# FROM THE EDITOR




As we get to the sharp end of the league season - which feels like it's come round very quickly, I must say - I have heard some speculation about the possibility of clubs manipulating Covid alerts to avoid playing games and just take the 7 points instead. I'm sure many other readers will have pondered such scenarios too. What clubs choose to do if faced with such a possibility is guesswork but our game needs all the help and positive approaches it can get. But, after discussing fair play in the last newsletter, one aspect of fair play that has become something of a bugbear of mine this year relates to slow play, especially in matches not regulated by appointed officials - which, lest we forget, is the majority of club cricket played in this country. Being involved with my club's (Didsbury) 3rd XI on Sundays this season has been tarnished by poor over rates in almost every league game played. Recently one of our opponents took 3hrs 4 mins in the field (and didn't even complete their 45 over allocation), another took 2 hrs 49 to bowl 40 overs, another just shy of 3 hours to bowl 44.4 overs, another 42.5 overs in 2 hrs 54. And there are other examples. I had it confirmed from another source that things are barely any better in Sunday Divs 1 & 2, with the added issue of sides sometimes posting 7 or 8 boundary fielders. On Saturdays, 1st XI cricket is well regulated and with teams of officials issuing reminders to captains at regular intervals during the game, and possible points deductions at stake, these sorts of issues are few and far between. But, like I say, go beneath 1st XI level and the way in which captains fail to take their obligations seriously in terms of the tempo of the game has significant implications for attracting and retaining players. I

have made suggestions about some possible ways in which these sorts of issues could be addressed and no doubt there are other ideas in the mix. But there has to be a pro-active approach to dealing with issues related to slow / unfair play because of the likely impact upon people choosing to play or be involved as officials, or not. One of the key concepts of The Hundred has been the strict 21/2 hour time limit on the match, and whether you are already a big fan of the tournament, or (like me) much less persuaded by it, I am all in favour of any innovations within a game which make sure it is played at a reasonable tempo.

I hope you enjoy the slightly extended format of this newsletter, encompassing the last three weeks of action. Plenty to look forward to in all the divisions as well as Cup Finals, T20 finals day in 2nd & 3rd XI, and Alderley Edge and Alvanley flying the flag for Cheshire in national competitions.

# INTERNATIONAL HONOURS FOR A CCCL VETERAN

After a terrific season for Lancashire over 50s, Urmston's Chris Turner received a call up to the England over 50's set up and enjoyed a couple of games at the fabulous and famous Marlborough College



ground, against UK India and then against Wales. "I was at the crease when we won the match but the captain was at the other end on 49\* so I thought it wise to let him get the winning runs!" Chris told the newsletter. "But I have been told the Wales match was a recog nised full international fixture so I hope to receive a cap at some point." After a hundred in his first inns for Lancs over 50s at Southport. and some 300 runs in 2021. Chris was thrilled to be involved with Eng land and is hoping for more later in the season. "I have made myself available and hope to get the call."



Time for all the officials to give themselves a little work out with three scenarios. Based along the lines of the excellent MCC laws of cricket app, there are three different types of question, starting with a more simple situation through to a more complex one. I will look forward to receiving your comments and will publish the answers in the next edition!

### UMPIRING AND SCORING - BEGINNER

The batting side have their opening bat still in, along with their number 11, and are battling to save the match. Off the last ball of the penultimate over the opener hits a fair ball along the ground towards the boundary, but the ball stops rolling and does not touch the boundary rope. The batsmen cross for an easy single. Seeing this, a fielder kicks the ball over the boundary in order to keep the opener off strike for the start of the last over.



UMPIRES - how many runs are scored here, what do you signal to the scorers, and who is on strike for the start of the last over? Is any other action appropriate?

Scorers - how many runs have been scored, how are they recorded, and what signals should you receive?

### UMPIRING AND SCORING - INTERMEDIATE

It's a T20 match. From the final ball of the game, the batting side need one to tie and two to win. The bowler bowls a fair delivery which the batsman misses, as does the keeper, who is standing up to the stumps. The batsmen complete one run and start on a second when a fielder gathers and throws the ball to the keeper, who is standing on the pitch to one side of the stumps. The batsman is running full tilt to make his ground and violently shoves the keeper over before grounding his bat. In so doing the keeper's helmet comes off and the throw from the fielder strikes it, at which point the batting side ask for five penalty runs. The batsman claims the keeper was obstructing him. The wicketkeeper claims he was obstructed by the batsman shoving him. The umpires come together and agree the batsman's actions constitute a level 2 offence.

