

Aylesbury Vale Dynamos

Club History

Aylesbury Vale Dynamos is an amalgamation of Aylesbury FC and Bedgrove Dynamos, two local clubs with a rich history in local football. Aylesbury FC enjoyed a long history in senior and junior football dating back to the 1930's under the previous names of Aylesbury Vale, Haywood United, Belgrave, Stocklake and Negretti and Zambra FC, which was founded in the 1930's by workers at the Negretti and Zambra company then based in London's King Cross district. The company moved to the Stocklake Industrial Estate, Aylesbury.

in 1949 and by the mid 50's the premises had a bar, football, cricket and tennis facilities. The football club joined the Aylesbury District League in 1954. The social club changed its name to Stocklake when Negretti and Zambra sold the premises to the local council, who then leased the facilities; hence the different sections adopted the name Stocklake. Under the guidance of Chairman Mr Ernie Crotty, the club gained many honours including runners up in ADL's top divisions, before gaining intermediate status in the Wycombe and District League first and senior divisions. Sadly Ernie was killed in a road accident just before the club moved premises to the present location at Haywood Way in 1987.

After gaining senior status and promotion to the Chiltern League in 1988, Stocklake enjoyed many further successes including Division One runners up in 1991, Premier Division and League Cup runners up the following season and Wycombe Senior Cup success in 1995. Cup success was also followed on in the following season, this time the Berks and Bucks Intermediate Cup being added to the trophy cabinet. Belgrave FC was formed in 1983 by Jim Sullivan who lived in nearby Belgrave Road. Jim had two sons who were passionate about football but were limited to where they could play, so formed a team himself with the help of neighbours Lynne and David Hatcher. By 1990, under the guidance of Danny Martone, Belgrave had grown to five youth teams providing football for over ninety boys from the Quarrendon and Haydon Hill areas of Aylesbury. 1996 saw the forming of two senior teams under the Belgrave FC name and by the turn of the millennium teams were represented at all levels from Under 8's through to seniors,

At the start of the 2000/2001 season, the senior Belgrave FC team was renamed Haywood United following an amalgamation with Stocklake FC with Danny Martone voted in as chairman of the new club. Haywood United joined the Spartan South Midlands League and won promotion into Division One after two seasons. Notable achievements during the 2001/2002 season included league awards for the best kept and most improved ground; this included the erection of floodlights and perimeter fencing, which Danny and his hard working committee fought hard to establish. Season 2002/2003 saw a difficult start in Division One, but with the arrival of manager Jon Franklin and his assistant Keith Walker just after Christmas, the club eventually consolidated finishing in 9th place. Promotion was gained to the South Midlands Premier Division the following year after a campaign that saw 23 wins, 7 draws and only 4 losses.



Haywood United proved themselves capable of staying in the Premier Division after finishing 3rd in the 2004/2005 season in a campaign that only include one loss in the twenty matches after Christmas. The club also entered the FA Cup and Vase for the first time and won the Buckingham Charity Cup in 2006.

Season 2006/2007 began with Haywood United becoming Aylesbury Vale FC and saw Keith Walker and Steve Gleinster take over as joint managers and steadily build a squad. This was recognised in the 2008/2009 season, under the management of Mark Eaton, with a good cup run in the FA Cup and FA Vase, winning three rounds in the FA Cup losing to Level 4 side Gosport after a replay, and losing out in the 4th round of the FA Vase to Leiston Town. After Christmas the side suffered due to long term injuries and finished mid table. May 2009 saw a major new development in a new semi professional side vote for a name change. Aylesbury Football Club was formed under the leadership of Chairman Roger Dance and assisted by Vice Chairman Danny Martone

Former Chairman Bill Harrison was made President of the club. Great success on the field of play was to follow, with the team having a fantastic run in the F.A. Cup. We were the last 'level five' team in the country to remain in the competition and were rewarded with a visit to Haywood Way for the F.A. Cup trophy, allowing the team, supporters and local people to get their hands on this famous trophy and make the most of this memorable occasion. We were finally knocked out of the competition by Wealdstone in a close game. A brave and superb display was witnessed by a bumper crowd of 800 plus.

