Last Weekends Round Up In The Bostik North

Bowers and Pitsea are on a run of victories only one fewer than Dorking, and yesterday's eighth consecutive win would have been all the better for the fact it came against local rivals Basildon United. David Knight fired a hat trick, and Brad Warner got the fourth as the Bees were sent back to their hive with no honey.

Heybridge Swifts were second on Friday night, with a one-nil win against Witham Town in so much fog that a great deal of the game was hidden from the spectators, and they remained second as Aveley were held at home by Bury Town. The Millers fell behind when Ollie Hughes got an early goal for the visitors, but were ahead by half time courtesy of Jason Raad and Thomas Richardson. Bury weren't to be beaten, however, and Hughes got the equaliser five minutes after the break. No further goals saw the Millers fourth and left Bury in sixth.

In between Swifts and Aveley sit Swifts local rivals Maldon & Tiptree, for whom a goal in each half gave them victory at Soham Town Rangers. Jerome Slew opened the scoring, Sammie Mcleod closed it, and the Jammers are twelve points behind Bowers- but perhaps more importantly twelve ahead of Bury.

For fifth place Coggeshall Town the gap between themselves and sixth is eight points, and they extended that advantage with a comfortable victory over Mildenhall Town. Although in truth it might not have been as comfortable as the scoreline suggests, because although the seed growers went ahead midway through the first half through Nnamdi Nwachukwu it took them until seven minutes before the end to get another, the same player on target. George Cocklin made it three just before the end, a result that leaves Hall six points from safety.

AFC Sudbury are up to seventh following a 2-1 win over Great Wakering Rovers. Tom Maycock opened the scoring in the tenth minute, and Liam Bennett made it two nine minutes later, before Rovers made the last five minutes entertaining as Stephen Butterworth got a goal back. Tilbury and Grays Athletic are eighth and ninth, Lewis Smith putting the home side ahead only for Charlie Allen to equalise, whilst Felixstowe & Walton United and Barking also ended with a goal apiece, Miles Powell giving the Seasiders the lead before Sahr Kabba made it all square. Felixstowe are tenth, Barking thirteenth.

Brentwood Town are up to twelfth, goals from Connor Martin and Charlee Hughes giving them a two goal advantage before Sam Borrer got one back for hosts Dereham Town. The Magpies came into this game on the back of a run of four straight victories and six matches unbeaten, whilst Brentwood were buoyed by a crushing victory over Sudbury in midweek, and the visitors kept their good form going. Dereham are seventeenth, six points clear of the drop zone

Nine minutes later their lead was doubled by Liam Bennett with a superb effort beating the keeper from 25 yards to nestle the ball in the top corner.

After the break Rovers looked stronger and determined to get back into the game, however it was Sudbury who went close to putting the game beyond Rovers on a couple of occasions, Lewis Hawes in goal heroically keeping Rovers in the game with some fine saves.

With 84 minutes gone Rovers for the second match in a row then found themselves with ten men, Ollie Woodhouse being sent to the stands picking up his second yellow for a challenge on Ben Hammett.

The visitors didn't give up and there were chances at both ends, with five minutes remaining player manager Stephen Butterworth found the net with a looping header, and it was Rovers who looked more likely to score in the closing minutes, sub Jacob Wiggins going close to level the scores, only to be denied by the Sudbury stopper.

In the end Rovers were unlucky not to come away with something from the game, however the search for their second away win in the league continues.

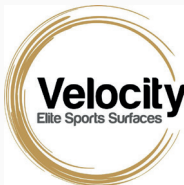

Aveley FC

A Brief History

AVELEY FOOTBALL CLUB was formed in 1927 and played in local leagues until 1939. Club activities were then suspended during the war years 1939/45. In 1946 the club was reformed and joined the Thurrock Combination. Aveley twice won the Essex Junior Cup, firstly in 1948, then retaining it the following year.

Aveley gained Senior League status in season 1949/50 and were elected into the London League, Division One. They were Division Champions in the 1951/52 season. In the same season they moved from Lodge Meadow to their present ground, Mill Field, and were promptly nicknamed The Millers. In season 1954/55 they were Division Champions once again which was followed by election to The Delphian League in 1955/56. They competed in this league until 1962/63 with little success.

1963/64 saw Millers join the Athenian League. Full membership of the Football Association was granted in 1964/65. Season 1970/71 was probably the clubs most successful one. The first-round proper of the FA Cup was reached along with the FA Amateur Cup quarter-finals, they were also Champions of the Athenian League.

