# FROM THE EDITOR



Well that's been much more like it - bright blue skies, heat, warmth and a general lifting of spirits as cricket has made up for lost time with some fabulous games. The crowds being allowed to return to professional cricket have all helped to bring a welcome feel of 'normality' back to life although of course, the challenge of remaining Covid-aware and our grounds being as Covid-secure as possible is imperative. Covid is not going away and despite the encouragements for all clubs of seeing bars and hospitality areas, and more latterly changing rooms, in use, we are never far away from much of this being reversed - so please, do your

bit, especially with sanitising hands. A couple of other things have caught my attention recently. Firstly, fines. So far this season there has been over £400 levied for infringements of clearly laid-down procedures. One club has been fined 5 times for failing to return umpires marks, and there are numerous other repeat 'offenders' that seem to have a somewhat cavalier attitude to the subs they collect (either that or the captains don't mind picking up the tab). The failure to return umpire marks is the main reason clubs get fined, along with incomplete or late submissions of match details on Play Cricket. It's my belief that the majority of 1st XI matches are being scored electronically by at least one scorer so it's a mystery why results and details are sometimes delayed. And for those clubs who still feel wary of using technology to score games, please get in touch - there really is no need to be concerned. One of my more worthwhile contributions to the game has involved being part of a group of scorers who

helped to get both PCSP and PCS developed and refined and it really is amazing how far both of these programmes have come, and that they have always been free to use! Secondly, I have had sight of the Fair Play table and it makes for encouraging reading, with Cheadle, Toft, Bollington, Marple, Alvanley and Hale Barns all with a good '4' rating (4 being the standard aimed for) and another 13 clubs at 3.9 or higher. There will be more on this in future editions of the newsletter. For now, I hope you enjoy reading about what's been happening in the last fortnight - it's been busy, with so many cup games being fitted in around league schedules, representative cricket, junior matches etc. Enjoy your involvement and make a difference at your club just as you are able.

# PLAY CRICKET REGISTRATIONS

All clubs are advised to read and heed the following message received from the League Play Cricket administrator, Darren Sutcliffe:

Please can all clubs note: being so far into the season, it is no longer acceptable to be putting in registration requests on a Friday.

With immediate effect the cut off for registrations is

Thursday at 6.00pm

and therefore any registration requests sent after will not be processed until the following week. This in turn means any player who registers after 6.00pm on a Thursday to play on the Saturday or Sunday will remain unregistered, and thus deemed ineligible if he or she plays - meaning the game could be awarded to the opposition.

All clubs should make captains and potential new players aware.



# CCCL PREMIER LEAGUE



Heat and glorious blue skies returned on 5th June as a number of couponbusting results gave the Prem a wideopen feel. Didsbury went top for the first time in their history after a startling 86 run demolition of Alderley Edge. Just as in their T20 defeat two days earlier, the Dids batting again promised more than it delivered, but their 177 proved to be more than adequate as Liam Booth's 6 wkt haul saw AE slump from 33-2 to 43-7, and finally folding for just 91. Equally startling on the day was Nantwich's huge 129 run loss at home to Oxton, whose 198-8 was respectable without being formidable, but Chris Stenhouse (6-28) and Jack Corran swept Oxton to an astonishing win, only skipper Ray Doyle making double figures as the hosts couldn't recover from being 10-4. OP's confidence wasn't affected by losing to the bottom club the week before, as they made it successive defeats for Chester BH. OP got to 179 after being 136-7 before the 4 man OP attack then shared the heavy lifting, dismissing a dogged CBH for 159 after they were 55-5. Cheadle shrugged off their 66 all out the previous week to beat Timperley by a handsome 70 runs. With his second 85 in two inns. Subhaan Mahmood put on 143 for the 1st wkt with Elliott Bullock (54) as Cheadle