Meanwhile, away from the midst of F.A. Cup drama, our success continued, becoming 'Double Winners' Winning both the Spartan South Midland League and League Cup capping an extraordinary season and gaining promotion to the Southern League Division 1 Central. Steve Bateman took over in 2013/14, steered the club to safety in his first 6 months in charge. Then in 2014/15 with Bateman at the helm FC has their most successful season to date most successful to date. Playing at the highest level in the club's history, the team finished third in the League, having been pushing for promotion all season and narrowly lost out in the semi final to Bedworth United having already beaten them twice in the league. the 2015/16 finished with a flourish as the club finished just outside the play off positions, but had the consolation of our first major Cup Final, beating Chesham United in the Berks & Bucks Cup at Windsor. Steve Bateman and his management team resigned at the end of the



season and Danny Gordon & Gareth Risbridger took the helm, supported by Paul Bonham, Ryan Wiffin & Aaron Norman. Davis Haule took over from Gordon & Risbridger in December 2016, appointed brother Brian as his assistant and recruited former coaches Fraser McLachlan, Aaron Wiffin and added Ryan Collings to his back room staff for the 2017/18 season.

In 2018/19 Scott Reynolds was appointed manager and when he resigned midway through the season it was left to Paul Bonham to take control but because of ground grading issues the Southern League made the decision to relegate the club and so after ten seasons in the Southern League. Phil Granville and Ben Gill were appointed midway through last season and will kick off the 2020/21 season again in the Spartan Premier Division

Bedgrove Dynamos

Alf Buckland, a resident of Finmere Crescent, formed Bedgrove Dynamos in 1968. It was created to fill a void in activities for boys within the Bedgrove area on the south side of Aylesbury. In 1980, Dave Bayliss became involved when he brought his Cub side to the Bedgrove Park. The teams amalgamated and Dave went on to be the chairman for 21 years, stepping down in the year 2000. Within two years and barely a full strip between them, they managed not only to win the Under 12's Aylesbury & District League (ADL), but went on to win the 13's & 14's league in consecutive years and, by which time, they now had four teams at various age groups.

Over the years the club has grown and has won many tournaments and trophies, especially at county level. Many teams have toured abroad and the club has also entertained boys from Europe and America. We can boost that we are the only boys club to have a club pennant on display in Barcelona's trophy room.

At the start of the season 2001/02 the club was the largest junior club in the Aylesbury area, running teams from under 8's through to under 18's. At the end of the season 2001/02 the club managed to win the coveted Berks and Bucks Cup at under 14's, the Mayor's Cup at under 12's, represented in two other cup finals, won 3 league titles, gained 6 promotions in total and all teams finished in the top 6 to the fairplay awards for their respective leagues. In the last 20 seasons across the age groups the club has won 25 divisional titles, and runners up 20 times.

In 2019 two became one when the sides amalgamated with the intention of allowing the youth of the town to progress through junior football to youth and then adult football and play at the highest possible level.

LEAGUE HISTORY

The League is relatively young compared to other's being formed in 1922 as the Bedfordshire County League. With new clubs keen to join from outside the County it was decided in 1929 to change the name to the South Midlands League. The League continued to consolidate and strengthen over the ensuing 70 years or so providing quality football for many teams over a large area of the South Midlands. In 1997 it became apparent that the London Spartan League, which was very much to the South of the League's geographical footprint, was strugglingadministratively and, with the full support of the Football Association, the decision was taken to merge the two competitions with the new League being known as the Spartan South Midlands League. The League now covers a wide area from North London in the South to Milton Keynes in the North and from Ware in the East to Aylesburyin the West.

The League is part of the FA's National League System (NLS) and comprises of three Divisions; Premier at Step 5 of the NLS, Division One at Step 6 and Division Two at Step 7.

The League has a proud record of promoting clubs to Step 4 of the NLS and has also provided 4 FA Vase Finalists including two winners in Arlesey Town and Hoddesdon Town FC.

The History of Leighton Town Football Club

Leighton Town, who were known as Leighton United between 1922 and 1963, were formed in 1885. They were mainly involved in local leagues until the outbreak of the Great War and were winners of the Leighton and District League on several occasions.

