Isthmian Midweek Round-Up

We had a reduced set of fixtures due to the after-effects of storm Kia-Ora, but those that went ahead provided plenty of drama. Here's our round up.

Premier Division

It was only ten days since Bowers and Pitsea and Haringey Borough last met, but familiarity didn't get in the way of the excitement at the Len Salmon last night, as Bowers ran out three-two victors.

Brad Warner gave the hosts an early lead from the spot, but they held it for only twelve minutes before another spot kick saw Borough equalise, Danilt Akindayini firing past Callum Chafer from twelve yards. It took until eight minutes after the break for the next goal to arrive, and once more it was Warner, firing home his nineteenth of the season- this time from open play- and it was three-one within ten minutes, an own goal giving the hosts a cushion. Two minutes from time Akindayini got his second of the match to narrow the gap, but the visitors couldn't find an equaliser and the hosts moved above them into fourteenth place.

Elsewhere, a Surrey derby saw Leatherhead and Kingstonian play out a one-one draw at Fetcham Grove. Both goals came in a six minute period before the break, Gus Sow putting the K's ahead in the thirty seventh minute, Jerry Nnamani equalising two minutes before half time. The Tanners remain ninth, the K's eleventh.

Into the North Division, and the big game at the bottom of the table saw Romford move to within three points of safety with their second victory in a row. After defeating second bottom side Felixstowe and Walton United on Saturday, they welcomed Brentwood Town- third from bottom- to Parkside, and ran out three-two winners due to a late, late winner from Gabriel Adelowo.

Mekhi McLeod put the hosts ahead from the spot, but an own goal drew Town level ten minutes later. Louie Theophanous restored the lead in the twenty seventh minute, but it seemed as if the visitors had grabbed a point when Adam Topley equalised six minutes from time- but with only a minute left Adelowo sent the home fans wild. Town are four points ahead of Romford having played a game more, Felixstowe three points ahead having played five games more.

At the other end of the table, Tilbury moved up to fourth as they eased to victory over Grays Athletic. Both goals came midway through the first half, David Knight putting the Dockers ahead from the spot after twenty three minutes, Thomas Barton getting the second eight minutes later.

Basildon United put eight points between themselves and last place with a one-nil win at Great Wakering Rovers. Joseph Paxman got the goal eighteen minutes from time, as Rovers ended the match with nine men.

There was one match in the South Central Division, and it saw Westfield get back to winning ways with a comfortable three-nil victory over Staines Town. The Swans have announced eleven new signings over the last few days, but their new recruits didn't help them much as Arsen Ujkaj, Max Blackmore and Aaron Watson lifted the hosts up into third place.

In the South East Division, fifth place Herne Bay needed two goals in the last ten minutes to take a point at Faversham Town. Bay took an early lead as Zak Ansah got his twenty fifth goal of the season, and they held it until the hour mark when Kelvin Ogboe equalised for the Lilywhites. One minute later and the same player had put Faversham ahead, and in the seventy eighth minute Ogboe got his hat trick from the spot- and must have assumed he'd clinched three points for his side. Bay had other ideas, and Simon Kabamba reduced the arrears with seven minutes remaining, before Keiron Campbell got the leveller in the very last minute.

East Grinstead Town must love playing Three Bridges. After picking up their first win of the season against their Sussex rivals on Saturday, they secured another point against them last night- and in doing so moved to within five points of second bottom Ramsgate, with a game in hand. Bridges, who are three points and one place further up the table, took the lead with an own goal after eleven minutes, but the Wasps were level after twenty five minutes, Stephen Smith with the goal, and eleven minutes after the break Daniel Thompson put them ahead. Curtis Gayler got the Bridges equaliser nine minutes from time

In the Velocity Trophy something rather surprising happened. Worthing lost again! And then something even more surprising happened- Maldon & Tiptree lost too! Worthing were hosting Cheshunt, and took a lead into the break as Thomas Chalaye scored in the thirty sixth minute. The second half, however, belonged to the Ambers- Reece Beckles-Richards, Amadou Kassarate and Ashley Nzala with the goals which turned the match on its head and sent Cheshunt through. The Ambers must wish they could move to Sussex, as they've now played two matches in the county over the last few days and scored nine goals!

