



(BEAL AN ATHA - the mouth of the ford). Ballina is an important commercial centre and is pleasantly situated on the river Moy 9.5 KM (6 miles) south of Killala Bay on the north Western side of Ireland. It is a seaport that still retains the old world charm and hospitable ways. A noted fishing area.

Ballina also has various sporting amenities catering for squash, Tennis, Rugby, Soccer, Gaelic Football and Hurling, Basketball, Golf and a new Swimming Pool located close to the town centre.

Only 8 miles from the twon there is a beautiful 3 miles of pollution free sandy beach, while in the town there are also many pleasant walks through an unpolluted environment through woodland and riverside areas of tranquil surroundings.

The Town of Ballina was not established until the 17th Century and was probably founded by Cromwellian planters who received grants of land for their services to the west of the river Moy. Before this Ardnaree on the east bank of the river was the main settlement area and a castle guarded the 'fords' over the Moy. Because there were no bridges in existence at the time one can appreciate the importance of these fords.

A number of Battles were fought in Ballina 1485 and in 1586 more than 1000 were massacred and the same amount in women and children drowned on the banks of the Moy when the Scots McDonnells were caught on the east bank by Sir Richard Bingham.

Today Ballina has a population of over 9,000 people and is one of the largest towns in the province of Connaught. It continues to be a very busy market town but has also moved into the Industrial stream with factories of International Origins from Japan, America, West Germany and many native based manufacturing and service projects. It has proved to be an ideal location for the setting up or relocation of most Industrial projects with assets such as an Industrial estate, an abundance of fresh clean water, a young and flexible work force and it is accessible by road, rail and sea.



For the visitor the town offers top class accommodation with a choice of facilities such as Sports and health complex, Mediaeval banquet hall, excellent cuisine, modern and mediaeval styled bars, coffee shops, craft shops, Moy Salmor and a welcome to all that is unsurpassed in our country. A full spectum of shopping facilities catering for all is also to be found in Ballina where value, quality and service are the aims to which members of the trade and development association aspire to give you.

On the river Moy, noted throughout Europe, fishing for Salmon and trout is still available within the town boundaries. The fishing potential within the area is almost endless from deep sea to lake fishing on the numerous lakes close to the town to river fishing.

A variety of live entertainment is available especially in the summer months in both the hotels and bars. Lovers of Jazz, popular music and tradional music are all catered for. There are also plenty of night clubs in the town to cater for those who prefer a late night out. With so many lakes and the Atlantic sea near by there's no shortage of beaches and camping areas. Enniscrone, only 8 miles from Ballina provides an award winning three miles of sandy beach which meets the river as it enters the sea. Also there are fantastic 18 hole golf coarses and ultra modern club houses in Enniscrone and Ballina.

Today there are two bridges crossing the River Moy and joining Ballina and Ardnaree. The upper bridge, known as the 'Ham Bridge' was built in 1836 and it replaced an earlier and only structure crossing the river. A second lower bridge was added in 1838.

In 1798 the French Forces under General Humbert marched victoriously into Ballina having landed in Kilcummen below the village of Killala. They came as allies to defeat the occuping British forces but alas were defeated soon afterwards. Today a memorial to Humberts honour is sited close to the town centre.



#### **RUGBY IN CANADA**

Though Rugby was introduced to the Canadians by the British military stationed in Canada at the time, the major credit for the embryonic Canadian game lies with the one time English International A. st. G. Hammersly who shortly after playing for England in the very first International against Scotland in 1871 took his knowledge of the game to British Columbia.

Today Canada has over 200 Rugby clubs and over 11,000 players which is similar to Ireland. New Zealand touring teams regularly stop off on their journey to and from Ireland, England and France. Results from these matches in Canada has shown the All Blacks and the rest of the world that Rugby is on the up and up especially in British Columbia where their results against the touring sides have been more superior to those of the National Team.

