

'We would urge all clubs to make every effort to fulfil their fixtures in the second team leagues. We have put rules in to place which will hopefully lessen the amount of postponements. All clubs are asked to ensure that their coaches and captains are aware of the rules'

Clubs asked to take note of second fifteen league rules

Please see below the rules and expectations of Clubs participating in the North Wales 2nd XV league and North East Counties League 2014-15

- a. The rules of the North Wales 2nd XV league are, where relevant, to mirror those of the WRU National Leagues.
- b. In the case where the numbers of players on the two teams are unequal, it is an expectation that
 - i. the team with the higher number of players should offer some of their players to the opposition in order to make the two sides equal in number
 - ii. if i. above is not possible, the game should begin with equal numbers e.g. if one team has 19 players and the other has 12, the game starts as a 12 v 12 game
 - iii. in instances such as described in ii. above, the team with 19 will be allowed to use seven substitutes
 - iv. the minimum number of players per team is ten
- c. All Clubs should attempt to follow the expectations above and, thus, negate the possibility of calling off games.

PERMITS ARE AVAILABLE RIGHT UP UNTIL KICK-OFF TIME

A permit must be sought for each match in which a player plays and such permit may be granted for a match at any time in the season. Any permit issued must be made in writing (via fax, posted letter or email), by both the Club with which the player is registered, and the Club with which he is to play on permit and lodged with the Union before the match takes place.

In exceptional circumstances, where a permit is agreed during WRU office closure hours (e.g. a Saturday), the permit may be lodged by telephoning 02920 822407 or 02920 822404 and leaving a voicemail message. The written confirmation must be sent to the Union as soon as possible after lodging the voicemail message.

Gerald Davies gives emotional speech at NWRUC AGM

An inspirational speech by Gerald at the District J AGM. Report by Iori Hughes, Llangefni RFC

Last night, the club secretary Arnold Milburn and I had the honour and privilege of listening to the great Gerald Davies address the NW rugby council AGM on what is to be his last visit before he steps down. He gave a very passionate and emotional speech on the war between the WRU and the regions that has 'fractured' our game.

A true great of the game without a shadow of a doubt, he said that one of his most satisfying achievements has been to kick start rugby in North Wales and Alwyn Jones was later to comment that without Gerald Davies' intervention we would never have been as advanced with RGC as we are now.

In the most emotional part of his speech he talked about the need to keep the HWYL and the CULTURE of Welsh rugby intact because THAT is what makes us different from the rest of the world and every club must invest in youngsters to ensure their future.

As I listened I wondered how much we at CLWB RYGBI LLANGEFNI have contributed to the local community over the 42 years that we have been in existence and how much pride and publicity we have brought to the town of Llangefni and the Isle of Anglesey in that time. I felt 10ft tall in the meeting thinking of what we have achieved as a club through the blood, sweat and tears of volunteers and the fantastic hard work you have put in over the years.

The only regret I have is that, despite a great attendance of 40+ delegates, that a much larger audience was not able to hear the speech last night from Gerald Davies but it has inspired me as chairman to redouble my efforts and support everyone involved to restore our great club to the top table of NW rugby and get the HWYL back into the game.

Terry pledges to ride every mile for Yogi and the money Terry raises will go towards making memories and delivering dreams.

The challenge started on the 6th September 2014 with the RGC 1404 away match at Blackwood, with the first home match for RGC 1404 taking place almost a year to the day of Yogi's funeral – an emotional home launch of Terry's challenge which will conclude on the 18th April 2015 with the final away match at Merthyr, followed by the final home match on the 25th April 2015

Terry,Bennett from Cefn Meiriadog, has been living with back problems for most of his life, and didn't think he'd ever be able to do this ride for Yogi. After playing rugby from a young age, and having suffered back problems from the age of 25, Terry finds riding his motorbike difficult sometimes, but that's not stopping him.

Terry said "I know it sounds easy to ride a motorbike to 13 away matches, but for me it's really going to be very difficult. I have severe back problems, and I'm not as young or as fit as I used to be, but I want to do this for Yogi and to support The Yogi Foundation, and nothing is stopping me!"

Despite Terry's positive attitude, there are still concerns as Terry's journey will take him on many dangerous roads, and will take place during the forthcoming winter months.

Sue Davies, Yogi's wife said "It's such a great challenge that Terry is undertaking and I want to pass on my thanks and best wishes to him, Yogi would have been so proud".

Shaun Turner from the Yogi Foundation said "We will be eagerly following Terry's journey over the four thousand miles and wish him all the very best for his 4K for Yogi Challenge. It really is amazing that he has committed to doing this and can be sure that every penny raised will be so valuable to the charity."

Canada to play Namibia at Parc Eirias

International rugby will return to Colwyn Bay this autumn with Namibia taking on Canada (Eirias, November 7).

