing cartlidges and Wheatley Youth Centre of ten years ago. The chief sport of the young men of the village was fighting, getting sloshed and falling down at the Bridge Hotel. Thanks to Rugby we now do much the same kind of thing but we have the R.F.U. Laws to tell us the time, place, method and opposition.

No seriously though folks after the army youth team had come over and boxed a few ears, and the revived wrestling club had taught them to maim, crush and trample people, they were ready for the ultimate challenge — Rugby Football.

Some unbelievably coarse early games were played against Bicester Youth Centre. The team was very mixed ranging from well into his prime Tosh Harris to young Angus Mackay — size 12 boots and all knees and elbows. Our only skill lay in tackling which the lads did with wild abandon. They found it most enervating to be able to knock someone down without being charged with grevious bodily harm or booted off the field.

We were careful to explain the unwritten laws of the game and the importance of the right sporting attitude. I shall not forget the expression of terror on Gordon Marlow's face as he pressed himself into the woodwork of the West Stand Bar to avoid a sea of beer and glasses. "You said this game was played by gentlemen," he said reprovingly. It was then he realised why Ian Thompson and I were standing under an umbrella with buttoned up plastic macs.

Our strip did not arrive for two months and we played in the unwashed shirts of Thames Valley Police 'borrowed' by P....... H...... One week he could not get it. Ten of us stood outside the Sandpiper and found Micky sliding down the wall. We took him and his friend, kidnapped Liggy and went to Gosford. There we borrowed their new shirts and first team flankers before winning 17-0. Micky's friend was a total stranger and has not been seen since.

We have not progressed that far really. We try to put out 4 sides now but are often short of players. We sometimes play without shirts if Terry takes them to Bournemouth. We still want to cater for teenagers and even minis if enough men would commit themselves every Sunday. As we begin our eighth official season I hope we still have what we began with. Lots of enthusiasm and a family feeling which allows no internal friction.

Today of course we open our Clubhouse — a tremendous step for a young club. It is a piece of genuine good fortune that we have our own base so early in our history. We shall however be judged not on mere possession but to what use we put our advantage.

This is just the end of chapter one. There are many years ahead of exciting games and enjoyable social events. Hundreds of young men wait to be introduced to the game and I am confident that we shall flourish. All this will however be a long and wasted journey if we do not play in the spirit intended and conduct ourselves off the field in the same manner.

Finally may I pay public tribute to Dick Manger who was there before the club. To Glen Evans and Dick Thorpe who have never wavered from their allegiance. To Geoff Windsor-Lewis who was asked to carry the banner and who has frequently waved it wildly when called upon to do so.
