

With James Weatherill and Jonny Montgomery both still injured and with Aston Goss. Ben Stevens and Brian Haule all unavailable manager Davis Haule again had to shuffle the pack and show the depth of his new squad. Ashley Jenkins again kept goal, Derek Feyi replaced Stevens in defence and Ty Deacon returned to the centre of the forward line with Harry Scott on the right of the front three. Davide Pobbe was added to the squad along with Joe Fitzgerald on the bench.

After the excellent performance on Tuesday in beating Marlow it was a bit like after the lord mayors show, there just wasn't the same urgency about the FC play, with very little shape and structure to the game and neither side was really able to get a foothold. The game was strewn with errors, after four minutes a goal kick was mishit by Ashley Jenkins along



the ground and came to Uxbridge's Joe Wright but his snap shot flew wide with Jenkins scrambling to get back. As the half progressed though, the impressive Shavne Almond took more and more control of the game and was involved in nearly everything the Moles created, after eighteen minutes he picked up the ball on the left side of the field, cut inside and hit a low shot which was parried by Keeper McCarthy and the onrushing Harry Scott was unable to find the final touch.

Almond was again involved

two minutes later this time with some nice interplay with Kieron Schmidt on the left. Almond's final ball in found Ty Deacon but again FC were foiled by the Uxbridge keeper. The away stopper made another fantastic save on twenty eight minutes, Shayne Almond found the overlapping Craig Carby with a through ball and his cross from the left was hit by Deacon but McCarthy somehow kept it out. Moles fans were now asking if the side again was to rue all these missed chances. Uxbridge had their best chance on thirty five minutes

when Joe Wright bent a ball in which Ashley Jenkins in the home goal palmed away for a corner. Aylesbury should have broken the deadlock just as the half was ending when Harry Scott's ball in couldn't be put away by either Deacon or Almond and the half finished all square.

FC needn't have worried though as straight from the kick off a ball over the top from Craig Carby found Ty Deacon, who beat one man and then sensationally chipped the keeper from the edge of the box to give Aylesbury a

deserved lead. That lead should have been extended when five minutes later Shayne Almond again put in a fantastic cross which Jeanmal Prosper met on the volley but yet again the ball was kept out by McCarthy. The home side did make their advantage pay though when a short corner found Almond with the ball and his cross was met by Jordan Jenkins who headed home to make it 2-0.

Aylesbury now looked in complete control and comfortable but a goal out of the blue by Dylan Kearney brought Uxbridge back into the game. On sixty eight minutes the two goal lead was restored when Prosper was bought down on the edge of the box, man of the match Shayne Almond stepped up and fired the ball over the wall and into the top left corner. That should have been that, but yet again as in so many games this season Aylesbury have conceded sloppy goals and today was



no exception, with just a minute to go of normal time and the home side attacking, FC lost possession and a ball over the top found Kearney bearing down on goal and he slipped the ball past Jenkins to give Aylesbury a nervous four minutes of injury time which they came through to enjoy their second league win of the week.

The Moles





Our opponents in the FA Trophy today are the Moles of Surrey, Molesey FC who play in the Bostik League South Division.

It's not often you get to face a team with the same nickname, and FC fans may be forgiven it would be unlikely to happen, but today is the first game between the two clubs, the moles of Buckinghamshire and Surrey respectively.

The Step 4 side from Surrey ply their trade in the Bostik League South Division and currently sit in thirteenth place after a mixed start to their season, with only 4 points gained away from home so far, with their last points coming on the road at Ashford United on September 9th.

Thankfully for the Moles their home form has been good enough to put them in mid-table early on.

Molesey were knocked out in the first qualifying round of the FA Trophy last season with a 3-1 home loss to Romford and both sides will be looking to progress one step further than last year for some of that prize money at stake and the chance to take on a larger side.

Molesey are led by Peter Lelliott who guided the team to the fantastic Combined Counties League Premier Division win in the season of 2014/15 and has helped Molesey to solidify their position in the Bostik South division finishing ninth in their first season and 19th last season.

The dangermen for Molesey are Josh Andrew, who scored two on tuesday night in their victory over East Grinstead and also midfielder Ross Chalke who has scored three so far. The moles boast a strong line-up with the likes of Antonio Simeone from Godalming Town, also Manny Quarshie and Ronald Sobowale who have scored a few goals so far this season.