The venue, home to Wales Under 20 for the past three seasons, is becoming a regular fixture on the international circuit, with the match following last season's Test between Japan and Russia and the five-team international series in 2012.

There will be no shortage of Welsh connections with two current Canadian internationals plying their trade at the Ospreys and a number of players having spent time playing for RGC.

Former RGC head coach Clive Griffiths is involved with Canada Rugby, while former Newport outside half Gareth Rees is their team manager. The match will kick off a key preparation period for Canada ahead of Rugby World Cup 2015 - their opening game against Ireland will kick off the Millennium Stadium Rugby World Cup action on September 19. All Canada's top players are expected to be part of the line-up against Namibia. including former Scarlet Jamie Cudmore, now at Clermont Auvergne, Glasgow's DTH van der Merwe and London Irish lock Jebb Sinclair.

Canada currently sit in 17th place in the world rankings with Namibia in 22nd place.

Former Scarlets and Blues head coach Phil Davies has recently spent time with the Namibian coaching team as part of an IRB remit to help prepare Tier Two sides for Rugby World Cup - and could remain linked to the side in the build-up for next year's tournament. He said, "It was a case of working closely with the coaches on their planning, coaching delivery and principals of play looking at the year ahead."

Some of Namibia's best known players include Sarances back row Jacques Burger and Exeter Chiefs full back Chrysander Botha, along with a contingent of players in South Africa's Currie Cup. Head coach, former Dax prop Danie Vermeulen has just completed a trial weekend and is determined to put down a marker in the Canada game.



He said, "A number of players put their hands up for selection for the end of year squad and Rugby World Cup. We don't want to make excuses. Canada is a key target for us."

Cllr Graham Rees, Conwy's Cabinet Member for Tourism, Marketing and Leisure added:

"We're proud that we've been able to secure this exciting fixture for Eirias, Colwyn Bay. This time next year these two teams will be competing in the Rugby World Cup with worldwide television audiences of millions, this is a wonderful opportunity for rugby fans to come along and support national first teams playing on our doorstep."

"It's clear there are many fans and enthusiastic spectators here in North Wales and we're pleased to be able to offer the facilities for everyone to enjoy top flight rugby."

WRU unveils Welsh language policy and bilingual web-site

The WRU has adopted an official Welsh Language Policy which will help enshrine the use of the language in rugby both on and off the field.

WRU unveils Welsh language policy and bilingual web-site option (Da iawn--Or Diwedd !!)

The policy will ensure the language is considered across the business and rugby operations and wherever the game is played by WRU teams.

To coincide with the adoption of the policy the WRU has unveiled a new bi-lingual website which will regularly be uploaded with rugby news from Wales.

The website can be opened through a Welsh option button on the main home page of the existing website (CYM).

The new policy is also published on the WRU website and printed copies of the document are being sent to all staff and stakeholders. The policy has been approved by the WRU Board and was devised after consultation with the Welsh Language Commissioner for guidance on content.

Within the policy, protocols are outlined for the use of Welsh throughout the remit of the governing body, which includes the Millennium Stadium. The policy covers areas such as website use, publications, social media, telephone protocols and public speaking.

WRU staff will monitor the use and development of the policy which will evolve to reflect the growth of rugby in future. The WRU will also continue to liaise with the Welsh Language Commissioner's office to seek advice on implementing the policy.

WRU Group Chief Executive, Roger Lewis, said: "I am delighted the Welsh Rugby Union has published an official policy which reflects our duty of care for the use of the Welsh language across the national sport of Wales.

"We represent the national sport of Wales and it is right and proper that we champion and facilitate the use of Welsh both within the WRU and through the people we engage with. We already carry out a great deal of work through the medium of Welsh and this policy document is an accurate reflection of our commitment to the language."

The Chairman of the WRU, David Pickering, added: "Welsh is a living language and the WRU is proud to acknowledge its importance through the adoption of this new policy.

"I hope this move will show the way for other organisations who want to follow our example and proclaim their support for Welsh in this way.

"We know how hard the Welsh Government works to promote the use of the language and we are delighted to align our own policies to that strategy.

"Of course many people will continue to engage with the WRU in the English language but we must reflect the needs of Welsh speakers who want to use Welsh throughout their daily lives.

"We are also extremely grateful to S4C for the help they are giving us in achieving our ambitions with the website content."

The WRU and S4C have forged a partnership within which the Union allows the broadcaster access to Welsh language video content which can then be utilised by both organisations. This enables the WRU to guarantee a flow of Welsh language content across its web output.

The WRU already boasts a wide use of the Welsh language through areas such as its publications, coaching, match official and skills training courses, publications, media engagement and signage.

The WRU offers facilities for media interviews to be carried out through the medium of Welsh around the world where Wales teams play.

