IT'S DIFFICULT to know what to write about sometimes in these programme columns we send out each week.

Do people want to hear views on the big issues around the game? Are you flicking through a programme for some light-hearted reading at half-time?

It feels like everything has been a bit serious recently. And rightfully so. Clubs up and down are worried about the future. What makes it harder, in this Covid pandemic, is a lot of the things we are worrying about when it comes to Non-League football are largely out of everyone's control.

While clubs can put the right protocols in place, if the government suddenly decide no fans then there's not much that can be done about it.

It's a frustrating time for all, perhaps summed up by the situation this weekend in the FA Cup where Step 2 fans aren't allowed to watch their team play live, be it home or away.

At the time of writing, there is still great uncertainty for National League clubs about their kick-off. They will be behind closed doors but with almost no exceptions, that will only work if there is sufficient support from the Government or the Premier League.

All we really want is to watch our teams play again. That goes for every club throughout the pyramid. Those who already have fans in want to make sure the gates stay open.

Perhaps this tricky period reminds us why we started watching Non-League football in the first place. The thought sprung to mind from last week's NLP where our new columnist Tony Incenzo talkSPORT's journalist and Non-League expert – about the importance of getting young fans through the doors.

Tony recounts how his mum used to drop him and a friend at the gates of Hendon and would return at 4.45pm to pick them up knowing they will have had an enjoyable, and safe, afternoon watching their local side. From their Tony's passion for these levels of the game soared and, anyone who follows him on twitter, will know just how many grounds he has visited over the years.

It got me to thinking about my own involvement in the game. My Dad is the one to blame, Heavily involved in Non-League football, I probably had no choice. But I loved going down to a ground, smelling the liniment waft from the changing rooms before standing so close to the action soaking it all in. I enjoyed watching Premier League football, like any other kid, but really Non-League was the place to be.

That then morphed into regularly watching Farnborough Town with friends before, in our teenage years, that transformed into away games as well.

We'd hop on the train early in the morning and headed off to far flung destinations like Hitchin, Carshalton and St Albans.

It's only a few years later when you start driving that you realise these places are not that far away at all. But that was our Saturdays. Stopping at McDonalds on the way to the ground. Stopping there again on the way back to the station. Navigating our way through Clapham Junction and eventually arriving back home tired but fulfilled.

That's what Covid has shown me, anyway. How much I enjoy being at a game with other people and soaking it all in. How I enjoy going to a game with my Dad, who kick-started my love affair with Non-League in the first place. And, with that, I'm off tonight to see a game with him. Enjoy your game.

Today's Visitors

Nicknamed 'The Bees' Basildon United came into being in 1967, previously Armada Sports as a junior club, who were formed four years earlier. In 1967/68 the renamed club joined the Grays and Thurrock League moving into the Greater London League the following season.

The first major step was in 1970 when the Essex County FA granted Basildon United Senior status and they became founder members of the Essex Senior League. It was not long before Basildon got amongst the honours and when they successfully applied for promotion to the Athenian League in 1980 they could look back on four consecutive Championships from 1977 until 1980 and this still stands as a League record. In addition they also finished runners-up in 1973 and 1975 and the League Cup was won in 1978 to complete that season's double. The following season they carried off the Essex Senior Trophy.

Basildon United's membership of the Athenian League only lasted one season as they finished runners-up to Windsor and Eton and earned promotion to the Isthmian League Division 2. Also in this season, 1980/81, they progressed to the quarter finals of the FA Vase before Irthingborough Diamonds ended the bees run winning 6-4 in a sixth round replay.

After three seasons in the Isthmian Division 2, Basildon United were promoted as Champions in 1984 pipping St Albans City by one point on the last day of the season. This season saw them reach the finals of both the Essex Senior Trophy and the Eastern Floodlight Competition.

The bees found life a lot harder in Division 1 and eventually lost their struggle against relegation in 1989 back to Division 2[north], this the first time they had been relegated in their history. Two further seasons were spent in Division 2[north] before the decision to deregionalise the Isthmian Second Division saw the club resign from the Isthmian League and re-joined the Essex Senior League in 1991/92. The club felt that an excess of travelling in an Isthmian Division 3 was not viable at that point.

The club quickly regrouped both on and off the pitch and it wasn't long before the Senior League successes of the late seventies were emulated. The bees finished in the top six in both 1991/92 and 1992/93 and made a League Cup Final appearance in 1992.

