weekend Round up in the Isthmian North

Leaders Bury Town travelled to Essex to take on fifth place Great Wakering Rovers. Bury had only one league defeat in their last ten matches, whilst Rovers had lost only one of their last six- and only one match at home- but it was the visitors who took the lead in the second half, Cemal Ramadan scoring from the spot just after the hour. Jake Chambers-Shaw doubled the lead fourteen minutes from time, leaving Bury two points clear at the top, but with second place Maldon having three matches in hand.

Our big match saw second play third, as Maldon & Tiptree- we've run out of superlatives to describe their performances this season- hosted Grays Athletic. The visitors had been a little inconsistent of late, losing two of their last four, and they didn't start well, the Jammers taking the lead in only the third minute, Jorome Slew with the goal. It was two-nil just before the break, Rob Girdlestone doubling the lead, but Grays were soon back into it as Mitchel Hahn scored on the hour. Slew made it three for the Jammers six minutes later and soon Athletic were also down to ten men, Jack McQueen seeing red. Another win for the Jammers.

Heybridge Swifts travelled to seventh placed Aveley. The last time they did that in a league match was the Playoff Semi-Final last season, and the Millers were desperate for revenge- and they got the breakthrough just after half an hour through Harry Gibbs. It was two-nil before the break, Jason Raad with the second, and within seven minutes of the restart the lead had doubled, Alex Akrofi and George Sykes getting numbers three and four. Sykes got number five, too, as the Millers ran riot- and Swifts ended the match with ten men after Elliot Ronto saw red. Aveley climbed to fifth.

AFC Sudbury entertained Canvey Island, and the Yellows took the lead ten minutes before the break, Tom Maycock scoring from the spot. They held it until six minutes from time, when Kane Gilbert equalised, but got the points nonetheless as Joe Grimwood scored the winner in the very last minute.

Eighth place Histon headed to Tilbury, the Dockers buoyed by the signing of David Knight from Bowers and Pitsea. Knight made his debut, but it was strike partner Brian Moses who was first on the scoresheet, after only two minutes- and the Dockers were two up five minutes later, Ryan Boswell finding the net. Knight did find the net after the break, making it 0-3 from the spot, and then making it four in the fifty fifth minute, before confirming his hat trick with number five in the 58th minute. Even with a three month handicap, do you think he might be North Division top scorer this season too?

Soham Town Rangers are having a very good season so far, and they travelled to Romford, who have looked much better of late but still need to start picking up some points. Boro struck first, Reece Tranter with the goal just before the half hour, but Rangers hit back right after the break, Tom Newman with the equaliser. Romford got their noses in front once more just before the hour, Danny Nesbitt with the goal, and made it three-one through Giovanni Palmer, but Rangers then narrowed the lead again through Cameron Watson and that man Sam Mulready got an equaliser with two minutes to go- but the visitors were then rocked by a red card for Callum Russell. That was the final action of note, and both sides took a point.

Cambridge City, who announced three new signings on Friday, hosted a Basildon United who had won both of their last two matches in all competitions, and scored five goals on each occasion. The Bees stung first, Harry Norman scoring after twelve minutes, but City equalised nine minutes after the break through Jordan Gent. Parity didn't last long, however, Ernest Okoh putting United ahead once more, but City hit back for a second time through Ryan Sharman. Sharman then turned the match on its head by putting the hosts into the lead with eight minutes remaining, and they held on despite Jake Jessup's dismissal. Adam Vyse also got his marching orders for the Bees.



Eighteenth took on seventeenth as Felixstowe and Walton United entertained Brentwood Town, and the Seasideers struck early, Josh Kerridge finding the net after three minutes. They were two up just after the quarter hour through Callum Bennett, and got their third shortly after the break, Armani Scaar finding the Brentwood net. Town didn't give up, and two goals in six minutes brought it back to three-two before Andrew Freeman got an equaliser fifteen minutes from time to ensure honours were shared.

Thirteenth played fourteenth as Dereham Town hosted Witham Town. Witham lost striker George Bugg to Brightlingsea Regent yesterday, but they were a player up after Charlie Dickerson saw a red card for the Magpies, and soon afterwards a goal up as Pat Ahern gave them the lead. The ten men hit back to level, Adam Hipperson scoring the equaliser, and then took the lead through Rhys Logan- but they weren't finished. Logan then made it three, and later got his hat trick to make it four, and the ten men completed a remarkable effort as Hipperson made it five.