UMPIRES - which laws would you refer to, to deal with this situation, and what is the result of the match? Scores - how many runs have been scored, how are they recorded, and what is the result of the match?

### UMPIRING AND SCORING - ADVANCED

It's a CCCL 1st XI match. Skies are darkening and rain is in the air. Having collapsed, the batting side are in danger of defeat, and lose their eighth wicket, at which point the bowlers' end umpire calls 'time' and the scheduled drinks break takes place. The new batsman waits on the pavilion steps and does not step over the boundary rope. As the fielders and umpires move back into position, an umpire asks the new batsman to come onto the field. The batsman replies "I am waiting for you to call 'play', because from that point I can wait another two minutes here and then come on, as long as I am taking guard within three minutes of the previous wicket falling I cannot be out, and it might start raining before then."

UMPIRES - how would you deal with this situation, and what laws would you cite in so doing?

Scorers - when would you record the new batsman's innings as commencing, and how would you justify your decision according to the laws?



# CCCL PREMIER LEAGUE



### 17 July

Leaders Nantwich and second place Didsbury turned up the heat on the rest of the Premier Division, both with dominant wins on a baking hot day. Any euphoria Alderley Edge were feeling after their T20 cup triumph was quickly dispelled in a collective batting seizure at Whitehouse Lane, Iosing their last 4 wkts without any addition to the total and all out 86, the Dabbers coasting home by 9 wkts, AE zero pts. After recent batting problems of their own, Timperley opted to field first at Didsbury and had 44 overs in the hot sun before taking a wkt, running out Henry Charlton five short of his ton. Charlton and Marcus Fisher (105), a makeshift opening pair, put on 187 for the 1st wkt. Timpers, at one stage 82-1, finished 165 all out. Oulton Park lost ground in third after a real arm-wrestle of a draw at Oxton. The hosts' 188-5 seemed some way short, especially after Jimmy Sullivan (42 off 127) and **Danny Leech** (71) put on 106 in 32 overs for OP's first, but Oxton fielded and bowled brilliantly, and a spell of four wkts in 5 overs towards the end left OP clinging on at 181-9. A magnificent third wkt stand of 182 beween Alex Money (133\*) and Harry Killoran (105) took CBH to a skyscraper 342-3 at Neston, who had 57 overs to survive and did so just - at 213-9. A gripping game at Hyde saw the hosts claim a precious 25 pts after a 2 wkt win over Toft in a match marked by middle order recoveries. Toft were again indebted to Andrew Jackson and James Scott as they recovered from 94-5 to post 191-9, both then in action with the ball as Hyde were quickly 17-3. A superb 92 from Adam Worrall and 39 from Cole Turner helped Hyde upto 163-6 before a crucial 9th wkt stand of 30 got them over the line. Widnes' good run continued, moving into mid-table with a third win in five, Aaron Soni taking 5 -11 as Cheadle went from 39-0 to 55-7 and eventually 99 all out. The hosts fought hard with the ball and the

chase was far from straightforward, **Majid Majeed** the Widnes hero with 44\*.

### 24/25 July

Some fabulous feats of run scoring, and big partnerships, were the features of the weekend. Neston's Simon Stokes took the individual honours with two tons in two days. On the 24th, his 108 helped Neston to a sizeable looking 271-8 against AE, who coming off the back of a debacle the week previous, powered to a famous win by 8 wkts. Sam Perry's 2021 gets better and better, a magnificent 151\* (153 bs, 4x6, 15 x4) taking him past 1000 runs for the season in all comps. He and Tom Foreman (97) added a wonderful 233 for the 2nd wkt as the target was reached with almost 10 overs unuse. Neston then played Cheadle the following day and **Stokes** was at it again, a brilliant 131 off 135 as he added 183 for the 3rd with Dane Williams (67\*), Neston piling up 285-3. Cheadle were quickly 1-2 but Josh Dooler (69) and James Clift (87) led the fightback, a fantastic effort by the visitors seeing them bowled out for 275 off the penultimate ball of the match. It was Cheadle's second defeat of the weekend after going down by 5 wkts against CBH the day before and although they remain bottom they are still in touch with the sides above them. One of those, Timperley, got a morale boosting 25 pts against Hyde, who just cannot string wins together and remain in some trouble. 90 from Furgan Shafiq was the main-