Let the battle of the Moles commence!

Club History

Ex-Corinthian, and prominent local G.P, Dr. James Jenkinson Knox started the 'Hampton Court and East Molesey Association Football Club' in the Autumn of 1892 (the year the song 'Daisy Daisy' came out). The first match was played on Saturday 24th September, when we played hosts to Barnes F.C, winning 14 - 5! The club changed its name to 'The Molesey Football Club' in 1896, when, in an interview the good doctor was quoted as saying, "... I looked about me and started the Molesey F.C., and was appointed its first captain. The club is gradually growing and I have great ideas as to its future." However, after the untimely death on Xmas Day, of the 32-year-old doctor following an illness, interest in the club waned, and the club went through the metamorphosis of Molesey Athletic -> Molesey St. Mary's before Molesev St. Paul's emerged as the leading club in Molesev in 1905 plaving their Kingston & District League home matches at the Royal Oak Ground owned by one Mr. J. Bourchier.

Molesey lost the first ever Teck Cup Final, 0 – 6 to runaway league leaders, Teddington in 1909/10 (the only football trophy to be donated by royalty, still going strong todayl). In 1911/12, Molesey St. Pauls amalgamated with a lower-leagued team, Molesey, to form Molesey & St. Pauls United. 1912/13 saw the reserve side win the Surrey Minor Cup (a trophy donated by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle), 2 – 1, Vs Tongham, at Woking F.C., and just before WWI, the Surrey Junior Charity Cup was won, 2 – 1, away Vs Chertsey!

Discarding the 'St. Paul's United' part, Molesey entered the Surrey Junior League for one season in 1920/21, and won group - section 3. This put them into the semi-finals where they hosted and beat Thornville (Croydon), 4 – 0. The visitors reported, "The winners are the finest junior team we have met this season,... a cleaner set of players than the Molesey side (in our opinion) could not be found". The league was won in a final at Walton, Vs Godalming Federation, 1 – 0. That amazing season also saw the Surrey Junior Cup won on the ground of Summerstown F.C, 3 – 0, Vs Brighton Railway, whilst the Surrey Junior Charity Cup was won again, 7 – 0, at home to Shottermill!

In the summer of 1939. Molesev merged with Molesey Athletic (a successful Kingston & District Junior side) to form Molesey United. Though originally planning to field 4 sides, the outbreak of WWII only saw one side take part in a very reduced war-time Kingston & District League which they won in 39/40, and again in 40/41. The last 2 years of the war saw no Molesey side, and during 1945/46, only West Molesey Old Boys played a season of friendlies. For 1946/47, the two clubs, Molesey United and West Molesey Old Boys, merged to form 'Molesey F.C' and played over the road on the 'rec in the Surrey Intermediate League. That year, the league title was won, and the Surrey Intermediate Charity Cup Final was reached, losing 1 - 4 to Farnham Town reserves at Guildford City F.C in a final played at the start of the following season. The Surrey Intermediate

Challenge Cup Final was also reached during 50/51, but at Leatherhead F.C., old rivals Ditton Old Boys proved too strong, winning 2-0.

With the help of an F.A loan, our present site at 412 Walton Road was purchased for the start of the 1953/54 season. That season would see the Moles play for the first time in black and white (due to the influence of Fulham F.C connections) and enter the Surrey Senior League! Also they enjoyed the visit of Q.P.R in January '54 - the pro' side winning 2 - 1. 54/55, saw the clubhouse erected on site, and so enable the club to be allowed to compete in the National F.A. Amateur Cup. A4 - 1 victory, at Chertsey Town F.C., over Farnham Town (1st team!) in Surrey Senior League Charity Cup Final, saw Molesey's first Senior honours in 1956/57. The following season (57/58). Molesev won the Surrev Senior League Title (Unfortunately the Moles have not won a league since!)

Molesey's first season in the Spartan League was arguably their most successful in their 14-year stay there. They finished second the league to Staines Town, after leading it for most of the year, reached the second round of the Surrey Senior Cup, where a record attendance (which stands to this day) of 1,553 saw the Moles lose 0 – 6 to top amateur side, Tooting & Mitcham, who, in 58/59, took eventual F.A. cup-winners Nottm Forest to a replay at the City Ground. The Spartan League Cup Final was reached, when Molesey, known as the 'nearly team' that year, hosted Met. Police, but lost 2 – 3.

