Health and Safety Policy Statement

In accordance with the regulations detailed under the Management of Health and Safety Regulations 1992 and the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974, Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club is making a positive commitment to achieving the highest standards of health, safety and welfare for all of those who may be affected by the activities of its operations.

It is the duty of every individual under Section 7 of the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 to take reasonable care for their own safety and the safety of others who may be affected by their acts or omissions.

As a result, all individuals are actively encouraged by Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club to communicate any health and safety matters, which may affect themselves or others.

Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club as a Rugby Club will as far as reasonably practicable also meets its statutory obligations in the maintenance and provision of the following:-

- Risk assessment activities
- Effective lines of communication for all those affected by the operating practices for Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club
- Regular monitoring and review of all health and safety practices
- Safe equipment and safe systems of work in their operation
- Regular servicing and checking of all machinery and equipment.
- Safe arrangements for use, handling, storage and transportation of all equipment,
- Materials and substances for use at work.
- Adequate facilities and arrangements with regard to welfare

This club is strongly committed to encouraging our playing members to train hard and compete, but the health, wellbeing and safety of each individual is always our paramount concern.

Processes and Procedures and Management

The Executive Committee of Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club will be responsible or the implementation of the Health and Safety Policy in accordance with the responsibilities prescribed by the Management of Health and Safety at Work Act 1992.

Risk Assessment

As part of our on-going responsibilities, we will carry out regular Risk Assessments to ensure that all potential risks are identified and subsequently controlled. This will be in accordance with the following:

- the identification of all potential risks
- evaluation of the adequacy of existing health and safety measures
- implementation of action in areas of deficiency
- · regular review

Training

To carry out a risk assessment correctly and appropriately all staff employed at Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club will undertake risk assessment training generally and specifically in relation to:

- · Manual handling and lifting techniques
- Fire Prevention
- Control of Substances Hazardous to Health Regulations (COSH1994)
- Slips, trips & falls.

In addition, all staff will be subject to periodic simulated fire and bomb alert procedures. This will ensure that all parties are aware of their roles and responsibilities in the event of such an occurrence. This will be implemented in accordance with the following:-

- when working practices change
- when job roles change
- when new equipment/technology is introduced

Health and Safety Representative

A nominated member of Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club staff will be responsible for overall health and safety in the workplace. They will be the point of contact for anyone who identifies a potential health and safety risk or any area where there may be cause for concern.

Responsible person(s): Chairman, Bar Chairman and Rugbysafe Lead.

Safety equipment and systems for their use in operation

As part of their responsibilities, the Health and Safety Representative (Bar Chairman) will carry out regular inspections of the Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club premises against a specified checklist, which will include items such as access and egress, fixtures etc. Any irregularities or concerns will then be reported to the Executive Committee. Regular servicing and checking of machinery will be carried out by those who installed the equipment where and when possible or by trained rugby club personnel and inline with manufacturers operating guidelines. The Bar Chairman will have a copy of servicing intervals and will monitor these for action.

Monitoring and Review

The Health and Safety Policy will be monitored by regular inspections of areas by the Bar Chairman and Health and Safety Representative. Health and Safety Policy and Procedures will be reviewed by the Bar Chairman and Health and Safety representative on an annual basis. Any changes to the Health and Safety Policy will be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee for ratification.

Communicating the Health and Safety Policy

Players, spectators and visiting players, will be provided with appropriate information on health and safety risks via the Health and Safety Policy, which will be displayed in a prominent place within the Club House and on the Club Website.

Contractors

Contractors will be assessed against their ability to undertake specified tasks safely by interview and inspection of their own health and safety policy. Contractors will have the requirements of Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club's own health and safety policies incorporated into contractor agreements.

General Health and Safety Procedures - Fire and Bomb Alert Procedures.

FIRE

The following fire procedures should be adhered to by all parties:

ON HEARING THE ALARM

Designated staff will establish location of the fire
They will telephone the Fire Brigade by dialing 999 and ask for FIRE.
Upon answering by the operator, give them telephone number of the phone you are using, and upon request by the operator, give the address of Rochford Hundred RFC clearly and audibly,

FIRE AT:

Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club
The Rugby Park Magnolia Road, Hawkwell, Essex SS4 3AD

Note that the Club Post Code DOES NOT direct you to the Club House but the park at the start of Magnolia Road. The Club House is 700 meters passed the Park.