Leighton were one of the original members of the South Midland League in 1922 – which at the time was known as the Bedfordshire County League. They were also members of the Spartan League between 1922/23and 1951/52, but their only successes being the Spartan League Division 2 title in 1923/24and 1927/28. They were Bedfordshire Senior Cupwinners in 1926/27.

In 1952, they became a founder member of the Hellenic League, but after two disappointing seasons, moved to the South Midlands League. In 1965/66season however, the Premier Championshipsat in the Leighton Town Boardroom. The club then re-joined the Spartan League in 1967/68.

Leighton proceeded to consolidate their League success by winning the Bedfordshire Senior Cup for three successive seasons in 1968, 1969 and 1970. Unfortunately, some of the successful players moved on to other clubs, and Leighton's fortunes again declined. A move to the United Counties League proved disastrous and after just two seasons, the club re–joined the South Midlands League.

During the '70's and '80's, Leighton were unable to capture the success of the '60's.

In 1990/1991the First Team won the South Midlands League Challenge Trophy and the O'Brien's Premier Division Cup, both for the first time in the club's history.

The 1991/2 season was one of the club's best. The South Midlands Premier Division title, which had eluded the club for so long, was won, and with it a place in the Isthmian League.

1992/3saw the Club's success continue when they won the Bedfordshire Senior Cup for the first time since 1970. The Club missed out on promotion in their first

Isthmian League season by just a single point, but the Youth Team retained the County Cup.

1995/6saw the First Team win promotion to Division 2 of the Isthmian League, whilst at the same time retaining the Buckingham Charity Cup.

In the 1996/7season, Leighton won the Isthmian League Associated Members Trophy for the first time.

1998/99sawthe return of the Associated Members Trophy and the Buckingham Charity Cup.

Season 2003/04Leighton won the Ryman Isthmian Second Division title. They were also named Ryman Division Two Team of the Year, and Paul Burgess was awarded Manager of the Year. They also reached the Fifth round of the FA Vase, and the final of the Beds Senior Cup, before losing to Andover and Arlesey Town respectively.

The 2004–05season saw the club placed in The Southern League East Division and finished in a creditable tenth place. They also won the Buckinghamshire Charity Cup. The Reserves won the Bedfordshire Intermediate Cupand the U18's won the SCYFLLeague Shield.

The 2005–06 Season saw the Club progress again, improving on the year before, as they finished 8th in The Southern League Western Division. After a poor start, League results improved and the side only suffered four defeats from the start of November until the end of March, a play-off place just eluding them.

After three excellent victories interest in the FA. Trophycompetition ended with a single goal defeat to eventual semi-finalists, Borehamwood.

The Club also reached the Beds Senior Cup Final, but sadly they again finished as Runners Up.

The Club were relocated to the Southern League Midland Division for 06–07 season but only one League win in the first six games and early exits in the two FA Competitions cost Paul Burgess his job in September. He was replaced by former Wycombe professional Keith Scott, results did improve but it was a disappointing season, although Town did win the Bucks Senior Charity Cup.

The 2007–08started brightly with the first League defeat not coming until mid-October. Three wins in the FA Cup saw the Club reach the 4th Qualifying Round for the first time in it's history. A 3–0defeat to Conference South, Havant and Waterlooville finally ended the run. Keith Scott then left in December to join Windsor and Eton. In January 2008, Assistant Manager Sean Downey was appointed as First Team Manager and did a splendid job as the Club ended their League season in 9th place, winning the Bucks Charity Cup and reaching the final of the Beds Senior Cup once more.

The 2008/09 Season the First Team finished 8th in the Southern League, Midland Division, achieving their highest points total to date at that level.

The 2009/10season saw Leighton once again finish in the top half of the table, when they finished in 9th place and they also lost the Bedfordshire Senior Cup Final to Southern League rivals, Arlesey Town after penalties.

Season 2010/2011,sawTown finish in 7th place in the League, gaining 69 points, their best performance since joining the Southern Football League.

The 2011/2012a poor season saw Leighton finish in their lowest position for several years.

2012/13was also very disappointing for the First Team as they finished in 20th place.

2015/2016After 3 disappointing seasons Leighton finished the season in the bottom two of the Southern League Central Division and were relegated to the Spartan South Midlands League where they had last played in the 1991/92 season.

