POLICY AND PROCEDURES FOR THE SAFEGUARDING, WELFARE AND PROTECTION OF YOUNG PEOPLE (For Tours see RFU Safeguarding ON Tour Guidance on MRC Website\Club Document)

Chairman's Statement:

In order to provide young people with the best possible experiences and opportunities in the sport of rugby union, it is imperative that everyone within MFC MJ&C operates within an accepted ethical framework and demonstrates exemplary behavior. This not only ensures the game makes a positive contribution to the development of young people, safeguards them and promotes their welfare, but also protects all personnel from allegations of abuse or poor practice. It is not always easy to differentiate poor practice from abuse. It is not the responsibility of employees or volunteers in the sport of rugby union to determine whether or not abuse is taking place. It is their responsibility to identify poor practice and possible abuse and to act if they have a concern about the welfare of a child or young person

MFC MJ&C Key Principles

- Anyone under the age of 18 should be considered as a child or young person for the purposes of this document.
- The welfare of all children and young people is paramount.
- All children and young people, regardless of age, gender, ability, race, religion, ethnic origin, nationality, social status or sexual orientation should be able to enjoy the game in an environment safe from abuse of any kind.
- It is the responsibility of child protection professionals to determine whether abuse has taken place but it is everyone's responsibility within the sport of rugby union to report concerns.

- All suspicions and allegations of abuse will be taken seriously and responded to swiftly and appropriately as per RFU/RFUW Policy and Procedures.
- Working in partnership with parents/carers is essential for the protection of young people.
- The RFU/RFUW recognises the roles and responsibilities of statutory agencies in relation to safeguarding children/young people and promoting their welfare, and is fully committed to complying with the procedures of the Local Safeguarding Children's Boards.
- The RFU/RFUW Policy and Procedures for the Welfare of Young People is mandatory and all affiliated clubs and Constituent Bodies must appoint a Welfare Officer to ensure that the appropriate procedures are followed.

1. Roles and Responsibilities

1.1 In order that the RFU/W and MFC MJ&C Child Protection Policy is implemented effectively there has to be recognition that RFU/W, Constituent Bodies, member Clubs and schools must work together, each with a role to ensure that young people enjoy rugby union in a safe environment. The Policy and Procedures for the Welfare of Young People in the Sport of Rugby Union is to be applied to all young players who are under 18. Within RFU Regulations a male player is permitted to play in the adult game when he reaches his 18th birthday. In these circumstances, paragraph 2.1(f) below cannot practically be applied. However, those responsible for the management of adult teams which include 17 year olds must at all times be mindful of their safety and wellbeing.

1.2 The RFU/W must:

- a) Appoint a designated person to manage Child Protection
- b) Produce a national Child Protection Policy
- c) Produce a Child Protection Implementation Plan
- d) Manage the implementation of DBS disclosure
- e) Produce relevant resources to support the Child Protection Policy
- f) Delegate the management of cases to CBs where appropriate in accordance with RFU regulations
- g) Appoint a disciplinary panel when necessary and

h) Ensure all appropriate individuals and bodies are informed of disciplinary decisions and ensure they are acted on.

1.3 The Constituent Body (CB) must:

- a) Appoint a Welfare Manager
- b) Ensure that each Club has a Child Protection Policy
- c) Co-ordinate the management of DBS (Disclosure & Barring Service), was CRB (Criminal Records Bureau) disclosure
- d) Ensure that all reported cases are managed in line with RFU/W Policy
- e) Manage Child Protection Disciplinary cases when instructed by RFU
- f) Monitor a minimum of 10% of Clubs per year; and
- g) Identify a disciplinary panel that, where necessary, will be convened to hear cases of poor practice as identified by the RFU Child Protection Officer

1.4 MFC MJ&C must:

- a) Appoint a Welfare Officer (plus another person to undertake the role in the absence of the designated person) who will act as the first point of contact for concerns about the welfare of young people
- b) Publish a Child Protection Policy within the Club. This must include all the detail set out in this Policy and Procedures for the Welfare of Young People in the Sport of Rugby Union;
- c) Ensure that all officers and committee members are aware of their responsibility in this area and that the Club responds to any indication of poor practice or abuse in line with RFU/W Policy
- d) Implement a policy of Best Practice for all adults working with young people
- e) Ensure that all relevant members who have regular supervisory contact with children or a management responsibility for those working with young people undertake an Enhanced Criminal Records Bureau disclosure; and
- f) Identify a disciplinary panel which, where necessary, is able to manage cases of poor practice as identified by the RFU Child Protection Officer

2. Prohibited practices

2.1 MFC MJ&C Coaches, managers or volunteers including all professional staff must never:

- a) Take young people to their own home or any other place where they will be alone with them

