Bank Holiday Round Up In The Isthmian North

North Division

Great Waking Rovers started the day at the top of the table after two victories, but faced a tough task as title favourites Coggeshall Town were waiting for them. The Seed Growers had four points from their opening two matches, and soon made it seven, Tom Hubble and Tevan Allen with a goal in each half to earn them a 2-0 win. Coggeshall climb to fourth, Rovers slip to seventh.

It was second v fourth at Park Drive as Maldon and Tiptree hosted Witham Town, and it was first v ninth by the end- or, in truth, by the thirty sixth minute, as by then the Jammers were four goals up. William Cracknell, Charlee Hughes with two and Al-Al Amin scored them, and although Shamido Pedulu pulled one back for Witham after the break, Tyrique Hyde restored the four goal gap to make it five-one seven minutes from time.

Third place Canvey Island, along with Rovers and the Jammers protecting one hundred percent records, travelled to face new boys Hullbridge Sports, and moved up to second with a three-one victory. Josh Hutchinson, George Purcell and Tobi Joseph gave the Gulls a three-nil lead, and although Ola Ogunfunmilade got one back it was no more than a consolation.

Fifth place Bury Town and eighth place Cambridge City both started the day with four points, but by the end Town had seven, as they recovered from scoring an own goal after two minutes to score three of their own after the break. Ryan Horne, Jared Robson and Emmanuel Machaya found the net, and fired Bury into third place.

Heybridge Swifts, in seventh spot, looked to bounce back from their heavy FA Cup defeat at Grays Athletic as they travelled to Felixstowe and Walton United. The last time the sides met, back in February, the Seasiders despatched their visitors by three goals to nil, but although the game once more had three goals, Swifts got two of them. Alex Teniola and Elliott Ronto made it two-nil by the break, and although Miles Powell got one back five minutes after the restart to make the second half interesting that was the last goal of the game. Swifts end the day in fifth place.



Grays Athletic and Basildon United both recorded crushing FA Cup victories at the weekend, but the sides, who started the day in tenth and ninth place respectively, each had a win and a defeat from their two league matches so far. United took the lead after six minutes through Harry Doyle, but Athletic equalised ten minutes later through Steve King and then, when it looked as if a draw was certain, scored twice in the last five minutes to take the points. Tony Stokes got both goals as Grays climb to sixth.

Histon and AFC Sudbury also recorded FA Cup victories at the weekend, but it was the yellows who used that result as a springboard, following up with a four-one away win. Sean Marks got their first and last goals, Freddie King the two in the middle, whilst Danny Gould got the consolation for Histon.

Dereham Town had recorded two draws in their opening two matches, but looked good in both. They hosted a Soham Town Rangers side yet to take a point, so the outcome was certain, wasn't it? It looked even more certain when the Magpies opened the scoring after six minutes through Eoin McQuaid, but Sam Mulready levelled for the Greens one minute later and then got Rangers winner nine minutes after the break. The visitors climb to thirteenth, Dereham slip to seventeenth- and the image above is of Sam celebrating what turned out to be his winning goal. It comes from Alan Palmer, and the rest of Alan's shots can be found here.

Romford lost so badly in their last league match that they'd offered supporters their money back, but they had a much better result in the FA Cup at the weekend so will have gone into their home clash with managerless Aveley with some confidence. That confidence was soon shattered after new signing Alex Read opened the scoring for the Millers, and then Aaron Condon and James Love made it 0-3 at the break. Keiron Owusu pulled one back for Boro, but Love scored again with nine minutes left to secure victory. Aveley climb to eighth, Romford remain in the basement. Tilbury, in eighteenth spot at kick off, hosted a match against another team with no points, Brentwood Town. There was only one goal, and it came to the Dockers, who climb to fourteenth. Jordan Cox found the net from the spot after 55 minutes.



Today's Visitors

Dereham Town Football Club was founded in 1884, spending many of its early years in the local Norwich District and the Dereham & District Leagues. During these early years, the Club made its first appearance in the Norfolk Senior Cup Final, when they lost to C.E.Y.M.S., in 1891-92.

Until 1965, the Club played in the Norfolk and Suffolk League prior to the formation of the Anglian Combination. In that transitional season Dereham Town won the Senior 'B' Division. In 1988-89 Dereham Town was relegated from the Premier Division of the Anglian Combination, thus losing their proud record of being the only Club to have never played outside the Premier Division since the League's formation in 1965. The following season Premier Division status was regained when the Division One title was claimed.

