# **Chairman's Report**

I'm sat here thinking about my first full year in the role of Chairman. To say it's been a challenge is somewhat of an understatement. The impact of Covid on all of us and our Rugby Club has been wide ranging. Once lockdowns were implemented and business as usual became impossible we had to react as a Rugby club. Two overriding demands on the Exec Committee became, ensuring the future financial viability of the club and secondly ensuring we protected and kept safe our members.

Financially we're in a strong position, having successfully made use of the various Government and RFU grant scheme's – thanks to Vinod and Charles for their efforts in this area. Thanks must also go to all our club sponsors for their continued support. Finally, thanks to the wider membership and families; not only paying the social membership fees but participating and donating to the "Run Camelot Run" event. Thanks to Aled, Ross and the first team squad for driving this, I'm immensely proud to be part of a club that can pull this off - not only bring in much needed funds to the club but at the same time helping the Hospice of St. Francis whilst bringing a much-needed sense of camaraderie across the membership during this difficult time.

In between the various stages of lockdown, we had periods where "Rugby" was allowed, not the full game we all know and love, but something was better than nothing. Thanks to everyone involved in the planning of this return and to our coaches and volunteers within the various sections who took the time and effort to ensure we did this in Covid safe and risk adverse manner. Again, another moment of pride in adversity was walking round the club on that first Sunday morning back pitch side, seeing the enjoyment and endless smiles of our young players, the parents and the coaching teams, just getting back to a bit of normality.

We have taken this opportunity of the clubhouse being closed to re-fit the kitchen. Wading through the various regulatory requirements and securing the various trades we needed when they have been busier than ever are just some of the challenges we have faced. It's taken way longer and required far more effort than any of us could have envisaged at the outset. Thanks to all of those who've helped over the duration of the project. Now we are in the final snagging stage of the project I look forward to seeing it put to good use in the coming season.

Looking forward to the new season we have as an Exec prioritised several other capital projects. These include fitting replacement rugby posts on the up and down pitch — the posts have arrived we are now just waiting on the concrete being available to install them. We have also prioritised plans to upgrade the floodlight offering on that pitch; we've found our supplier and now just getting the necessary consents needed to progress. This is a much-needed project as the demands on our floodlit pitch space grows continue to grow with up to 350 players per week across all sections of the club making use of the facilities.

On the playing front we are all keeping our fingers crossed that nothing impedes the start of the new season with full rugby being the offering. With fixtures back on the agenda we're looking forward to paying our respects and tributes to club stalwart Joe Weed who sadly passed away during lockdown. More details to follow in due course.

With the future in mind one last request to all members; in order to move these projects forward at the pace we'd like and to meet the regulatory demands placed upon us as a club, we simply need more help and therefore more volunteers.

If you can spare any time, as little as 30 minutes per week would help us, please volunteer. Please come and talk to any of member of the committee and we will happily workout how your skills and knowledge can best help us.

I'm looking forward to seeing where we can take the club in the next few years. Let's stay safe and work together as one to take this great club forward.

# **Finance Report**

Having joined the committee in October 2020, at the peak of financial uncertainty, the job of Club Treasurer was made much easier with the creation of the new finance subcommittee the same month.

With continuing restrictions in October and no end in sight to the pandemic, the creation of the Finance Subcommittee was part of the Executive Committees strategy of close fiscal management. Consisting of Nick, Charles and our bookkeeper, Vicky Martin, we met monthly to forensically examine expenditure, look for further savings and efficiencies as well as opportunities for grants. For the first time, the club monitored its profit and loss (P&L), monthly, enabling us to make sensible decisions based on realistic forecasts. Four pairs of eyes are certainly better than one!

The P&L and associated financial forecasts revealed the folly of opening during the summer (July & August) of 2020 and directly informed the shape of our 2021 reopening plans.

Crucially, the P&L enabled us to successfully apply (within the very narrow 10-day window) to the Rugby Union Winter Survival Fund (RUWSF) – making us one of only 6 clubs in Hertfordshire able to do so and I am delighted to report that we received the maximum award of £50,000. A very unusual grant process in that it is specifically designed to cover cashflow (operating expenses) rather than capital projects and despite the "strings" it comes with, the RUWSF leaves the club in a fantastic position from which to begin the 2021-22 season.

Additionally, the forecasting work undertaken by the finance committee enabled the following;

- Establishment of a budget for rugby
- Complete the (significantly expanded) kitchen renovation project
- Approve the budget for the renovation of the patio (not begun yet)
- Approve c. £30,000 of spending on a major overfall, refit and expansion of the clubs floodlights
- Allocation of money from gift aid, Run, Camelot, Run.. fundraiser, local grants and other donations to various projects

I must give thanks to Chris and Ruth Topping, who's previous hard work meant the club was left in a financially stable position going into the pandemic, their brilliant "bible" handover book and procedures which enabled the Finance Committee to focus on the most important matters.