- b) Spend any amount of time alone with young people away from others
- c) Take young people alone on car journeys, however short
- d) If it should arise that such situations are unavoidable they should only take place with the full knowledge and consent of someone in charge in the Club/governing body and/or a person with parental responsibility for the young person. In exceptional circumstances where a coach, manager or volunteer cannot obtain the consent of the someone in charge in the Club/governing body and/or person with parental responsibility for the young person then if it is in the welfare interest of the young person, paragraphs 2.1(a) and 2.1(c) do not have to be followed. If this occurs the adult must record the occurrence with the Club/governing body welfare officer.
- e) Engage in rough, physical games, sexually provocative games or horseplay with children/young people
- f) Take part as a player in any dynamic contact games or training sessions with young people. If there is a need for an adult to facilitate learning within a coaching session through the use of coaching aids e.g. contact pads, this should be done with the utmost care and with due regard to the safety of the young players
- g) Share a room with a young person unless the individual is the parent/guardian of that young person
- h) Engage in any form of inappropriate sexual contact and/or behaviour;
- i) Allow any form of inappropriate touching (see Guidance Document, Appendix 4)
- j) Make sexually suggestive remarks to a young person even in fun
- k) Use inappropriate language or allow young people to use inappropriate language unchallenged
- l) Allow allegations by a young person to go unchallenged, unrecorded or not acted upon m) Do things of a personal nature for a young person that they can do for themselves unless you have been requested to do so by the parents/carer (please note that it is recognised that some young people will always need help with things such as lace tying, adjustment of Tag belts, fitting head guards and it is also recognised that this does not preclude anyone attending to an injured/ill young person or rendering first aid)
- m) Depart the rugby Club or agreed rendezvous point until the safe dispersal of all young people is complete
- n) Cause an individual to lose self-esteem by embarrassing, humiliating or undermining the individual
- o) Treat some young people more favorably than others or
- p) Agree to meet a young person on their own on a one to one basis.

3 Positions of Trust

3.1 All adults who work with young people are in a position of trust, which has been invested in them by the parents, the sport and the young person. This relationship can be described as one in which the adult is in a position of power and influence by virtue of their position. Sexual intercourse or touching by an adult with a child under the age of 16 years is unlawful, even where there is apparent consent from the child.

A consensual sexual relationship between an adult in a position of trust within the rugby setting and a child over 16 years of age is contrary to the Policy and Procedures for the Welfare of Young People in the Sport of Rugby Union.

3.2 Adults must not encourage a physical or emotionally dependant relationship to develop between the person in a position of trust and the young person in their care.

3.3 All those within the organisation have a duty to raise concerns about the behaviour of coaches, officials, volunteers, administrators and professional staff which may be harmful to the children, young people in their care, without prejudice to their own position.

4 DBS Disclosures

4.1 All adults who have 'regular supervisory contact with young people' must undertake DBS disclosure within eight weeks of their appointment to a position that involves regular supervisory contact with young people.

These adults will include;

- Professional Staff
- All coaches/assistant coaches/club administrators
- Heads of Mini/Midi Rugby sections
- Heads of Youth Rugby Sections
- Team Managers
- All Referees who regularly officiate mini/midi and youth games
- Welfare Officers
- Physiotherapists

4.2. DBS disclosures must be conducted through the RFU Child Protection Department who have jurisdiction to deal with any matter arising from any such disclosure.

5 The 4 Main Types of Abuse

5.1. Emotional abuse

This occurs when individuals persistently fail to show young people due care with regard to their emotional welfare, when a young person may be constantly shouted at, threatened or taunted, or be subjected to sarcasm and unrealistic pressures. There may also be over-protection, preventing young people from socialising, or bullying to perform to high expectations. The young person may lose self-confidence and may become withdrawn and nervous. In a rugby situation, emotional abuse may occur when coaches, volunteers or parents:

- Provide repeated negative feedback.
- Repeatedly ignore a young player's efforts to progress.
- Repeatedly demand performance levels above the young player's capability.
- Over-emphasise the winning ethic.

5.2. Abuse by neglect

This occurs when a young person's essential needs for food, warmth and care both physical and emotional are not met. In a rugby situation neglect may occur when a:

- Young players are left alone without proper supervision.
- Young player is exposed to unnecessary heat or cold.
- Young player is not provided with necessary fluids for re-hydration.
- Young player is exposed to an unacceptable risk of injury.

5.3. Physical abuse

This occurs when individuals including other young people, deliberately inflict injuries on a child or young person, or knowingly do not prevent such injuries. It includes injuries caused by hitting, shaking, squeezing, biting or using excessive force. It also occurs when young people are given alcohol, or inappropriate drugs, or there is a failure to supervise their access to these substances. In a rugby situation physical abuse may also occur when:

- Young players are exposed to exercise/training that disregards the capacity of the player's immature and growing body.
- Young players are exposed to over-playing, over-training or fatigue.
- Any person exposes young players to alcohol and gives them the opportunity to drink alcohol below the legal age or fail to supervise access to alcohol.
- Young players are provided with or encouraged to take prohibited substances including performance-enhancing drugs.

5.4. Sexual abuse

Girls or boys can be abused by adults (both male and female) or other young people. This may include encouraging or forcing a child or young person to take part in sexual activity. In a rugby situation sexual abuse may occur when:

- An adult uses the context of a training session to touch young people in an inappropriate sexual way.
- Coaches, managers or volunteers use their position of power and authority to coerce young players into a sexual relationship.
- Coaches or managers imply better progression of the player in return for sexual favours.

6. Bullying

Bullying is not always easy to define and will not always be an adult abusing a young person. It is often the case that the bully is a young person. There are three main types of bullying: physical, verbal and emotional. In a rugby situation bullying may occur when:

- A coach adopts a win-at-all-costs philosophy.
- A player intimidates others.
- An official is over officious.