In 1993-94, the Senior Knockout Cup was won for the first time when Wymondham Town were comprehensively beaten 3-0 in the Final. December 1996 saw the Club move from its previous home on the Council owned Recreation Ground into the plush surrounding of the new site at Aldiss Park.

The Club's first full season at Aldiss Park (1997/98) saw the dream become reality when Eastern Counties League status was achieved with the club winning a first Anglian Combination Premier Division title. This was achieved by going undefeated for the first twenty-two League games and remaining undefeated all season away from Aldiss Park. Not content with just the League title, the club also won the Don Frost Memorial Cup. The Club's opening season in Eastern Counties League football (1998/99) saw the club finish seventh in Division One and reach the inaugural Division One Knockout Cup Final where League Champions Clacton Town beat us. The Club also received the annual Jewson Sportsmanship Trophy. Season 1999/2000 saw the First Team again finish seventh in Division One whilst the Reserves were crowned Champions of Anglian Combination Division Three.

For the second year running the Club again won the Jewson Sportsmanship Trophy.

At the start of season 2000/2001, Norwich City Football Club visited Aldiss Park for a pre-season friendly and although the 'Magpies' lost 9-0, a new record attendance of 1800 was established. That season saw the First Team secure promotion to the (then) Jewson Premier Division. For the third year in succession, the Club received the Jewson sportsmanship Trophy, along with the hospitality award and match day programme award.

In early July 2001, Norwich City again graced Aldiss Park with their presence and for the second year in succession a new record attendance was set for Aldiss Park, this time over 3000 witnessed a 3-0 win for the Canaries. Their first season in the Premier Division saw Dereham finish in a creditable 12th position. Norwich City again graced Aldiss Park in July 2005 when almost 3000 spectators saw the Canaries overcome the Magpies 6-0. In the League an inconsistent first-half of the 2005/06 season was followed by an excellent second-half which saw Dereham suffer only three defeats from mid-December and which culminated in the winning of the Norfolk Senior Cup at Carrow Road, where Norwich United were defeated 1-0. Eventual twelfth place in the League equalled the Clubs highest ever finish in the top division.

Season 2006/07 was the most successful in the Clubs history to date. The Norfolk Senior Cup was retained with a 1-0 victory over eventual League Champions Wroxham, sixth spot in the League was our highest ever finish and our Under-18s claimed the Ridgeons Youth Cup with a 3-1 victory against Blackstones. The Club was also awarded the Ridgeons 'Integrity in Football' trophy.

In March 2008 former Magpies player, Matt Henman, replaced Rob Taylor as manager after captain Adam Gusterson had briefly held the reigns as caretaker manager. Fourth place in the League was achieved with victory over Mildenhall Town in the last match of last season.

Season 08/09 again saw a fourth place finish in the Ridgeons Premier Division, a run to the fifth round of the FA Vase and, as in the previous season, a disappointing defeat in the semi-final of the Norfolk Senior Cup. Our Reserves finished fifth in their first season in the Ridgeons Reserve section. Season 09/10 was a good one for the Club despite the First Team having, by their recent high standards, a mediocre campaign eventually finishing tenth in the Ridgeons Premier Division and, for the third consecutive season, falling at the semi-final stage of the Norfolk Senior Cup. However, our Reserves finished second on goal difference in the Reserve Division North, the A Team secured their highest League position for some years, finishing third, also winning the Dick Davey Ambulance Cup and the Fen Regis Invitation Shield. Dereham Towns Under-18s won the Ridgeons Youth League East Division, suffering only one defeat all season, and then triumphed in the Championship play-off defeating Huntingdon Town 2-1.

In season 2010/11 the Magpies were runners up in the Ridgeons Premier League and won the Norfolk Senior Cup at Carrow Road, defeating a strong Kings Lynn Town side. The Reserves and Youth teams continued to progress with the Youths winning the Ridgeons Youth Cup, and 5 of this team were in the Norfolk Under-18 side which won the FA County Youth Cup.

Season 2011/12 was relatively disappointing with the side finishing in mid table in the League; however, the younger sides continued to thrive and hopefully many of these players will be pushing for a first team place in the future.

Season 2012/13 saw the Magpies achieve their first promotion since 1997/98 when the Thurlow Nunn Eastern Counties League Premier Division title was won and, with the necessary ground improvements in place, promotion to the Ryman League was achieved. And with the FA relaxing the criteria for the admission of Reserve sides at step 6 Dereham Town Reserves were voted into the Thurlow Nunn First Division for season 2013/14.