Today's Visitors

ROBBIE NIGHTINGALE (37). Cambridge born and a member of City's youth setup in his early teens, Robbie progressed into the first team and made over 350 appearances in two spells at the club, sandwiching a few years at Histon during their climb through the leagues. He left City for Royston Town in summer 2013 before becoming manager at Soham Town Rangers in 2015. Robbie took the helm at City in December last season and nearly pulled off a miracle escape from relegation.

NEIL MIDGLEY (39): In summer 2013 Neil was appointed as first team coach. Neil is a product of Ipswich Town's Academy but he made his name at Barnet where he scored freely. He moved on to Kettering Town via Canvey Island. Neil had a three month loan spell with City in 2006 before returning to Kettering for three weeks when he made the move to City permanent. Neil has made over 300 appearances for City and is now Assistant Manager.

DAVE THEOBALD (39): Cambridge born and bred, Dave is one of the finest centre halves ever to play for City. In six seasons he made 261 appearances and scored 39 goals. He cut his teath in management with Robbie Nightingale at Soham: Town Rangers and joined City with Nightingale in 2016 as Head Coach.

DANNY BONESS (22): Danny is on loan from Hemel Hempstead Town . Danny is a goalkeeper and former West Ham scholar . He has previously had spells with Colchester United , Grays and Biggleswade Town .

DAN GEORGE (24): Dan is a goalkeeper. He was first choice between the sticks at Corby Town for almost three seasons before joining City in November this season.

MIKEY DAVIS (20): Mickey was originally with City in his teens before winning a scholarship with Grimsby Town. He wasn't kept on by the Mariners and moved on to join Haverhill Borough, his home town side, before later switching to Haverhill Rovers. He signed for City in November '18 and can operate either as a full-back or wide midfielder.

SEB SIMPSON (24): Seb is a fullback who can put in a shift in midfield or at centreback . He joined City in November last season from Kempston Rovers . Seb's only other club was Bedford Town .

YAW OFOSU (23): Yaw joined City in November this season from Newport Pagnell Town . He came in as cover centreback but has proved to be a very capable rightback.

JORDAN GENT (27): Jordan originally joined City in December 2016 and soon became a fans favourite during the relegation battle that failed on goal difference and the following seasons run to the playoff final . Last season he moved up a level to Biggleswade Town , but returned to City in September this season . Jordan is a centreback

TOM GARDINER (24): Tom is primarily a centreback back can also play centre midfield or rightback. He is a product of Spurs academy but his first senior football was with Hibernian from where he joined City in 2014. After 14 impressive performances he moved on to Dartford and later St Albans, Eastbourne and Chelmsford. He resigned for City on New Years Eve.

LUKE KNIGHT (31): Luke was signed from Royston Town in October this season. He is a very experienced and competitive central midfielder. He captained St Ives Town to promotion three years ago.

JARID ROBSON (24): Cambridge born Jarid is a goalscoring midfielder. He starred for Haverhill Borough before being snapped up by Mildenhall Town where he was spotted by Bury Town who signed him last summer. He moved over to Bury Town in November.

EBBY NELSON-ADDY (27): Ebby is a very influential, hardworking midfielder. He joined City in March 2018 from Barton Rovers. By November the following season he had become City's leading scorer but was lured by the bright lights of Bedford Town, cutting his travelling in half. However, in December this season he decided the grass wasn't greener and returned to City.

NATHAN OLUKANMI (26): Nathan's story mirrors his travelling companion Ebby (above). He joined us from Barton Rovers in November 2017, went off to Bedford before returning in December this season. Nathan is one of the fastest players in non league football and can play on either wing.