Canadian Rugby is split, East and West or British Columbia versus the rest. In the east the game has developed from an early period with an influx of professional people from France, the British Isles and Ireland during the 1960's. This included many P.E. teachers all making a great input to the game. Even before the 60's though the game was still being played all over Canada. There are reports of a match played in 1863 between the English Forces and some students from Mc Gill university.

Today Montreal Football Club is among the oldest in the world dating from 1865. The touring party from Ballina will be playing Rugby in Montreal where there is a big contingent of Irish people settled. It is also planned by the team to play a number of matches in Toronto and Peterborough.

The Canadian Rugby Union was formed in 1929 when six provinces met in Winnipeg to draw up the constitution. After folding in 1939 with the outbreak of World War 11, the C.R.U. was reformed in 1965, this time without government Finance. Today the Inter Provincial competition is the back bone of the countrys Rugby. Another competition is held for the smaller unions also with each union holding its own club competitions. Ontario and Eastern Ontario have two divisions each with Niagara and Quebec having three each while Toronto has Four.

Travel in Canada proves a handicap for the clubs. Climate too can also make life difficult. In the east matches take place in the spring and Autumn (May-October) while in British Columbia the Northern Hemisphere season is from September to April being the only climate suitable for winter competition.

#### Senior Cup 1979

For some it may seem like and eternity but in fact it is only ten short seasons ago when Ballina pulled off that historical win the Senior Cup final, wrestling Connachts biggest Rugby prize from the renouned Athlone club in the Galway sports grounds.

Twenty eight seasons previously, when Ballina won their first Senior Cup under the captaincy of Ivan Heffernan, the club was at 'Senior status but remarkabley on this occasion it was a' Junior Club having qualified for the Senior competition by winning the Junior League title the previous season.

Under the guidance of coach Dr. Oliver Bourke and captained by his brother Dr. Aubrey, who sadly is no longer with us (R.I.P.) the club qualified for the final having defeated a gallant Loughrea team in the semi final at Ballina. An interception by Neil Dodd providing the valuable try to secure victory for the home side and a Cup final appearance against the big guns of the Senior ranks Athlone.

Ballinas achievements caught the attention of the national and local newspapers. There was much talk concerning their chances and some speculative bets were placed, one in particular which was to prove most fruitful for the teams captain.

In the week leading up to the final Michael Rowe, a centre of high renoun, was forced to cry off the team with flu and a young Commerce student, Niall Brennan (who currently is a main organizer of this Canadian Trip), was called onto the side.

A capacity crowd turned out that Sunday to watch what turned out to be a ding dong struggle between the paragons of the junior ranks and the seniors from Athlone. Towards the end of the third quarter, both packs sharing the laurels and the scores locked at 6-6, the game developed into a test of wits with many testing kicks and probing, prodding runs. At the end of normal time however both sides were preparing battle lines for extra time but then Ballina had a match winning conjuring act in reserve.

# INJURY TIME TRY SEALS HISTORIC WIN FOR BALLINA

In the sixth minute of injury time, Ballina finding greater reserves of and concentration, caught the enemy unaware with a quickly taken line out Athlone 22 yard line. 

When the history of Ballina R.F.C. is written it will be found to be interwoven around one man Sean Murphy. Sean for many years kept the club alive when any other club would have faded out of existence. This he did by his tremendous energy and tenacity. He would just not let Rugby die in Ballina. Then in the seventies when the club had a winning sequence Sean saw the chance to progress to a Clubhouse of our own-this was unherard of for a Junior club but he was not daunted by this and in 1978 he saw the realisation of his dream. Throughout the many years of his presidency and in later years his patronage Sean always displayed the utmost courtesy and generosity to all who came in contact with him and in the sometimes tough game of Rugby his gentle and unruffled approach always seemed to win the day. It can safely be said, though he is no longer with us, that without him we would not be touring in Canada - or indeed would we be even playing at all.

Sean is sadly missed by us all but we thank him for the legacy he has left us.

#### Rugby patron honoured

Special celebrations have been planned by Ballina Rugby club for Sunday week when the Presidents Room in the club's premises at Creggs Road will be dedicated to the late Mr. Sean Murphy, once described as being "the father of Connacht rugby".