Designated staff will try to inform the operator of the exact location of fire and wait for the operator to repeat the address before replacing receiver.

ALL THOSE IN THE ROCHFORD HUNDRED RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB BUILDING MUST.

- A. Leave the building immediately by the nearest available exit point when told to do so and go to the Fire Assembly Meeting Point which is located in the far corner of the main car park.
- B. The Bar Chairman or his/her nominee in the absence of the Bar Chairman Health and Safety Representative or senior member of staff will then check all areas of the building to make sure that everyone has been evacuated.
- **C.** On leaving the building, where safe to do so, windows and doors should be closed. Move to Fire Assembly Meeting Point immediately.

BOMB

The same evacuation procedure will apply as for the fire alert, with the exception that individuals will be required to move as far away from the building as possible.

Fire Assessment

An annual fire risk assessment will conducted in August with subsequent report being presented to the Executive Committee at the September Executive Meeting

Responsible Person(s): Club Chairman and Bar Chairman.

Emergency Access and Egress procedures

In the event of an emergency and an ambulance being required, it is the responsibility of the lead Coach or Team Manager to ensure that an adult is sent to the Club main gate located in the main car park to direct the driver to the appropriate pitch. The nominated person must also ensure that the gates are open to access and exit the 1st team pitch to allow easy access to the other pitches. If the ambulance is required on the top pitch or the mini pitches then the nominated person shall direct the ambulance accordingly to the top gate or the mini car park gate. The nominated person must also ensure the top gate is unlocked.

Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club will ensure that appropriate signs are placed on all gates requiring that the entrances are kept clear to ensure adequate access.

Medical Emergency Action Plan (MEAP)

It is the responsibility of all Executive Committee members, Bar Chairman and employed Bar Duty Managers, Kitchen Supervisors and qualified coaches, parent helpers and managers to understand the Rochford Hundred Rugby Club M.E.A.P. Copies of the M.E.A.P. will be kept in a safe place behind the bar in the Club house, on the Club Website and copies must be held within every Squads first aid kit bag. A copy must also be sent to all Mini, Youth and Academy players parents every September by the respective Team Managers.

Responsible person: Mini and Youth Chair and RugbySafe Lead.

First Aid Personnel

Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club will provide sufficiently qualified first aid personnel with the appropriate resources to enable first aid to be administered.

It is a minimum requirement that at all training sessions and matches that there is at least one first aider of Level 3 qualification e.g. Emergency First Aid in Rugby Union, Emergency First Aid at Work or equivalent to be present at all times.

All Squads have been and will continue to be provided with fully stocked First Aid kits. These first aid kit bags must be placed in a visible position pitch-side at all training sessions and matches. It is the responsibility of the Squad Manager to ensure that they are fully stocked and the lead Coach or Parent helpers is to ensure that they in place during training sessions and matches. Specific First Aid Kits will also be held behind the bar and in the kitchen.

If there are no qualified first aiders present the session or match should be cancelled.

Age Grade Players: Health Declaration and Emergency Contact Information.

It is strongly recommended by the R.F.U. that all parents of Age Grade players should be asked to provide basic medical information and emergency contact details for their players.

Rochford Hundred Rugby Club permit that such information may be stored within a sealed envelope and placed within the squad first aid kit bag.

Responsible Person: Individual Age Grade Squad Manager and Lead Coach or parent helper.

Reporting Accident

It is Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club policy that all accidents are formally reported within the Club Accident record book and to the Child Safeguarding Officer. Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club Accident book is locked within the cupboard behind the bar. An RFU incident/accident form will also need to be completed for every accident involving personal injury.

ALL incidents and Accidents must be reported to the Club within 48 of the incident or accident. Failure to formally report incidents or accident may result in disciplinary action against the Lead Coach and Manager.

Rochford Hundred Rugby Club will review all incidents and accidents on a quarterly basis with findings and recommendations being reported to the Executive Committee and Lead Coaches if necessary.

Person(s) responsible: Child Safeguarding Officer, Mini and Youth Chair and RugbySafe Lead.

Diseases

It is the duty of Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club to report any occupational disease to the Health and Safety Executive (HSE).