Sir Stanley Rous opened the new clubhouse and bar in 1960, where the architect won an award for the 'butterfly roof' design - unfortunately as Gary Mayne points out, "It didn't keep the rain out!" Around this time, the pitch was rotated 90 degrees to its current position. The Spartan League Cup was won, 3-2 Vs Crown & Manor, at Ruislip Manor F.C in 1961/62 despite the Moles finishing third from bottom! Easter tours to Germany were organized by Jack Anders after the end of each season from 65/66 to 69/70 and provided much joy and interest for players and supporters alike. The pavilion was completed in 1967. New floodlights were installed for 72/73 when a West Ham XI were invited down for its opening. Molesev won 2-0, and secretary Roy Dew said of the lights, "It lit up the whole ground by itself. It was incredible".

Playing in the Athenian League Division Two for four seasons between 1973-77, one Mr. Cyrille Regis (one of England's first black international players) played for the Moles during 75/76, during which they won Section D of the Premier Midweek Floodlit League with a record points haul, reached the final of the Surrey Senior Shield, losing 1 – 2 to Woking, at Stompond Lane and also reached the Vase 5th round losing down in Bristol

The club were elected into a newly formed Division Two of the Isthmian League for the start of 1977/78 when for the first 2 seasons, the club

narrowly missed promotion. The 1981/82 season saw Molesev's furthest run in the F.A. Vase. the quarter-finals, where, under a crowd of 604 in Molesey, the Notts Alliance side, Rainworth Miners Welfare cruelly ended Molesey's dreams, 1-0. The close season following 1985/86, saw Gary Mayne head the members in refusing the relocation of the football club proposed by the then committee, due to mounting debts. The result was that part of the club was sold off. The rebuilding under Gary reaped rewards when, under Martin Eede, the club won promotion to the Isthmian League Division One in 1989/90 and won the Southern Combination Cup, 3-2 Vs Feltham at Walton Road the year after. The 1992/93 season saw the club promoted to the Premier, and reach the final of the Isthmian League Cup at Aldershot Town where they lost 1 - 2 to Marlow. In 1993/94. the club reached the F.A. Cup First Round Proper stage, losing 0 - 4 at home to Conference side, Bath City. The league's refusal to again grant the club an 'A' grading for their Walton Road ground mid-way through 95/96, condemned the club to their first ever relegation.

This started a bleek period in the club's history when the club slowly but surely slipped down the Isthmian leagues, hastened by off field dramas instigated by a former chairman and later, a 'legal secretary'. Yet there were one or two bright spots. One such getting featured in a documentary 'under the moon' in the late 90s; and also being player-manager Clive Walker's time at Walton Road during 2000/01 when, due to his connections, he took a Molesey side out to Hong Kong to take part in a six-a-side tournament, one of their opponents were — Glasqow Celticl! (the Moles lost 0 – 1).

Staines Town won the Southern Combination Cup back from Molesey (who beat them in the 93/94 final with mostly their reserves) in 2005/06 - when it was Staines turn to field mostly reserve and youth players and win! In 2007/08 the Moles went out the Isthmian League and didn't win at home all season! Since then, we have consolidated our Combined Counties status, even reaching the Surrey Senior Cup Semi Final in 2010/11 for only the third time in our history! Last season (12/13), the Moles won the Southern Combination Cup on a penalty shoot-out, 5 - 4, against Spelthorne Sports following a 1 - 1 draw after extra time watched by a crowd of 246 at home. The club is going through a legal process to sell a part of the around to Rushmon Homes at the moment despite having already gained planning permission from the council. The committee are fighting very hard, under good guidance and are confident of a successful outcome. Also the management team of Steve Webb. Peter Lelliott and Alan Maynard enter their seventh consecutive term in charge appointing a new coach, Dan Carroll and look to be competitive again in this season's Combined Counties League

Manager Davis Haule took the opportunity in this League Cup tie to make some changes ahead of the FA Trophy game at home against Molesey on Saturday, making the starting line up for the first time was winger Hafid Bounyafe, he was joined by Midfielder Kerran Lataille, replacing Harry Scott and Davis Haule. On the bench was new signing, defender Garry Jones who has joined from Potters Bar Town.