Aveley were elected to the Isthmian League in season 1973/74. Here they competed without success in Division One until they were relegated to Division Two North at the end of the 1985/86 season. Millers did however achieve two cup successes during this time. The Essex Thames-Side Challenge Trophy was won in 1979/80 and the Hornchurch Charity Cup in 1982/83.

The 1989/90 campaign was a memorable one for The Millers. Promotion back to Division One was gained with a tremendous end of season run-in to finish second to Heybridge Swifts by two points.

This was followed by a 3-0 victory over Premier Division St. Albans in the final of the AC Delco (League) Cup. This made Aveley the first team from the lowest division to win this competition. After this the club slipped down to Division Three and cup successes were limited to appearances in the finals of both the East Anglian Cup and the The Essex Thames-Side Challenge Trophy in 1997/98.

The 1999 / 2000 season started well with Aveley being un-beaten in the League at Christmas. However, a turn in fortunes saw them slip and eventually finish 9th. This was followed by 6th place in season 2000/01.

A roller-coaster season 2001/02 saw the club finish third behind Hornchurch and champions Croydon Athletic and gain promotion to Division 1 North.

An excellent season for the Millers in 2002/03. Good runs in the FA Cup and Bryco Cup were capped by an appearance in the Essex Senior Cup Final. This did not go Millers way however with Chelmsford City winning 5-0. The Third Qualifying Round of the FA Cup was reached, eventually losing out to Canvey Island 2-0. A good run-in saw Millers finish in sixth place in the League.

The 2003/04 campaign saw the club eventually finish in 14th place. Millers matched the previous season's performance and reached the final of the Essex Senior Cup. This time a much-improved display saw them go down 3-1 to local rivals Thurrock. The final game of the season was another cup final. This time in the East Anglian Cup, and a visit to Spalding United. This also finished in a 3-1 defeat for the Millers.

2004/05 was a disappointing one for Millers first season in the Southern League, the club finishing in 15th place. Compensation, however, came in the form of the Essex Thames-Side Challenge Trophy. Romford were beaten 1-0 in the final at The Mill Field. Simon Thomas scoring the only goal of the game. Another difficult season followed, on and off the pitch. Millers ended the season with their third manager, Steve Browne, steering them just clear of the relegation places.

A poor League season in 2006/07 was again compensated for by winning the Essex Thames-Side Challenge Trophy for the second time in three seasons.

After a disappointing start to the 2007 / 08 campaign, November saw the arrival of Rod Stringer as Manager, and fortunes turned with the Millers putting a string of impressive results together to finish the season in Mid-Table. 2008 / 09 saw the foundations that were laid the previous season, bare its fruit as the Ryman League Division One North Championship was won on the last day of the season in dramatic fashion at East Thurrock United. In a tense finish to the season, Millers created a club record of 11 straight away league wins, and Rod Stringer was duly judged as the Manager of the Season for the Division.

2009 / 10 our first in the Isthmian Premier Division saw a great finish to the season, with 12 wins from the last 14 games, taking us into 3rd position and a home semi-final play-off against Boreham Wood. Unfortunately, it was one step too far, and a 1-0 defeat saw the end of a fantastic season.

During the close season Rod Stringer departed for Braintree Town, taking with him his management team, and the whole playing squad. A difficult season was endured with a last day 3-2 win at Hastings being significant as the club survived relegation by virtue of a reprieve despite finishing 4th from bottom of the table.

2011 / 12 was much of the same, and relegation was confirmed after a poor season. Justin Gardner took over the reins in February of 2012, and has this season assembled a strong playing squad that is currently challenging for an immediate return to the Premier Division.

2012 / 13 was a successful season with the team occupying a play off positions all season. Unfortunately, we lost out in the semi-final at Maldon & Tiptree.

The most significant result of the 2013 / 14 season was the news in March that after many years of trying, the Club has finally achieved planning for new state of the art facilities. After a protracted period of negotiations. work commenced on the new stadium build in July 2016, and it is hoped that the new premises will be occupational for the start of the 2017 / 18 campaign.

After a solid start to the 2016/17 campaign, Justin Gardner resigned from his role of team manager after a 4 1/2-year term. Terry Spillane was subsequently appointed in October.

August the 1st 2017 is a truly remarkable day in the Millers 90-year history. The day finally arrives with the opening of Parkside, the new home of the Millers. Dulwich Hamlet are the first visitors to open the stadium.

With the new stadium came the exciting appointment of James Webster as the Millers Boss, who joined in October from Brightlingsea Regent where he had led them from Step 7 to Step 3 in 7 seasons.

As we enter our second season at Parkside, the management team have assembled a strong group of players to hopefully see us challenge at the top end of the division.