stay of Timpers' 5 wkt win, although Ben Balderson (30\*) and Charlie Barnard (48) added 75 for the last wkt as Hyde recovered from 95-8 to total 193. Differing fortunes for the leaders, Nantwich pulling clear after a scrambled 3 wkt win in a penurious struggle at OP, Phil Stockton's 6-43 and 4 wkts from Olly Griffiths (and 23\*) doing the business, but Didsbury lost by 49 runs at Widnes, for whom Majid Majeed scored 90 and took 4-36 in a terrific personal display, a late flourish from James Green (70\*) to no avail. Meanwhile, 80s from Jonny Crick and Matt Jones, and 6-38 from Damario Goodman, helped Oxton dole out a 123 boshing of Toft and claim a much needed 25 pts.

### 31 July

The sides in the bottom half all fought hard but couldn't force wins as July came to a close. Cheadle defended 182 with real vigour against AE, who had 57 overs to chase but were left holding on as Katie Haszeldine, on her 1st XI debut, played out two maiden overs, including the last of the match, AE finishing 155-9. Oxton made it successive wins as they won an excellent game against Timperley by 15 runs. Grant Hughes top scored with 66 for Oxton, who had Timpers 20-3 in reply, only for a strong fightback led by Ed Galley (64) and Jake Sandham (51) which helped take Timpers very close. Widnes concluded a great month for them with a fantastic chase of 271 to record a memorable win over CBH, for whom Atif Qureshi (106) and Jack Williams (86) added 171 for the 5th wkt, CBH giving Widnes two extra overs. An unbeaten 83\* from Majid Majeed then anchored Widnes' reply as they reached their target in the 56th over. Leaders Nantwich beat Toft by 56 runs

in a match in which no batsman passed 50 and the Dabbers themselves just reached 200, while second placed Didsbury kept up the pressure with a tight 15 run win over Hyde. 60s from **Henry Charlton** and **Nick Anderson** (who is unable to bowl at present) helped Dids recover from 46-4 to post 234-7. **Charlie Barnard** and **Dave Fitzsimmons** took Hyde to 158-3 in the 44th before the returning **Matt Gregson's** 3 wkts

helped Didsbury regain control, Gregson's haul including the last of the match as Hyde carelessly eschewed a batting point. Three half centuries helped third place Oulton Park to 246-6 and a roomy 104 run win over Neston, Ben Gibbon (5-39) and Andrew Dufty (6.5-3-6-3) the pick of the OP attack. It's been a poor run for the Parkgate club who have won just one of their last seven and now have a weather eye on the foot of the table.

# CCCL DIVISION ONE



### 17/18 July

Only three matches were played on a glorious Saturday afternoon, with the impact of Covid still being felt. It was Bramhall who benefitted the most, playing through two days of very hot weather to record successive wins and give themselves a real lift after an inconsistent campaign to date, first by bowling Warrington out for just 98 and knocking the runs off in 22 overs, Greg Dixon 50. Then on Sunday, a more demanding chase in their rearranged game with Macclesfield. Played at Bollington, Bramhall won by 5 wkts, more runs for Dixon (67) and a stylish 62 from Jack Bridgeman helping them to 205-5 after Miles Bradshaw's 63\* and 54 from Rob Porter got Macc to 204-9. It was Macc's second match at Bollington in two days, having also lost there 24 hours earlier. Former Bolly favourite James Cross made 63 but spinners Toby Phipps and Stuart Plant shared 8 wkts between them as Macc were all out 182. 48 apiece from captain Calum Rowe and James Longhorn helped Bolly to their target and still top of the pile. Contenders Bowdon, Brooklands and Grappenhall all had no game, but Urmston lost a little ground on the chasing pack despite a high scoring draw with visitors Marple, who put behind them a succession of disappointing batting displays with a splendid 279-6, superb centuries for captain Albert Hall (103) and Mark Bennett (105) in a second wkt psp of 176 the main story. Without skipper Lewis Jackson, Urmston gave it a real go in reply, an opening stand of 90 between Harry Singh (47) and Arav Shetty (76) giving them a start and a quickfire 57 off 44 from Matt Kilcourse making it lively, but ultimately the chase fell short at 245-7. Marple holding their nerve and making Urmston's choice to field first rebound on them somewhat with only 7 pts to show for such a big batting effort. Marple remain second bottom but closed the gap with the 14 pts they