totalled 217 for the second time this season. Chris McCarthy's 63 helped rescue Timpers from 14-3 but they went bottom as a consequence of losing and of the other results. Taking 64 off their last 5 overs, Widnes powered to 285-8 at home to Toft (Ali Chugtai 75) Toft replying with 269-8, Andrew Jackson continuing his great form with 86\* off 60 balls. Another high scoring game had an even closer finish, as Hyde were given 60 overs to chase Neston's 275-4 dec. Captain Simon Stokes' second ton of the season saw him add 159 for the 3rd wkt with Will Evans (92) and 99 for the 4th with Dane Williams (50\*). Hyde gave it a real go and needed 12 off the last over which proved just out of reach in a fantastic finale. On 12 June an amazing match at Booths Park saw hosts Toft beat CBH by 1 run. The last 4 Toft wkts added 84 and used their overs as they totalled 236-9, before a dramatic start to the CBH reply saw them 10-3. Alex Money (80) and Harry Killoran (75) then added a brilliant 159 for the 4th, before CBH lost 4 wkts for 1 run in 16 balls. Tom Wyatt (39\*) led another revival, with CBH requiring 3 off the last over with 1 wkt left. After Andrew Jackson bowled 5 dots, last man George McCormick was run out going for 2 off the last for the tie, in a pulsating climax. Most of the other games lacked this drama, especially the battle of the early top two at Whitehouse Lane which went emphatically Nantwich's way as Aneesh Kapil (124\*) and **Chris Simpson** (56\*) took them to 195-0 in 36 overs and a 10 wkt hammering of Didsbury. James Duffy's 52\* was the feature of another one-sided game as Hyde bowled Cheadle out for 88 and won by 8 wkts. Oxton's last 4 wkts added 95 but Simon Stokes (93\*) and Dane Williams (45\*) added an unbeaten 121 to give Neston a 6 wkt win. OP went third with a 6 wkt win over AE, Ben Gibbon taking 5-31 and **Michael Robinson** hitting 67\*. After an opening psp of 168 (Furgan Shafig 94, Abishek Kulkarni 75). Widnes did well to restrict Timperley to 263 in the clash of the bottom two. 82 from Luke McCoy helped get Widnes to 222-4 after 44 but Timpers fought back to bowl Widnes out for 248, Shafig's 5-52 rounding off a M-o-M display to give Timpers a much needed 25 pts.

Brooklands were able to enjoy an extended sunbathing session on 5th June after their thrashing of Warrington took 33 overs to complete. AJ Hart's 6-31 and 3 more for Rob Leach saw Warrington dismissed for a measly 54, the unsurprising 10 wkt win sending Brooklands top of the division. Bollington were detained slightly longer but not really extended in their 6 wkt win over Congleton, who lost 9-43 to tumble to 107 all out. Harri Dickinson top scored with 41 as Bolly stayed second. The other shorter fixture was perhaps the least surprising as Davenham's woes showed no signs of easing, James Dodds' 5-19 the big factor in their dismissal for 106. The in-form Tyrone Lawrence hit 56\* to complete a comfortable Sale win. In contrast, there was a fabulous 100 overs of cricket at a glorious Broad Lane as visitors Bowdon racked up 289-7, Ross Zelem's brilliant run-a-ball 103 (his second ton of 2021) and 92 from Pat **Ashling** the main contributors as they added 140 for the 2nd wkt. Grappers' pair Peter Barnes (62) and Grant Hodnett (agonisingly run out for 99) added 111 for the 3rd wkt as the hosts gave the massive run chase a real go, ending on 258-8. Urmston's quiet but encouraging progress continued as they made it three wins out of their last four