MFC MJ&C have in place an Anti-bullying Policy (see Appendix 6) to which all players, coaches and parents must subscribe

7. Poor Practice

Poor practice includes any behaviour that contravenes any of the following:

- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Fair Play Codes
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Coaches Code of Ethics
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Equity Policy
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Good Practice in the Rugby Setting
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Policy and Procedures for the Welfare of Young People in Rugby Union
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Anti-bullying Policy
- MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Tour/Children and Young People Away from Home Policy (this includes clubs, CBs and National Representative squads) Available on the RFU website: www.rfu.com

8 Procedures to Manage Allegations

8.1 Procedures

As a volunteer coach, parent or member of MFC MJ&C the following guidelines should be followed where there is a concern relating to the welfare of a young person:

- If the young person is in immediate danger or has been physically injured, ensure they are safe and contact police or social services.
- If the young person is not in immediate danger but you have concerns either:
 - Discuss the concerns with the club welfare officer or club official who will advise on the correct procedure for referring your concern appropriately. or
 - Contact the RFU Child Protection Helpline 0208 831 6655.

- Make a note of what you have seen or heard but do not delay in passing on the information. Complete an RFU Incident Record Form as soon as possible a copy of which can be found here: [Initial Issue Concern/Reporting Form](#)

Please remember it is not the responsibility of those working in the sport of rugby union to decide that abuse is occurring but it is their responsibility to act on any concern.

8.2 Responding to Suspicions

If you become aware of anything that causes you to feel uncomfortable you should talk to the Club Safeguarding Officer (Jenny Johnson 07762 914580). This means being aware of the attitudes of staff, coaches and volunteers and of the interactions between them and the children and with each other. If the behaviour is contrary to MFC MJ&C or RFU/RFUW Welfare Policy and Procedures and young people are at risk then action must be taken. Adults must also be alert to any unusual incidents or activities that take place where staff, coaches or volunteers are putting young people and themselves in a vulnerable position. In all cases of reported poor practice/abuse the following principles should be adopted:

DO

- **Stay calm** – do not rush into inappropriate action. React calmly in order not to alarm the young person.
- **Reassure the child** – that they are not to blame and confirm that you know how difficult it must be to confide.
- **Listen sympathetically** – to what the child says and show that you take them seriously.
- **Keep questions to minimum** – the law is very strict and child abuse cases have been dismissed where the child has been led or words and ideas have been suggested. Only ask questions to clarify.
- **Ensure you clearly understand what the child has said** – in order that the information can be passed on to the appropriate agencies.
- **Consult** with the Club Welfare Officer or CB Welfare Manager ensuring that you communicate all the information accurately.
- **Maintain Confidentiality** – all incidents will be treated with an open mind and handled in a fair and equitable manner. Information will only be shared on a need to know basis. Confidentiality must be maintained until a case is proven.
- **Ensure the safety of the young person** – if urgent medical attention is required then call an ambulance, inform the doctors of the concerns and ensure they are aware that this is a child protection issue.

DON'T

- **Don't panic** – or allow your feelings to be evident.
- **Don't make promises you cannot keep** – explain that you will need to tell other people.
- **Don't make the child repeat the story unnecessarily.**
- **Don't delay.**
- **Don't speculate or make assumptions.**
- **Don't approach the alleged abuser.**
- **Don't take sole responsibility.**

8.3. Taking Appropriate Action

8.3.1. Concerns about poor practice and possible abuse within the rugby setting

This relates to anyone working with young people in a paid or voluntary capacity and includes volunteer coaches in clubs, club helpers, tutors on training camps and coaches. Allegations will often relate to **poor practice** where an adult's behaviour is inappropriate and is causing concern. Poor practice constitutes any behaviour which:

- Contravenes RFU Codes of Ethics and Codes of Good Practice in the Rugby Setting
- Infringes on an individual's rights.
- Is a failure to fulfill the highest standards of care.

Poor practice is unacceptable in the sport of rugby union and will be treated seriously. Appropriate action in line with MFC MJ&C Constitution and RFU/RFUW regulations will be taken.



You should make reference to section 8 of this document. You should also record the behaviour on the RFU Incident Record Form. Information passed to external agencies must be as helpful as possible. It will be necessary to make a detailed report at the time of disclosure. The report should contain the following detail:

- The young person's name, address and date of birth and any disability
- The nature of the allegation
- A description of any injuries/bruising
- Any observations about the behaviour/emotional state of the young person
- Times, locations, dates
- The young person's account in his or her own words of what has happened
- Actions that have been taken as a result of your concerns
- Whether the person writing the report is expressing their own concerns or those of a third party

Remember to:

- Sign and date it
- Keep a copy
- Keep a record of the name and designation of the Social Services member of staff or police officer to whom concerns were passed

Remember that you must not investigate yourself. You must:

- Make a full record of what has been said, heard or seen as soon as possible.
- Inform the Club Welfare Officer immediately.

The Club Welfare Officer will report the matter to the RFU Child Protection Officer and the CB Welfare Manager.

8.3.3. Action to take in the matter of Concerns about Poor Practice and Possible Abuse

Following guidance from MFC MJ&C Club Welfare Officer or RFU Child Protection Officer that the issue is Poor Practice then the Club Welfare Officer must:

- Forward a written report to the CB Welfare Manager and RFU Child Protection Officer.

