A word from the Press Box

- Welcome to Bell Close, for this afternoons eagerly anticipated Buildbase FA Vase clash, against Eastbourne Town. A very warm welcome to our visitors, who have made the long journey to be here with us today.
- Another 2 wins from 2 games for us, after a win over Harefield last Saturday in the league lifted us to 10th. A solid 2-1 win, against opposition we lost to in September, 3-1.
- On Tuesday, we travelled to Shefford Town & Campton of Division One, in the League Challenge Trophy Last 16. We ran out 1-0 winners, after a late Danny Webb penalty saw us progress to the Quarter Finals. Shefford were reduced to 10 men in the second period, but gave our boys a good game and had many chances of there own. Another strong performance from Dan Benney kept us in the tie.
- Today, its FA Vase day, a competition we have already played 4 games in this campaign. Wins against Bugbrooke, Long Crendon, Hadleigh and Broxbourne have seen us reach the third round stage.
- And as you know, we are up against Eastbourne Town, in what will be a big game for both clubs. The glamour of the FA Vase is huge to clubs at our level.
- Your support is always has been excellent in recent weeks and we need you again today! Tell your friends and family, that we need them to show their support for their local club!
- We want to stay on the road to Wembley and your support can give us a chance of doing that!
- Make sure as always you head to our Tea Bar (menu further on in the programme), for a brilliant range of hot and cold food.
- As always, Enjoy the Game, Up the Town!

History

Leighton Town, who were known as Leighton United between 1922 and 1963, were formed in 1885. They were mainly involved in local leagues until the outbreak of the Great War, and were winners of the Leighton and District League on several occasions.

Leighton were one of the original members of the South Midland League in 1922 – which at the time was known as the Bedfordshire County League. They were also members of the Spartan League between 1922/23 and 1951/52, but their only successes being the Spartan League Division 2 title in 1923/24 and 1927/28. They were Bedfordshire Senior Cup winners in 1926/27.

In 1952, they became a founder member of the Hellenic League, but after two disappointing seasons, moved to the South Midlands League. In 1965/66 season however, the Premier Championship sat in the Leighton Town Boardroom. The club then rejoined the Spartan League in 1967/68.

Leighton proceeded to consolidate their League success by winning the Bedfordshire Senior Cup for three successive seasons in 1968, 1969 and 1970. Unfortunately, some of the successful players moved onto other clubs, and Leighton's fortunes again declined. A move to the United Counties League proved disastrous and, after just two seasons, the club rejoined the South Midlands League. During the '70's and '80's, Leighton were unable to capture the success of the '60's.

In 1990/1991 the First Team won the South Midlands League Challenge Trophy and the O'Brien's Premier Division Cup, both for the first timThe 1991/2 season was one of the club's best ever. The South Midlands Premier Division title, which had eluded the club for so long, was won, and with it a place in the Isthmian League.

1992/3 saw the Club's success continue when they won the Bedfordshire Senior Cup for the first time since 1970. The Club missed out on promotion in their first Isthmian League season by just a single point but the Youth Team retained the County Cup.

1995/6 saw the First Team win promotion to Division 2 of the Isthmian League, whilst at the same time retaining the Buckingham Charity Cup.

In the 1996/7 season, Leighton won the Isthmian League Associated Members Trophy for the first time. 1998/99 saw the return of the Associated Members Trophy and the Buckingham Charity Cup.

Season 2003/04 was arguably one of the Club's best ever, as the First Team won the Ryman Isthmian Second Division title. The team was also named Ryman Division Two Team of the Year, and Paul Burgess was awarded Manager of the Year. They also reached the Fifth round of the FA Vase, and the final of the Beds Senior Cup, before losing to Andover and Arlesey respectively.

The 2004-05 season saw the club placed in The Southern League East Division and finished in a creditable tenth place. They also won the Buckinghamshire Charity Cup. The Reserves won the Bedfordshire Intermediate Cup and the U18's won the SCYFL League Shield.e in the club's history.

The 05-06 Season saw the Club progress again, improving on the year before, as they finished 8th in The Southern League West Division. After a poor start, League results improved and the side only suffered four defeats from the start of November until the end of March, a play-off place just eluding them.

