We seek **professionalism** throughout. We have started the careers of **internationally capped players** who have represented England, or other nations. One of these players has gone on to manage the England Men's National Team. We have produced players who have played, and **won trophies, in the Premier League**. Numerous players have earned money playing football at the semi-professional level. Our players have also earned football scholarships, at home or abroad, allowing them to play football whilst gaining a fully paid **education**.

FAMILY

We are a football family.

Our values apply to every person associated with the club: player, coach, administrator, alum and their respective families.

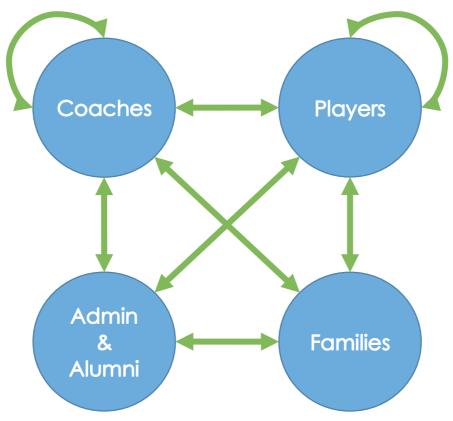


Figure 1 Creating a football family requires us to manage relationships between Coaches (also to other coaches), Players (also to other players), Club Administrators & Alumni and Families.

Forest United brings different communities and backgrounds together and we consider the club as **one family**. To build an effective football family we must manage the relationships and communicate effectively between **coaches**, **players**, **administrators & alumni** and every person's respective **family** (Figure 1).

Effective communication is **key**, to a successful football **family**.

EXCELLENCE

Strive for excellence in everything you do. Our club is our product, and our product must be first class. Excellence is validated against the TEST:

- Team: Our club is formed from our teams, and our teams must be excellent
- **Effort**: Play, coach and support with great intensity on every game, never quit
- **Sportsmanship**: Referees, opposing teams, and families should regularly have great things to say about us
- <u>Truth & Integrity</u>: Maintain honesty and honour: in thought; in words; and in our actions on and off the field, both in and away from football



GROWTH

Educate yourselves and others. Develop a **growth** mindset and constantly seek improvement. Progress, do not pause to **actualise** your potential. Remember:

• Teachers first: Coaches second

• Students first: Players second

PROACTIVITY

Take the **initiative** in your development: be **proactive**, not reactive. Proactivity is: attendance with the right attitude and independence matched with inquisitiveness.

- Attendance: Every training session and match is an opportunity to improve
- Attitude: Don't just show up, turn up-ready to improve
- Independence: Improve yourself and the club outside of organised times
- Inquisitiveness: Ask questions to develop your knowledge

HUMILITY

The club comes **first** and no individual is bigger than the club. Surrender your ego for the good of the team and the club. Humility is shown by:

- Attire: respect the badge, the colours and the kit
- Work ethic: arrive early and only leave after the equipment is packed
- **Courtesy**: be respectful, not rude, to: our teammates; our coaches; our administrators; our alumni; the opposition; and the referees
- **Involvement**: engage every way possible with the club and the community

Culture

EVERYONE

We are responsible to the club, no matter where

Your responsibility to the club (as a player, coach, parent, administrator or member) extends **even when you are away from the pitch**:

Do not get involved with or do anything that would ever embarrass or compromise the integrity of the players, coaches, and families of our team.



Everything you do reflects on our team, club, school, family, and community. Any violation of this policy can result in suspension or expulsion from the team.

We start with a positive attitude

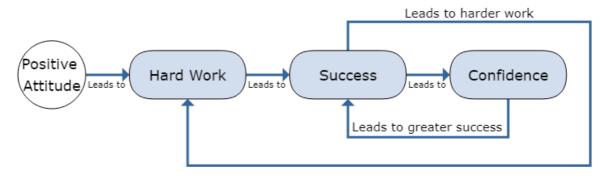


Figure 2 The Attitude Chain sets how we think about and actualise our success.

The **Attitude Chain** is as follows (Figure 2): positive attitude *leads to* hard work; hard work *leads to* success; success *leads to* confidence; confidence *leads to* greater success; and greater success *leads to* harder work. Anytime the cycle is broken, we must **restart with positive attitude**.