2016/2017 This was a disappointing season with the club struggling for much of the time after yet another Managerial Change. Thingsdid pick up towards the end of the season and we eventually finished in 16th place.

2017/18 The club retained Scott Reynolds as Manager and finished 4th in the League and reached the Quarter Finals of the FA VASE. Gates improved and it was our best season for about 8 years,

2018/2019Manager, Scott Reynolds resigned in the close season and Danny Nicholls was appointed as Manager but left in October due to work commitments. The Clubthen appointed Joe Sweeney and Paul Copson, who had previously won the Premier division title with London Colney as their new Management Team. They steadied the ship and we finished in mid table.

2019/2020 Was a good season for the Club as we again reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase and after a slow start in the Leaguethe team started to find some good form as we slowly climbed up the table. The team were also awarded the Team of the Month twice.

2020/2021Townfor the third time in 4 seasons reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase but sadly lost out to 2 late penalties. An indifferent start in the League meant we could not quite gain the points needed to gain promotion in a Covid affected season.

2021/2022 Leighton are hoping to be challenging at the top end of the table but we are well aware that this is a difficult Division and several other strong teams will be competing to finish in the top 2 places.

MATCH REPORT

Flackwell Heath 1 - 2 Leighton Town

This was Town's 4th away match in a row and they still have to play 3 more away games before facing Aylesbury Vale Dynamos at Bell Close on the 23 October.

Despite the very heavy rain the Flackwell pitch looked in good condition for the start of the game. Town started the match playing up the slope and in the early stages both teams looked keen to press forward. There were a couple of half chances for both teams early on but Town's defence looked comfortable when the hosts attacked. It was the hosts however who took the lead in the 19th minute when Thomas worked his way into the corner of the penalty area before curling his shot into the far top corner of the goal.

Town pushed forward looking for an equaliser and Danny Webb cleverly turned past his marker just inside the box and fired in a fierce right footed shot which went just wide of the keepers right hand post. In the 35th minute Town won a free kick just which was crossed into the box where it fell loose and Ethan Flanagan fired the ball into the net from close range.

With a couple of minutes remaining to half time Town were awarded a free kick on their left flank and when the ball was crossed into the box Bill Morgan got his head to the ball and Ethan Flanagan was quickly onto the ball and fired home from 2 yards with his left foot.

The second half was fairly even but there were very few serious efforts on goal although in one move down the left Ashton Campbell ran into the penalty area but his left footed shot lacked the power to trouble the home keeper who made a comfortable save. Six minutes from the end of the match Flackwell must have thought they were going to equalise but Connor Coulson made a superb save to keep Town in front.

Town saw the game out and stay at the top of the table for their trip to Harefield on Tuesday night before travelling to Oxhey next Saturday.

MATCH REPORT 5/10/21

Harefield 2-1 Leighton Town

After taking all 3 points at Flackwell Heath on Saturday, Leighton travelled to Harefield on Tuesday night hoping to gain another 3 points to keep them at the top of the table but it was the hosts who secured the points with a goal in each half. Despite a late reply from Danny Webb it was too little too late for Town.

Leighton had a chance to take the lead in the 10th minute when after an excellent pass by Luke Dunstan Tom Silford drove a low ball across the face of the goal but Danny Webb at the far post had his scoring attempt from 6 yards blocked by a defender. Harefield went in front in the 19th minute when Bill Morgan headed the ball out where it was picked up by a harefield player who ran towards goal and from the edge of the penalty area he drove a superb shot into the corner of the net despite the best efforts of Connor Coulson.

A few minutes later Town had another half chance but Dave Parkinson drove his shot into the side netting. Harefield then went close as a low shot flashed across the Town goal. Town were then reduced to 10 men just before half time when Tom Silford was sent to the Sin - Bin for dissent.

Leighton went close to equalising when Ethan Flanagan crossed well from the left and Danny Webb jumped well but his header struck the bar and the hosts scrambled the ball away.

In the 65th minute Harefield broke away and Joe Fitzgerald was deemed to have fouled his opponent as he ran into the box, the resulting penalty was easily converted to double the hosts lead. Joe Fitzgerald and Oran Swales then put in some good work down the right wing for Town but the final ball was well claimed by the home keeper.