We've no idea how Witham fan James Beardwell continued smiling after all that, but smile he did- and we've borrowed Alan Palmer's image of him at yesterday's match to use as our headline shot. Perhaps he's forgotten that Town have David Knight and Tilbury up next!

Coggeshall Town, starting the day in sixth, travelled to Hullbridge Sports, and had a man advantage just after the break as Joseph Wright got his marching orders. They had a goal advantage soon afterwards, Joseph Claridge with it, and held on for all three points to move to third.

WE CAN always count on the FA Cup to throw up memorable and unusual stories each season for Non-League clubs.

So far this is the season for Chichester City. The Step 4 club have made it all the way to the first round for the first time in 60 years – and then got a bye straight into the second!

For those who missed it, the bye came because of League One Bury's demise. There were an odd number of clubs in the first round proper draw so it was decided the final ball in the hat would progress straight through, with the £36,000 prize money cheque thrown in for good measure.

Of course, no football club or fan wants to be seen benefiting from someone else's misfortune but it seemed fitting that the lowest ranked club left in the competition were the lucky recipients.

They've even made a donation to the Bury start-up club, which they didn't have to, showing they understand the importance of the football family.

The players celebrated wildly on TV and fair play to them. They now get the chance to draw a plum tie in the second round and even dream of reaching the third round – what a story that would be.

Like many others, Chichester City will be grateful for the financial benefits of the FA Cup too. The FA recently doubled the prize fund and this season we saw losing money in the qualifying rounds.

The FA see the competition as a great way to put the money from TV deals back into football and it is certainly huge for clubs providing they spend it right.

And that's one of the big talking points – how does a club spend their money wisely? For some that might mean signing that striker that will win promotion. For others it's purchasing new equipment or renovating the tea bar.

Our friend from The Non-League Show, Tim Fuell, penned a column in last Sunday's NLP on the very subject. As someone involved at Hayes & Yeading he is seeing first-hand how big a cup run can be with their first round proper tie against Oxford United selected for live TV.

Check the column out if you can, but Tim brings up the idea of how money can be best spent – how about a voucher to be used by clubs at FA recommended outlets? So instead of the money being wasted on the team, an investment is made into the club's infrastructure or is used to improve the ground. You'll no doubt have your own views but anything that can be to the benefit of a football club long term is surely the way to go?

We'll enjoy telling the FA Cup stories over the coming weeks and plenty of clubs will soak up the national spotlight.

While the actual games are great in the moment, it's important the cup money leaves a lasting legacy too.



WELCOME TO Hullbridge Sports

Records show that Hullbridge United Football Club was formed by a group of local men, fronted by the then proprietor of the Anchor Inn, a Mr. A. W. Moss. He owned a room behind the pub known as Buff's Hall. This was where the club held its first meeting. A Mr. Brown generously allowed the club to play on his land, on the corner of Pooles Lane and Long Lane.

Hullbridge United's first colours were Green and Gold quartered shirts, White shorts and Green socks, which, by an amazing coincidence, were the same colours as those on the flag flying outside the Anchor Inn!

Affiliating to the Essex County FA in 1947, Hullbridge United entered the Southend & District League for the upcoming 1947-48 season. 1950-51 saw Hullbridge United reach their first Cup Finals. In the Section 'C' Final of the Southend Charity Competition, United beat Maxwell Sports 4-1. Four weeks later, in the Southend & District League's French Cup, Hullbridge faced Rochford Athletic but, somewhat unluckily, lost the Final by three goals to four.

After six seasons of Second Division football, 1951-52 saw Hullbridge finally gain promotion – and they did it in style, winning both the Championship and the French Cup. In the final, Hullbridge defeated the reserves of Great Wakering Rovers 3-0. In all, the club played 28 matches that season, scoring an amazing 141 goals.

