# Selection Principles for 

Captains

## Summary of Principles

- Consistency of team selection is key, so changes from week to week should be minimised
- The higher the team, the greater the commitment is expected from the players.
- First team players should be available for 80-90\% of matches.
- Teams should include a mixture of developing players and established players, ideally around $50 \%$ of each.
- We should aim to promote developing players as soon as they are ready.
- Promoted players should be given at least six matches to establish themselves in their new team
- On a given matchday, the squad size should be comparable across all teams
- If players have to be shuffled around teams temporarily, it should be established players that are moved
- Players (especially developing ones) should not be expected to play out of position for any length of time
- We must aim to grow the teams in a sustainable way i.e. all teams within a section should move up the league structure together
- Selection should take the longer-term view into consideration (future seasons) as well as the short-term (current season)
- Rolling subs are for the whole team, not just the developing players

| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
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| First team players should <br> be available for $80-90 \%$ of <br> matches. | A consistent team is more <br> likely to be a successful <br> team | Players who are less <br> available will be selected <br> for lower teams or will be <br> used as "bonus" players to <br> complement a squad. (ln <br> line with earlier principles, <br> only 1 or 2 such players <br> should be used) |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Teams should include a <br> mixture of developing <br> players and established <br> players, ideally around <br> $50 \%$ of each. | A blend of youth and <br> experience is required in a <br> successful team | A team might not include <br> all the strongest players <br> currently available. The <br> developing players will still <br> be learning. |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| We should aim to promote <br> developing players as soon <br> as they are ready. | The best way for the club <br> to grow is by developing <br> our players. We are not <br> currently in a position <br> where many established <br> players join us | Team selections may <br> favour the developing <br> players over established <br> players. The developing <br> players could initially find <br> it challenging to play in <br> the higher team |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Promoted players should <br> be given at least six <br> matches to establish <br> themselves in their new <br> team | A player who is afraid of <br> getting dropped due to <br> making a mistake will not <br> play to their full potential | Captains and team-mates <br> will need to be considerate <br> if it takes a little while for a <br> new player to adjust |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| On a given matchday, the <br> squad size should be <br> comparable across all <br> teams | It is not good for the club <br> as a whole for one team to <br> "hog" all the players. It <br> would not be fair and <br> would lead to resentment <br> between teams | Players may have to be <br> temporarily moved <br> between squads |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| If players have to be <br> shuffled around teams <br> temporarily, it should be <br> established players that <br> are moved | In line with earlier <br> principles, developing <br> players would benefit <br> more from stability of <br> selection | Established players would <br> be expected to be flexible <br> and accommodating |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
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| Players (especially <br> developing ones) should <br> not be expected to play <br> out of position for any <br> length of time | It is hard enough for <br> developing players trying <br> to get used to playing with <br> more experienced team- <br> mates and/or at a higher <br> standard, without also <br> adding the pressure of a <br> new position | Captains should take other <br> factors into consideration <br> such as player preference, <br> input from coaches or <br> playing position at age- <br> group level. <br> Do not assume that young <br> players should be played <br> as wingers/forwards, just <br> because they are fit and <br> have energy to run around <br> a lot. |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| We must aim to grow the <br> teams in a sustainable way <br> i.e. all teams within a <br> section should move up <br> the league structure <br> together | We want to have <br> competition for places and <br> we want a steady flow of <br> players between teams as <br> people develop. This <br> would be more difficult if <br> there is a big gap in <br> playing standard between <br> teams | From season to season, <br> the club may focus on <br> particular teams to try and <br> bridge the gap to the <br> higher ones |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
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| Selection should take the <br> longer-term view into <br> consideration (future <br> seasons) as well as the <br> short-term (current <br> season) | With a high proportion of <br> developing players, a <br> relatively high rate of flux <br> is expected. We need to <br> minimise the adverse <br> effects of players leaving | Players who are known to <br> be leaving should be <br> spread throughout the <br> teams. Captains should <br> think about alternative <br> players who could replace <br> the departing ones. |


| Principle | Rationale | Implication(s) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Rolling subs are for the <br> whole team, not just the <br> developing players | It is not fair to treat the <br> developing players <br> differently. Addditionally, it <br> will be harder for their <br> game to improve if they <br> are not given sufficient <br> pitch time. | Established players will <br> have to adapt to having <br> breaks during the match <br> and if necessary, perform <br> a thorough warm up <br> before re-joining the <br> match. |