5 Reasons why you should follow Non-League Football

Most of us support teams that are in the top tier of the some of the top footballing nations. The clubs that constitute the nonleague provide a real alternative to the higher echelons of the game.

Most of us support teams that are in the top tier of the some of the top footballing nations. It is but natural, they are the ones who hog the limelight, win the big trophies and sign the biggest superstars. All signs lead to the top teams.

But how many of us have heard of non-league much less know the teams that take part in it? For those of you who aren't familiar: Non-League football describes football leagues played outside the top leagues of a country. Usually, it describes leagues which are not fully professional. The term is primarily used for football in England, where it describes football played at a level below that of the Premier League and the three divisions of the English Football League.

The clubs that constitute the non-league provide a real alternative to the higher echelons of the game. So just what is the appeal of non-league football?

5) Fairy tales

Non-league football does produce its fair share of fairy tales. There have been many, from Fleetwood Town rising out of non-league obscurity to now reside in League 1 to Lincoln City who was languishing in the fifth division who would participate in the League 1(3rd tier in England) next season.

However, none eclipses that of AFC Wimbledon, a team formed in 2002 by fans of the old Wimbledon FC, who were outraged that their club had been moved 56 miles away to Milton Keynes and renamed MK Dons. The club defied all the odds after starting life in the Combined Counties Premier Division (English football's ninth tier) by gaining promotion in five of the next nine seasons to reach professional football again in 2011.

They are produced countless upsets in the FA Cup and the League Cup. Some memorable ones are Conference Premier Lincoln defeating Burnley at Turf Moor to reach the quarter-finals of the FA Cup in the 2016-17 season and Conference Premier side Luton Town's away victory over Premier League's Norwich City in the 2012–13 Fourth Round Proper. Yeovil Town holds the record for the most victories over league opposition as a non-league team, having recorded 20 wins through the years before it achieved promotion into The Football League. The record for a club which has never entered The Football League is held by Altrincham, with 17 wins against league teams.

4) Large Talent Pool

People may have a laugh and say that the non-league does not house any talent, but that is mere short-sightedness' this footballing world where ludicrous amounts are thrown around like confetti for players. On-league is a treasure trove waiting to be excavated.

Some of the players to rise out of non-league to reach the Premier League include Jamie Vardy, Chris Smalling, Charlie Austin, Troy Deeney, Dwight Gayle There is so much talent in non-league football, but people just don't see it. It is a travesty but nowadays scouts do come to watch these games in the hopes of finding a gem, but still not enough respect is being paid to the Non-League.

Who knows, the next Ronaldo or Messi could be waiting to be excavated from the Non-League.

3) The Money

Let's be honest. All the top clubs have fan followings in the millions and have huge stadia and the average price of a ticket is close to 60 pounds for a premier league game. Add to that the food and drinks and the merchandise you procure, and this proves to be a costly affair. It has become a big business where the big clubs just fleece the fans and as such the average Joe is outpriced.

The Alternative, go to your nearest Non-League Stadium and support the team. The ticket prices are dirt cheap and you can be a part of the action. One can easily get access to the players and have a chat with them towards the end of the game.

The owners are also quite friendly and for once, your opinion matters which is largely unheard of in the modern game

Granted, the quality of the gameplay and the players are far far lower, but the benefits overweigh the disadvantages.

2) Stadia

Clearly, the stadiums in non-league football certainly don't have the facilities, size or glamour to match those that you'd find in the Premier League, but it has one crucial advantage in that it has its own charm and passion.

One feels special singing their heart out throughout the games in such stadia and to the players who care and are not playing to just earn truckloads of money.

When you're attending a football match; you remember the entire day, not just the game being played on the field, and non-league clubs have more memorable individual details than most professional ones.

1) Fierce Loyalty

In the modern day, where loyalty seems to be a dying quality, it is of great comfort that there are still those people out there who seek to support their local sides rather than simply selecting a random bigname team to support, with no emotional attachment to them, simply because they think they'll win trophies.

In an era where some supporters of the big clubs do not have a strong sense of loyalty towards their team and players. One feels a part of the process of watching a local team and gets a strong sense of pride about their place and this feeling cannot be underestimated in a time where people are attempting to take the heart from football and treat it solely as a business.