Following a decision that the issue is to be investigated as Child Protection/Abuse then the Club Welfare Officer must:

- Refer the allegation to Police or Social Services. They will give advice concerning who should contact the child's parents/guardians.
- Inform the RFU Child Protection Officer, forwarding a written report utilising the Incident Referral Form (Appendix) who will take the report to the RFU Child Protection Referral Management Group.

Non-action is not an option. The welfare of the young person is paramount.


8.3.4. Action to take if you become aware through your own observations or through a third party of possible Abuse occurring in a setting other than rugby.

If this happens you should:

- Ensure the safety of the young person. If he/she requires immediate treatment, call an ambulance, inform doctors of concerns and ensure they are aware that this is a Child Protection issue.
- If a young person is taken to hospital Social Services must be informed immediately.

MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW procedures should then be followed. Specifically:

- Report concerns to Club Welfare Officer.
- Club Welfare Officer will seek advice from RFU Child Protection Officer, CB Welfare Manager, RFU Child Protection Helpline or NSPCC Helpline 0800 800 5000.
- If there is any delay in receiving advice contact must be made with Social Services.
- If a formal referral is made, make it clear to Social Services/Police that this is a Child Protection referral.
- All police forces have dedicated Child Abuse Investigation Teams (CAITs) that deal with allegations of abuse within the family setting and by people in positions of trust.
- If you believe that a child is in immediate danger or has come to physical harm, dial 999.
- Parents/carers should only be contacted following advice from Police or Social Services.

Non-action is not an option. The welfare of the young person is paramount to every other consideration. Delay in acting can increase the risk to the child.

8.3.5. General Advice

In all cases please always remember the following:

- It is often more difficult for some young people to disclose abuse than others. Previous experiences of prejudice may lead them to believe that those in authority do not really care about their well-being.
- Disabled young people may have to overcome additional barriers before feeling that they can disclose abuse. They may rely on the abuser for their daily care and not know of alternative sources of care.
- The abuse may be the only attention/affection they have experienced.
- There may be communication differences and they will almost certainly have to overcome prejudices that block our willingness to believe
- They may be abused or to use their medical condition to explain away indicators which in an able-bodied young person would concern us.

These groups of people need us to be extra vigilant and to give thought as to how we will respond

Information should be handled and disseminated on a need-to-know basis only, following advice from social services/police. This may include the following people:

- The Club Welfare Office
- The CB Welfare Manager
- Designated Officers within the RFU/RFUW
- Parents/carers of the young person alleged to have been abused

9. Recruitment of Staff, Coaches and Volunteers

It is of vital importance that all MFC MJ&C staff, coaches and volunteers are of the highest calibre and are safe to work with children and young people. Consequently it is crucial that stringent and reasonable steps are taken to prevent people from entering the sport of rugby union who may pose a threat to the safety and welfare of young people. The following recruitment principles will be followed:

Advertising

If any form of advertising is used to recruit staff, it should reflect:

- The responsibilities of the role.
- The level of experience or qualification required (e.g. working with children an advantage).
- The MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW stance on Child Protection.

Applications

- All adults who are in contact with young people, whether paid or voluntary will complete an application form. After a position has been offered the person must complete a DBS application form. Until the DBS Certificate has been received that person cannot work unsupervised.

Training

- Appropriate training will enable individuals to recognise their responsibilities with regard to their own good practice and the reporting of poor practice or concerns of possible abuse.

MFC MJ&C and the RFU/RFUW strongly recommend that:

- All adults who have regular contact with or have responsibility for young people complete the RFU Play it Safe course as soon as it practically possible.
- All Club Welfare Officers should attend the RFU INTOUCH Course as soon as is practically possible.
- All adults who have a coaching responsibility for young people attend an appropriate RFU Coaching Course and consider entering the Coach Licensing scheme.

- It is vital that all staff working with young people in the sport of rugby union are conversant with:
 - Maintain accurate records of themselves on Rugby First
 - Adopt Player-centric coaching techniques.
 - Know and apply best practice on how to work with young people safely and effectively.

Monitoring and appraisal

At regular intervals all professional staff will receive structured formal supervision. Volunteers should at least be given the opportunity to receive formal or informal feedback. In both instances this will enable managers and the member of staff to:

- Identify training needs.
- Set new goals.
- Highlight concerns about inappropriate behaviour.

10. Good Practice in the Rugby Setting

It is the aim of MFC MJ&C and the RFU/RFUW is that all young people enjoy the game in a safe enjoyable setting. The following section sets out Good Practice Procedures that all those involved in the delivery of the game of rugby union to young people should adhere to.

10.1. Codes of Good Conduct for Coaches and Officials

Codes of Conduct will ensure that all children and young people and the individuals who work with them will enjoy the game in a safe environment. When working with young people coaches and officials must adopt the following guidance:

- They must always be publicly open when working with young people. They must avoid situations where the adult and an individual child are alone and/or unobserved, e.g. individual skill session after a team training session. They must work in pairs and never alone with a group or individual.
- Rugby is a physical game. Situations will occur when, in order to teach or coach certain techniques, it is necessary to make contact with the player. However the following must apply:
 - Parents and young players must be made aware of situations in which this may happen when they join the club.
 - Physical handling must only be used for safety reasons or where there is no other way of coaching the technique and always with the permission of the child/young person and their parent/carer.