Mr. Murphy who died two years ago gave a lifetime to the game as player, coach, referee and administrator. He was president of the Ballina club for over quarter of a century, was the club's patron at the time of his death. He was a former president of the Connacht branch and served on the executive of the IRFU.

Ten years ago he saw a lifelong dream come true with the opening of the £60,000 clubhouse.

To mark the occasion a large colour photograph of Mr. Murphy was unveiled in the President's room followed by an end of season match when Ballina took on a Connacht selection.

#### **ACHILL 1988.**

In april of the last year the very first Rugby match was played on Achill Island. The beautiful island off the west coast of Ireland has always been associated with pleasant week ends, long sunny days and of course the occasional beverage. Most of all it is renowned for the friendliness and warmth of its people.

The Rugby match organised by local publican and sturdy prop forward, Tom Cafferky along with tremendous help from Michael Rowe, Arthur West and Donal Quinn was an ideal opportunity for funds to be raised to defray medical expences incurred by a young local lad who had been seriously injured in America.

It was with great pleasure that the "touring" party left Ballina in force that Sunday morning pulling up just outside town to pick up Mick Murphy, who had difficulty sneaking out the back door! And so we were truly on our way ... looking forward to the historic game. The scenery on the road to Achill is breath taking and every corner on the road we turned revealed even more lovely sights to those of us unfamiliar of the route to the island.

We crossed over the bridge from the main land to the island and there upon were met by the local pipe band clad in their hand woven woollen sweaters. Mike Murphy led the Bus into the village a green and white flag dancing above his head as he marched with the band to .... the nearest pub where upon his duties strayed from him momentarily and he detoured to the counter, flag still in hand, and proceeded to sample the local brew. It was all great fun and much to the amusement of the locals although some were left slightly puzzled to see an army of fine looking "athletes" emerge from the tour mobile and all kitted out in the customary club tie and navy jacket. We filed out of the the bus like toy soldiers, the sounds of the pipe music and snare drum were irrsistable... we had to jig. The scene was set for a smashing day ... we had to play the game yet!!



Having rounded up the teams, some of who had slipped into mild hysteria, we got kitted out. There was a short journey to the pitch which was beside the Atlantic ocean. Little did we know at the time looking out on the waves that we would soon be crossing them in the near future on another historic trip for Ballina R.F.C. on route to Canada. A hugh crowd of interested people travelled from near and far to watch the game... the first ever in this part of the world.

A team led by Brian Tuffy wearing green jerseys and including soem notable ball spinners in Eugene Cawley, Neil Dodd, Jonesie, Martin Boland and "Sam Cawley played the team in blue led by Davie Hunt. That team proved to be slightly stronger with Pat Piggott, Ray Foley, Richard West and Alan Rowe. The Team managers Gerard P.P. "Heineken" and Patrick X.Y. Buckley were busily warming up their respective squads when referee Peter Murphy called on the captains and the game was on.

A titanic struggle was to follow with many fine scores going each way. 

# KING OF THE FISH.

News that a Canadian Atlantic Salmon which had been tagged in the estuary of the Miramichi river near New Brunswick was caught in Greenland sixteen months later after an ocean treak of over 15,000 miles really puts the spotlight on this remarkable species of fish - the Salmon.

This is the longest migration on record for the Atlantic Salmon. Sufficient evidence has now been gathered about the Atlantic Salmons life which begins in the river. In the autumn the hen Salmon makes its way up, river and deposits its eggs in the spawning bed. The fish can be easily discouraged in their progress having to leap ten to twelve feet in height sometimes to avoid obstructions in their path. Occasionally these obstructions prove impassable and the Salmon dies after repeated fruitless attempts.

It is believed that the Salmon deposits its eggs in a trench like structure that it has either dug out with its body or by using its mouth and then the eggs are covered over by the male partner. These periodic visits by the Salmon have made many of those in authority and the fishermen to believe that the Salmon will always return to its native river or that in which it was bred and that the fish's sense of smell leads it back. Even when several rivers enter the sea in one stream the Salmon will always return to its own water and avoid all other rivers.