WRU and schools join foces to improve health of the game

An army of high calibre individuals has been appointed by schools across Wales in order to make a huge impact into the growth of rugby in Wales.

The 'school-club hub officers' have a variety of backgrounds including former professional rugby players, current semi-professional players, coaches, teachers and development professionals, and have been employed by 43 schools and colleges as full time rugby officers with a key objective to increase the amount of rugby played at schools and clubs.

Some of the appointments in the Dragons region include Bridgend assistant coach Mike Hook who has been employed by Lewis School, Pengam; Cross Keys captain Adam Powell as Tredegar Comprehensive's new rugby officer; Pontypridd flanker Jake Thomas is at Newbridge Comprehensive and Dragons outside half Dorian Jones, son of Kingsley has joined his old teachers at Brynmawr.

Former Wales and Dragons hooker Steve Jones has joined the ranks at Gower Col-



lege, former Ospreys flanker Ben Thomas is making waves at Brynteg Comprehensive, former Wales centre Neil Boobyer and Chris Jones share joint responsibility for the role at Treorchy Comprehensive, and in the Scarlets region, some of the more well-known names include former prop Aled Griffiths who is flying the flag at Ysgol Bro Myrddin, Carmarthen, Carmarthen Quins hooker Gethin Robinson who has been appointed at Queen Elizabeth High and former Llanelli and Llandovery outside half Tomas Marks who has taken up the role at Ysgol Bro Dinefwr.

The schools, working closely with the Welsh Rugby Union, have signed up to a set of criteria which will ensure the rugby officers offer opportunities to play the national sport - in its various forms - to both boys and girls of all abilities throughout the school and that there is an effective communication and interface between the school and neighbouring club. The Welsh Rugby Union has provided funding to the schools to enable them to make these appointments.

The initiative has been developed and rolled out following the root and branch review into Welsh rugby recently carried out by WRU Head of Rugby Josh Lewsey.

Lewsey said, "The 'school-club hubs' created by the appointment of the rugby officers will provide a huge boost to Welsh rugby. This model plays a key part in developing a co-ordinated system that underpins the long term needs of both the elite and community game.

"They will provide for the dissemination of best practice throughout the country and connect the coaching advice of the national team to those delivering at grass roots. They will help to raise standards on the field, within the WRU Under 18 Wednesday League and the Welsh Schools Regional Leagues but a key aim will also be on the transition and retention of players into the club game.

"There is clear evidence now emerging that a disciplined sports programme can also contribute to improved academic results, attendance statistics and pupils' confidence and self-esteem. As such, by focussing on the game's core values and designing the seasonal structure to support the academic timetable, it is hoped this initiative will contribute to the development of well-balanced and healthy young people who will be good role models within their schools and communities. Such changes do not happen overnight but hopefully this is the first step towards a sustainable and successful structure for the health of the national sport."



England, who Wales also lost to in the final, proved a class apart and won 43-0 in the opening pool match but Hannah Jones' side bounced back to win their remaining games on day one by beating Portugal (17-5) and Ireland (12-5).

Assistant Coach Josh Leach felt it was a game they could have easily lost "I'm obviously disappointed with the performance. We dominated possession and created opportunities but we turned the ball over cheaply"

The black and blues had done well up the slope to take a 5-0 lead in the first forty minutes, only to see the development team grab an interval advantage in time added on with their only threat inside the twenty two, Rory Martin- Smith in the sin bin at the time.

It was a warning sign of RGC's potency as Bagshaw went over after a long range attack, cancelling out a try by Bill Carey, who along with Ross Pritchard, was making a return to his home club after a year away..

James Lang's conversion gave the away side a 7-5 half time lead.

Even so, many would have put money on Llanharan after the turn around, but they went off the boil and allowed RGC to display their attacking ability.

Early pressure after the restart came from the Colwyn Bay based outfit and it was only good tackles from the likes of Mike Powell and Tyler Williams aided by turnovers from skipper Scott Malone that kept them at bay.

However, a rebound saw the pack lose a scrum head and a collapse ended in a penalty try, Lang making it 14-5.

The lead grew in the 56th minute with wing Tom Blackwell going over, again the opposition not helped by another scrum decision against them.

Defeat for the Dairyfield side was confirmed as left wing Carwyn Ap Myrddin sped over immediately after the yellow card and Lang converted.

There was at last a response from the beleaguered side as they pressed on the line, but shouts from the crowd for a penalty try as a quick penalty was tackled inside the ten metres zone went unheeded, and Llanharan know that a huge response will be needed as they travel to powerful Bargoed on Saturday.

Head coach Matthew Lloyd commented: "A disappointing result again as we were firmly in the game at half time. There was huge effort from the players - the win isn't far away but we must play what's in front of us and discipline has to be better."