TOMMY RIGBY (17): Tommy is a member of City's youth set up and played in our Development side last season . He plays in midfield .

KAIDYN MICHAEL (18): Kaidyn learned his trade in Cambridge United's Academy and Development team. He can play anywhere across the middle of the park .

AREL AMU (24): Arel is a long time target of City manager, Robbie Nightingale and indeed put in seven days notice for him when he was at Dunstable Town last season but Arel joined Hemel Hempstead instead. Arel is a central striker with an eye for goal

RYAN SHARMAN (24): Ryan originally joined City in December 2016 and soon became leading goalscorer during the relegation battle that failed on goal difference and the following seasons run to the playoff final when he scored 40 plus goals. Last summer he moved up a level to Leiston but returned to City in September this season.

ISAAC MANYARD (22): Isaac is a silky skilled hard working midfielder previously with Ipswich Town's academy. He joined our development squad last season and soon became a regular in the first team squad.

NICKI DEMBELE (22): Nicki joined City on New Years Eve. He is a free scoring left winger formerly with Waltham Forest, Metropolitan Police and Lingfield (Surrey).

RYAN INGREY (27): Ryan is a Royston Town legend having played a major part in their rise from The Sparton League over the last 8 seasons and was voted in to their team of the decade. Ryan can play anywhere across the front or in centre midfield.

 $TOM\ WOOD\ (25\)$: Tom was signed from St Ives Town at the end of January having previously played severall seasons with St Neots Town . He can play anywhere across the back or in centre midfield .

Cambridge City FC – history

Early years

The club was formed in 1908 as Cambridge Town, the direct descendant of the earlier Cambridge St Mary's club which had folded at the end of the 1907-1908 season following a dispute with the local Cambs FA. As a torchbearer for amateur football in the days when many clubs viewed the professional game with disdain, the new club affiliated itself with the recently established Amateur Football Association rather than the local FA. Trophy success came early, with a notable victory being achieved in the International Du Nord Trophy in 1912 after beating host club Tourquennois in Northern France.

Cambridge Town amalgamated with an earlier Cambridge United club in May 1914, joined the Cambs FA for the first time and in turn gained entry into the FA Cup and the FA Amateur Cup for the first time, whilst retaining their AFA links. The club's best ever run in the Amateur Cup came in 1928 when they reached the semi Final only to lose to Leyton at Fulham's Craven Cottage ground. The club moved to the Town Ground in Milton Road in April 1922, having previously played at Purbeck Road (1908-1911), the Hills Road Bridge Ground (1911-1914), Trinity College New Field (1920-1922) and various other grounds in the period 1919 to 1920.

Town v Town

A rivalry developed with Ipswich Town during the late 1920's and mid 1930. Huge crowds attended these games at Milton Road, peaking at 11,916 in 1929. Both clubs' success in the Southern Amateur League prompted invitations to join the newly formed semi-professional Eastern Counties League in 1935.

Ipswich accepted, but the Cambridge Committee declined on account of their commitment to amateur football, so the two Towns went their separate ways. Within three years Ipswich had been elected to the Football League leaving Cambridge fans wondering what might have been! Cambridge Town moved on to the Spartan League, winning three league titles between 1945 and 1950. Shortly after progression to the Athenian League, Cambridge was granted City status in 1951 and with it the club's name change to Cambridge City

Southern League Champions

City finally left the amateur game in 1958 and joined the Southern League, gaining a place in the Premier Division of the Southern League ahead of local rivals Cambridge United in their first season. City won the Premier Division in 1962/63, edging out United in an enthralling title race with the local derby at Milton Road being witnessed by over 11,500 people. The absence of automatic promotion to the Football League put a lid on City's ambitions. Nevertheless, City were regular challengers for the title and had the highest attendances in non-league football up until the mid-1960s. But City lost their way and were relegated to Southern League Division 1 in 1967/68. Promotion back to the Premier Division followed in 1969/70, but this was the same season Cambridge United were elected to the Football League. City were left to reflect that, in 12 Southern League seasons together, they had finished above their local rivals in 7 of them. Strife in the 1970s