- Any contact or touching that is inappropriate (not directly related to the coaching context) or is aggressive is poor practice and is unacceptable.
- If groups are to be supervised in changing rooms, always ensure that individuals work in pairs, and that gender is appropriate. Children/young people must not change at the same time or in the same place as adults.
- Where mixed teams compete away from home at least one male and one female adult must always accompany them.
- Volunteers and professionals must respect the rights, dignity and worth of all and treat everyone with equality.
- Coaches must place the well-being and safety of the player above the development of performance. This means that coaches must adhere to the following guidelines:
 - Avoid overplaying of players (particularly talented players). All players need and deserve equal opportunity to play and to rest.
 - Remember that children/young people play for fun and enjoyment and that winning is only a part of it.
 - Motivate youngsters through positive feedback and constructive criticism.
 - Ensure that contact skills are taught in a safe, secure manner paying due regard to the physical development of young players.
 - Never allow young players to train/play when injured. If unsure, err on the side of caution.
 - Ensure equipment and facilities are safe and appropriate to the age and ability of the players.
- At least one coach per age group must hold a current RFU coaching award or a recognised award. All other coaches should hold a current RFU coaching award or be working towards one.
- Coaches must keep up-to-date with knowledge and technical skills and should be aware of their own limitations. Coaches must only work within the limitations of their knowledge and qualifications.
- Coaches must ensure that the activities that they direct or advocate are appropriate to the age, maturity and ability of the players.
- Coaches, managers, volunteers and parents must always promote the positive aspects of their sport (e.g. fair play), and never condone law violations or use of prohibited substances.
- Coaches and team managers must consistently display high standards of personal behaviour and appearance.
- Coaches, volunteers and parents must never overtly criticise players or use language or actions that may cause the player to lose self-esteem or confidence.
- Young people must not be allowed to drink alcohol or encouraged to drink alcohol if they are under the legal age to do so.

APPENDIX 1: MFC MJ&C Procedures to Manage Case of Poor Practice

Poor practice is defined as any behaviour that contravenes MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Codes of Conduct (Fair Play Codes) or MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Guidance for Good Practice.

- Once an incident is reported to the Club Welfare Officer he/she should consult with the RFU Child Protection Officer in order to ascertain whether the allegation is to be investigated/dealt with as poor practice, bullying or abuse.
- Once the incident has been identified by the RFU as poor practice and in consultation with senior club officials (Club Chairman/Youth Chairman) a decision will be made whether or not to suspend, temporarily, the person accused. Each case will be considered on its merit.
- A disciplinary hearing may be called. The panel should be made up of three MJ&C Officers with regard to the following criteria:
 - No person who has been involved in bringing the case to the disciplinary hearing should sit on the panel.
 - Senior management of the club must be represented.
 - As the case relates to poor coaching practice, experience in this field must be represented.
 - The CB Welfare Manager can be invited.
 - In agreement with the MFC MJ&C Committee the MFC MJ&C Chairman may invite others to sit on the panel as they see fit
- The accused will be advised of receipt of the report and provided with both copies of the reports and all witness statements.
- The accused will be invited to attend any disciplinary hearing.
- The accused must be given sufficient advance notice of the disciplinary hearing.
- The accused must be given the opportunity to offer his/her side of the events and call witnesses.
- Once the disciplinary panel reaches a decision it should be communicated to the accused and confirmed in writing and to the parents of a young person.
- A copy of the finding must be sent to the CB Welfare Manager and RFU Child Protection Officer.

APPENDIX 2: Terms of Reference for MFC MJ&C Child Protection, Safeguarding and Welfare Officer

- Ensure the club has a Child Protection Policy and self-monitoring strategy.
- Ensure Codes of Conduct are well publicised and adhered to.
- In consultation with the club Child Safeguarding Officer (Jenny Johnson) ensure all reported incidents are managed at the appropriate level in line with MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW procedures.
- Ensure all relevant club members are aware of Child Safeguarding training opportunities.
- Ensure all parents, children and young people are aware of the club policy on Child Protection/Welfare and the correct procedures and channels for voicing concerns.
- Ensure that all adults who have regular contact with young people undertake DBS disclosure.
- Be aware of local Social Services and Local Safeguarding Children's Board (Tel. 0161 474 5657/8/9).
- Sit on relevant club committees.
- Support MFC MJ&C to produce, maintain and enact an effective Child Protection Policy.
- In consultation with RFU Child Protection Officer advise on the management of all reported cases (in line with MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW procedures) and ensure that all cases are reported to RFU/RFUW.
- In consultation with RFU Child Protection Officer plan the implementation of DBS disclosure within the MFC.
- Monitor the effectiveness of club's Child Protection Policies.
- Establish contact with Social Services and local Safeguarding Children's Boards.
- Have a formal role on relevant committees within the MFC.
- Monitor the implementation and effectiveness of training plans within MFC.