After three excellent victories interest in the FA. Trophy competition ended with a single goal defeat to eventual semi-finalists, Borehamwood.

The Club also reached the Beds Senior Cup Final, but sadly they again finished as Runners Up.

The Club were relocated to the Southern League, Midland Division for 06-07 season but only one League win in the first six games and early exits in the two FA Competitions cost Paul Burgess his job in September. He was replaced by former Wycombe, professional Keith Scott, results did improve but it was a disappointing season, although Town did win the Bucks Senior Charity Cup.

The 07-08 started brightly with the first League defeat not coming until mid-October. Three wins in the FA Cup saw the Club reach the 4th Qualifying Round for the first time in it's history. A 3-0 defeat to Conference South, Havant and Waterlooville finally ended the run. Keith Scott left in December to join Windsor and Eton. In January 2008, Assistant Manager Sean Downey was appointed as First Team Manager and did a splendid job as the Club ended their League season in 9th place, winning the Bucks Charity Cup and reaching the final of the Beds Senior Cup once more.

The 08/09 Season the First Team finished 8th in the Southern League, Midland Division, achieving their highest points total to date at that level.

The 09/10 season saw Leighton once again finish in the top half of the table, when they finished in 9th place and they also lost the Bedfordshire Senior Cup Final to Southern League rivals, Arlesey Town after penalties.

History

Season 2010/2011, saw Town finish in 7th place in the League, gaining 69 points, their best performance since joining the Southern Football League.

The 2011/2012 a poor season saw Leighton finish in their lowest position for several years.

2012/13 was also very disappointing for the First Team as they finished in 20th place.

2015/2016. After 3 disappointing seasons Leighton finished the season in the bottom two of the Southern League Central Division and were relegated to the Spartan South Midlands League where they had last played in the 1991/92 season.

2016/2017 This was a disappointing season with the club struggling for much of the time after yet another Managerial Change. Things did pick up towards the end of the season and we eventually finished in 16th place. 2017/18 The club retained Scott Reynolds as Manager and finished 4th in the League and reached the Quarter Finals of the FA VASE. Gates improved and it was our best season for about 8 years, however Manager, Scott Reynolds resigned at the end of the season.

2018/2019 The Club appointed experienced coach Danny Nicholls as the new Manager, but he resigned at the start of October. The Club then appointed Joe Sweeney and Paul Copson as their Management Team and results improved but we were unable to reach the top third of the table..

2019 We are hoping to be competitive this season with several new signings but this is a very difficult Division and we are well aware of the quality of many of the teams.

VISITORS HISTORY

Eastbourne Town is the oldest senior football club in Sussex having been founded in 1881 as Devonshire Park, being named after its first home ground – A venue now known for staging one of the premier pre-Wimbledon tennis tournaments. In fact, it was the arrival of tennis at the ground which ultimately was to lead to it becoming the predominant sport and the subsequent relocation of both cricket and football. After five years of playing at the Park, the football club moved to the newly opened "Saffrons Field" colourfully named after the variety of crocus which had originally been cultivated on the site for use in the preparation of medicines. In 1889 the club changed its name to Eastbourne and fielding a side of 'gentlemen amateurs' began to play a dominant role in county football winning the Sussex Senior Cup eight times, and being runners-up on a further three occasions, up to 1907. The first grandstand was built in 1894 and at the turn of the century the whole complex was enlarged by the incorporation of Larkins Field. In 1907 the club split from the Football Association and aligned itself with the then Amateur Football Alliance becoming founder members of the Southern Amateur League where they remained until after World War II. During the 1920's the club won two League Championships, reached the final of the national AFA Senior Cup in four consecutive seasons, winning on two occasions, and made five further Sussex Senior Cup Final appearances albeit with only one success. The following decade did see a further two Senior Cup victories and success at the first attempt in the RUR Charity Cup. Good attendances saw the 'popular' Town Hall side of the ground asphalted and a new wooden grandstand erected behind the goal at the Larkin's Field end. The ground survived World War II in tact with friendly matches regularly being played there. In the summer of 1946 the pitch was moved closer to the cricket ground to facilitate the Town Hall side being terraced - although it was not until 1962 that the Meads Road end section was covered. Following one post-war season in the Southern Amateur League, the club joined the Corinthian League where they remained until the competition merged with the Athenian League in 1963. In the immediate post-war years the Saffrons attendances averaged 3,000 with the ground record of 7,378 being set when Southern League side Hastings United visited in an F.A. Cup tie on 10th October, 1953. During this era there were further Charity Cup successes, a Sussex Senior Cup win in 1953 and an AFA Invitation Cup success in 1970. After more than eighty years of being known as the 'town club', the club's name was changed to its present form. In March, 1969 the wooden grandstand was destroyed by an arsonist and although 'temporary' cover was provided, it was twenty-five years before a replacement was opened; the stand being named in memory of club stalwarts Sid Myall and Taffy Jones. Falling attendances made it uneconomic to continue in the Athenian League and in 1976 Town resigned, their final match being in the League's Cup Final where they lost 1-2 away to Cheshunt. Accepted into the Sussex County League the newcomers lifted the Championship at the first attempt and the following year reached the final of

