### Welcome to Grove Park...

Manchester Football Club was founded in 1860, and its purpose was to play Rugby football, although it was not considered necessary to say so in its title. As such we have a proud tradition and heritage spanning over 150 years, making us one of a select few who can lay claim to being the oldest rugby club in the world.

The Club was formed in 1860 by Richard Sykes, a former Captain of Football at Rugby School, having previously (in 1857) organised the first game of rugby, between the Gentlemen of Manchester and the Gentlemen of Liverpool. Over the years the Club has provided no fewer than six RFU Presidents, ten Presidents of the Lancashire RFU and more representative players than space allows us to list here.

The game has certainly moved on a little since 1860, turning 'professional' in 1997 with some great names falling by the wayside as a consequence. We have had our own challenges since our first foray into National One (now the Championship) in 2001. We have met those challenges head on in true rugby spirit, surviving a rapid tumble through the Leagues. We have since seen a reversal in our fortunes and we are pleased to be competing for a second season in North One West in 2018/19 having been promoted as champions of South Lancs & Cheshire 1.

We continue to field three Men's sides in league competitions as the senior section continues to strengthen. The foundations provided by the 2nd, 3rd & occasional 4th XV are essential to the success of our First XV and to the continued growth of the Club. Perhaps even more so with an eye to the future, we need a competitive Colts team, which we certainly have in our Academy, again competing as MAKOS in an innovative partnership with our neighbours Stockport RUFC. Manchester Ladies are a well-established and integral part of the Club, now with a 2nd XV as the squad continues to grow, and will once again field a competitive team in RFUW Championship North 2.

We are delighted to have so many senior players representing Manchester Rugby Club who are "home grown", and we welcome the new players we continue to attract who want to 'make history, play rugby' here at Grove Park. With many of our Juniors and 'old boys' winning County and International honours (not to mention Premiership club rugby at Sale Sharks and beyond), a thriving Women & Girls section and literally hundreds of M&J players enjoying their rugby every weekend, it is clear that the building blocks are in place for a successful and sustainable future.

We salute all those players who have played in our colours, those who play this weekend and those who will play in the future. We know that you are rightly proud to represent a rugby club with such a long and proud tradition. It is up to us, the current generation, to continue to pull together to ensure that this club has a glorious future for the next 158 years and more. We welcome all visiting players, officials and supporters to Grove Park. You are assured of a warm welcome here and we hope that you will stay around after the game and enjoy the atmosphere of our great club.

### Anselmians 16 v Manchester 12

### Manchester let lead slip away'

On another frustrating day, Manchester failed to capitalise on their dominance of territory and possession, which ultimately cost them the game and the loss of a vital away win.

A good start to the game saw Manchester make a good exit from the kick off and press the oppposition deep into their 22. With good kicking from hand, Macca kept play deep in the Anselmians half, where following a line out steal a penalty was awarded to Manchester for holding on; just to the left of the posts 30 yards out reward for the good start seemed on the cards, however, the kick was off target.

Anselmians were unable to execute a good exit and again found themselves pinned in their 22, where once again they infringed. Manchester elected for a scrum and after several close drives Mike Jordan was pushed over for the opening score. There was a disagreement between the linesman on whether the conversion was good, crucially as it would turn out later, the referee ruled it as a miss. Twenty mins 5 v 0.



From the restart Anselmians finally managed some possession in the Manchester half, gaining a penalty in the 22 to the right of the posts, this was slotted over 5 v 3.



Manchester then had their best passage of play, winning a string of penalties in the opposition 22, strangely none were kicked, Manchester electing instead for a scrum on each occasion. The pressure told, first the Anselmians tight head was sinned binned, then Charlie Ding took a quick tap to dart over but this was brought back as a front row replacement was making his way onto the pitch. The respite was short lived as the ball was moved out to the right for Charlie Johnson to cross the whitewash which with the conversion made it 12 v 13, 30 minutes into the game.

Following an injury Joe Williams was replaced by Joe Houghton but the pattern of the game remained with Manchester in charge of possession and territory. However, with half time looming Anselmians managed to break out and following a couple of line out infringements moved the ball into the Manchester 22. Another penalty allowed Anselmians an easy three points to bring the half to a close at 12 v 6.

Turning round with the wind at their backs Manchester seemed well set to consolidate their lead, which in truth should have been much bigger if kicks had been taken and more chances converted.

The weather then decided to intervene with heavy rain throughout the second half making play very difficult, with a we tball and a greasy surface. This soon came

into play as Enna was harshly adjudged for a high tackle on a playing falling into him as he slipped, resulting in a yellow card and 10 minutes in the bin. Despite lower numbers Manchester continued to dominate possession and territory and were unlucky when following a clean break by Jay and Charlie Ding the ball was knocked on as the try line loomed.

The pattern of the next 20 minutes saw play in the Anselmian half as they tried to play rugby with forward drives rather than kick for territory. As the conditions worsened neither side could sustain possession, with numerous knock-ons and missed line out throws leading to stalemate.

With the Manchester scrum now dominant it looked like it was only a matter of time before the pressure told and Manchester would stretch their lead. However, it was not to be. From deep in their 22, Anslemians chose to run it out, their outside centre made a clean break finally being brought down by Doug Day in the Manchester half. Good recycling allowed the ball to be moved out on the right and after a series of drives, the defence was breached and the ball run under the posts allowing for an easy conversion. Totally against the run of play Anselmians took the lead 13 v 12, 15 minutes to go.

The pressure was on Manchester, who





again returned to the Anselmians 22 but allowed another break out as the ball was spilled. As Manchester retreated and tried to stem the oncoming tide of the now fired up Anselmian players they were adjudged to have infringed, with hands in the ruck. The penalty in front of the posts was calmly slotted and at 16 v 12 this meant with time running out Manchester needed a try to regain the lead.

Play returned yet again to the Anselmian's 22 where further pressure was exerted by the dominant Manchester scrum, however, as penalties were conceded in the dying seconds these had to be played rather than kicked. Several attacks were repelled by the defiant Anselmians defence and matters were made worse as Manchester spilled balls in their desperation to score, alas, finally running out of time.

A harsh lesson for Manchester, where dominance in possession and territory were not converted, kicks were missed, chances spurned and too many basic errors made when the conditions worsened. Credit to Anslemians' who were strong in defence and literally converted all the four opportunities Manchester afforded them to score.

A losing bonus point does not help our league position. Hopefully, the break next week will do Manchester good and we can work our way back to the performance that allowed us to score 87 points only three weeks ago.