APPENDIX 3: MFC MJ&C Coaches Code of Ethics

- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches must respect the rights, dignity and worth of every child and young person with whom they work and treat them equally.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches must place the physical and emotional wellbeing of all young players above all other considerations, including the development of performance.
- The relationship that a MFC MJ&C rugby coach develops with the players with whom they work must be based on mutual trust and respect.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches must ensure that all activities undertaken are appropriate to the age, maturity, experience and ability of the players.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches will encourage young players to accept responsibility for their own behaviour and performance.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches should clarify with the young players (and their parents/carers) what is expected of them both on and off the rugby field and also what they are entitled to expect from the MFC MJ&C coach.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches should work in partnership with other MFC MJ&C rugby coaches and others within the game (officials, doctors, and physiotherapists, sports scientists) to ensure the wellbeing, safety and enjoyment of all young players.
- All MFC MJ&C rugby coaches must promote the positive aspects of the sport e.g. Fair Play. Violations of the Laws of the Game. Behaviour contrary to the spirit of the Laws of the Game or relevant regulations or the use of prohibited techniques or substances must never be condoned.

APPENDIX 4: Physical Contact with Young People in Rugby Union – MFC MJ&C GUIDANCE

There are a number of principles that should be followed within the sport of rugby union when the activity involves physical contact. Physical contact in rugby should always be intended to meet the child's needs, NOT the adult's. The adult should only use physical contact if their aim is to:

- Develop sports skills or techniques.
- To treat an injury.
- To prevent an injury or accident from occurring.
- To meet the requirements of the game.

The adult should seek to explain the nature and reason for the physical contact to the child reinforcing the teaching or coaching skill. Unless the situation is an emergency, the adult should ask the child for permission. It is good practice for Rugby Clubs, as part of an induction process or pack for new members, to explain to parents/carers and their child or give written guidance about any physical contact that will be required as part of that activity.

Young people should be encouraged to voice concerns they have if any physical contact makes them feel uncomfortable or threatened. Contact should not involve touching genital areas, buttocks, breasts or any other part of the body that might cause a child distress or embarrassment. Physical contact should always take place in an open or public environment and not take place in secret or out of sight of others.

Specific situations

1. Physical punishment

Any form of physical punishment of children is unlawful by coaches, volunteers and professionals, as is any form of physical response to misbehaviour unless it is by way of restraint. It is particularly important that adults understand this both to protect their own position and the overall reputation of the organisation in which they are involved.

2. Contact as part of coaching

There are specific circumstances within the sport of rugby union that will require coaches or teachers to come into physical contact with children and young people from time to time in the course of their duties. Examples will include activities where safe practice is critical, e.g. the introduction/development of scrummaging. Adults should be aware of the limits within which such contact should properly take place, and of the possibility of such contact being misinterpreted. It should be recognised that physical contact between an adult and a child that may occur during legitimate teaching or coaching may be misconstrued or misunderstood by a pupil, parent or observer. Touching young participants, including well intentioned informal and formal gestures such as putting a hand on the shoulder or arm, can, if repeated regularly, lead to the possibility of questions being raised.

As a general principle adults in positions of responsibility should not make gratuitous or unnecessary physical contact with children and young people. It is particularly unwise to attribute frequent touching to their teaching or coaching style or as a way of relating to young participants.

3. Responding to distress and success

There may be occasions where a distressed young person needs comfort and reassurance which may include physical comforting such as a caring parent would give. Physical contact may also be required to prevent an accident or injury and this would be wholly appropriate. A young person or coach may also want to mark a success or achievement with a hug or other gesture. Adults should use their discretion in such cases to ensure that what is (and what is seen by others present) normal and natural does not become unnecessary and unjustified contact, particularly with the same young person over a period of time. It should also be considered that what, to an adult may seem to be appropriate, may not be shared by a young person.

4. Sports science and medicine

There may be some roles within Rugby Union where physical contact is and/or a requirement of the role, particularly sports science or medicine. These tasks should only be undertaken by properly trained or qualified practitioners. This guidance does not seek to replace the specific guidance and codes of practice developed for those professionals and reference should be made to the appropriate body for that discipline.

APPENDIX 5: MFC MJ&C Good Practice Guidance for Match Officials

When refereeing young players, match **Officials Must:**

- Recognise the importance of fun and enjoyment when officiating young players.
- Provide verbal feedback in a positive way during games.
- Appreciate the needs of the players.
- Be a positive role model.
- Recognise that safety is paramount.
- Explain decisions – most young players are still learning.
- Never tolerate verbal abuse.

When refereeing young players, match **Officials Must Not:**

- Change in the same area as young players.
- Shower with young players - agree a timetable with the coaches.
- Be alone with young players at any time – if a young player comes into the dressing room ensure another adult is present.
- Check studs without the coach being present.
- Administer first aid.
- Allow a young player to continue playing if there are doubts about their fitness.
- Tolerate bad language from young players.
- Engage in any inappropriate contact with young players.
- Give a lift to a player unless there are other young people or adults in the car and the parents are aware of the arrangement.
- Take a young player to his or her own home.
- Overtly criticise young players or use language that may cause the player to lose confidence or self-esteem.
- Make sexually explicit remarks to young players.

When refereeing young players, match **Officials Must Always:**

- Report, in writing, to the Club Safeguarding Officer or CB Welfare Manager and/or Society Secretary, behaviour by adults that you feel contravenes MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Child Protection Policy. This includes:
 - Verbal bullying by coaches/parents/spectators.
 - Physical Abuse by coaches/parents/spectators.
 - Inappropriate or aggressive contact by an adult to a young person.
 - Verbal abuse directed at the official by young people or adults.
 - Pitch invasions (recommended barriers are maintained by MFC MJ&C and should be policed during and after games)

REMEMBER: The welfare of all young people is paramount.

