Welcome to Keswick RUFC

Warrington RUFC extends a very warm welcome to the players, officials and spectators of Keswick RUFC on their first league visit and we look forward to an enjoyable game.

Keswick RUFC founded in 1879 have always kept the flag flying in Cumbrian rugby and has had many ups and downs since the heady 1950s when they were undisputedly one of the leading clubs in the county. It was one of the first clubs to have its own club house (built by the players themselves under the guidance of builder and joiner members) and its own ground. Then known as (Greta Park, the Keswick club attracted county games and representative games and was a local point tor rugby in the twin counties of Cumberland and Westmorland. Today they play at the now renamed Davidson Park in honour of the achievements and support of one of Cumbria's rugby 'greats' Phil Davidson. In the 1989/90 season they won the league beating rivals Rossendale 13-7 to win the title. In 1994 Keswick got to the quarter finals of the RU Pilkington Shield when they entertained Kidderminster Carolians it was the biggest game in their history. After a brave performance in front of an 1800 strong crowd their journey came to an end losing 17-27 but only after extra time. Playing in the Cumbria and North Lancs/Cumbria leagues has seen Keswick producing some excellent rugby culminating in promotion to North One West this season having finished top in Cumbria Division 1 in 2018/19.

Today sees the return fixture when Warrington entertain Keswick, with both teams at the wrong end of the table a close game is sure to be in prospect and may the best side win on the day.

Waterloo RUFC 1st XV 32-10 Warrington RUFC 1st XV

It was another bad day at the office for Warrington as they lost to promotion contenders Waterloo 32-10. However, this was a gritty performance, especially from the pack who outplayed their opponents for most of the match.

Waterloo opened the scoring within two minutes of the start when, with the strong wind at their backs, they put in a huge kick. Although this was fielded by Warrington close to their try line, follow-up pressure from the home side saw them cross far out.

Warrington were unlucky not to level the scores shortly afterwards when a strong break from skipper Josh Downes took lay to the Waterloo 22. Waterloo relieved the pressure with a penalty and then went on to kick a penalty goal.

The Warrington pack was very much on top at this stage, in the set pieces and in the loose, outscrummaging their heavier opponents, stealing ball in the line-outs and gaining possession in the rucks and mauls. Ironically, it was the home side who scored again when they bustled over from a scrum, A fourth Waterloo try, which was converted, soon followed but Warrington managed to finally get on the scoreboard on the stroke of half time when Josh Downes forced his way over.

Following a period of sustained pressure, Warrington's second try came after 20 minutes of the second period and it was, fittingly, scored by Sean Callendar, who was superb throughout. However, any hopes of a Warrington come-back were soon dashed when they received two yellow cards in quick succession and then lost iconic skipper Josh Downes with a head injury. Waterloo took advantage of their temporary numerical superiority to score their fourth try before finishing off the scoring with a rather fortunate try in the closing minutes.

"Waterloo were perhaps a little flattered by the scoreline," mused coach Andy Roberts. "We palyed some good rugby today but were let down in the final phases. We are now looking forward to meeting Bowden next week."




January's 1st XV player of the month

Warrington RUFC 2nd XV 83-14 Bolton RUFC2nd XV

As the score suggests, a weakened Bolton, who had to cancel their third team game to fulfil the fixture, were no natch for a fitter, faster Warrington outfit. The half back partnership of scrum half Matt Rockey and the evergreen sean McDermott made the most of Warrington's speedy back division to which Bolton had scant answer.

Within 2 minutes McDermott had floated a long overhead pass out to centre Mark Tickle who took off from talfway to dazzle under the posts. Not to be outdone, brother Steve Tickle was next to score 10 minutes later linishing off a flowing movement instigated by a neat break from Rockey on his own 22. Rockey himself was ext on the score sheet taking the final pass from captain Dom Hastings who provided the link back inside from the Warrington right wing. Full back Andy Almond added the extras to make the score 17-0

n the 25th minute Almond himself scored the first of his hat trick collecting an attempted clearance kick on half vay, outpacing the defence and scoring under the posts. 2 minutes later Almond again scored on the end of a long hass from Rockey and on the stroke of half time his third, the try of the match, kicking a McDermott cross kick on he volley, collecting and scoring under the posts. In the meantime winger Will Jones had added the first of his hat trick when he finished off quick wide ball on the right. Almond added the conversions to take the score to 45-0 at the interval.