A superb 1993/94 season saw Basildon United again win the Essex Senior League double, the championship being won for a record fifth time and the following season, 1994/95, they battled through to the FA Vase Quarter Final for the second time in their history before losing out to Raunds Town.

During 1997/98 Basildon United equalled Brentwood's record of three League Cup wins by beating Burnham Ramblers 1-0 in the final and it was Basildon's sixth appearance in the Essex Senior League Cup final which is also a record. The Bees also finished runners-up to Concord Rangers in the Essex Senior League.

1999/2000 saw Basildon United finish 13th their worst ever season till the 2007/08 season and although a reasonable 8th position was achieved in 2000/01 two bottom half positions followed for the next two years.

The club finished 7th in both 2003/04 and 2004/05. John Higley was Bees manager at the start of the 2007/08 season but was replaced by Jason Emery in October, the club struggled for form all season and used 72 players only to finish in 16th just one place off the bottom, the only consolation was winning the 'Best Programme in the League' award. A new management team of Colin Cook and Gary Morris was announced for the 2008/09 season and the club won its first six matches and reached the second round proper of the FA Vase, by December the management team had left the club and ex reserve coach Jody Prewell was appointed Manager with the Bees finishing the season in 8th place.

Jody left the club by mutual consent in April 2010 and was replaced by Sean Merchant as Caretaker Manager. The Bees suffered their heaviest defeat on April 24th when losing 10-0 at Witham Town with the club finishing the season in 12th place.

In May 2010 John Doyle returned to the club as First Team Manager bringing in former Romford Manager Mark Reed as his Assistant and Paul Rogan as Coach.

After a 12th place finish in the Essex Senior League John Doyle decided to step down at the end of the 2010/11 season and the club advertised for a new Manager, over 30 hopefuls applied and Paul Larke was appointed as the Bees First Team Manager in June 2011, after the club's worst start of the season in our history Larke resigned following a 9-1 defeat at Witham Town and John Doyle returned to oversee the forthcoming FA Vase match against Ampthill Town. The following week Chris Wood was appointed permanent Manager.

Unfortunately no improvement was seen in results and The Bees finished bottom of the ESL for the first time in their history Former Ramsden Manager Bobby Barnes was appointed in May 2012 and at just 27 was one of the youngest managers in non-league football. After Barnes decided to resign due to work commitments John Higley returned to the club and was assisted by Steve Brown senior. After a number of managerial changes the club ended the 2012/13 season with Bertie Brayley as player/manager and the club finished in 13th position. Laurie Carter was appointed manager for the 2013/14 season and the club finished in 8th position.

In May 2014 Colin Cook returned to the club as First Team Manager and was assisted by Craig Gillam until he left during September only to be replaced by his Assistant who guided the Bees to a 12th place finish.

Ahead of the 2015/16 season Lee Connor was appointed as assistant to Craig Gillam and the club enjoyed its best season for many years winning the League Challenge Cup and finishing runners up in the ESL, Brad Warner also won the League's Golden Boot award.

In May 2016 the club appointed Aaron Bloxham, who had enjoyed success at White Ensign, as its first team manager and he was assisted by John Radford. Amid Table finish was achieved in the Essex Senior League as well as notably success in the FA Vase and Essex Senior Cup.

In May 2017 Marc Harrison joined the Bees from Essex Olympian League team Basildon Town and he will be assisted by Liam Wallace.

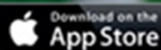

Niall John Quinn
(honorary MBE; born 6 October 1966)

Niall is an Irish former professional footballer and businessman, and the ex-chairman of Sunderland. Quinn continued as Sunderland's director responsible for international development until he stepped down in February 2012.

He played club football for English Premier League teams Arsenal, Manchester City and Sunderland during the 1980s, 1990s and 2000s. Quinn also received 92 caps for the Republic of Ireland national football team,

scoring 21 times, which makes him Ireland's second highest goalscorer of all time.

He also appeared with the Irish team at the UEFA European Football Championship of 1988 and two FIFA World Cups in 1990 and 2002.

Niall Quinn played Gaelic football for the Perrystown, Dublin 12, club Robert Emmets. He also played underage football and hurling for Dublin. In July 1983, Quinn captained a Dublin Colleges GAA party on a one-month tour of Australia.

Aged 16, he played in the 1983 All-Ireland Minor Hurling Championship Final, and was offered a contract to play professional Australian rules football before settling on a career in soccer. He played Gaelic football for Co. Kildare club Eadestown after his retirement, winning a junior C county title in 2008