Meet the players

Goalkeepers:

David Hughes: David joined us recently from Harlow Town, where he spent the past 2 ½ seasons playing a major part in Hawks promotion season, making 118 career appearances. Previously David played for East Thurrock United, and during his time there played for the Millers briefly on loan.

Defenders:

Sam Cross: Sam, 23, Basildon based player who is equally at home playing at either centre back or at left back has joined us after recent spells at Bowers & Pitsea and Grays Athletic.

Harry Gibbs: In 2016/17 Harry featured 31 times and, in the end, won Young Player of the Season and did start off playing for us at the start of the 2017/18 season playing five times, before leaving when former manager Terry Spillane was in charge, Harry then moved to Brentwood, but has re-joined ahead of the 2018/19 campaign.

Sam Mvemba: Mvemba, 18, made 40 appearances for Romford, mainly at left back where he helped the club climb out of the relegation place and into safety at the expense of Norwich United. Sam joined Romford from Barking Abbey where he was named coaches player of the year in the 2016/17 season.

Jake Pitty: Right back who opted to leave Canvey Island to join his local team in October. Made 146 appearances for Canvey over 5 seasons, playing most of them in the Bostik Premier. Was a member of the play off final team who lost out to Haringey Borough last season.

Conor Mead: Right back who was a January signing from Basildon United. Conor has previous Isthmian League experience playing for Tilbury for 5 seasons

Connor Witherspoon: Connor joined last season for an undisclosed fee from Brightlingsea Regent after making 68 appearances for the club, and Withers has signed on at Parkside for next season. Prior to joining the Millers last season, he achieved promotion via the playoffs with Brentwood Town before leaving to join Brightlingsea Regent and in that season helped the R's to win the Bostik North title in 2016/17.

Midfielders:

James Love: Joined the Millers from Bostik Premier side James Love where he was awarded players' player of the season for the 2017/18 season. He started his career in the youth system at Brentwood Town where he made his first team debut at just the age of 17. He was a key component in the Brentwood team that gained promotion to the Bostik Premier Division a few years back

Marcus Milner: Marcus started his career at Southend United in their youth system and was in the same group as ex Miller Kyle Asante. Moved to Maldon & Tiptree before joining Brentwood Town. We signed Marcus from Ware in the summer.

Andy Freeman: Freeman, 21, joins the Millers from National South side Concord Rangers, prior to making the jump to the Beachboys he was playing for fellow Bostik North side Brentwood Town.

Freddie Gard: Gard, 21, attacking midfielder joined the Millers from Bostik Premier League side Brightlingsea Regent. Prior to joining Brightlingsea, Gard was at Southend United and he had a loan spell at tenants Grays Athletic and Regent before making that move permanent. Freddie went on to make 27 appearances, scoring one goal against Cheshunt in our 4-1 win in February 2018.

Shad Ngandu: The 23-year-old joins after a fantastic season for Waltham Abbey scoring 20 goals from midfield in 47 appearances in 2017/18.

Jason Raad: Attacking midfield player who signed for us in October from Harlow Town. Previously played for Cape Town and Supersport United in his home country of South Africa.

Amir Berkane: Midfield player who re-signed for us in December after returning home from the USA having spent the last 3 seasons at University there. Previously played for us last season and was part of the successful Brightlingsea Regent team that won this division back in 2017.

Wyan Reid: “He’s one of our own” as the saying goes. Millers first player to come through our new academy system, which started 16 months. Wyan has appeared regularly in our very accomplished Reserve set up and is now fast becoming part of the first team squad.

Forwards:

Tom Richardson: The forward has signed for the 2018/19 season staying with manager James Webster who he played under when Brightlingsea Regent won the Bostik North in the 2016/17 season. Tom was instrumental in that title charge with 34 goals in 59 appearances for Regent which helped him secure a move to East Thurrock United in the National South scoring 4 goals in 8 games, which included a hat-trick against National League side Aldershot Town in the FA Trophy. Richardson showed his quality on the pitch with 9 goals in 12 appearances since joining the Millers at the end of February.

Alex Akrofi: Local lad, who Joined us from Tonbridge Angels where he was a regular scorer over the past 2 seasons. List amongst others, Maidstone United and Brentwood Town in his previous clubs.

Loui Hazelwood: Pacey winger with an eye for goal. Made a great impact for Aveley Reserves this season and was brought into the first team in January scoring a brace in his debut v tenants Grays Athletic.

Bobby Vaughan: Recent signing from Stenhousemuir FC. Bobby was previously with Thurrock before training with us pre-season. He then signed for the Scottish League Division One side, making 5 appearances prior to joining us after his contract was cancelled in January.