With both First and Reserve teams playing at their highest ever level, the 2013/14 season was eagerly anticipated. The First team experienced three defeats in their first four League matches but soon got to grips with the more physical aspects of step 4, thereafter losing only 10 of the next 42 games, eventually finishing the season in 7th place after briefly sitting in a play-off spot. The Reserves, with a predominantly young, development squad, were never likely to challenge at the top of the table,

but neither were they embarrassed by any opponent. Season 2014/15 saw further consolidation in the Ryman League with a second successive 7th place finish in Division One North. A good run in the FA Cup came to an end at Conference North Boston United. For our Reserves the season was once more a struggle but the squad produced some fine football without securing the results their play often warranted. Our Under-18's secured the Thurlow Nunn Youth League East

Division title, by defeating perennial rivals Wroxham in the last match of the season.

Another strong season in Ryman One North saw the Magpies end the 2015/16 season in 9th place. Again, a play-off place was briefly in view but in the event we finished 12 points off 5th place. However, the season ended on a high when a 2-0 victory against Ryman League bound Norwich United, at Carrow Road in May, secured the Norfolk Senior Cup for the fourth time in 10 years.

Our Reserves once again found themselves pitted against more experienced and wily opponents but faced up to the challenge admirably. The Under-18's reached the Second Round of the FA Youth Cup, bowing out of the competition at Mansfield Town – losing 4-3 to an extra-time goal. On the way Peterborough United's Under-18's were defeated 2-1 at Aldiss Park.

The 2016/17 season was ultimately a disappointing one as the Magpies ended the campaign in eighteenth place – the lowest finishing position since promotion to step 4 in 2013/14. As the season ended long-serving Club manager Matt Henman stepped down in order to take on a new challenge in Dubai.

2017/18 briefly saw the team heading the Bostik Division One North, the Club's highest ever position in the Non League System. After subsequently flirting with a play-off place a poor run of results during March and April saw an eventual eighth-place finish. In January 2019, following a run of poor results, manager Neal Simmons was replaced by former Magpies players Adam Gusterson and Olly Willis. The pair had jointly managed and taken Harleston Town from the Anglian Combination into step 6 football, winning both League and Cup on the way.

The 2018/19 season did end on a high with an extra time victory in the Norfolk Senior Cup Final at Carrow Road, making it a fifth County title for the club.

Elliot Pride (33) - Goalkeeper and a great organiser who has excellent distribution and one who the Club are delighted to retain for the 19/20 season.

Aiden Way (18) – Young goalkeeper that is working his way through the club's academy programme. Fantastic shot stopper. One to watch for the future.

Matt Castellan (24) - Commanding and ball-playing defender, Matt is back for his second spell at the Club, having made 12 appearances for the Magpies during the 17/18 season. Joined last season from Kings Lynn Town and was a big part of consolidating the defence after he arrived.

Shaun Wones (34) - Experienced and versatile player, equally at home in midfield or defence, with a knack for scoring. Possesses good technical ability and is an organiser and leader.

Adam Plumstead (28) – A strong, no nonsense centre half, often dominates in the air. Adam joined us from Wroxham during last season and was an ever present in our successful County Cup run.

Charlie Dickerson (17) – Current DESA student who has impressed in his first year in the Academy, making his first team debut in March 2019. A full back equally comfortable going forward as defending.

Dion Frary (22) – A versatile defender who can play anywhere across the backline, or as a holding midfielder. Dion joined us from King's Lynn last season following a successful loan spell with the club in 2017.

Sam Garner (30) – Experienced full back who joined the club in the summer of 2017. A knee injury suffered through his first season has kept him sidelined for a number of months, but he has returned this pre-season looking to reclaim his right back slot.

Jake Imrie (28) – Jake joins the club this summer from Harleston Town, combining once more with the management team of Adam and Olly. Jake's signing in a Porto shirt ended up going viral leading to an unlikely friendship forming between the two clubs.

Thomas Matthews (21) – An well organised and exciting young defender equally at home at full back or centre half. Tom joined us this summer from Stowmarket.

Lewis Johnson (18) – Another player who can play across defence or in a midfield role. Lewis joined the club during last season, having played in successive National Finals for Norfolk U18, captaining the side in his second season with them.

David Hinton (29) - Team captain, and 2018/19 player of the season who is comfortable on the ball and regularly puts in consistent performances. Leads by example and pops up with important goals from time to time.