APPENDIX 6: MFC MJ&C Anti-Bullying Statement and Policy

Principles

Bullying of any kind is not acceptable within MFC MJ&C or any Constituent Body providing playing opportunities for children and young people. MFC MJ&C and the RFU/RFUW are a 'telling' culture and anyone who knows that bullying is happening is expected to tell their Club Welfare Officer or Constituent Body Welfare Manager.

Bullying will be taken seriously, responded to promptly, and procedures followed to deal with the situation. It is the responsibility of every MFC MJ&C adult and other engaging in rugby union whether professional or volunteer, to ensure that all young people can enjoy the sport in a safe enjoyable environment.

What is bullying?

Bullying is the use of aggression with the intention of hurting another person. Bullying results in pain and distress to the victim. Bullying can be:

- Emotional - being unfriendly, excluding (emotionally and physically), and tormenting (e.g. hiding rugby kit, threatening gestures including sending threatening texts messages).
- Physical - pushing, kicking, hitting, punching or any use of violence.
- Racist - racial taunts, graffiti, gestures.
- Sexual - unwanted physical contact or sexually abusive comments.
- Homophobic - because of, or focusing on the issue of sexuality.
- Verbal - name-calling, sarcasm, spreading rumors, teasing.

Objectives of this Policy

- All Club members, coaches, volunteers and parents should have an understanding of what bullying is.
- All Club members, coaches and volunteers should know what the MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW/Club/Constituent Body policy is on bullying, and follow it when bullying is reported.
- All players and parents should know what the MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW/Club/Constituent Body policy is on bullying, and what they should do if bullying arises.

- All Players and parents should be assured that they will be supported when bullying is reported.
- Bullying will not be tolerated.

Signs and symptoms

A child may indicate by signs or behaviour that he or she is being bullied. Children and Young People have described bullying as:

- Being called names.
- Being teased.
- Being hit, pushed, pulled, pinched, or kicked.
- Having their bag, mobile or other possessions taken.
- Receiving abusive text messages.
- Being forced to hand over money.
- Being forced to do things they do not want to do.
- Being ignored or left out.
- Being attacked because of religion, gender, sexuality, disability, appearance or ethnic or racial origin.

Other signs and symptoms

A child or young person:

- Doesn't want to attend training or club activities.
- Changes their usual routine.
- Begins being disruptive during sessions.
- Becomes withdrawn anxious, or lacking in confidence.
- Has possessions going missing.
- Becomes aggressive, disruptive or unreasonable.
- Starts stammering.
- Has unexplained cuts or bruises.
- Is bullying other children.
- Stops eating.
- Is frightened to say what's wrong.

These signs and behaviours may not constitute bullying and may be symptoms of other problems. MFC MJ&C and Constituent Body (CB) members, coaches and volunteers need to be aware of these possible signs and report any concerns to the Club Welfare Officer or CB Welfare Manager.

MFC MJ&C Procedures in the Management of Bullying

- Report bullying incidents to the Club Welfare Officer (or CB Manager), record (using the RFU Incident Record Form). If the incident is an adult bullying a young person, the Club Welfare Officer (or CB Manager) will report the incident to the RFU Child Protection Officer. If the incident is a young person bullying a young person, the club/ county will manage this, and can access advice and support from the Club Welfare Officer, CB Welfare Manager or RFU Child Protection Officer at any stage of the process.
- Parents may be informed and asked to come to a meeting to discuss the problem.
- If necessary and appropriate, police will be consulted.
- If mediation fails and the bullying is seen to continue MFC MJ&C Club/CB/RFU can initiate disciplinary action under the relevant constitution.

Implementing RFU Anti-Bullying Policy Phase 1: Raise Awareness

- Raise awareness with all members and players within the Club:
- Maintain a poster on the club notice board with picture, contact details and duties of Club Safeguarding Officer.
- Ensure all young players know they can talk to someone if they are worried.
- Ensure that parents have a copy of the policy (on paper behind the bar and posted on club website).
- Adopt the policy within the club constitution.
- Ensure that the Code of Conduct clearly states that behaviour that constitutes bullying will not be accepted.
- Ensure all coaches, staff and volunteers have signed up the Code of Conduct.
- Ensure the policy is given to members and players.
- Set up a working party to support the ongoing development and implementation of the policy.
- Identify any training needs within the club and contact the RFU to find out about workshops and opportunities for support.

APPENDIX 9: MFC MJ&C Policy Regarding Photographic Images (including those taken by Mobile Telephones)

APPENDIX 9 A: MFC MJ&C and RFU/RFUW Best Practice Guidelines

MFC MJ&C and the Rugby Football Union and the Rugby Football Union for Women recognises that publicity and pictures of young people enjoying rugby are essential to promote the sport and a healthy lifestyle. To facilitate this it is therefore essential that the following principles and rules should be observed.

These Best Practice Guidelines have been developed to provide clubs schools and Constituent Bodies with advice and guidance on the use of images of young people. It is recommended that this is adopted by clubs and Constituent Bodies and the Eight Golden Rules outlined in these guidelines below are made available to as many people as possible.