Health & Safety Policy

To support our Health & Safety policy statement we are committed to the following duties;

- Undertake monthly, recorded risk assessments of the club premises and all activities undertaken by the club
- Create a safe environment by putting health & safety measures in place as identified by the risk assessments
- Ensure that all members are aware of, understand and follow the club's health & safety policy
- Appoint a competent club member to assist with health and safety responsibilities
- Ensure that normal operating procedures and emergency operating procedures are in place and known by all members
- Provide access to adequate first aid facilities, telephone and qualified first aider at all times
- Report any injuries or accidents sustained during any club activity or whilst on the club premises
- Ensure that the implementation of the policy is reviewed regularly and monitored for effectiveness.

- Take reasonable care for your own health & safety and that of others who may be affected by what you do or not do
- Co-operate with the club on health & safety issues;
- Correctly use all equipment provided by the club;
- Not interfere with or misuse anything provided for your health, safety or welfare.

Club Health & Safety Information

CLUB HEALTH & SAFETY OFFICER(S):

Chairman and Bar Chairman

QUALIFIED FIRST AIDERS:

All Age Grades and Seniors Squads have qualified First Aiders and a current list is located within the First Aid Hut, Scrum Shed and behind the bar.

LOCATION OF FIRST AID FACILITIES:

Within First Aid room, behind the bar, within the kitchen and Scrum Shed.

LOCATION OF TELEPHONE:

Behind the bar.

LOCATION OF ACCIDENT BOOK:

Stored behind the bar within locked cupboard.

Rochford Hundred RFC, in line with its Health and Safety Statement, recognizes the need to undertake regular Risk Assessments in the following areas:

SECTION 1 - CLUB HOUSE AND CHANGING ROOMS

The Club;

- Ensures the building fabric is in a good state of repair;
- Undertakes a regular maintenance inspection programme;
- Ensures all the emergency exits are clearly signed and emergency lighting provided if required by the inspecting authority;
- Ensures rooms are labelled with clear, bold signage to members of the public;
- Ensures prohibited or potentially dangerous areas are clearly marked;
- Has identified any potential trip hazards (e.g. kit bags in the bar);
- Ensures maximum security of valuables in changing rooms;

- Ensures all changing rooms are free form hazard and are maintained in a healthy manner;
- Ensures there a provision for secure storage of bar stock.

SECTION 2 - COSHH (CONTROL OF SUBSTANCES HAZARDOUS TO HEALTH)

The Club identified three potential hazardous substances, as follows;

- Calor Gas
- Bar and equipment cleaning materials
- Asbestos

As such, The Club has;

- Assessed the risks to health created by hazardous substances;
- Determined control measures to prevent or control exposure to hazardous substances;
- Ensured control measures are both implemented and working in practice;
- Provided information and instruction to relevant personnel;
- Provided protective equipment where necessary;
- Ensured relevant people wear any necessary protective equipment.

 The Club acknowledges that a premises asbestos survey should be undertaken and is planned to be completed by the start of the 2022/23 season

Person Responsible - Bar Chairman

SECTION 3 – EQUIPMENT

In considering the issue of equipment used, the club recognises that it is responsible for all pitch maintenance, car park areas, perimeter fences, Club House, gym, first aid room and all storage facilities.

The Club has considered equipment that is our responsibility, this includes;

- Contact equipment to include all pads and suits;
- Scrummage machines;
- Post Protectors
- Tackle bags and shield

In line with health & safety procedures, the Club will ensure that;

- All contact suits and pads are examined monthly by a nominated person to ensure that they offer no risk to players using them and have correct weight for all Age Grades
- At the end of each season an audit is undertaken and all suits and pads not reaching the necessary standard are disposed off.
- Each scrummage machine has an annual service to check it is fully functional

• All coaches ensure that the machine is in safe working order before use and only coaches trained in the use of the machine will use them

Person(s) responsible: Mini and Youth Chair and RugbySafe Lead.

SECTION 4 – EVENTS

The Club recognizes its duty of care to all who visit the club. The Club is regularly hired out to external uses and for festivals and as such, through a safety audit, the Club has ensured the following;

- There is adequate information signage;
- The condition and repair of any roads, car parks or access paths and the management of traffic to and from the site is suitable;
- The facilities to be used are safe and free from defect;
- The facilities are suitable for use for all persons likely to need to use them, children, disabled persons etc.

When the premises are used in hours of darkness, (evening or winter events), the Club will ensure the following;

- The lighting is adequate and well maintained;
- There is standby provision for power through emergency lighting and a basic hand held light.

