WHAT'S THE best goal you've seen live? Not necessarily your favourite or one that meant the most, saw your club win something or, dare I say it, avoid relegation. But the best.

Football is subjective. One person's best goal might not be to the taste of another's. Some prefer mazy runs. Others think there's nothing better than a long range strike that crashes in off the underside of the bar.

We're fortunate we get to see more Non-League goals than we ever did. Now wonder strikes from across the country are only a few clicks away, be it on the club's website, YouTube channel or social media. Often we will see a goal just moments after the game has finished.

It used to be waiting to buy the end of season club video to re-live those moments that could have occurred months earlier. Was it quite as good as you remembered? Was it really that far out? Did the keeper really have no chance?

One that will always live long in my memory was a strike by Michael Warner for Farnborough Town against Heybridge Swifts. A headed clearance fell out of the sky to customary cries of 'SHOOT!'

Often the instruction to take aim is swiftly followed by groans as the ball sails off target, troubling parked vehicles in the car park more than the goalkeeper.

But this day, Warner's effort was a dream. Like a tracer missile the ball rocketed into the top corner. Two goalkeepers wouldn't have saved it.

It was brilliant. These days it would have gone 'viral' and been retweeted thousands of times on twitter.

Technology has certainly made our annual Goal of the Season at The NLP's National Game Awards more competitive than ever.

More and more nominations roll in each year, all worthy winners from all different levels of the game. In years gone by, these goals would be the stuff of myth and legend. Now the tangible proof is there.

I was fortunate enough to be at the National League North Eliminator game between Brackley Town and Gateshead a few months ago.

Fans weren't allowed in the grounds. That was a shame for loyal supporters as it is but even more so when Shane Byrne pulled a spectacular rabbit out of the hat on the stroke of half-time.

Gateshead had just gone one up deep in first-half stoppage time and looked for all the world to be heading into the break in front.

But Byrne, apparently, had other ideas. Receiving the ball from kick-off inside his own half, the midfielder hit an inch perfect ball that flew right into the top corner.

Gateshead keeper Brad James had no chance. It wasn't like he'd been caught unawares not concentrating.

It left the handful of people inside the ground open-mouthed. A wow moment. The only problem for me being, I didn't fully see it. I was taking notes down from the first goal. Who shoots direct from kick-off!? I saw it in the air from a long way out, I saw it arrow into the net. I saw 80 per cent of it. But I didn't see the actual strike itself.

So does it count as my best goal witnessed live? It's certainly the best one I nearly saw!

Today's Visitors

The club was formed in 1904 as Histon Institute FC, and played for 44 years in the Cambridgeshire Football League. John Chivers, chairman of major Histon employer Chivers & Sons, helped to found the football club. The company donated a field then covered in roses for the club to play on, which is commemorated in the rose on Histon's crest. From 1926 the club moved to its current location, where a grandstand was erected in 1934.

In 1948 the club became champions of the Cambs League and joined the Spartan League, winning promotion to its Premier Division in 1951. The "Institute" was dropped from the club's name that season. The top forward in those days was Mo Thurston, who scored 63 goals in season 1949-50. In 1960 Histon entered the Delphian League, which became part of the Athenian League structure in 1963, but struggled at that level. The pitch was re-sited at right angles to the old one in 1960-61, and a replacement stand opened in 1964-65.

In 1965 Histon switched to the Eastern Counties League, where they were to play for the next 35 years. When the ECL adopted a two-division format in 1988, Histon were placed in the Premier Division. In the 1989-90 season, with Alan Doyle as manager, Histon won the ECL League Cup and sold players Lance Key and Shaun Sowden to Sheffield Wednesday and Giuliano Maiorana to Manchester United. The transfer fee rescued the club financially, and a Manchester United team played Histon on 19 May 1989.

Following administrative and financial difficulties in 1993, the club was relegated to ECL Division One in 1995 but were promoted back to the Premier Division two years later. The 1997-98 season saw Neil Kennedy establish a club record by scoring 46 senior goals in the season, and Histon finished 3rd. Finally in the 1999-2000 season Histon won the ECL Premier Division title under the management of former Cambridge United player Steve Fallon, appointed on 27 July 1999, and were promoted to the Southern League Eastern Division.