Our business year ended on July 31<sup>st</sup> and I am pleased to present our draft final P&L to the membership. Please <u>CLICK HERE</u> to view.

Unfortunately, my work commitments have evolved to a point where I am unable to continue in the role of Club Treasurer and will step down as of the AGM. I will support whoever is my replacement by way of a thorough handover and I'm pleased to be able to pass on a robust financial legacy following a very challenging period in the club's history.

Needless to say, this hasn't been a normal year and I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow committee members, for their continued support which has made my life easier. I would also like to praise new committee members – Mike Killeen and Ross Merrett for rising to the occasion and overcoming their baptisms of fire!

I would also like to take a moment to thank two outgoing members of the committee.

Vinod Thayil was parachuted into the committee to provide a firm hand on the financial tiller last year, a job he did very well in the clubs' hour of need. We wish him well for the future as his work takes him overseas.

Tony Browett has been part of the club for so long that I expect that we will need to unscrew him from the wall! As a player, captain, coach and most recently as Director of Senior Rugby alongside Richard, the committee will miss Tony's experience and candour as he steps aside to focus on other ventures. I suspect (and hope) this isn't the last we have seen of Mr B!

Ensuring we all have a club to return to is not solely down to the work of the committee. Many of our members gave their time freely with several acting under their own initiative to promote the club or ensure the clubhouse and its environs remained clean, tidy and serviceable.

I would particularly like to single out the endeavours of Cory Chambers for his dogged work on the kitchen. Cory gave many unpaid hours to this project and was critical in keeping the project on track and ultimately seeing it through to its completion.

The omni-present threat of new lockdowns and ever-changing restrictions made stocking the bar a real challenge – too much stock and we could lose out financially, too little and our members wouldn't hesitate to let us know! The various phases of reopening were managed masterfully by Lynn Massa and her bar team, and I would like to pass on the gratitude of the committee.

Similarly, when allowed, Becca Fuller (shop-manager) and Chelsea Riches (Club Safeguarding Officer) brought some sense of "normal" back to Sundays. Thank you to both for your efforts this last 12-months and for agreeing to continue.

With thanks too to Noel James who continues as draw-master for the Club Lottery – Camelot 2000 – please do email <a href="mailto:secretary@camelotrfc.co.uk">secretary@camelotrfc.co.uk</a> for information about the lottery. I was also heartened to see an e-mail from our International Match Tickets Secretary, Jon Clapham regarding Autumn International Tickets – things are beginning to feel a little bit normal!

### **Land-swap and Lease Negotiations**

With thanks to Chris Topping and Alan Chowles for their continued perseverance with the (i) ongoing negotiations around the lease on the Council Pitches and (ii) the detail surrounding the proposed land-swap – an important precursor to the club getting a new clubhouse.

I am pleased to report that despite slowing due to COVID, matters progress satisfactorily and we expect the new (75-year) lease agreement (council pitches) to be signed imminently. The remaining obstacles regarding the land swap also appear to have been overcome and the committee expects agreements to be finalised in the coming weeks.

Separately, I am in discussions with DBC to finalise the T&C's for maintenance of the car park, specifically line-marking, drainage (incl. maintenance of the rainwater interceptors) and with DBC and Boxmoor Trust to agree a strategy to mitigate dog-faeces on our playing surfaces, which has become a big issue due to increased use by dog-walkers during lockdown.

### Web-shop & Gift Aid

With much of the real world in various stages of lockdown we were keen to explore every avenue possible to generate revenue and this meant looking online.

Following a protracted application to HMRC, the club received authorisation to receive payments via Gift Aid which we launched to our members in December. A big thank you to the following members for contributing over £2,500 via Gift Aid. This money formed part of the £20,000 budget for the kitchen renovation project:

Providing a wide range of clothing and merchandising, the club shop moved online in January and can be viewed <u>HERE</u>. To all those members of the 3<sup>rd</sup> XV squad who have made a pastime of asking me when the shop is open, I can legitimately say it is now open 24/7!

The web-shop and Gift Aid are two legacies of COVID which I pleased to confirm will remain going forward.

### **Membership Subscriptions**

The membership may recall that the club took the pragmatic position of adopting a two-tier plan for subs in the 2020-21 season. In the absence of any clear direction as to whether there would be any rugby, competitive or otherwise during the 2020-21 season, the club invited members to pay social subs (£35) with an "Early-Bird" option of £150 for those wishing to help the club. Almost 350 of our members took up either option and I would like to thank our members for their incredible support – several of whom bought subs more than once or donated via gift aid too.

Tier 2 was to be a balancing payment depending on how much rugby we could offer. In the end we took the decision not to push this button due to the restrictive return to rugby available and our successful application to the RUWSF (see Vinod's finance report), which took pressure off club reserves.

Conversations with other clubs would suggest that this approach appears to have been more successful than those who either levied full subs for 2020-21 or elected to charge nothing.