The summer of 1953 saw the club change name to Hullbridge Sports. After a few poor seasons, times improved for the club when they won the 1956-57 Third Division Championship and the League's Shaw Cup. They finished five points clear of Canvey Island Sports in the League and saw off Victory Athletic reserves 3-2 after extra time in the Cup Final. Suffering relegation at the end of the 1958-59 season, Sports' stay in the Third Division lasted but four seasons as, in 1962-63, 'Bridge won promotion as runner-up in the newly named Second Division with a dramatic final day victory to ensure promotion on goal average. Drawing 4-4 at home to Southwick Rovers, 'Bridge scored three goals in the final fifteen minutes to gain a 7-4 victory and promotion.

Another double was achieved during the 1965-66 season when Hullbridge won the First Division Championship and Section 'C' of the Southend Charity Competition - beating Southchurch Rovers 3-0 in a replay after a 2-2 draw. A respectable fifth place finish was achieved in the Premier Division the following season, along with being French Cup finalists. 1968-69 saw Hullbridge finish bottom of the Premier Division but just three seasons later the club regained their Premier Division status, finishing runner-up to Canvey Island Amateur FC at the end of the 1971-72 season. Good cup runs that year saw the club reach the semi-final of the Ramuz Cup and the Fourth Round of the Essex Junior Cup.

In the late 1970s the club decided it wanted it's own ground. Negotiations with Rochford Council proved successful and the club took control of 16.5 acres of farmland in Lower Road (at the top of Coventry Hill), with the club moving during 1980. Transformation of the site was slow, with the clubhouse not officially opened until 1983.

The end of the 1979-80 saw Sports put six goals past the Southend Estuary 'keeper to win Section 'B' of the Southend Charity Competition.

A move up to the newly formed Southend & District Alliance in 1982 found the club wanting. Finishes of sixth and eighth and First Round knockouts in the League Cup wasn't exactly what the club had hoped for. The only bright spot was reaching the 1982-83 Southend Charity Shield Final, although they lost 0-4 to Rayleigh Town. Nevertheless, again, looking for a higher standard of football, Sports then joined the Essex Olympian League for the 1984-85 season. They immediately won promotion after finishing third in the Second Division. At the end of the weather-hit 1987-88 season, Hullbridge (now in the Second Division again) brought home the Essex Intermediate League Cup, beating First Division Benfleet in the Final, held at the old New Writtle Street ground of Chelmsford City FC. After a 1-1 extra time draw, courtesy of a Mark Wood goal, Sports went into the replay 12 days later having played five League matches in between! However, after a goal-less 120 minutes, Sports won 5-4 on penalties.

Looking for a further climb up the non-league ladder, Hullbridge made improvements to the ground during 1989 so it passed the grade for senior football. 1990 saw the Essex County FA grant the club senior status and so the club joined the Essex Senior League for the 1990-91 season.

Matt Petre had the honour of scoring the club's first goal in senior football when, on 25th August 1990, in the club's first match of the Essex Senior League season, he scored Sport's only goal in a 1-3 defeat by visitors Stansted, in front of a 163 crowd. At the end of their first season, the club finished in a respectable 12th place.

History Continued

The new floodlights were put to good use during the 1999-2000 season when, after seven cup-ties, the youth team reached the Third Round (last 64) of the FA Youth Cup. Visitors Blackburn Rovers won the tie 6-0 in front of a crowd of over 800.

After taking over the managers hot seat during February 2006, Enrico Tiritera oversaw a gradual improvement in the club's fortunes on the pitch. 2008-09 was one of the best seasons for the club since gaining senior status. They attained 41 points over a 30-match programme and reached the Quarter-finals of the East Anglian Cup for the first time. In 2009-10 Hullbridge reached the Quarter-finals of the Essex Senior Cup, again for the first time, before losing narrowly 0-1 to Football League side Dagenham & Redbridge.

The 2010-11 season saw Sports reach their first Cup Final as a senior club, the County FA's Tolleshunt D'Arcy Memorial Cup. Unfortunately, Sports were beaten 1-2 by Braintree Town.

Dan Braney and Mark Bliss took over the reins from Enrico Tiritera, who departed the club in March 2013. In their first full season, 2013-14, Dan and Mark guided the team to their best ever FA Vase Cup run, reaching the Fourth Round (last 32), before being beaten 1-3 by eventual winners Sholing FC, having been made to travel to Southampton for the fixture on a wet January evening.

