Our Founder: R.K.Keller M.C. Life Member Blackheath H.C. Kent President 1968-1970



The Outcasts were founded in 1934 to attend the Worthing Easter Festival. Roy Keller was the Organiser and Captain and thought up the name. According to legend and Jimmy James, after one Saturday evening's revels, Roy was travelling home down the Old Kent Road on a number 10 tram, when the name 'Outcasts' came to him. Relieved at having solved this problem he dozed off to be woken at 3.00 am by the cleaning lady in the tram depot. Roy offered her the flowers he had bought as a peace offering for his wife Esme. The cleaning lady refused the flowers and ushered Roy on his way home to Charlton.

Roy also created and was the First Captain of the Fifth XI in 1957. Roy was the archetype of the social hockey player. I remember as a very young player one Easter, being swept in his wake into The Assembly Rooms at Worthing where he demanded loudly that the party should be shown to "Mr. Keller's Table". He was known and loved everywhere.



As hockey re-established itself after the First War, long before the advent of Leagues and Cups, the Saturday afternoon Game was the showpiece event for Clubs. By the thirties 'Social' Hockey in the form of Sunday friendlies and end-of-season Festivals started to develop. This was enjoyed by the more sociable members often with invitation players. Blackheath have always been to the fore when it comes to social hockey and a Sunday and Festival side was formed.

The practice of the early Outcast teams was always to select the Sunday side from those in the bar on a Saturday night. This has always resulted in a good mix from all sections of the Club. The team was seldom short, and sometimes had too many. Roy once enlisted the services of a Royal Artilleryman, who played in goal wearing a dark suit, bowler hat and pads, and smoked a cigar throughout the game. In the Thirties, the Outcasts regular Sunday lunchtime watering hole was The Crown on Blackheath. After Roy, Paddy Sloane took over the captaincy of The Outcasts, aided by among others, Jeff Hynds.

In 1955 Ian Robertson assumed the crown and built up the fixture list until there was a game every Sunday, and started our long association with Thanet. Ian also started a summer evening hockey programme. He sometimes had difficulty counting to eleven, particularly during festivals. I well remember an Easter Saturday when Ian, thinking we were short, recruited David Frost of OKs; then thought he had 12 and stood me down; and then discovered he had Jo Aguiar playing left half and inside left, and demanded to know why I wasn't on the pitch, all in the space of 5 minutes.

Around 1972, age, infirmity and a state of general disorganisation encouraged Ian to hand over to me. During the Seventies, The Outcasts played a comprehensive Sunday and Summer programme and started visiting The Medway Festival. Subsequently management has been shared by David Maltman, Richard Cleall, Conrad De Souza and many more.

Worthing The first Festival attended by The Outcasts was at Worthing during Easter 1934. The atmosphere of these Festivals has not changed - in the Thirties, Roy encouraged Herbert Sears to drive his baby Austin into the saloon bar of The George, where it was placed on a table.

Jim Fuller remembered an Easter Festival just after the Last War when he was sharing a bed with Arthur Garrish. They awoke to find a hoover, switched on, in bed between them. The top kitty master of all time must be Trevor Holmes who, in 1971, commandeered a tea urn at The Hairy Goats Hotel, had it filled with bitter, and sold it to other Teams who could not get to the very small, undermanned, bar. The Outcasts kitty ran into profit that year.

The sociability was not confined to members of Blackheath, apart from Guest Players, firm friendships were formed with members of other Clubs, notably The Hairy Goats (Maidenhead), Scorpions(Old Kingstonians), Bohemians (Tulse Hill), Strollers (Surbiton), Accidentals(Hendon) and Furness. Not forgetting The Members of Worthing H.C. who provided the annual venue for our revels. The Outcasts have interrupted Festival Matches with clouds of bubbles, a panel of judges assessing the performance, and a pantomime horse.