City finished Southern League runners up in 1970/71, but the latter years of the decade were dreadful. Relegation in 1975/76 saw crowds dwindle and the Club fall into decline. In 1977, Directors decided to return the Club to amateur status by joining the Isthmian League but, in scenes that would be repeated 30 years later, subsequent fans' protests forced most of the Board to resign. The club thus remained in the Southern League. Better times

After the redevelopment of the ground in the mid 1980's, City gradually improved and a new generation of fans mobbed their heroes after the 1985/86 Southern League Southern Division championship was won on the last day of the season. The goal scoring exploits of Gary Grogan were instrumental in City's recovery, according him a 'City Legend 'status. Since 1993, City have reached the 1st round proper of the FA Cup five times and the 2nd round once, which is a far better record than achieved by the more illustrious City sides of the 1960s.

Ups and downs

Recent seasons have been a roller-coaster ride for the City faithful. City's best season for 30 years saw them finish runners up in the inaugural Conference South season in 2004/05, going on to lose in the play-offs. Off the field the ground had been sold to pay off mounting debts and matters took a turn for the worse in 2006 when the then Board announced an agreement to allow City to be absorbed into Cambridge United. With City on the brink of extinction,

supporters were galvanised into a campaign which eventually forced Directors to resign, to be replaced by members of the Cambridge City Supporters' Trust. The opening league match of 2006/07 was arguably the most memorable since the early 1960s – not merely because City won with a stoppage time winner at Havant & Waterlooville, but because it offered irrefutable proof that that City had survived a blatant attempt to kill it off and were very much alive and kicking. City celebrated their centenary in 2008, but were demoted at the end the 2007/08 season due to over-zealously applied ground regulations. This decision ended 22 consecutive seasons in the 2nd tier of non-league football. City lost out to Gloucester City in the 2008/09 play-off. In the 2009/10 season, City won the Southern League Cup for the first time and finished one point shy of a playoff place. With the ground sold, a groundshare agreement was in place with Newmarket Town for the 2010/11 season but a last minute offer from our landlord meant that City had another season in its own stadium and celebrated by securing a place in the playoffs with a 4th place finish in the league. However, this was met with disappointment again as the team went down one nil away to Salisbury City. Another reprieve following a new deal with the landlord gave City two more seasons at Milton Road, 2011/12 and 2012/13. Once again the play-offs were reached but again an away defeat in the semi final, this time at Oxford City. This disappointment was however tempered by the news that the club has secured a site on which to build a new stadium and training complex. City ultimately missed out on a play-off spot in the 2012/13 season, but the club enjoyed a FA Cup run, with a televised first round proper home tie with MK Dons producing a fantastic night with a nil nil draw at Milton Road before losing in the replay at Stadium MK. With our lease on the stadium finally coming to an end, April 27th 2013 saw the last ever first team match at the ground before a large crowd with mixture of tears and smiles. Adrian Cambridge had the honour of scoring the last ever goal at Milton Road in the one nil victory over Redditch United.

New era

A new era for the club commenced in August 2013 starting with a ground-share at Histon FC. City once again reached the play-offs that season but once again tasted semi final defeat, this time at home to St Albans City. The 2015-16 season saw City move to share at St Ives Town FC. Manager Gary Roberts left in the summer of 2016 after 13 years at the club. His replacement Dan Gleeson had a short and ultimately unsuccessful spell in charge, former player Robbie Nightingale taking over as manager in December 2016. Robbie won his first game in charge to boost City's hopes of avoiding the drop. City's playing record improved culminating in five wins and a draw in their last six games but ultimately it was not enough and the club were relegated to step four for the first time in our history. Hopes of bouncing straight back were dashed when City lost in the play-off to Hartley Wintney. After three seasons at St Ives, City are now back at Histon FC whilst waiting for the new ground in Sawston to be built.