3olton had their purple 10 minutes at the start of the second half with pressure from their forwards gaining just lesserts with a try under the posts. 45-7. This resurgence was short lived, however, as back rower Kirk Drummond snapped up a loose ball as Bolton pressed the Warrington line, and surged up to halfway. Centre Fickle was in support to carry from halfway to full way under the posts. Tickle then, unabashed converted with a lrop kick.

Warrington reasserted their dominance and with ample possession added four more tries from wingers Jones (2) and Jordan Harnett and scrum half Rockey. Bolton had the final word, however, when, on one of their rare visits to the Warrington 22, a neat grubber kick split the Warrington defence and brought a try under the posts.

aptain Hastings said " I think our 12 try bonanza, 11 from the backs, confirms the old adage " there's no match or speed"."

20 years of the Six Nations: Who has been the best player to have graced the championship?

The Six Nations began 20 years ago. Here, Telegraph Sport writers take their pick of the finest players to have graced the stage.

Gavin Mairs: Brian O'Driscoll

O'Driscoll announced himself on the international stage with a hat-trick of tries as he inspired Ireland to their first win over France in Paris since 1972 in the first year of the Six Nations in 2000, the launch pad for

a stunning career for Ireland and the Lions. O'Driscoll was the catalyst for the transformation of Ireland from an also-ran side to one that consistently challenged for the Six Nations title, including the Grand Slam in 2009 and the championship title in his final year in 2014.

There is a fitting symmetry to O'Driscoll's career from announcing his stardom in 2000 with a hat-trick against France against Stade de France to winning the 2014 Six Nations title in the same stadium in his last international game. The gaudy statistics – the 141 Tests, the record 26 tries in the Six Nations – only capture a fraction of O'Driscoll's impact.



It was the joy he brought to supporters of all nations with his gorgeous outside break and sumptuous offloads. Along the way he helped to change the face of Irish rugby, galvanising a team accustomed to being plucky underdogs through the force of his self-belief.

Ben Coles: Alun Wyn Jones



Alun Wyn Jones has led Wales to plenty of Six Nations glory. Part of three Grand Slamwinning sides, including one as captain, which is a remarkable CV and makes Jones an easy choice ahead of his 14th Six Nations with Wales this spring. That kind of longevity is truly remarkable in any sport, but especially in top-level rugby at the heart of Wales' pack. Few Welsh players are as revered outside Wales, justifiably so too. Jones has been Wales' official captain since Sam Warburton retired, although his leadership has always been there and integral towards any Welsh success. Whenever he decides to retire, he will be sorely missed by those both in and outside of Wales.

Charlie Morgan: Brian O'Driscoll

Arriving with a hat-trick at the Stade de France two decades ago, O'Driscoll ended up 26 tries from 65 Six Nations matches. George North, remarkably still just 27, has 19 and could eclipse that record. O'Driscoll should hold top spot for a while yet, though.

Plenty of individuals have bettered his pair of Championships, with a single Grand Slam in 2009 followed by a farewell triumph five years later. None can match the highlight reel of game-shaping breaks, deft passes and eye-watering commitment to the contact area. It is impossible to watch his try against England in 2009, a crashing shunt between two forwards close to a ruck, without wincing

Mick Cleary: Sergio Parisse

The Six Nations championship was brought into being so that the talent of a Parisse could be admired by a wider audience. Born in Argentina, an Italian by upbringing and a global superstar by dint of his sumptuous, all-consuming game, Parisse has bestrode almost the entirety of the Six Nations championship, making his international debut in 2002 and is poised for an emotional farewell in front of a home crowd at the end of this tournament. Parisse, a hard-nosed no.8, occasionally impetuous yet blessed with the skills of a back, would have graced any international team in the world.



Tom Cary: Brian O'Driscoll

O'Driscoll's Six Nations career was one long highlights reel; from that stunning hat-trick in Paris back in 2000 when he announced himself on the international stage, to the magisterial performances in 2009 which helped Ireland claim their first grand slam in 61 years, to the final send-off in Paris is 2014 when he helped Joe Schmidt's fast-improving team to the title.

Simply put, O'Driscoll was the best outside centre in the world for years, possessed of dazzling speed and footwork, and incredible hands. Plus he could get over the ball like an openside, winning his team many a turnover. He remains the tournament's top try scorer (26 tries).