with a 6 wkt victory over Macclesfield, young Arav Shetty the star turn with 72 and 2-36 as Jack Mattson's 69 was top score in Macc's modest 168-7. Another young Urmston talent Harry Singh joined Shetty in a 2nd wkt stand of 70 as the hosts won with 8 overs unused. The sun finally shone both literally and figuratively at Bowden Lane as Marple recorded a first league win of 2021, a hugely relieving 5 wkt triumph over struggling Bramhall. From 69-6 the visitors did relatively well to total 136, with 4 wkts each for Jack Grundy and Joe Cash. Mark Bennett then hit 57 as the hosts only needed 32 overs to knock off the runs. June 12th saw first play third in a thrilling match as leaders Brooklands won at Bowdon by 1 run. Chris Hart (41) and Joe Gill (24\*) added 61 for the 9th to take Brooklands to 151, but Pat Ashling's 50 steered Bowdon to 94-4 and with 7 extra overs to bat. all seemed set fair for the hosts. but they stumbled to 129-8 before James Bottomley and Chris Ashling added 20 amidst growing tension, Chris falling in the 51st over, bowled by Gill in an unforgettable finish. In complete contrast Warrington had another entirely forgettable Saturday, this time dispatched for just 48 at high flying Urmston and losing by an eyewatering 178 runs after Lewis Jackson's superb 106\* had powered the home side to 226-5. Calum Rowe hit 88 in Bollington's 215-7 as they had Grappenhall by the short and curlies at Broad Lane, the hosts 96-7 at one stage and grateful for lower order forza to see them to safety at 179-8. Macclesfield and Marple also drew at Victoria Rd. the hosts needing their last pair to survive 10 balls for sanctuary on 188-9. Earlier Mark Makin (67) and Max Fitzgerald (64) had taken Marple to 212. Sale's good batting form continued as they racked up 248-5 at home to Congleton, Dan Newton 61\* and then 3-30 as the visitors replied with 209-8, Tom Leese with 61 for them. Bramhall recorded their first win since April 24 when they hosted Davenham, whose 184 was far and away their best batting effort of the season. Bramhall had to work into the 49th over to reach their target 6 wkts down, the 30 extras conceded by the visitors costing them dearly.

There was joy and jubilation for Barrow on June 5th as they finally recorded a league victory, and it was a surprisingly comfortable win too, beating Hale Barns by 6 wkts. HB collapsed from 95-4 to 114 all out as Sultan Raja, Ryan Holloway and Iroshan de Silva all took 3 wkts, Iroshan also with a run out before Macca Hooton's 45 provided the base for 25 pts. Their good news meant more gloom for Stockport, who lost at Ashton OM despite posting a spirited 199-9, captain Zafar Jatoi just falling short of three figures while Zaheer Khan took 5-61. Ed Faulkner then starred again with the bat, his 98 coming out of 143 whilst batting, before Akash Patel and James Marshall put on an unbroken 62 to secure the win. The top two sides before play started met at Upcast Lane, hosts Lindow indebted to Robin Broom, whose magnificent 108\* off 103 bs, and unbroken psp of 123 with Daniel Osborne for the 6th wkt, helped them to overtake Christleton's 205-9, for whom Max Dunvaband top scored with 61, the 32 extras Lindow conceded not proving as costly as they might. The tightest finish of the day came at Clay Lane, where hosts Haslington needed a last wkt psp of 9 to help them scramble past Mobberley's 164. Despite a determined 78 from Osman Butt. Mobb's total didn't look especially imposing at halfway but

when Haslington slumped to 92-6 it seemed more than enough. However, Tom Gledhill (who earlier took 4-45) scored 21 at no.8 and as no.7 Tom Hackett dug in, the hosts just did enough. Alvanley's Michael Rowlands' 86 was over half their total when they entertained Romiley, who left with 25 points after James Badrock (44\*) made the highest of a number of handy contributions. Upton aren't often involved in the highest scoring match of the day, but it was to be an unforgettable trip to Flowery Field for them as they chased down a daunting 221-7 set by Stockport Georgians and in particular Francis Yates, the youngster in fine form with a brilliant 112 off 122 bs. However, after an opening stand of 85, five 6s from Matthew Smith in his 71 helped propel the visitors to 225 -5 with 8 balls remaining. June 12th saw Lindow power to the top of the table after 6-46 from skipper Alex Matthews and a rasping 107\* out of 152-2 from opener Rob Herriott helped them overcome basement club Stockport. Alvanley made equally (and surprisingly) short work of Christleton in a top of the table encounter at Little Heath, winning by 7 wkts after bowling the hosts

