# FROM THE EDITOR



#### **DUCKWORTH-LEWIS IN ACTION**

Rather than my usual thoughts and observations appearing in this edition, given the rain ruined month we have all endured I hoped it would be more helpful to devote space to the subject of Duckworth-Lewis. The Cheshire Cup has been bad-

ly affected by weather interruptions and, having scored one such game myself last week, I was struck by the differing responses and reactions to the thought of D/L coming into use in the game. So here's a quick summary with some of the key points, as well as examples (and a rationale) behind it all. No-one would be happier than me if all of this turns out to be not needed for the rest of the season!

Duckworth-Lewis (D/L) uses both a par score and a target score. The target score will not change once set, unless there is a further stoppage and loss of overs in the chasing team's innings. The par score will change at the fall of each wicket and also the end of each over (except where the chasing side have lost a lot of wickets with a lot of overs remaining, but it's generally immaterial by that stage).

D/L is not perfect! Creators Frank Duckworth and Tony Lewis said this themselves, recognising from the outset that a 'perfect' solution could never be achieved. They described their creation as "the most equitable means of dealing with an inequitable situation" - namely, a weather-interrupted match which leads to an unequal split of overs between the two teams.

A D/L calculation is based upon the use of wickets and overs (also referred to as 'resources'). D/L makes a statistical assessment of how each side has used their resources at the point of any interruption and sets a target based upon this assessment. D/L will also calculate where the side batting first has had their innings cut short and then terminated.

## EXAMPLE: WALLASEY v NESTON, CHESHIRE CUP, 23.5.21 NESTON 268 (40 os), ABANDONED

In this match there was no further play possible after the first innings. Neston made 268 from 39.5 overs. Under competition regs, Wallasey had to face a minimum of 10 overs for a result. Had this been possible, their D/L target off 10 overs would have been 97, almost 10 an over. Neston scored at a rate of 6.7, so why is D/L so much higher?

Firstly, D/L assesses the use the batting side made of their resources, and I think all would agree that 268 off 40 overs (less one ball) is an impressive total, so in this instance D/L has taken account of an above average batting performance, which is perfectly reasonable. It is also assessing the fact that the chasing side know they only have 10 overs, and will thus pace their batting accordingly, possibly altering their batting order knowing they have 60 balls to score 97 runs. Bowlers will be restricted to two overs each – possibly one over spells for some bowlers, which is not easy to adjust to – and likely bowling with a wet ball. There's also the first two overs of powerplay with only two fielders out.

A Wallasey supporter may say "they scored at 6.7 so why don't we have 6.7 as the target, say 68 off 10 instead?" It's because D/L recognises that sustaining a rate of 6.7 through 40 overs takes some doing - maintaining that rate for 10 overs, whilst not easy, is not as difficult as maintaining it for 40. Therefore a chase of 97 off 10, which is a challenge, gives both sides more of a sense of 'fairness' on the day - the chasing team are going to have to bat as well as their opponents, but if they can do it, the fielding side can have no complaints about the batting side's task being easier.

As stated above, no-one is claiming the above scenario is 'perfect' - it is simply a more equitable way of trying to resolve an unsatisfactory situation, being fair to both sides by reflecting what's happened in the match to date.

## EXAMPLE: CHESTER BH (187-8) BEAT DIDSBURY (105) BY 82 RUNS

A delayed start made this a 70 over game. Thankfully there were no further interruptions, although the threat of rain was rarely far away, so the 10 over equation was of great interest. Didsbury's par score at 10 overs was 36, if no wickets were lost, but sadly for them, Dids were 10-3 after 4 overs, at which point the par score (although not actually germane until 10 overs were bowled) was 45. By comparison, had Didsbury kept all their wickets intact after 4 overs, the par score would have been 13. A big difference - but all the D/L par score does is reflect the match situation. In this case, losing 3 wickets in the first 4 overs, while not necessarily ending a team's chances of winning, does deal them a major blow. As with an uninterrupted match, keeping wickets in hand and the run rate under control is the ideal way to chase - and keep on the right side of the D/L par.



# CCCL PREMIER LEAGUE



More gloom for Cheadle and OP on 22nd May as their cancelled clash meant both suffered their third successive blank Saturday, but thankfully elsewhere the Prem surfaced after two weeks almost completely underwater. Nantwich even got so lucky as to have a full 55 overs to bat against Timperley. Aneesh Kapil in particular made the most of a return to the middle with a fine 109 off 116 balls, but was almost half the final total of 219-9. However, it was soon evident this would be plenty as the accomplished Nantwich attack got to work, spinner Scott Wardley leading the way with 5-13 - including a hat-trick - and Kapil himself taking the last wicket to seal a thumping 126 run win. Didsbury have been delighted with new recruits Charles Lowen and Henry Charlton. and their knocks of 72 and 64 respectively helped Dids also post 219 in their 80 over game with Chester BH. The champions were indebted to captain Harry Killoran whose skillful 88 held things together, CBH finishing on 170-9 in a gripping game. It was equally tense on the Wirral as Hyde, without Jason Whittaker, dismissed Oxton for 155 in a 100 over match, Charlie Barnard taking 5-42 in an unbroken 15 over spell. Hyde's reply was unspectacular graft, 42 from Ad-