Owen Murphy (18) - An outstanding prospect who broke into the First Team whilst still at school in the 16/17 season, making over 50 first appearances before his 18th birthday. Equally at home at full back or in midfield, this could be a big break through season for Owen.

Adam Smith (32) - Adam returned to the Club for the 18/19 season. A midfield player who is comfortable on the ball and has lots of experience at this level of football. A club stalwart who gives real dependability and consistency in midfield.

Meet some of the boys

Robbie Linford (21) – A youngster who has progressed through the club, offering reliability in midfield and defensive cover when required. Robbie rejoins the club this summer having been away at Stowmarket last season.

Adam Hipperson (26) - The sought after wide player joined the Club in the summer of 2018 from Norwich United. Adam is a direct forward whose pace and power helped the team pull away to safety last season and he is looking to build on this in his second season with the club.

Rhys Logan (24) - A direct and quick winger who creates a number of goal scoring opportunities for the team. Rhys suffered from an injury early last season but came back to help in the relegation battle and he is working hard to further improve that this season.

Ryan Hawkins (24) – Ryan joins the Magpies on a short term loan from National North team King's Lynn. An exciting forward player with an excellent set-piece delivery.

Jamie Forshaw (28) - His work rate sets the tone for the team and he has a knack for scoring important goals. Has suffered with injuries the past two seasons and is looking to get back to his best this year.

Eoin MacQuaid (22) – A direct midfielder, with a great eye for goal, and a set piece delivery to be admired. Eoin joins us from King's Lynn Town this summer, having helped them to promotion last year.

Ryan Crisp (25) - A powerful striker who is as good as anyone in the Isthmian League with his back to goal. Ryan showed glimpses of returning to his very best at times during a difficult season last year and expectations are high for the coming season.

Olly Willis (33) – A versatile player combining this with his Assistant Manager role. A real fan favourite in his second spell at the club he offers great experience and cover for the team.

Charlie Clarke (22) – Charlie came through the DESA soccer academy, before progressing to playing in the States with Chattanooga FC. Charlie returns to the club this summer, a powerful goal scoring forward, who is looking to build on the success he had Stateside.

Toby Hilliard (23) – A quick, tireless frontman, who has helped King's Lynn Town rise to National League North in recent seasons. Toby rejoins the Magpies following a loan spell in 2018, looking to add to his goal tally of recent seasons.

This season has heralded the news that yet another island team are hoping to enter the Non-League pyramid.

Following in the footsteps of Guernsey, who play at Step 4 and the newly formed Jersey Bulls, who are currently competing in Step 6, a group from the Isle of Man have unveiled plans to create their very own football club, with ambitions to play in the Northwest Counties League in time for the start of next campaign.

This is brilliant news both for the Non-League system and players and fans living on the Isle of Man.

Last year I went to visit Guernsey, where I thoroughly enjoyed watching a match and have subsequently interviewed their manager Tony Vance on a number of occasions.

It was brilliant to see how the island's community had really embraced the team and the atmosphere on matchday was a superb thing to be a part of.

When speaking to Vance it quickly becomes clear just how much pride he has taken in the project and the importance that it has had in developing young players on the island.

Whereas before, making the jump into the professional ranks was extremely hard for young footballers on the island, they now have the opportunity to showcase their talents in England throughout the year.

One of the big drawbacks of starting an island team is the high costs involved, which include having to pay for the travel of both themselves and their opponents, however both Guernsey and Jersey Bulls have demonstrated how, with the support of their local communities, these steep financial commitments can be managed.

The fact that Jersey Bulls were able to attract almost 1000 fans for their very first fixture at the start of the month shows both how island clubs can develop revenue and help to cultivate a special following across the community.

The Isle of Man bid is being led by National Team manager Paul Jones.

When interviewing him last week I was immediately struck by his immense passion for football on the island and his determination to see the project through

There have been plans in the pipeline to start a team on the Isle of Man for almost 15 years but for one reason or another the project has never come to fruition, until now

I wish Paul and his colleagues the absolute best of luck in creating a club because these island teams have the potential to unite their communities in such a unique way.

BANK HOLIDAY BLUES FOR ROVERS.

On a scorching August bank holiday Monday, Rovers travelled to North Essex to face one of the promotion favourites Coggeshall Town.

Great Waking Rovers were looking to make it three league wins in a row, but Coggeshall away was never going to be an easy game.

The hosts started on the front foot with lots of possession, although they found it difficult to get many shots on target with the Waking defence standing strong.

