P7 (NOW S1) BOYS TO MEN

This past season has seen the P7 team grow, bigger team, bigger pitch, bigger scrum and the introduction of line outs.

Thankfully the team numbers also grew, we started the season with 8 players, which sooner grew to 12 and finishing the

season with 14. This stage in junior rugby is known as the skill hungry years, as children are geared to learn skills at this time. The coaches still focused on building the skills they have learnt in previous years, but put a greater focus on movement skills.

Introducing set positions for players and set moves for penalties and kick offs. The coaches also encouraged 'homework' and independent practice with parents and team mates, ball handling, running and basic core strength exercises such as press ups and sit ups.

Due to the low numbers at the beginning of the season we had to borrow players for the opposition, which although not ideal the team leant to adapt quickly. Our senior players(senior due to time playing rugby) Kerry Dent and Declan Smith steered the team on

the pitch using the sets plays practiced at training improving at every game. One thing we did encourage at games was after the competitive game was to mix up the sides and play a fun game focusing on ball handling and positioning. This was invaluable to

teams, playing against and with new players improving game communication and most importantly getting game time and having fun.

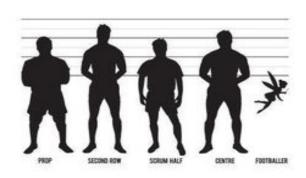
Towards the end of the season it was great to hear from opposition coach's comment on the improvement in the team. Yes we