The Salmon can lay up to 900 eggs for every pound of its own weight and in the spring the young fish appear. They are only over an inch in length and like many newly born creatures they face a severe crisis in there immediate lives. The young Salmon grows rapidly however and assumes a banded appearance through the developement of dark bars on its sides. The fish soon becomes a 'Parr' and will eventually become a strong and powerful. In about 16 weeks it grows to about double its original length but it still remains in the fresh water as it is still not ready for the sea.

At the end of the second year the Parr attains a gorgeous costume and bright scales are in evidence. The fish is now called a 'Smolt' and moves to the salt water for the first time in its life, around the period of march to June. When they return in May to October the fish are then called 'Grilse' and vary in size depending on the amount of time they were feeding out at sea. Generally speaking if they had spent less than 2 years they are Grilse, more and they are Salmon. The Grilse can be

Various groups of fish enter Irish rivers at different times of the year. Between January and May we get Spring fish and from May to October the Summer fish arrive. Depending on the length of time the fish have feed in the sea the average weight of the groups of Salmon can vary between 10 to 60 pounds in weight.

The river Moy has 'runs' of both Salmon and Grilse is noted well through out urope as a fine fishing river for both Salmon and Trout and where fishing is



# DID YOU KNOW!!!

The worlds largest Rugby club is the Harlequin football Club in England. It was founded in 1866 and it has provided over 150 international players, 14 England captains and 10 R.F.U. presidents.

In 1979 when Ballina won the senior cup for the second time in the clubs history they were a junior club!! and had qualified for the senior cup by winning the junior league the previous year ... needless to say ... the celebrations went on for a year too!!

The first New Zealand team (All Blacks) wore dark blue jerseys.

The crest on the Argentine Pumas jersey is actually a jaguar.

On April 20, 1902 a ceasefire was concluded between mid day and sunset during the Boer war to enable the British forces and the Afrikaaners to play some Rugby.

Western Samoa's first International in 1924 against Fiji was played at 7 a.m. so that the locals would still be in time for work. The Fijians won 6-0 despite having to play against 15 big Samoans ... and a big tree growing in the middle of the pitch!!!







Treasurer was P. Buckley, a Munster & Leinster Bank official and a real driving force. The banks supplied a large number of players, including J. Carney, Hugh Campbell (Ulster Bank), and a one-time captain, and Tim O'Connor, an international standard high jumper, whose regular feat was to jump the railway gates at Station Road—from the standing position! There were many local players—Leo Ahearne, Eamon and Jimmy English, Bill "Brute" Cosgrave. Players travelling in from outside towns, included Tommy Timoney, from Killala, who had had American Rugby experience in the U.S.A.; Vincie Cosgrave, J.P. Roughneen, Kiltimagh; the Melett brothers, Kevin and Willie from Swinford; Paddy Sherry, Foxford; B. Coleman, Castlebar, and Brendan McAuley, "imported" from Dublin, for vital matches. The Customs and Excise was represented by a very diminutive "Baby" Power.

The Club had it's headquarters in the Crescent Hotel, owned by the Cosgrave family, beside the Post Office, and there the visiting teams were entertained, and meetings were held.

The teams travelled mainly by hired omnibus. There were two transport companies in Ballina, at the time—I.O.C. (Irish Omnibus Company) and the Magnet Bus Company. The players' cars were often used for away matches. Following their most auspicious start in Connacht competitive fare, the season 1928/'29 dawned bright, and Ballina shot right to the top of the Connacht graph, by winning the Senior League. The team was led by Eddie Murphy; Eamon English was at out half; Ivan McGee, a student at St. Muredach's College at the time, operated at scrum half; Billy Carlos played at full back: Tim O'Connor centre back; James (Gildie) Ahearne and Jimmy Murphy on the wings; Hugh Campbell led the forwards which included George Conboy, Kevin Mellett and Brendan McAuley.