The team finished the league in ninth position with 53 points from a 38 game season but the icing on the cake was winning the Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy, the first ever silverware as a senior club, beating Haringey Borough 1-0 in the final, Michael Edgar scoring the only goal.

Mark Bliss took sole charge of the team in 2014-15 and was joined by coach Steve Tapley and between them took the club to it's highest ever league position and points tally, finishing fourth with 71 points and 73 goals along the way. With yet another Fourth Round FA Vase run losing 3-0 at Flackwell Heath. Mark and Steve have stepped down for the 2015-16 season, Rob Hodgson has been installed as the new Manager along with Aaron Hunwicks as coach.

In their first season (2015/16) Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks took the club to new FA Cup heights by making Hullbridge Sports history and reaching the Second Qualifying Round, where they were unfortunately beaten by Grays Athletic of the Ryman Premier Division. It was a last 32 exit again in the FA Vase equalling previous records and demonstrating the FA Vase consistency shown from previous seasons.

In their second season (2016/17) running the First Team Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks found life more difficult as the side finished 11th in the Essex Senior League and disappointing early exits from most of the cup competitions, but they did take the side to the second Tollshunt D'Arcy Memorial Cup Final in successive seasons, but were unfortunately beaten again by Heybridge Swifts FC.

Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks continued in the hot seat at the start of the 2017/18 season, but early exits from the FA Cup, Essex County Cup and poor league form saw an emotional farewell after the FA Vase victory over Wembley FC at Lower Road.

Rob stayed for a short while to play for new manager Darren Manning, but Aaron left the club that had been his home since 2012 for pastures new. New manager Darren Manning had one main objective after taking over and that was to keep the club in the Essex Senior League and he managed to achieve this finally finishing 15th (out of 21), but unfortunately Hullbridge exited the FA Vase again in the last 32 away at Tring FC.

2018-19 sees Darren Manning's first full season at the helm and his side played at the newly renamed Ryan's Heating Stadium at Lower Road. Darren and number two James Wakeling started the 2018/19 campaign in the Essex Senior League.

In the first major cup competition of the 2018/19 season, Hullbridge went out of the FA Cup in the Preliminary Round away at Newmarket Town FC (2-1). Followed by a 0-2 home defeat to Newport Pagnell Town in the Third Round of the FA Vase.

Although disappointing results in cup competitions we fared much better in the league finishing as Essex Senior League Champions with 87 points, scoring 79 goals and conceding only 33, the best defensive record in the league, finishing 5 points clear of 2nd placed Stansted. Promotion to the BetVictor Isthmian League for season 2019-2020 being achieved in their first full season in charge.

Richard Ian Wright (born 5 November 1977) is an English retired professional footballer who played as a goalkeeper. He currently works as a coach for Manchester City.

Born in Ipswich, he joined Ipswich Town as a trainee, going on to play for the club 298 times between 1995 and 2001. He then moved to Premier League club Arsenal, before being signed by Everton in 2002, where he spent five years. A brief spell on loan from West Ham United with Southampton was followed by a transfer back to Ipswich Town. After a short spell at Sheffield United, a third stint at Ipswich and a brief time at Preston North End, he joined Premier League champions Manchester City on a free transfer in 2012. After four years at City, during which he did not play at all, he announced his retirement in May

2016. He remained with City as a coach under new manager Pep Guardiola. He was a member of the England squad, earning two caps, and was included in their squad for UEFA Euro 2000.

Wright was born in Ipswich, Suffolk and signed a professional contract with Ipswich Town on 2 January 1995 after serving his apprenticeship, and made his debut as a 17-year-old in a 2–0 victory at home to Coventry City in May that year. The season ended with Ipswich's relegation from the Premier League, and for the following four, Ipswich lost in the promotion play-offs from the Football League First Division. He played a major role in Ipswich's 1999–2000 season when the club were promoted via the play-offs at the fifth attempt. On 29 May 2000, in the play-off final against Barnsley, Ipswich won 4–2, with Wright's long goal kick being passed from Marcus Stewart for Richard Naylor to put them 2–1 up. Wright gave away a penalty kick by fouling Craig Hignett, but he saved it from Darren Barnard. In Ipswich's first season back in the top flight, he inspired them to 5th place and qualification to the UEFA Cup.