out for just 84, Chris & Steve Charles taking 7-48 between them. A fascinating encounter at Brooks Drive saw Ashton OM make it three wins out of their last four with a 5 wkt win over Hale Barns. A psp of 106 for the 4th wkt between Christian **Dodson** and **James Guest** lifted the hosts after an uncertain start, and when AOM slumped to 23-4, the target of 196 looked a long way off. However, a brilliant stand of 162 for the 5th wkt between Miraj Patel (78) and Mike Roberts (78\*) decided the outcome. Amidst growing tension, an unbroken last wkt stand of 28 gave Georgians a precious win at Barrow in a low scoring imbroglio after 5-33 from **Simon** Normanton had seen the hosts bowled out for 106. Mobberley came good again with a 7 wkt win over Upton but the final word must go to Romiley, in touch at the top after their 115 run win over Haslington, and in particular Ans Rashid Muhammmad, whose spectacular 175 (incl. 122 in boundaries) was the finest innings all those present could recall seeing.

Hal Dwobeng (69 off 40) and James McDougall (66 off 41) put on 109 for the second Bowdon wkt as the hosts posted a total which proved well out of reach of Brooklands, although the 25 extras conceded by Bowdon (making it 46 in the match) narrowed the margin of victory.

Ian Gill's 39\* kept Neston in touch, but with two needed off the last ball Paul Stimson was run out leaving the scores tied. Neston took 7 off their super over, and amidst terrific tension, Chris Hackett kept CBH in check, both clubs enthusing online after the match about the wonderful spectacle it had turned out to be.

Heatons Sports Club: STOCKPORT GEORGIANS (138-7) beat Heaton Mersey (137-8) by 3 wkts After Mersey had taken 12 off their final over, Fahad Bashir hit 53 off 34 for Georgians, who scrambled a bye off the last ball to get the 8 required off the 20th over for victory.

Bowden Lane: ROMILEY (123-5) beat Marple (120-8) by 5 wkts

The visitors kept the required rate under control throughout their reply to ease into the quarter finals.

June 8th: Dane Rd: SALE (160-5) beat Timperley (131-9) by 29 runs

64 from Robert Grant and 33 from Mike Bishop set Sale up for a strong total. Timperley's Matt Fletcher top scored with 32 off 19, having earlier taken three wkts, but the visitors were never really within range.

Upcast Lane: TOFT (181-8) beat Lindow (139-7) by 42 runs

52 off 34 from Phil Raikes, on top of a rapid Drummond/Stubbs opening psp, set Toft well on their way, with Lindow struggling for impetus throughout their reply. Toft sportingly made a game of it by donating 37 extras.

#### 3RD XI T20 JACK GARDNER TROPHY

**Grappenhall** and **Macclesfield** will join re-instated **Bramhall** at Finals Day after both clubs won nail-biting quarter finals against Elworth and Timperley respectively. **Macc** beat **Elworth** off the penultimate ball of their match on June 8th. The extras column (55 in total) proved decisive, the 36 Macc conceded in the Elworth total of 125-7 almost proving terminal. As it was, **Macc** just managed to keep the run rate manageable, holding off a fine effort by Elworth in the field. On June 10th, despite 53 from Richard Holden, **Grappenhall** were 106-7 after 12.3 chasing **Timpers'** 151-5 and looking out for the count, but no.9 Stanley Pennington hit 34 off 24 in a feisty riposte, helping **Grappers** to squeeze through nine down with 2 balls remaining in a breathless finish. **Hyde** host **Didsbury** at Werneth Low on Tuesday 15th in a meeting of the current holders and 2019 runners-up to determine the final qualifier.