am Worrall the highest score, but absolutely the right approach on the day for the 25 pts. Neston had no such problems at Parkgate as they clattered the Toft attack for 237 in their 40 overs. Simon Stokes (104) and Luke Camden (63) adding 158 for the 3rd wkt. Toft drew solace from batting out only 6 down, Thomas Roe with an unbeaten 54. Sam Perry also enjoyed the day, his second ton of the season for AE and a quickfire 46 from Chris Sanders powering them to 218-5 from 40 overs at Beaconsfield Rd. Not for the first time in 2021, Widnes saw their innings fall away, this time losing 8-69 to be all out 131, Sanders tormenting them further with 4-40. However, May 29th saw Widnes break their duck with an improbable but well deserved away win at OP. the old firm of **Qamar Hafiz** (6-32) and Majid Majeed (4-23) causing havoc on a difficult day for all batsmen as OP were all out 103. Majeed then scored 23 priceless runs as the visitors inched to a 2 wkt victory. Timperley also enjoyed the sweet taste of success for the first time, and in some style too with a 74 run win over Neston. Solid contributions all the way through the order saw Timpers total 220-9, with 4 wkts

each for Chris Page (including the first ball of the inns) and Furgan Shafiq meaning the visitors were all out 146. Didsbury rounded off a great month with an extraordinary win at Oxton. Tim Hughes' superb 76 helped Dids to 116-2 after 30 overs but they were all out 13.5 overs later for 131, Chris Stenhouse and Damario Goodman causing a shuddering collapse. Nick Anderson then shook off his captain's contrariété with 6-25, this the lead act as Oxton (72) didn't last 23 overs. AE also enjoyed a brilliant win over Chester BH, who recovered from 50-6 to post 177, Jack Williams and Ashraf Qureshi adding 117 for the 7th. Sam Perry's 85 was a class apart as AE eased to a 6 wkt victory with almost 12 overs unused. Toft recorded the biggest win of the day, a fantastic performance from Andrew Jackson (8-22 and 28 runs) sealing a Booths Park boshing for Cheadle who were bowled out for 66 after the hosts had posted 223. The match at Hyde would probably not rank as one of the better games but visitors Nantwich cared not one jot as they garnered the 145 they needed to take away a 4 wkt win - and top spot in the table.

# **CCCL DIVISION ONE**



22nd May saw four games played, three of which were overs shortened, but depressingly for Marple and Sale, no Saturday cricket for a third straight week. Bowden Lane was just too wet. visitors Congleton also left frustrated, while Sale's shorter trip to Urmston was also not necessary. In the cricket that was played, it was a bee-autiful day as Bowdon, Bollington and Brooklands all claimed 25 points, the latter coming out on top in a low scoring scrap at Whitehall Rd after only managing 134 against Bramhall. Alex Edwards' patient 60 was the only prolonged resistance against Ryan Macciocchi, whose wonderful 8-49 put his side in with a great chance of victory. but not for the first time, AJ Hart girded his loins, returning 13-5-13-5 with Thomas Starkes' 4-24 polishing the visitors off for just 97. The other two Bs both romped to victory. Pat Ashling (105\*) and Ross Zelem (76) added 154 for Bowden's 2nd wkt as they raced to 204-2 in just 28 overs against Warrington. Matt Tully and Chris Ashling then took 7 wkts between them, the visitors only managing 115. Bolly were equally dominant with fomer and present captain putting on 177 for the 1st wkt, Calum Rowe's 130 coming off just 89 balls while Rick Hough's supporting 59 saw

the hosts rack up 217-2 in just 32 overs. Elliot Alston's defiant 49\* was the only thing to remotely cheer Davenham, accounting for 63% of their total as they folded in the 70s for the third time in four games, Jerome **Jones** taking 4-21. The result of the day came at Broad Lane, where the form book was well and truly shredded as visitors Macclesfield recorded a heartening 5 wkt win in their 80 over game. Grappenhall's powerful batting had a real off day, only two batsmen getting past 20 as youngsters Bradlev Porter and Miles Bradshaw took 5-40 in 19 overs between them. Macc's reply hit the buffers as they lost 3 wkts in one over, but Harrv Elms and John Birchall calmed things down, their unbroken stand of 52 for the 6th taking Macc to victory. May 29th saw Brooklands climb to the top of the table with a 45 run win at Macc, a 48 ball 70 from Kevin **Carroll** in stark contrast to everything around him. Rob Leach's fine bowling form then helped Brook to a stillhealthy win, although a recalcitrant last wkt psp of 74 between Rob Porter and Chris Moores made it an intriguing finalé. Bolly were jolly after they came out on top by 66 runs at Bowdon, especially Stuart Plant, whose amazing return of 9.1-6-8-8