Born in Paris, Christanval's career began at AS Monaco in 1999, where he made 81 appearances, scoring one goal. They won the 1999–2000 league title, earning him the title of Young Player of the Year, and he made several UEFA Champions League appearances. In January 2001, it was reported that Monaco were considering exchanging him for Frank LeBoeuf of Chelsea.

Barcelona and Marseille

Christanval was then signed by Barcelona of Spain's La Liga for a £6.5 million fee in June 2001, the team he supported as a child. After being released from Barcelona in 2003, he joined Marseille on 18 July on a four-year contract. They reached the 2004 UEFA Cup Final in his first season, but he was an unused substitute as they lost 2–0 to Valencia.

Fulham

After two weeks on trial at Arsenal, their manager Arsène Wenger opted not to sign Christanval. He then joined another Premier League London team, Fulham, on 9 September 2005. Upon his signing, manager Chris Coleman stated: "He can be captain for the next five years if he shows the same consistency and level of performance".



Ian Patrick Harte (born 31 August 1977) is an Irish football agent and former footballer who played as a defender and was best known for his ability to score goals from long range, including being a free kick specialist.

He began his career at Leeds United making 288 official appearances across nine seasons. Following their relegation and financial difficulties in 2004 he joined La Liga team Levante. He returned to England in 2007, featuring at a variety of clubs and winning the

Championship title at Reading in 2012 and AFC Bournemouth three years later.

Harte earned 63 international caps for the Republic of Ireland between 1996 and 2007, scoring 12 goals. He was included in their squad at the 2002 FIFA World Cup.

The Philips Sport Vereniging abbreviated as PSV and internationally known as PSV Eindhoven is a sports club from Eindhoven, Netherlands, that plays in the Eredivisie, the top tier in Dutch football. It is best known for its professional football department, which plays in the Eredivisie since its inception in 1956. Along with Ajax and Feyenoord, PSV is one of the country's "big three" clubs that have dominated the Eredivisie.

The club was founded in 1913 as a team for Philips employees. PSV's history contains two golden eras revolving around the UEFA Cup victory in 1978 and the 1987–88 European Cup victory as part of the seasonal treble in 1988. The team has won the Eredivisie 24 times, the KNVB Cup nine times and the Johan Cruyff Shield ten times. Currently (as of Nov 2018), PSV is 39th on the UEFA club coefficients ranking. Throughout the years, PSV established itself as a stepping stone for future world class players like Ruud Gullit, Ronald Koeman, Romário, Ronaldo, Phillip Cocu, Jaap Stam, Jisung Park, Ruud van Nistelrooy, and Arjen Robben.

Since its foundation, it has played in the Philips Stadion and has upheld its club colours (red and white). Its

elaborate connection with Philips can be witnessed in its sponsoring, shared technology and board member ties. Fans have named themselves 'boeren', Dutch for either peasants or farmers), taking pride in Eindhoven's status of being a provincial city and their Brabantian heritage.

To serve the need for activities with Philips employees, the company founded its own football team in 1910: the Philips Elftal. Its ground was the Philips Sportpark, located on the same location as the present day stadium. Financial turmoil and worker strikes led to a quick demise of the team and in 1913, its successor emerged, Philips Sport Vereniging, founded on 31 August. It was the day that Philips organized celebrations and sports competitions in light of the centennial defeat of the French in the Napoleonic Wars. It was not until 1916, however, that the football department switched its name from Philips Elftal to PSV. Because of World War I, the first possibility to enter a league was in the 1915–16 season. The club's first ever match was a 3–2 defeat against Willem II Reserves on 19 September 1915. The team did achieve promotion that season to a newly created Third Division of the Brabantian FA. Under the guidance of coach Wout Buitenweg, PSV were promoted in 1918 and 1921 as well, eventually reaching the Eerste Klasse. The team was relegated in 1925, but its stint in the Second Division only lasted one year when PSV were promoted again. Since 1926, PSV has always played in the highest possible domestic league.

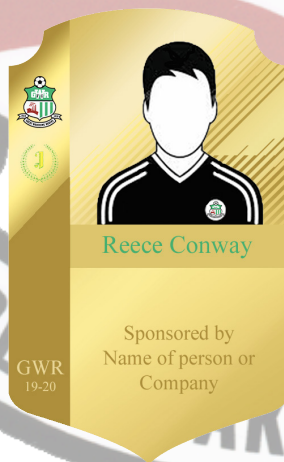