Aylesbury must have thought that after the first ten minutes it was going to be a long night, Chesham dominated possession and rarely let the away side have a touch of the ball but in the end the 3-0 scoreline flattered the home side as FC really played their part in an entertaining game.

Jordan Jenkins was called into action after just three minutes blocking a goal bound effort, then a vicious ball across the FC goal was missed at the far post by onrushing strikers. It was all Chesham at this point but Ty Deacon then broke the defensive line at the other end but was unable to pull the trigger and the ball went away for a corner. Hafid Bounayfe then found himself on the right side of the penalty area but the onrushing Hafed Al-Droubi narrowed the angle and the winger shot just wide as Aylesbury came more and more into the game.

Derek Feyi was booked after twenty eight minutes for an obvious tug and Chesham fired the free kick just wide from a dangerous position. The Generals then had a golden opportunity when a ball fired across was blasted over the bar from six yards with Ashley Jenkins beaten.



On thirty seven minutes a training ground free kick saw Shayne Almond play the ball short to Kieron Schmidt and his cross found Bounyafe open at the far post but the tricky winger couldn't control the ball and the half ended all square.

The second half started much as the first with Chesham in control and ten minutes in they took the lead.
Oran Swales was needlessly tripped by Kerran Lataille and Lewis Toomey stepped up to dispatch the resultant penalty. Chesham then doubled the lead when Adam Watkins ran onto a ball from Joe laciofano and slipped the ball passed Jenkins.

Aylesbury kept battling but were unable to create a clear opportunity to pull a goal back, they changed the formation and went three at the back, introducing new signing Garry Jones but Chesham tied up the game and progressed to the next round with a third goal from lacofano.

All in all a good performance against a good Chesham side as the team prepare for what is a far more important challenge on Saturday when Molesey are the visitors to Haywood Way in the FA Trophy.

Having lost out in the FA Youth Cup after extra time last week, Aylesbury FC U18's were hoping to bounce back as they returned to league action against Harefield United on Monday evening. The two fixtures between the sides last season produced a total of sixteen goals and plenty of entertainment, so much was expected of this tie.

With several players unavailable for various reasons Aylesbury were forced to make a few changes to the squad for this game. Juan Quintero, who has been recovering from a serious knee injury picked up at the end of last season whilst representing Mursley United in the B&B Cup final, was passed fit to make his debut for the Young Moles whilst Taf Manjengwa and Max Jones also made their first starts of the season as Dan Turney changed the tactical shape of the side.

Unlike their previous few performances, in the very early moments of the game Aylesbury were on the front foot. They played positively, looked good on the ball and were quick to pen Harefield back in and around their own box. The hosts tried to counter this with long balls but this was dealt with by the AFC defence, marshalled by goalkeeper Richmond.

This would be short lived however, as a poor pass across the edge of the box was directed straight at a Harefield who made AFC pay the price as he was able to run in and score past the onrushing Richmond. A very disappointing way to concede an early goal, particularly given the positive approach Aylesbury had taken in the game.



The goal kick started Harefield and they immediately seized control of the game hereon. Regularly testing the Young Moles midfield with runs from deep, they were able to work the ball easily into wide areas and gave the Aylesbury backline a torrid time as they were repeatedly let off the hook by the profligacy of the hosts' attackers.

Having seemingly weathered the storm, a lapse in concentration lead to a second for the Hares as their midfielder was given the freedom of the midfield to rush through against the AFC centre halves who were limited in being able to stop the attack which resulted in another easy finish for their forward to make it 2-0 to the home side.

The Young Moles will be very disappointed with the manner of the goals. A lack of energy in the midfield allowing Harefield too much time and space to get at the backline which was

doing its level best to cope. Trying to counter this, Manager Dan Turney changed the shape to a more familiar set up midway through the half to try to bring the Young Moles back into the game and provide a more solid platform in which they could build play.

It looked to be a wise move as AFC were immediately seeing more of the ball in good areas, and looked more threatening going forward. They soon had their first meaningful attempts on goal although failed to test the 'keeper who's had a relatively quiet evening up to this point.

He was soon in the thick of the action however, as a poor kick from his box didn't make it far and was intercepted by Jacob Hutchinson who unselfishly cut the ball across to Cian Banert who finished well after taking a touch to control. AFC getting one back and deservedly so based on their improvement minutes beforehand.