the Sussex Senior Cup. Thereafter the first team's best finishing position was third on two occasions but generally the trend was downwards. The installation of floodlights for season 1994/95 saw a resurgence in results, therefore, it was a shock when after finishing ninth in 2000, a year later they found themselves relegated after dropping ten places and finishing next to bottom. An immediate return to Division One was almost achieved in 2002; however, promotion was won in 2003 when Town finished in second position. On their return to Division One Town achieved were fifth in 2004 and, after two further seasons of consolation, the League Championship was again secured in 2007 and with it came promotion into Division One (South) of the Ryman Isthmian League, the club having only to complete minor works after pursuing an on-going programme of ground improvements. One of a small number of clubs in Sussex to hold the prestigious F.A. Community Club status; ETFC received a reprieve from relegation in 2010. Subsequently, the club worked hard to retain its place in the Ryman League but a

bottom place finish in 2014 saw them relegated to the County League. A spirited attempt to make an immediate return was thwarted when the side failed to reproduce their good early form after a long mid-season lay-off and they eventually finished fourth but did have the satisfaction of lifting the Sussex RUR Charity Cup for the sixth time moving them to within one victory

of being the fourth most successful club in the competition. Last season good starts were made in the three senior cup competitions but produced no success as they concentrated on their position in the league where they were pipped for the

title by Horsham who made an immediate return to the Ryman League.

Transport

Bell Close (LU7 1RX) is situated in the centre of Leighton Buzzard, opposite Morrisons.

There is a bus stop next to the entrance and the Train Station is a 15 minute walk away, where trains run frequently to London, Milton Keynes, Birmingham etc.

If you are coming to Bell Close by car, you can come through Town or down off the bypass (A4146) and down Grovebury Road. This will avoid a potential busy Town Centre, especially on a Saturday Afternoon. Parking can be found at the ground, or further afield in a number of side streets.

Parking at the ground on a busy matchday will be limited.

Danny Webb however did have a chance shortly before, but couldn't find the target from inside the area.Ben Pattie set his sights on the far post with a curling strike, that skidded past the goalkeeper on a slippery surface. $1 ext{-}0$, but not long for, as Harefield were given the opportunity to make it $1 ext{-}$ 1.Michael Donkor's accidental handball in the area, so the referee point to the spot.Lenney stepped up for the visitors and slotted it past Benney into the bottom corner.Benney was called into some action shortly after though and made a fine save down low to his right. Supporters were in disbelief a red was not shown to the keeper.Town made a second change, which saw Ben Pattie replaced by Ashton Campbell.Time continued to tick on and Dan Benney would prove to be a Town hero yet again! He made 2 brilliant saves in quick succession to shut out the opposition. With Harefield pushing on, Town were forced to hit the visitors on the counter attack and almost claimed a third, when Towell and Webb combined smartly. Towell's effort however, saved by the foot of the goalkeeper.Harefield continued to throw the kitchen sink forward, but couldn't find the finishing touch in the area. A team, who beat Town 3-1, back in September.Conway blasted over in stoppage time and that would prove to be the final action of the tie as Town saw the game out, to claim another 3 points!The Reds now up to 10th in the league, claiming back ground on the leading pack!5 league games through November have seen Town claim 13 points! 