In the first three Southern League seasons Histon managed 4th spot twice and then a disappointing 10th, which momentarily halted the rise in fortunes experienced under Steve Fallon, but the 2003-04 season saw the club finish 2nd in the Eastern Division to claim promotion to the Premier Division. The following year Histon took on League Two side Shrewsbury Town in the FA Cup 1st Round Proper, setting up a 2nd Round tie at home to Yeovil Town with a 2-0 victory. They lost to Yeovil, but clinched the Southern League Premier Division title on the last day of the 2004-05 season and were promoted to the Conference South.

In their first Conference South season Histon finished 5th, enough to secure a place in the play-offs for promotion to the Conference National. They won their first play-off game away at Farnborough Town 3–0, but lost 2–0 in the final against St. Albans City. In the FA Cup they reached the second round proper. The team managed a draw away at Nuneaton Borough but were defeated in the replay at Bridge Road 2–1 before a crowd of 3,077. The season was also notable for a 5–0 win against local rivals Cambridge United in the FA Trophy.

On 14 April 2007 Histon, now popularly known as the Stutes, beat Welling United 1–0 at Bridge Road to go 19 points clear at the top of the Conference South in the final table. Two days previously, officials from the Conference had passed Bridge Road as fit for Conference National football, paving the way for promotion (the club's fourth in 7 years) to the highest point in the non league pyramid. In the same season striker Neil Kennedy scored his 300th goal for the club with a hat-trick against Havant & Waterlooville.

Histon's 2007-08 season in the Conference National saw the Stutes play their first televised game, Setanta broadcasting the 1–0 home win against Oxford United. Later that season the club broke their record home attendance when a crowd of 3,721 saw Histon beat Cambridge United 1–0 on 1 January 2008. Histon finished the season 7th. The club's record goal scorer, Neil Kennedy, played his last competitive game against Forest Green Rovers on the last day of the season in a substitute appearance.

The second season of Conference National football saw the Stutes finish third, qualifying for the play-offs, where they were defeated 2–1 on aggregate by Torquay United in the semi-final. In the FA Cup Histon reached the third round, losing 2-1 at home to Championship side Swansea City, after beating League One opposition in Swindon Town 1–0 at home in the first round, and Leeds United 1–0 at home in the second round, the first time Leeds had lost to a non-league side. The Leeds United match was on national television, the attendance was 4,103, and the winning goal was scored by Matt Langston.

Histon's fortunes declined after the high spots of the 2008-09 season, as the money ran out. In November 2009 Gareth Baldwin ended his 17-year tenure as chairman of the club, and in January 2010 Steve Fallon's highly successful ten years as Histon manager came to an end. The club finished 18th in the Conference National in season 2009/10 and bottom in 2010/11. Alan Lewer, John Beck, and David Livermore served successively as managers. Histon finished their first Conference North season in 16th place and David Livermore left the club at the end of that season. Dennis Greene took over but left the Club in December 2012, to be replaced by former player Nacer Relizani assisted by the club's youth team coach Brian Page. The duo led the team to Conference North safety on the last day

of the 2012/13 season before Relizani stepped down and Page took over the top job.

Histon were now playing with a very young side largely drawn from the club's youth structure. The 2013/14 season saw them relegated from the Conference North to the Southern Premier League. Brian Page kept them at that level in season 2014/15, securing an 18th place finish, but even the return of Steve Fallon in October 2015 could not prevent further relegation to the Southern League Division 1 Central at the end of season 2015-16. In October 2016 Fallon became Director of Football, with Lance Key returning to the club (again) this time as manager. Season 2016/17 however saw yet another relegation, back to the Eastern Counties League where it all started in the 1990's.

After a season of adjustment in 2017-18 at the end of which the team finished 6th in the Eastern Counties League Premier Division, 2018-19 saw the club heading in the right direction again as Key lead the side to promotion claiming the league title with an impressive 14 point margin.

On returning to Step 4, the club was unexpectedly allocated a place in the Isthmian League for the first time in its' 115-year history. After spending much of the 2019/20 season in the top half of the league's North division, a mid-table finish looked to be on the cards before the season was curtailed due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

The end of the season also saw the club Chairman John Hall step down after four years in which the focus had been upon restoring community links, simplifying the ownership structure, repaying debts, cutting costs and introducing ladies teams.