Before each event the Club considers;

- Crowd management (including communication in the event of an emergency and any public disorder control issues);
- If there are clear directions as to where spectators may stand (distance from the touchline or any identified hazards such as machinery on site) where appropriate?
- What first aid provision and insurance there is in place?
- Is there adequate Ambulance access?
- Will the event incur a charge for police services, i.e. traffic control outside the venue or signage costs from local highways department?
- How cash taken at the gate or over the bar is safely stored or transferred from the ground?
- Are necessary procedures in place to deal with sanitation and waste management?
- When the premises are to be used for events other than the playing of rugby the

Club considers the following:

- Are the premises suitable for the event or function?
- Are likely attendees suitable for the premises?
- Is the staff competent to provide and service the function?
- Does the event need a separate license or insurance?
- Does the event or function need a separate risk assessment?

- If an external company is coming onto our premises can they produce their method statement, risk assessments, copies of their insurance cover and is it adequate?
- Will the event or function enhance or damage the club's standing in the community (e.g. could there be late night noise issues or disturbance to residents)?
- Are there special circumstances relating to the event to which necessitate informing the emergency services or local authority?
- If security staff is needed, they are suitably trained and experienced?

Responsible person : Bar Chairman

SECTION 5 – FIRE SAFETY

The Club is conscious that as from the 1st October 2006, the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 places the responsibility for maintaining premises safe from fire upon the owner or responsible person.

The Club recognizes its responsibility for:

- Considering who is at risk, reducing risk to its lowest level and controlling any remaining risk;
- Maintaining and signposting escape routes (including the provision for disabled people);
- Providing and maintaining means of warning in case of fire and for fighting fire;
- Creating a management plan to deal with emergencies;
- · Conducting and recording staff training.

The Club has recognized the need to ensure that;

- Flammable spirits are not mixed with other combustible items, (paper/rags);
- When cooking is conducted on the premises experienced, qualified and trained people are used;
- All electrical appliances are correctly tested, maintained and are not overloading electrical outlets including annual PAT testing
- At the end of each event/games any unwanted electrical items are switched off;
- A fire alarm system is installed and it is checked and maintained regularly;
- Suitable types of fire extinguisher are installed in correct locations and that they are maintained and Club staff knows where they are and how to use them.

The Club recognizes that arson is now the major cause of fire in commercial premises. To help prevent illegal entry into the premises the Club ensures that;

- The alarm is always set;
- Refuse containers are away from the buildings and there is a programmed refuse collection to reduce the amount of accessible flammable material;
- A dedicated person is always responsible for conducting the final check before premises are secure.

SECTION 6.1 - COACHING RUGBY - U7 to U18 (girls and boys)

The Club recognizes the need to ensure that players are playing and training in a safe environment. As such, the Club takes the following measures to ensure the maximum safety of all players all qualified coaches, parent helpers and managers;

Prior to engaging with any Age Grade all volunteers must :-

- 1. Be a member of Rochford Hundred Rugby Club
- 2. Complete the R.F.U. Volunteer Form for Rochford Hundred RFC
- 3. Complete their Introduction to Safeguarding Certificate (eLearning)
- 4. Attend the R.F.U. Play it Safe course within three months of joining
- 5. Have an Enhanced D.B.S. Certificate in place or have the necessary documentation lodged with the Club to complete your application. If you are awaiting your E.D.B.S. Certificate you may only coach with a qualified coach and then never alone. If you have not applied for your E.D.B.S. you are not permitted to assist a qualified Coach.
- 6. R.F.U. Emergency First Aid in Rugby Union Course (eLearning)
- 7. Complete the R.F.U. Concussion Awareness Headcase Course (eLearning)

Responsible person: RugbySafe Lead

E.D.B.S. Application Process

To apply for a new or renewal of your Enhanced D.B.S. Certificate you need to provide the Club with the attached list of approved documents that need to be shown to prove your identity. The easiest combination of documents are:

- Current valid passport
- Current driving licence
- Utility Bill (under 3 months old)

We need to see the original documents (not photocopies) and we are not allowed to use online documents e.g. online bank statements. Please ensure that the documentation has the same name and consistent address details. We cannot accept documentation where the name differs (e.g. Sarah-Jayne vs Sarah Jayne or Thomas vs Tom). Check that it is within the time limits for that particular evidence e.g. under 3 months for utility bills or under a year for council tax statements.