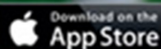

Born On This Day

Henry James Redknapp (born 2 March 1947) is an English football manager. He has previously managed AFC Bournemouth, West Ham United, Portsmouth, Southampton, Tottenham Hotspur, Queens Park Rangers and Birmingham City. In his second spell at Portsmouth, he managed

the side that won the 2008 FA Cup. At the conclusion of the 2009–10 season, he guided Tottenham into the UEFA Champions League. His son, Jamie Redknapp, played under him at Bournemouth and Southampton. He is also uncle to Frank Lampard, who played under him at West Ham United.

Redknapp was born in Poplar, London, the only child of Henry Joseph William Redknapp (1922–1996) and Violet May Brown (1924–2001). At age 11, while Redknapp was playing for East London Schools football, he was spotted by Dickie Walker, a Tottenham Hotspur scout. From there, Redknapp grew in the Tottenham youth ranks playing at Cheshunt, meeting the likes of Bill Nicholson, Dave Mackay and Danny Blanchflower. At age 15, Redknapp moved to West Ham United and played alongside Bobby Moore. In a 2008 interview, Redknapp stated as part of a tribute to Tom Finney, “I was a big Arsenal fan as a kid and I remember seeing him play against Tommy Docherty one night.” After being appointed Tottenham manager later in 2008, Redknapp stressed his Tottenham connections as well, stating: I am a big follower of the history of the game and Tottenham have been a great club over the years. I followed Tottenham, I trained there as an 11-year-old, 12-year-old so I know the history of the club. It is a big, big club.



Trevor Lloyd Sinclair (born 2 March 1973) is an English professional footballer, who currently plays for Squires Gate. Sinclair was a versatile winger, able to play on both the left and right flanks, who played in the Premier League and made twelve appearances for the England national team, including four at the 2002 FIFA World Cup. He retired in 2008, after a nineteen-year professional career, on being released by Football League Championship side Cardiff City.

Sinclair was born in Dulwich, London but grew up in Manchester. He began his career at Blackpool where he played from 1989 to 1993. When he made his debut for Blackpool, on 19 August 1989, he became the club's youngest ever player, at 16 years, five months, breaking Colin Greenall's record set nine years earlier. Sinclair's record was in turn broken by Matty Kay in November 2005.



Kevin Dennis Kurányi (born 2 March 1982) is a German-Brazilian retired footballer of Hungarian and Panamanian descent. He played as a striker and possessed great aerial ability and finishing skills. From 2003 to 2008, Kurányi was part of the German national team, for which he scored 19 goals in 52 games.

Early career

Kurányi began playing football in 1988 for Petrópolis-based Serrano FC in Brazil, when he was six years old. In 1993, he transferred to Panamanian club Las Promesas, where he played for one year before going back to Serrano FC. Kurányi returned to Las Promesas in 1996 for a further year.

Canterbury City have certainly had a topsy-turvy few weeks.

Just moments after edging past Leicester Nirvana at the start of the month to reach their first ever FA Vase Quarter Final, the club were rocked by the news that the local council had rejected their proposals for a new stadium, which would have ended 12 long years of nomadic life.

“One of the papers hit the nail on the head with the headline, joy to despair in the space of just 4 days” said City Chairman Tim Clark.

“We are ground sharing at the moment and I think everyone knows that without a new stadium our future will be in jeopardy”.

With relations between the club and the city council at breaking point, innovative direct action is now being planned.

Taking inspiration from the Valley Party, which was formed by Charlton Athletic fans in 1990 in an attempt to pressure Greenwich Borough Council into allowing the Addicks to return to their home ground, Clark has revealed that several campaigners are preparing to run in May's local elections.

He added, “We have been continually let down by the council and we are acting to save the club.

“We are not just campaigning for this single issue and are asking for more sports and recreational facilities to be developed across the whole area.

“It is strange to have all of this going on in the midst of what is by far the most successful time in the club's history.

“The campaign is something that we are all really excited about and we are going to try and talk to the local students at the university to try and get them involved and to ensure that it is something which appeals to young people.

“We have already found a number of people who are willing to run on our platform and stand up to the current council

“It is certainly a tough moment but it has helped to bring everybody together and there is a really special atmosphere around the club at the moment”.

From the perspective of the NLP it is deeply disappointing to hear how Canterbury City have seen their future put in jeopardy by the council's recent decision and we wish them the best of luck with their campaign.

Non-League clubs can play a vital role in conjuring up a sense of unity and identity within a community and it is crucial that they receive the support and protection of local institutions.