Under John's leadership, youth development continued to feature high on the club's priorities list with a clear pathway from Academy through Scholarship and into the First Team for our young players.

Existing Board member Richard Barlow succeeded John Hall as Chairman in the summer of 2020 and is looking to continue the progress made in recent years with a view to re-positioning the club within the local community and bringing the highest level of football the club can successfully sustain to Bridge Road.

Meet The Boys

Goalkeepers:

Sam Roach:

Very talented young keeper who was a part of the academy here at Bridge Road before moving on to Leyton Orient, from where he joined us on loan for the latter part of the 2016-17 season. Left Orient to join Mildenhall Town in the summer of 2017 and re-joined Histon on loan in December. That loan was made permanent in January 2018 and he has established himself as the first choice Number 1 with a string of impressive performances between the sticks.

Phil Peachey:

Experienced keeper who came to Bridge Road at the start of the 2019-20 season. Was previously at Godmanchester Rovers and has played at a number of clubs locally. Made 8 appearances for us last season and will push Sam Roach hard for the Number 1 shirt this season.

Defenders:

Andreu Ballester:

Left or right sided midfielder/defender who signed for Histon in August 2018. The Spaniard was with Cherry Hinton previously and made his debut from the bench against Whitton United in September 2018. Pacey and skilful, he has become an important member of the team making most of his appearances from the right back position.

James Chivers:

Defender signed from Newmarket Town in September 2017 who also had a brief spell at Bridge Road during the 2016-17 season.

Has become a mainstay of the defence since signing with a consistently high level of performance that has made him an important part of the Histon back line. Scored his first goal for the club at Stowmarket Town towards the end of the 2017-18 season and now has over 100 appearances for the club to his name.

Alfie Lawrence:

Young defender, captain of the Under 18's side, Histon Scholar and now first team regular Alfie certainly made an impression last season, earning his first call up to the senior side for the FA Trophy tie against Corby Town in October when making his debut from the bench. His first senior start came soon after in the Velocity Trophy against Soham Town Rangers before making his first league start for us in November away at Maldon & Tiptree to much acclaim with a man of the match performance from left back.

Charlie Lewis:

Right-sided but versatile defender who can play full-back or in the centre, Charlie first joined us at the start of the 2019/20 season before moving to the USA on a Scholarship. Returning to the UK this summer he has joined up with the squad again for the 2020/21 season until he's able to return to the States to continue his studies. Has shown plenty of ability during his time with us and is likely to feature regularly in the side this season.

Lewis McDonald:

Right sided defender who came through the Histon Scholarship, making his senior debut in the 2014/15 season during which he made 25 appearances, scoring once.

Macca returned to the country in the summer of 2018 after a spell in Australia where he most recently played for Altona City. He re-joined us here at Bridge Road in July 2018 and is nearing 100 appearances for the club.

Max York:

Max returned to Bridge Road for the fourth time in summer 2016 having moved to Biggleswade Town during the 2015-16 season. He made his first Histon debut in 2009-10 and can also name Rushden & Diamonds, Kettering Town and Biggleswade Town amongst his other clubs.

The Skipper had an outstanding year in 2016-17, leading from the front and deservedly picking up both the Supporters' and Managers' Player of the Year Awards.

Midfielders:

George Coy:

George joined us in October 2019 after a brief spell at Mildenhall Town. He is a natural left-sided player who is equally comfortable in midfield or defence. George played his youth football with Rushden and Diamonds but moved across to the Cambridge United scholarship programme when the Northamptonshire club folded. On his release from the U's, George gained valuable experience with Hardwick and Cambridge University Press before moving to Australia. Since joining us at Bridge Road he has gone on to become an important and regular presence at the heart of the midfield.

Josh Dawkin:

A very experienced and talented campaigner, Josh signed on at Bridge Road in September 2020 following a string of impressive performances in pre-season. Starting his career at Norwich City Josh made a handful of first team appearances for the Canaries before moving on to play for a number of clubs locally. After recovering from a serious injury that kept him out of the game for two years he returned to action last season with Godmanchester Rovers on loan from St Ives Town and Lance finally managed to get his signature this summer after previously trying to lure the midfielder to Bridge Road last year.