Nestons's long and presumably hot and sweaty trip across to Hyde on June 6th was well worth it as they went top of the 2nd XI Premier Division with a convincing 7 wkt win. Harry Donelan took 5-29 as Hyde's lower order battled to get them from 66-6 to 141, Neston easing to victorv thanks to Cameron Lea-Swain's fantastic 92\* (91 bs). They followed this up with an emphatic 10 wkt win at Bowdon on June 13th. Likewise, second place Didsbury 2s enjoyed comfortable back-to-back wins, at Alderley Edge and then swamping a weakened Nantwich by 173 runs. 83 from Scott Craig and 50\* from David Blackburn saw Toft hammer Marple by 9 wkts with 20 overs in hand on Jun 6, and Pete Talbot's 5-39 meant they followed this up with an impressive 8 wkt win over CBH who the week before had clung on at 197-9 to draw with OP. CBH reached 91-1 chasing 239 before the OP spinners got to work as the match reached a tense finale. The shortest game on the 6th occurred at Victoria Rd, where Macc's paltry 43 was only achieved by the last pair almost trebling their total, Alex Read (4-8) and Mark Hampson (3-10) the main reason Macc were, quite incredibly, 15-9. Cheadle were on their way home with 25 points after just 44.1 overs of cricket. However, they were left frustrated despite **Ben Samuels'** 89 on Saturday as lowly Hyde got a first win of the season at Kingsway, knocking off

186 to win by 3 wkts.

In 2nd XI Div 1, Oxton are already 54 pts clear. They were held in a high scoring game by Grappenhall (259-6 vs 200-8) on June 6, but came out on top in another run spree at Brooklands. A week after hitting 107 in their win over Warrington, Ben Cunliffe hit 103\* as the hosts declared at 251-4, but Jack Breheny hit 124 as Oxton won with 10 overs in hand. Meantime Grappers stayed second after a 7 wkt win at Georgians on the 13th. Ben Landels finished 98\* in Lindow's 238-8 on the 13th but Warrington's dreary negation in crawling to 134-6 kept them locked with the other strugglers, they being Davenham and Upton, both of whom have been well beaten by upwardly mobile Sale in the last fortnight. Heaton Mersey are another team also looking upwards with successive wins by 61 runs at Romiley on the 6th and by a whacking 110 runs on Sat at home to Timperley, who the week before were involved in an extraordinary match with Lindow, for whom Jamie Peel scored 95 as they totalled 237-7 at Timpers. The hosts raced past the post in under 35 overs thanks to an incredible innings of 165\* from 96 balls, including 29(!) fours and 3 sixes, by Shahnawaz Khan which was almost 70% of his side's 240-3. Khan was called into the 1st XI T20 side as a result.

On June 6th Jonathan Cowan took 6-32 as Widnes won at Bramhall and stayed top of 2nd XI Div 2, after the 2nd v 3rd clash ended in a tense draw. Urmston's lower order taking their side from 32-6 to 157-9 and safety against Didsbury 2A. Mike Hunter (101\*) and Sanjeev Bhatia (84) added 129 for the second Hale Barns wkt as they beat Upton. Ashton OM are the other side past 100 pts as they won at Tattenhall (Ryan Carey 5-23). Two Camerons, Mackinnon (75) and Smail (68) added 144 for the 4th wkt for Bollington at Congleton (the latter also taking 5-58) as the visitors won a thriller by 1 wkt. On June 13th, despite 109 from Shashwat Rusia and a large 2nd wkt psp, Widnes only totalled 200-9 against Didsbury 2A, who knocked the runs off in under 43 overs and went to the top of the table, holding a slender 4 pt lead over Urmston, who returned from their long trip out to Tattenhall with a 2 wkt win, despite Sean Reeves carrying his bat for 102 for the hosts. Alex Read scored 94 out of 162 for C.Hulme's and then took 5-26 as they bowled Bramhall out for 92 and Ryan Carey was at it again for AOM, a splendid 7-40 helping them to a 7 wkt win over HB. Upton conceded their game at Bollington and are thus last.

### CCCL 3RD XI

Newcomers **Romiley** are leading the way in the **Sunday Prem** with four wins from six in an impressive start. Toft and Sale have also enjoyed early season success and are in touch at the top. By contrast, champions Didsbury have won just once while Alderley Edge and Grappenhall have yet to claim 25 pts, although the latter two will be buoyed by making it through

to T20 finals day. North East Cheshire lead Div 1 with Marple & Compstall close behind. # KNOCKOUT STAGES

The mini-groups are now complete, after some dramatic games and impressive performances.