Wright was capped twice for England, making his debut against Malta in a friendly on 3 June 2000; he gave away two penalty kicks, conceding the first as David Carabott's shot rebounded into the net off his head after hitting the post, and saving the second, again from Carabott, in the 88th minute as England won 2–1. He was a member of the England UEFA Euro 2000 squad, where he was third choice behind David Seaman and Nigel Martyn.

On 15 August 2001, he earned his second and final cap, replacing Martyn at half time in a 2–0 friendly defeat against the Netherlands at White Hart Lane, and did not concede a goal.



Kasper Peter Schmeichel (born 5 November 1986) is a Danish professional footballer who plays as a goalkeeper (and Vice Captain) for Premier League club Leicester City and the Denmark national team. He is the son of former Manchester United and Danish international goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel.

Schmeichel began his career with Manchester City, but he had loan spells with Darlington, Bury and Falkirk before he made his Manchester City debut. Although Schmeichel appeared to have made the City number 1 jersey his own at the start of the 2007–08 season, the emergence of Joe Hart resulted in Schmeichel being loaned to Cardiff City. The signing of Republic of Ireland international Shay Given in January 2009 meant that Schmeichel fell even further down the pecking order at City, and in August 2009, he was allowed to link up with former manager Sven-Göran Eriksson at Notts County.

He spent only one season with the Magpies as, while it was a very successful one for the club and the player himself, changes to the club's financial position made his departure necessary and his contract was terminated by mutual consent. He joined Leeds United in May 2010, but again, his tenure at the club would only last one season before he was the subject of a transfer to Leicester City, where he would again work under Eriksson. Schmeichel has gone on to play over 300 competitive games for Leicester, winning the Championship in the 2013–14 season and the Premier League in 2015–16.

He played 17 games for the Denmark national under-21 team. Schmeichel was called up to the Denmark national team for the first time against Iceland on 13 May 2011, and was part of their squad at UEFA Euro 2012, but did not make his senior debut until 2013.

While at Manchester City, Schmeichel was called up for the Denmark national under-19 team in August 2004, and made his international debut in a 0–0 draw with Northern Ireland on 2 September 2004. He went on to play eight under-19 internationals until March 2005, competing with Kenneth Stenild and Michael Tørnes for the goalkeeping spot. He was called up for the under-20 team in October 2005, but did not play for the team until October 2006, during his time at Bury. The day after his under-20 debut, Schmeichel was asked to train with the senior Denmark team and was called up as a replacement for injured Theis Rasmussen in the under-21 squad.

Schmeichel was one of the leading players in the team, and was named Danish under-21 Talent of the Year in November 2007, following three clean sheets in the previous four under-21 games. He played a total 17 under-21 internationals in a row from March 2007 to October 2008, racking up seven clean sheets.

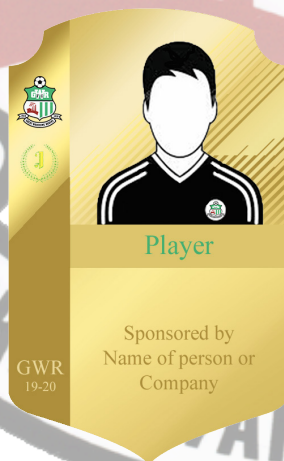
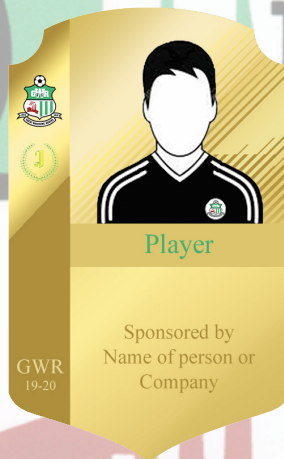
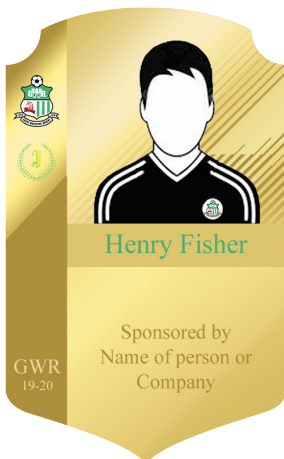