Danny Gould:

Versatile defender/midfielder/forward who can play on either side. Completed his Histon Scholarship in the summer of 2016 and by the end of 2016/17 had cemented his place as a regular starter in the side. Impressed his fellow players so much during the 2017/18 season that he won the Players' Player of the Year Award that year.

Now with well over 100 appearances for the club he is firmly established as a key member of the team and offers a real threat to opposition defences.

Buster Harradine:

Experienced midfielder Harradine was brought into the squad by Lance Key in the summer of 2019, bringing versatility to go with that experience as well as being naturally left footed, all of which will give the Gaffer greater options as the season progresses. Has previously played at Cambridge City, Soham Town Rangers, St Ives Town and Godmanchester Rovers.

Evan Key:

Key was with Bury Town as a youngster but joined Biggleswade Town in 2012, quickly becoming a regular starter in the Waders First Team. He moved to Bridge Road in September 2014 and his versatility initially saw him appearing in midfield and defence before settling into a centre half role. He returned to Biggleswade in February 2016 before returning again to Bridge Road in February 2017.

Playing regularly in midfield since 2017/18 he has added goal scoring to his repertoire, including a remarkable four goal haul at Hadleigh United in February 2018.

Tobi Lawal:

An exciting young prospect who joined us from Mildenhall Town in September 2020. Strong, pacey and skilful he has impressed when playing out wide in pre-season but he can also play centrally and the manager is expecting him to push on and develop into an all-round attacking midfielder over time. The Irishman's playing time was limited at Mildenhall last season due to injury but he's fit and ready to go this year and looks to be a real talent in the making.

Lewis Mair:

Left sided defender or midfielder Lewis is another tremendously talented youngster to make the step-up from our Under 18's side. He made his senior debut in 2019/20 and made 14 appearances in total last season. With an outstanding wand of a left foot his forays forward show a player with the confidence and ability to make a real impact on games despite his young age and he's expected to continue to impress this season.

Lee Smith:

Midfielder who was with Histon as a youngster before moving on in 2011 to play for Bury Town, Lowestoft Town, Biggleswade Town and again for Lowestoft Town. He re-joined Histon in the summer of 2015 before moving on again to King's Lynn Town in September that year. Returned to Bridge Road in February 2017 and his experience, together with his undoubted quality, has made him an important and creative contributor in the heart of midfield.

Simon Swinton:

Tenacious midfielder signed in July 2018 ahead of the 2018/19 campaign. Made his debut from the bench on the opening day against Haverhill Rovers and went on to make over 30 appearances last season, scoring twice. He has continued to add steel to the midfield this season and now a regular in the side he has notched up nearly 80 appearances for us this far.

Forwards:

Dan Brown:

Forward who was a part of Mildenhall Town's ECL Premier Division title winning side in 2016-17. Joined Ely City in January 2018 before moving to Bridge Road in March that year and made an immediate impact with 8 goals in 9 games before the end of the season. He continued to find the net regularly the following season, ending with 26 goals to his name and forming a dangerous partnership with fellow striker Ed Rolph up front. With 49 goals from 98 appearances surely the 2020/21 season will see him reach some big milestones in a Histon shirt.

Sam Reed:

Hugely experienced striker Reed joined us from Ely City in September and comes with a goal scoring reputation few can rival locally. Best known for several very successful years at Bury Town, Reed has also played for Newmarket Town, Biggleswade Town and Cambridge City in his time and brings that experience and natural predatory goal scoring instinct to the squad for the 20/21 season.

Ed Rolph:

Striker signed in July 2017 from Sawston United who previously played for the University of Nottingham. Took a while to hit his stride and was hampered by injury early in his first season but struck a rich vein of form after returning to fitness at Christmas 2017, scoring his first Histon hat-trick against Great Yarmouth in February and ending the season as the clubs' top scorer with 19 in all competitions from 38 appearances. He added another 21 goals from 40 appearances the following season and another 18 from 35 last season.

Last time out for the Rovers

SIX GOAL THRILLER AT CHADFIELDS