In 1929/'30 Ballina reached the final of the Connacht Senior Cup, and lost by one score (3-nil) to U.C.G., after a ding dong struggle. They were back in the final again the following season against Loughrea, but the Co. Galway Club emberged victorious by 6—3.

The Club continued to be a force in the province for the following years and although titles did not come it's way, it still fulfilled it's fixtures.

The outbreak of world war II placed limitations on the activities, and petrol rationing curtailed the number of matches, but there was a surge in the post war years and a gradual build-up to the Junior Cup win in 1948.

The 1948 win heralded better things to come, with the gradual preparation and moulding of the team to take the first Connacht Senior Cup title to Ballina in the 1950/'51 season.

On that historic team were: Manus Gilvarry; Gerry Browne; Mick King; Donie Barrett; Jackie Hannick; Arthur Boland; Charlie Connor; Joe Dunphy; Tom Connor; Seamus Quinn; Ivan Heffernan, (Capt.); Paddy Sheehan, (R.I.P.); Eamon Connor, Brian Moylett, Seamus Barrett, The side included the three Connor brothers—Charlie, Tom & Eamon. Coach: Sean Murphy.

# HISTORY OF BALLINA RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

It was in the early days of 1928, when Ballina got it's first real taste of Rugby football, when the newly formed Ballina Club played hosts to a Westport selection, in the grounds of St. Muredach's College.


IT was the start of an era, the birth of a Club that was to shed lustre on Connacht, and Irish Rugby. And although the Rules have changed in the interim, the spirit is the same in the Club.

The majority of the Ballina players in those early days were either bank officials or students just out of college, particularly from the Rugby playing nurseries such as Blackrock, Clongowes Wood, etc.

Ballina was proposed for membership at the February meeting of the Connacht Branch in 1928. The affiliation which was accepted unamiously, was proposed by Galwegians, and seconded by U.C.G. Straight away, Ballina got down to business and reached the final of the Junior Cup, to be beaten 8—4 by Galwegians.

In 1929 the Camp Field (now the home of Ballina Stephenites) was acquired as a Rugby pitch, with proper goal posts and markings provided.

The Club's first president was Dr. Francis Keane, of Lr. Pearse Street, and the other officers were Mr. W.S. Huggard, Solr., Mr. William Strong, merchant; and later Mr. J. Killeen, manager of the Bank of Ireland—and old Irish.

World War II placed limitations on rugby activity and travelling, but Ballina teamed up with Westport and Sligo in 1941, to compete in the Senior Cup. They were beaten in the first round (6—3) by U.C.G., who went on to take the trophy. Back (from left): M. J. (Mixie) Murphy, Ballina, T. The team also won the Senior League that season, and shared the title the following year, after a series of draws with Galway Corinthians failed to yield a result. Cup final appearance against Galway Rovers in 1957.

Surprisingly fortunes slumped for a time, and apart from a Junior Cup final appearance against Galway, in 1957, success did not come the Club's way until the Junior League win against Sligo, in Galway Sportsground, in 1973.

On duty for Ballina that day were: Seamus O'Dowd, Pat Doherty, Michael Rowe, Walter Rouse, Stanley Rowe, James Murphy (R.I.P.), Tommie Cooke, John Duffy, James Preston, Peter Murphy (Capt.), Michael Begley.

That League win was the start of a golden era for the Club—the purple patch in the Club's history, for it culminated in two Junior Cup wins; two Leagues; the winning of the Junior B League, and under age titles.

Coached by Dr. Oliver Bourke, the Club won the Junior Cup in 175/76, after a lapse of 18 years, after a nail-biting match against Galwegians, and retained the trophy the following season, again with a spirited display against newcomers, Creggs, from County Roscommon. Creggs, incidentally, are the current holders.