For the season ahead, a new range of subs have been designed, including a NEW family membership option, Student Membership, and packages to support two new sections of our club – Camelot Cubs (age 3-5) and Camelot Jesters. The finer details are just being worked out and we expect to publish information of the new subs package by the end of August.

### So, what's next?

Although COVID has brought the club (and community) together in some ways, it has also divided it in others.

Staggered Sunday-training times, a closed clubhouse and no rugby meant that a vital part of rugby culture has been missed for 18 months. In fact, we have two age groups who have never even set foot inside the clubhouse! What is going to be important next season is focusing on bringing the club (back) together – BBQs, fireworks, fun-days, club luncheons etc. with this in mind projects are underway:

- To enhance the rugby offering by significantly upgrading the floodlights.
- To provide a Sunday option for younger children (from age 3) in the form of Camelot Cubs.
- To include our sister-code of touch-rugby beneath the Camelot umbrella by formally receiving Camelot Jesters to become a team within the club.
- To plan open-days, fun day's, BBQs for the children, families, and seniors to resurrect the Camelot spirit and who knows, maybe several of those cancelled-centenary events might reappear!
- To use the new kitchen to maximum potential with new menus and opening times.

A key part of the culture of a club is its history and with this in mind I am pleased to announce that with the assistance of Boxmoor Framing Gallery, a significant renovation project is underway to restore and re-mount 30 items of memorabilia from across the ages much of which has been in storage for 20 years. Additionally, the Committee has agreed to rename the back bar in honour of our beloved late President, Joe Weed and new plagues will follow for Joe and also Jack Marshall shortly.

If I can finish by echoing what Nick has said about volunteering. We are an amateur community sports club – the key words there being amateur and community. Please do think about what you might be able to offer our wonderful club, what skills or experience you might have which you might be willing to share. Thanks to their efforts I'm pleased to report that playing numbers remained roughly stable across the section. # **Commercial Report**

It has been a real honour to join the committee of a club I have played at since my youth and still continue to attempt to play at, at the highest level. My aim as commercial director has been to connect the club to the local community and use this connection to boost the clubs image.

The main vessel for connecting with the local community will be social media and the use of the Camelot Website newsfeed. As part of this process, I have created and filled the roles of Social Media Managers (Jamie Hearn and Aled Gamble), with this we have created the social media policy which is vital to have in place. However, it is difficult to promote yourself as the local rugby club if there is no rugby being played, or social events being hosted.

That said, with thanks to Charles Riches we have set up with website pages to host sponsors and will be continuing to build out player profiles which will offer further opportunity for an online presence for sponsors.

Simply put, the more populated pages on the website = more sponsorship opportunity. Therefore, we are firmly in a strong position to push Camelot content effectively, when rugby and social events return.

We are also in the process of building a reformatted sponsorship package, this is being done through the help of our partnership with Club Champions (an outside resource that aids with commercial sports club advise). We will be looking to create a sponsorship leaflet, that will be hosted on the website and will give a clear breakdown of different sponsorship levels.

We are looking to retain all of our current sponsors, to which invoices have been sent to for the coming season, however on top of this we will aim to offer more to their value to their package for the same prices.

There is going to be an aggressive strategy put in place to bring in new sponsors to the club. In short we will aim to have a single exclusive partner for all types of services.

For example: Estate Agents, Tree Surgeons, Builders, Restaurant, Mechanics, etc..

There is still some work to do to ensure that we are able to increase revenue through sponsorship, however we are confident we will be able to do so. A clear establish plan will be set out for this, with the help of Nick Hoyes, Charles Riches and assistance from former Chairman and current sponsor Paul Maddison.

A positive to joining the committee as a current 1st XV squad player is that we are able to establish a voice from the playing group directly to the committee. As a result, it has been established that the playing group, would like us to explore the idea of 'Player Sponsorship'. Although this is not something that will be easy to do immediately, it is something that personally I would love to see work. An idea in its infancy, we have been exploring the possibility of create 'Patrons' to players. This will allow individuals or organisations to contribute towards a players playing costs for over the course of a season. Again, I stress this idea is in its early stages, but is something I would love to pursue and also relish any input of feedback on.

One initiative I had the pleasure of being involved it was 'Run Camelot Run', which saw the whole Camelot Community come together to raise money for Hospice of St Francis Charity by running a certain amount of KM's during lock down. To be frank this was an outstanding success and exceeded all expectations. Not only were we able to raise over £10,000 with Camelot seeing roughly £7,500, but also we were able to connect as a 'One Club' and even further afield as a community. Majority of thanks and credit for this fantastic achievement has to go to Aled Gamble, who headed up and ran the project.

To close, having joined as Commercial Director at the start of Covid, the opportunities to feel fully impactful and make a stamp on the position have felt limited. I am confident and with the help of Club Champions and mentorship of Charles, Nick and Paul, I am confident that as the world reopens after Covid-19 and rugby returns to normality I will be have the opportunity to put into action some plans that have stalled throughout this period.