will take some beating this season, blowing the hosts away for 115, the visitors workmanlike batting display earlier taking them to 181. 6-13 from Arthur Pennington gave Grappers their second win over Warrington in 2 days, 62 from Richard Green and 54 from Grant Hodnett the batting backbone in their 75 run win. Urmston rounded off a decent month with a 4 wkt win in a low scoring scrap at Bramhall, Harry Singh with 5 wkts and captain **Lewis Jackson** (35\*) seeing his side over the line. Despite a fine 70 (retired not out) from Andrew Hall, Marple's batting trend of falling away after good starts haunted then again at Sale, 103-2 turning into 140 all out. Tyrone Lawrence then added a 68-ball 71 to his earlier 4-25 as the hosts won by 7 wkts. **Simon** Prime (106\*) was the day's only centurion, carrying his bat as a 156 psp for the 2nd wkt with Muhamad Shahbaz Bashir (69) took Congleton to a king-size 232-4 against lowly visitors Davenham. Batting at eight, captain Ben Gough fought tooth and nail for 71 balls with 44\* but Jack Higginbotham's 6-20 was the star turn as Dav were all out 114.

Although Upton's 128-9 in their 49 overs on May 22nd was never likely to see the league strike rate records rewritten, it proved more than enough to win at the then leaders Alvanley in an improbably thrilling finish. Rich Battersby. whose strike rate in his 13\* was 40% higher than any of his team mates. claimed 6-29 in a remarkable spell. As good in its own way was Sophie Morris' 13-5-20-2 including the final Alvanley wicket off the last ball of the match as the hosts were dismissed for 97. It was far more clear cut at The Beets where 50s from Miraj Patel and Tom Scott took AOM to 208-9 and an 84 run win over Romiley, **Ed Faulkner** with another four wkts. A 74 over game proved possible at Barrow, where visitors Christleton won by 16 runs, Aamir Afzaal top scoring, running out Iroshan De Silva and taking a crucial wicket. Mobberley made it successive wins with an impressive 8 wkt win at Lindow, captain Matt Mountney with 5 wkts as the hosts were bowled out in under 29 overs for 118. There were no ifs but two Butts as Mobb replied. Hamza Butt with 59 adding 105 for the 2nd wkt with Osman Butt, who finished 39\*. The matches between

Georgians and Haslington, and Hale Barns and Stockport, were both cancelled, all these four teams suffering a third straight Saturday washout. May 29th meant it was a case of never mind the quality, feel the points at Cale Green where Stockport (67-6) got a precious win against lowly Barrow in a penurious struggle. In complete contrast, Romiley and Lindow played out a high scoring thriller at Birchvale Drive, the visitors' Robin Broom (80\*) sweeping aside (sorry) the early perils of 7-2 to help his team tally 233-9, 64 from Neil Holden (and a corpulent 27 extras) also major factors as were 4 wkt hauls for Brad Snape and Alex Barber, the latter then whacking 4 sixes in a 25 ball 40 to as Romiley, teetering on 151-7, made Lindow sweat, a last wkt stand of 24 cranking the tension high before Lindow wrapped up a thrilling 12 run win. Simon Gee's 51\* in a 3rd wkt stand of 80\* helped the visitors put last week's hiccup behind them, moving to second in the league behind Christleton, whose 195-7 was 53 too many for visitors AOM. Aamir Afzaal made it two nineties in the month, this time an ice-cream (that's a 99 for younger readers) as Joshua Jo**seph** made up for a rare modest batting performance with 4-29. A 7th wkt stand of 75 between Joseph Goodier and Tom Hackett lifted Haslington to 171 at Upton, a total worth a lot more, proven when Upton tumbled for 90, Jack Taylor with 5-28 as Matthew Smith's 17 was the highest individual total, Smith earlier taking 4 catches. A remarkable match at Brooks Drive saw Georgians last wkt pair Jordan Richards and James Locke add 69 to take SG to 144-9. Richards then bowled superbly, taking 5-12 as HB went from 80-3 to 104 all out. Umpire lan Wilson, standing in the game, told me "it epitomized 'what a great game cricket is' or 'it's a funny game', take your pick!"

After a bleak May, the 2nd XI Premier Division saw action in all 6 games on the 22nd, albeit reduced in most cases. The other winners were Toft, who won by 7 wkts against Neston, for whom Matt Brookes hit 69\*. Phil Raikes' 58 and 49\* from Ewan Williams saw Toft home with 5 overs unused. AE won a thrilling match against Marple in the last over, while 50\* from Mark Latham helped OP beat Cheadle by 6 wkts. Didsbury 2s had the better of their draw at CBH (Max Fisher 82, dad Marcus 57) while Macclesfield held on for an exciting draw with Nantwich in an 80 overs game. On the sunny Sat 29th, CBH returned to the top of the table thanks to 5-32 from Alex Townend as AE were all out 99. 71\* from David Hurst saw Neston go second, one of five other clubs past 100 pts, as they beat Macc. 5-27 from Nantwich's Phil Marsh saw them make short work of Hyde who were 64 all out, the Dabbers winning without undue alarm. The other two sides in the chasing pack played out a very one sided affair at Wilmslow Rd as Bowdon, without Hal Dwobeng (on England lacrosse duty) suffered an 8