Ballina won the Junior League in 1978, (capt.), Tommie Cooke, Michael Rowe, Ivan Heffernan, having beaten U.C.G. in the final. And to crown a great 1977/'78 season, the Club also won the Connacht Junior B League with a comprehensive win against Our Lady's Boys' Club. On the Ballina team were: Tony Duffy, Padraic Jones, Liam Martin, David Dodd, (capt)., Padraic Walkin, Tommie Cooke, Brian Mescal, John Duffy, Eugene Langan, Kieran Rouse, Stanley Rowe, Daithi Quinn, Bill Ferguson, Pat Doherty, James Preston. Reserves: Rory O'Connor, Martin Moylett, James Greham.

In 1979 Ballina R.F.C. went on to have its finest hour, when against all odds they beat Athlone in the Connaught Senior Cup Final. 10-6 in injury time. The side was captained by Dr. Aubrey Bourke and team members included Gerry O'Donnell, Eugene Cawley, Walter Doherty, Liam O'Neill, Niall Brennan, Seamus O'Dowd and Tommie Cooke. In the same year Ballina also won the U.17 League.

In 1980 the Junior Cup was added again to the clubs honours and then for the next 5 season's Ballina won the Junior League 5 times on the trot. In that time a Junior B' League (1983) and another Junior Cup (1985) were added.

Having won the 'Junior Double' (League & Cup) in 1985 the club departed the junior scene in style and moved up a step to the Senior Ranks. Ballina would again be playing Senior League matchs.

In the clubs first senior league match in 38 years they beat Athlone at home.



# From Boyhood days

"Would you care to play Rugby"—a note scribbled on a scrap of jotter paper was passed around the Science Lab. in the basement of St. Muredach's College, during a Physics Class, while most of the studios lads were engulfed in "Velocity of

The obvious 'lads' were earmarked by their size, weight, willingness and sense of adventure to take part in forming an under-age side to represent Ballina. The following day, being our fortnightly half-day, our 'gang' leader Paschal Preston took us to Belleek to tog, and we were greeted and made welcome by our new Coach—a man who would guide, coach and for the next three to four years, mould an inspiring young fifteen—his name, Liam Molloy. Liam, now distinguished in Rugby circles for his refereeing, administration, coaching and P.R.O. duties, is and will be remembered by all of us for his unceasing willingness to revive Juvenile Rugby, and we thank both himself and his wife for the endless hours devoted to this

Every Saturday and every half-day received from school was spent in Belleek, learning the ploys and skills of Rugby Football.

After 7 weeks we played our first ever match against Sligo Grammar School in Belleek. A match of many fortunes—the result did not matter. All of us felt like little giants clapping of our opponents and washing in the bath provided by the Moy

From there the momentum increased—a new flux of young blood joined us, and every Saturday during practice we grew up to relish the game. The following seasons were bigger and better. We had regular fixtures with Grammar School, Sligo and Westport R.F.C. on a home and away basis. The overcrowded mini-bus of Rugby enthusiasts and the savoury meals provided will always be remembered.

The following season, my captaincy, our coach decided that we merited an entry to the Branch Competitions. For the first round we were drawn against Sligo in the Minor Cup. Having experienced the usual toughness we pulled through to meet Westport, in the Semi-final. The battle was fought in the Demesne, in a mud bath of rain and hail. We scraped through to meet U.C.G. students in the Final. What a contrast. On a glorious sunny day we arrived in Galway, fresh and well, only to be annihilated by 70 points to nil, by the super knowledgeable school 1st Team leavers of the previous year. Never mind, we were brought to "The Skeff" and given a tidy helping of food, and our spirits were soon raised.

The end of that season then saw a split up of our Team—an inevitable part of life, I suppose-many of the lads departed to follow their respective careers/studies, most never again donned the little green jerseys. What remained-Gerry Hallinan, Pat O'Malley, Eugene Cawley, James Preston and myself—went through the ranks to the Senior teams, and the rest only God knows. They are to be found anywhere from South Africa, Toronto, London and Dublin.

Thats what living is all about! For all of us on that Golden Minor Side, wherever we are, we certainly will always remember our introduction to Rugby and that man who made it all possible, LIAM MOLLOY. To Liam and Family,