Any change to these guidelines will be notified via the MFC MJ&C notice boards, emails and website. Please remember that the safety and enjoyment of young people is paramount in all your activities and the Best Practice Guidelines has been designed to help you in this. MFC MJ&C and the RFU/RFUW are committed to providing a safe and enjoyable environment for young people. Implicit in this is the commitment to ensure that all publications, resources and media represent participants appropriately and with due respect. By adopting the points outlined in these guidelines you will be putting in place the best possible practice to protect young people wherever photographs or recorded images are taken and stored.

The 8 Golden Rules that will ensure compliance with the policy on photographic images are as follows:

1. Ensure parents/guardian/young person have granted their consent for the taking and publication of photographic images and have signed and returned the Parent/Guardian and Young Person Permission Form. It is strongly recommended that the relevant form (Example Attached) is incorporated into the annual club registration form and will therefore only need to be completed once a year.
2. All young people must be appropriately dressed for the activity taking place.
3. Photography or recording should focus on the activity rather than a particular young person and personal details, which might make a young person vulnerable, such as their exact address, must never be revealed.
4. Where an individual has achieved success in the game (e.g. when selected for representative side or showing triumph over adversity) permission must be gained from parent/guardian and young person to use photographs/recordings and relevant details.

5. Where possible, to reflect MFC MJ&C and the RFU/RFUW Equity Policy photographs/recordings should represent the diverse range of young people participating in rugby.
6. Anyone taking photographs or recording at any rugby event must have a valid reason for doing so and seek the permission of the organisers/persons in charge.
7. They should make themselves known to the event organisers/persons in charge and be able to identify themselves if requested during the course of the event.
8. All concerns regarding inappropriate or intrusive photography should be reported in confidence to the RFU Child Protection.

APPENDIX 9 B: MFC MJ&C Policy Statement Relating to the use of Video / Photographic Images

MFC MJ&C recognises the need to ensure the welfare and safety of all young people in Rugby Union. As part of our commitment to ensure the safety of young people we will not permit photographs, video or other images including those taken via mobile phones of young people to be taken or used without the consent of the parents/carers and the young person.

MFC MJ&C will follow the RFU/RFUW guidance for the use of images of young people.

MFC MJ&C will take all steps to ensure these images are used solely for the purposes they are intended which is the promotion and celebration of the activities of MFC MJ&C

If you become aware that these images are being used inappropriately you should inform Officers of MFC MJ&C. Images may be published on the website <http://www.manchester-rugbyyouth.com> for the purposes of celebrating success or promoting the activities of MFC MJ&C.

If at any time either the parent/carer or the young person wishes the images to be removed from the website, the club welfare officer should be informed and the request actioned.

APPENDIX 10: MFC MJ&C Policy and Strategy for Dealing with Media Enquiries

1. Why do MFC MJ&C need a media strategy?

Child abuse is an issue that will quite correctly generate media interest. The RFU/RFUW has developed a comprehensive training and certification programme for those working with young people in rugby. It is, however, imperative that each club/school has an effective strategy for dealing with media enquiries. The RFU/RFUW now has a regional media team who can help you deal with media enquiries. However, it is important that you handle initial enquiries in a way that will not aggravate the situation or generate negative publicity. It is also important to be aware of legislation that prevents the naming of children and young people in the media.

The RFU/RFUW is committed to investigating all allegations, but the potential damage the publication of false allegations can do to an individual or club should not be underestimated.

2. Be prepared

- If you know of an allegation of child abuse it is important to be prepared in advance for potential publicity:
- Contact the relevant RFU/RFUW Regional Press Officer (RPO) for your area or the Regional Media Manager and give them all the facts.
- Don't hide anything or pretend the situation is not as serious as it is or might become. The press can put a large headline on even the smallest story and it is important that the RPO is aware of all the details.

3. What to do when approached or contacted by a journalist?

- A journalist may hear of an alleged case of abuse, from a source, or directly from a relative or acquaintance, of the alleged victim.
- They are likely to approach the Constituent Body/club/school or coach/official and ask for their response. It is worth remembering that the journalist may already have the story mapped out in their own mind so what you say, and how you say it, is important.
- Make sure you clearly hear the name of the journalist and the media they are working for. If necessary, ask them to repeat it and write it down.
- Make sure you fully understand what the journalist is asking you. Ask them to repeat a question if necessary. You may be aware
- of the incident concerned but not always.
- Do not say 'No comment'. It makes you sound guarded and as if you have something to hide.

- Take a contact phone number where they can be easily contacted and find out when their deadline is.
- Contact the Regional Press Officer for your area and discuss the matter.
- The RPO will contact the RFU Child Protection Officer, to formulate an appropriate response.
- The RPO will then respond to the journalist and inform you of that response.

4. The follow-up

Allegations of child abuse are rarely one-day stories so be prepared for more phone calls and media enquiries. Just because one response has been given does not mean that the media will not have more questions in the future. Follow the same procedure as before and contact your Regional Press Officer.

5. Going 'off the record'

Journalists like nothing better than going 'off the record'. They use this tool to get more information but with the undertaking that they will not publish what you say. Do not speak off the record in any situation involving child protection issues.