We plan, prepare, execute evaluate in order to succeed

For hard work to lead to success (Figure

2), first we need a **plan**, e.g. "I need to take these steps to play well on Sunday". Then, we need to **prepare**: by effectively training the body and the mind. Then, we

need to **execute** our plan. Finally, we need to **evaluate** our attempts and use the outcomes to shape our plans for future successes.

At the end of each season, every player and coach involved should look in the mirror and honestly say: "I did everything I could to help our football team club be the very best it can be, and I'm a better person for it."

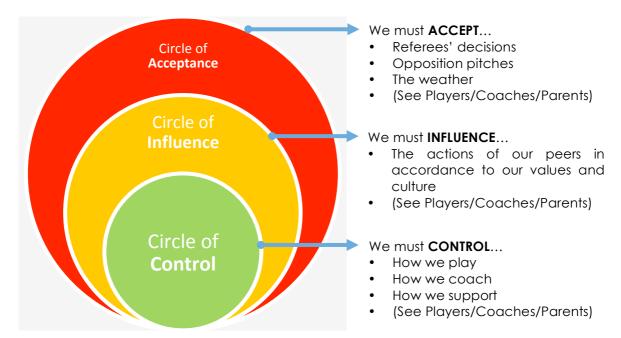


Figure 4 The three circles of focus: things we can control (green); things we can influence (orange); and the things we cannot control or influence and therefore must accept (red).

We spend our energy on what we can control, give our time to that which we can influence, but never waste time and energy on what we cannot control (Figure 4).

Respect our training and matchday policy

Be early and prepared.

On occasion, players will have a one-off absence with a reason (excused absences). These could be, e.g.: illness, family emergencies, school activities and so on. Reasons for absence **should be provided in good time before training and matches** otherwise they are considered unexcused absences. In the interests of team fairness, we set the following **three-strike policy** for **consecutive excused absences**:

- Second consecutive excused absence = missed start
- Third consecutive excused absence = missed half-game
- Fourth consecutive excused absence = missed game

Players should not be absent without a reason (unexcused absence), because communication is key to respecting our value of **Family**. Lack of communication also represents a lack of courtesy and disrespects our value of **Humility**. Thus, for absences without a reason we impose the following **three-strike policy**:

- First unexcused absence = missed half-game
- Second consecutive unexcused absence = missed game
- Third consecutive unexcused absence = removal from team

All decisions are at the discretion of the head coach and will be based on your previous demonstration of living to our club values.

Respect our no fighting policy

Any player that is violent, or encourages violence, towards others (whether a teammate, opponent or another) will be subject to an immediate suspension from the club. They may also be excluded altogether from the club.

No matter your age or experience, the kids are our focus

- Coach and mentor for life: treat each player with dignity, respect and develop bonds of sincere trust with each of them. They are always ours.
- Engage, don't dictate: get to know your players as individuals and coach them to become their best selves. Help them to take ownership and find solutions to their own problems—one day they will have to.
- **Use praise and criticism wisely**: criticism can weigh more than praise, so encourage at least as much, if not more, than you dissuade. No person wants to fail.
- Listen and offer support: be caring. How a player acts or plays may be unrelated to you, the environment or the team; but could be the pressures of life that they are unable to express easily.
- Their development is your responsibility: if it happened, you either coached it or allowed it.



Expect the very best from your players

We must show them that the impossible is possible.

- If you don't believe, neither will they: no matter what individuals you have, you must believe that they are capable of becoming more than what they are. Remember what it felt like when someone else believed in you, even when you did not believe in yourself.
- Paint a vision: help to structure and visualise a better future for them
- **Set goals**: communicate your expectations (to the team and to individuals), and help them to take ownership of their future.
- **Set pace**: be a role model for the kids the way you want them to act. Their eyes are on you, always. However much they put in, you must do more.

Be excited & enthusiastic

Enthusiasm breeds enthusiasm. If you have a positive attitude, then the players will follow, and that is the start of the Attitude Chain (Figure 2). You set the environment: becoming and staying excited is a personal choice. There are no excuses. How we react is just as important as how we act when the players are around. Be on and be up; regardless of how you feel.

We teach and coach players during the most influential time of their lives. Be consistently united with our purpose, values and culture, and teach these same standards to the players for the duration they are at our club.