They would get an opportunity to level the scores a few minutes later via a similar scenario to the one they scored as Jacob Hutchinson again being busy on the right hand side found Banert in space again in the box and having taken a touch to control fired a shot in only to see it cannon off of the crossbar and out of play. Good build up play from Aylesbury.

Having got themselves back into the game and pushing for an equaliser, Aylesbury were piling on the pressure. This would be their undoing as the ball was given away cheaply on the edge of the Harefield box, triggering a quick counter attack. With men piling forward the hosts were clinical in their execution and provided another easy finish in the box following some quick combination play in and around the AFC box. A reprieve for Harefield who's patience and discipline was well rewarded.

Half time: Aylesbury FC 1-3 Harefield United

An uncharacteristic 45 minutes from Aylesbury. Struggled to get on the ball early on and severely lacked composure on the ball. Their inability to keep possession one of the more telling factors in the scoreline as they were punished by a very energetic Harefield side.

Unsurprisingly, Aylesbury made a couple of changes at half time to try to ignite their performance. Archie Clarke and Henry Richmond were introduced to try to provide a little more balance to the side.

The game was finely poised, as Aylesbury went out early to try to claw their way back into the game whilst Harefield looked to show their game management skills in seeing out the result.

Both teams took turns in trying to control the game, with Aylesbury looking more dogged than in the first half with Harefield seemingly happy to get men behind the ball to soak up pressure before trying to use their pacey wingers to execute a counter.

Aylesbury, now seeing more of the ball continued to huff and puff throughout the half but lacked composure in the final third to be able to muster anything of real value. Harefield however looked dangerous on the break and forced Isaac Richmond into a handful of terrific saves to keep them at bay.

As the half went on, tiredness started to creep into the Aylesbury side. A lot of work had gone into this performance, although it could be argued that they were made to work harder than necessary.



"I thought the second half was pretty even, but for all our hard work we just couldn't create a clear cut opportunity to get ourselves back in it.

"Hopefully with a couple of the more experienced lads being available to us next week we can put on a better performance and get ourselves back on track in terms of results."





Last year was a very special year for the FA Cup, with the four teams contesting the semi-finals having finished in the top five of the English top-flight. Only once since the Premier League, or Premiership, kicked into action in 1992 has the last four been represented with such strength and quality (in 2008-09). The cup was alive and it seemed to mean something to the world's biggest and richest clubs... Or so we were told.

The truth of the matter is and this really isn't breaking news - all four of those clubs, Manchester City, Tottenham, Chelsea and most certainly the eventual winners. Arsenal. would have swapped that victory walk up those famous steps in northwest London for a top-four finish that opens the gate for Champions League football. They reached the last four through the sheer strength and depth they could call on, stripping back their playing resources and showing the competition little respect in the early rounds as they breezed past much-lesser opponents.

I don't blame them for this, but let's stop dressing it up; the FA Cup, while no doubt being a competition the biggest clubs still 'want' to win, is little more than a back-up plan for managers – like Arsene Wenger – to fall back on should the primary goal of top-class European football not be attained. Even then, for the most demanding of clubs, winning it will not be enough to save a manager his job.

Despite this, last season really was a very special year for the FA Cup, and the biggest success story came from Non-League football with Lincoln City reaching the quarter-finals. They talk about romance in the cup, and there was plenty of that as Danny Cowley's side became the first Non-League club in 103 years to reach the last eight.

For their efforts, and ignoring the TV revenue that was pulled in, they also picked up £395,000 for the six games they won. In the grand scheme of the FA's current pav structure and a pay pot that tips £15 million - this is probably about right, but the issue needs addressing in the earliest rounds. So let's shave a bit off the top and pile a bit more into the bottom. What difference does £1.8 million, the money picked up by the eventual winners, make anyway?

The FA would be doing a lot more for the game should they bump up the prize money in the first and second Preliminary rounds, which is currently just £1,500 and £1,925 respectively.

Forget the TV cash bonuses that 'may' come into it should smaller clubs proceed past the first round – give grassroots football the money it deserves

The FA have suggested they are going to address this, but actions speak louder than words and more cash is needed from the ground up. The £1.8 million that goes to the winner, most certainly a top-flight club and more than likely a top-four contender, will be nothing but loose change.

In fact, it probably won't even come close to covering the compensation package for the sacked manager who has the temerity to win the bloody thing!




