Risk assessment

The aim of this risk assessment is to prevent the spread of infection from Covid-19 to players, coaches, volunteers and parents at football training sessions and friendly matches.

This risk assessment covers a phased return to football at Bayard Recreation Ground.

- 1. Socially distanced fitness and ball work sessions.
- 2. Small group activities.
- 3. Full football training sessions as a squad.
- 4. Competitive training with groups up to 30
- 5. Friendly house matches

Until 31 July - Competitive training, with the overall group size (inclusive of coaches) being limited to 30 people

From August – Competitive matches to begin, for example pre-season fixtures currently only in house matches to be played at Bayard Recreation Ground.

From September – Grassroots leagues to commence

This risk assessment has been approved by all members of the Brightlingsea Regent Youth Football Committee.

This assessment follows The English Football Association and Public Health England advice and guidance and combined with good training practice and a common-sense approach aims to support players feel safe and happy.

All parents/carers/players have agreed to our risk assessment and our Mission Statement when we recommenced football at Bayard Recreation Ground. Please ensure that they are made aware of the amendments and are happy for their child to continue, code of behaviour and safeguarding of children to be respected and followed.

This is to set out:

- Club Risk Assessment
- Functionality of training measures to prevent spreading of the virus.
- Club liability and insurance.
- Preparing for further disruption.



Risk assessment applying to all training and preseason friendlies.

No player or coach will be judged, or disadvantaged should they choose to opt out of training and their choice respected.

CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

Covid-19 is a highly infectious and dangerous disease. A resumption of contact play is only achievable if those involved create and maintain a controlled environment that minimises the threat of infection.

Risk in sport cannot be completely eradicated but with caution and care these risks can be reduced. Each player will need to decide when to return to contact football, based on their own circumstances and the arrangements that have been put in place for a safe return. This is particularly the case for players from BAME communities or those with underlying health conditions.

All those returning to competitive grassroots football must adopt the following code of behaviour:

- Be aware of your own personal health. If you show any of the Covid-19 symptoms you must stay at home, inform NHS Test and Trace and seek medical advice.
- Be responsible. Read the guidance provided by The FA and by your club so that you are aware of the changes to the game and what is expected of you. This will include things like being prepared to wash your own kit, bringing your own labelled water bottle and being aware of changes to meet-up times.
 - Practise good hygiene. Wash your hands regularly and before, during and after a game.
 - Where possible maintain social distancing. This won't always be possible in a competitive match environment (for example when tackling an opponent) and that is acceptable. However, before, and after a game you should maintain social distancing.
- Support NHS Test and Trace. You're likely to be asked to provide your details so that in the event of a Covid-19 outbreak those potentially infected can be traced. This is to everyone's benefit so please co-operate.
- Do not spit. Spitting and the rinsing out of mouths is now a recognised risk to health and must not be done. Avoid shouting or raising your voice if face to face with other players.
- After the game. Be aware that other users may be waiting to use the facilities. Changing rooms and showers are likely to be closed and any socialising must follow the Government's guidance on social distancing