Coaches and Parent Helpers- U7 to U18 (girls and boys)

Once the above are completed all coaches and parent helpers are supported and encouraged to undertake all relevant R.F.U. coaching and refereeing awards along with internal club concussion awareness and C.P.D. sessions for all qualified coaches and parent helpers to ensure you are up to date with current practice and Club Coaching philosophy.

- Upon completion of your England Rugby Coaching Award or R.F.U. Level Two Coaching Award you become a Qualified Coach at Rochford Hundred Rugby Football Club.
- Only E.R.C.A. or R.F.U. Level Two qualified Coaches (or coaches currently attending their E.R.C.A.) are permitted to coach contact rugby to players.
- It is the responsibility of all Qualified Coaches, Parent helpers and managers to keep their personal R.F.U. G.M.S. UpToDate.
- The Club has a Child Protection Policy and a designated Child Protection Officer; Jayn Warner

SECTION 6.2 - COACHING RUGBY - over 18's (ladies and men)

The Club recognizes the need to ensure that players are playing and training in a safe environment. As such, the Club takes the following measures to ensure the maximum safety of all players all qualified coaches, parent helpers and managers;

Prior to engaging with any Age Grade all volunteers must :-

- 1. Be a member of Rochford Hundred Rugby Club
- 2. Complete the R.F.U. Volunteer Form for Rochford Hundred RFC
- Complete their Introduction to Safeguarding Certificate (eLearning)
- 4. R.F.U. Emergency First Aid in Rugby Union Course (eLearning)
- 5. Complete the R.F.U. Concussion Awareness Headcase Course (eLearning)

Coaches and Parent Helpers over 18's (ladies and men).

Once the above are completed all coaches and parent helpers are supported and encouraged to undertake all relevant R.F.U. coaching and refereeing awards along with internal club concussion awareness and C.P.D. sessions for all qualified coaches and parent helpers to ensure you are up to date with current practice and Club Coaching philosophy.

- Upon completion of your England Rugby Coaching Award or R.F.U. Level Two Coaching Award you become a Qualified Coach at Rochford Rugby Football Club.
- Only E.R.C.A. or R.F.U. Level Two qualified Coaches (or coaches currently attending their E.R.C.A.) are permitted to coach contact rugby to players.
- It is the responsibility of all Qualified Coaches, Parent helpers and managers to keep their personal R.F.U. G.M.S. UpToDate.
- The Club has a Child Protection Policy and a designated Child Protection Officer; Jayn Warner

SECTION 7 SECURITY

In considering the issue of security, the Club has taken into account the day-to-day usage of the Club and the degree of security required for our premises. In putting into place our security measures, we have taken into account the fact that, by the very nature of a rugby club, it is very difficult to account for every person on the premises at any one time.

The club operates the following security measures;

- Having business callers attend by prearranged appointment only;
- · Providing secure changing facilities for players with valuables;
- An alarm system linked to a central alarm control;
- Secure system for storing cash
- Adequate lighting, which can be actuated on detection of movement;

Responsible person: Bar Chairman

SECTION 8 – LONE WORKERS

There are occasions when certain volunteers e.g. bar staff work alone on the Club premises. The danger of them being taken ill or suffering an accident whilst alone is an additional hazard that has been considered.

- The following procedures are in place to minimize the risk;
- Lone worker to phone a designated person when they are starting work and when they finish;
- Designated person checks if nothing has been heard from them within a selected time within a selected time;
- Considerations to whether the task being conducted is suitable for lone working, and whether the person undertaking that task is suited to working alone.

Responsible person: Bar Chairman

SECTION 9 TOURS

Before undertaking any tour, the Club will

- Complete relevant RFU forms
- Ensure comprehensive insurance is in place;
- Consult the following RFU document "Organizing a Tour".

Responsible person: Mini and Youth Chair and Club Safeguarding Officer.

You will now have considered the risks that exist throughout your venue, detailed the work that you do and identified additional procedures that you will put in place to manage and minimise the risks of injury to your members, staff, volunteers, and visitors.

Please remember that the risk assessment is only a document and it is essential that you follow this up with real action to ensure that your place to play remains safe and secure. Keep revisiting the risk assessment to ensure that actions are completed as planned and as new hazards are identified, plans are put in place to manage these.
