

The Single System is the development pathway for players, coaches and officials of all ages and abilities to reach their full potential.



WHAT IS A CENTRE?

- o There are three levels of centre, Junior Development Centres (JDCs), Junior Academy Centres (JACs) and Junior Regional Performance Centres (JRPCs), each of which feeds players to the next level.
- Centres are where players can go to improve their hockey and potentially progress to the next level on the player pathway.
- Centres do not replace club and school activity, they run alongside these activities to allow players to access more hockey development opportunities.

WHAT HAPPENS AT A CENTRE?

o Centres provide regular training sessions with quality coaching on core skills followed by a competition phase where they will play against other centres, at the same level.

 Centres run on two cycles per year following the diagram below, all centres run as per the dates on the centralised calendar (which can be found on www.englandhockey.co.uk) to avoid clashes with other hockey activity.

- The number of centres depends on the level of activity, there are approximately 120 JDCs, 45 JACs, and 12 JRPCs.
- Players should attend the closest centre to where they live (or in the case of boarding pupils, where they attend school), which may be in a neighbouring county.

WHO ORGANISES CENTRES?

- Centres are organised by local hockey associations with guidance being given by EHB as to the running of centres at all levels.
- JDCs and JACs are organised by County Hockey Associations and JRPCs by Regional Hockey Associations who appoint administrators/coaches/managers/ welfare officers to organise and run activity.
- o A fee will be charged for players to attend training sessions/competitions.





JDCs are the next step on the player

pathway after school/club hockey. There are approximately 120 JDCs across the country. Players are nominated to attend JDCs by their teachers/coaches. For more information about JDCs and where they run contact your EHB Regional Office.



JRPCs (Tier 1) are the next step after JACs on the player pathway. There are 12 JRPCs across the country, which form 4 cluster teams; Mercia Lynx, Pennine Pumas, Saxon Tigers and Wessex Leopards. JRPC Tier 1 culminates in 2 Cluster Days where 3 JRPCs come together to play matches against each other in a cluster group.

JUNIOR REGIONAL PERFORMANCE CENTRES

Players are nominated for JRPC Tier 2 from JRPC Tier 1 Cluster Days. JRPC Tier 2 consists of High Performance Assessment Camps (HiPACs) for U15s/ **U17s and England Hockey Board Futures** Cup for U16s/U18s. The U16 and U18 National Age Group squads are selected from JRPC Tier 2.