In the summer of 2019 City were moved laterally to The Isthmian League, which is the first time we have competed in said league .

Diego Martínez Penas (born 16 December 1980) is a Spanish football manager, currently in charge of Granada.

Born in Vigo, Pontevedra, Galicia, Martínez was a full back capable of playing on either side. He spent his youth career at Celta de Vigo and Cádiz CF, representing the former for nine years.

Martínez retired from professional football at the age of 20, and started his coaching career with CD Imperio de Albolote's youth categories, while also playing for their first team. In 2004, he moved to Arenas CD, being initially in

charge of the youth setup.

An assistant manager in the 2005–06 campaign, Martínez was appointed manager of the first team in July 2006, in Tercera División. The following year he was named Motril CF manager, and remained in charge for two years.

In October 2009 Martínez moved to Sevilla FC, immediately joining the backroom staff. He was in charge of the club's C-team the following season, and subsequently managed the Juvenil squad.

On 22 May 2012, Martínez was named assistant at the first team, replacing Javi Navarro. On 13 June 2014, he was appointed at the helm of the reserves in Segunda División B, and managed to achieve promotion to Segunda División in 2016. After avoiding relegation with the reserve side, Martínez opted not to renew his contract, and was appointed in charge of CA Osasuna on 14 June 2017. The following 7 June, he left the club after failing to qualify for the play-offs. On 14 June 2018, Martínez was named Granada CF manager, and achieved promotion to La Liga at the end of the season. The youngest manager of the 2019–20 campaign, his side enjoyed their best-ever league start after achieving 20 points in ten matches, bringing Granada CF to the top of La Liga for 2 weeks. As a result, he was rewarded with a one-year contract extension through 2021 on 14 November 2019. On 16 December 2019, he was awarded with the Miguel Muñoz Trophy (shared with José Bordalás) by Marca.



Gabriel Alejandro Paletta; born 15 February 1986) is a footballer who plays as a defender for Serie C club Monza. Born in Argentina to parents of Italian descent, Paletta represented his birth nation at the under-20 level, participating in the 2005 FIFA World Youth Championship in the Netherlands. He started all seven matches as Argentina won the title. In 2014, Paletta was called up to the Italy national team and made his debut in a friendly against Spain. He represented Italy at the FIFA World Cup later that year.


2006-07 season

In February 2006, Paletta agreed to sign with Liverpool and eventually signed a four-year contract on 4 July 2006. Paletta became the second Argentine to play for the Merseyside club, after Mauricio Pellegrino. Paletta's first appearance for Liverpool came in a pre-season friendly against Wrexham in July. He scored his first goal for Liverpool during a 2006–07 Football League Cup third round 4–3 win against Reading on 25 October 2006. Paletta debuted for Liverpool in the 2006–07 Premier League season in a 4–0 away win against Wigan Athletic on 2 December; he was substituted onto the field for Sami Hyypiä in the 61st minute. Paletta would go on to make just two more league appearances for Liverpool.

Paletta debuted in the 2006–07 UEFA Champions League in a group stage fixture in a 3–2 away defeat against Galatasaray on 5 December. He was substituted off of the field in the 66th minute for Luis García. Paletta played a full 90 minutes of Liverpool's 2006–07 Football League Cup quarter-final match, a 6–3 home defeat against Arsenal on 9 January 2007. By the time that Paletta had made just eight appearances for Liverpool in all competitions, it was reported on 9 July that Paletta would be loaned to Spanish club Levante in order to gain some valuable first-team experience as Levante had expressed their interest signing Paletta on loan deal for the whole of 2007–08 season. Although Liverpool manager Rafael Benítez had agreed to loaning the defender, the loan deal was not reached. Liverpool went on to reach the final of the 2006–07 UEFA Champions League, losing 2–1 to Milan on 23 May 2007.

On 26 August, it had been officially reported that Liverpool had agreed for Paletta to sign with Boca Juniors, having welcomed the arrival of Argentine Emiliano Insúa.