took away with them.

### 24/25 July

It was back down to earth for Bramhall who suffered a heavy defeat at home to Bowdon, who went top after a dominant display. Invited to bat, the visitors had 50 on the board within 5 overs and hit a total of 42 x 4 and 5 x 6 in a score of 283, Pat Ashling leading the way with 81 (74 bs). Bramhall, who lost Luke Littlewood to enforced absence and Greg Dixon to injury, were all out 206. Bollington stayed joint top after a losing draw at Marple. The hosts, 90-6 at one stage, posted 203-8 in their 50 and an excellent bowling effort then restricted Bolly to 193-8. Brooklands picked up 25 pts to keep them very much on the premises, an unbroken 6th wkt stand of 81 between captain Jack Bagshaw and AJ Hart at Congleton taking them over the line after Rob Leach had earlier returned 5-27. Sale recorded an excellent 47 run win over Grappenhall, Dan Newton with a run-a-ball 48 and 3 wkts, while Macclesfield also claimed a valuable 25 pts with a 3 wkt win over Warrington, for whom skipper Jonathan Fletcher hit 81 off 60 to set Macc 210. Fifties from John Birchall and Miles Bradshaw set them up and other useful contributions got Macc home with two deliveries remaining. Urmston kept up their promotion push with an easy 8 wkt win at Davenham who were bowled out for just 70, their fifth double figure innings of a miserable 2021. On the 25th, Congleton recovered from 84-4 to reach 217-7 and had Macc clinging on at 189-9 when the overs ran out.

### 31 July/1 Aug

Bowdon made it a perfect month with a tense 8 run win over Macclesfield. An 80 over match, Bowdon made 166-8 before reducing Macc to 45-6, who recovered enough to reach 113 before the 9th wkt fell. At this point Jack Massey was joined by Chris Moores and together the pair inched towards the target before Massey was run out trying for a second with some six overs still in hand. It's fair to say that the rest of the Div 1 fare lacked anything like the same tension, although Congleton again failed to take the last wkt as they drew at Urmston. Congleton added 72 off their last 10 to total 195, before reducing the hosts to 21-4. Lewis Jackson (55) and **Sumit Panda** (71), who both had lives after catches were dropped, added 123 before Urmston fell to 164-9 by the time of the last over. In the event no.11 Sam Tootell didn't have to play at a single delivery despite 10 men round the bat. Bollington had an easy 7 wkt win over Warrington, who are now back in the relegation places, while Bramhall bucked up again with an excellent 4 wkt win at Grappenhall, who did well to make 135 having been 83-7. Stewart Jackson made a 114ball 34 before Olly Latter (a run a ball 39) secured a welcome 25 pts to keep alive promotion hopes. Brooklands took only two points from a disappointing loss to visitors Sale, who won by 5 wkts in a low scoring derby. Tyrone Lawrence continued his great 2021 with 5 wkts as Brooklands fell from 53-2 to 103 all out, before making 32, the top score of the game. Marple won the battle of the bottom two by 6 wkts over Davenham, who were 112-0 (Ben Gough 49, Mark Greaves 50) but ended up all out 178. An unbroken stand of 86 between Mark Bennett (64\*) and Conor Ramsay (40\*) then gave the hosts a first victory since June 5th and a 14 pt

gap to 11th place.

### 17 July

With leading sides Lindow and Alvanley's clash derailed by Covid. Romiley made the most of the situation with a 6 wkt win over neighbours Stockport. It was a good day for Badrock family members, brothers James and David each hitting 55\* as their unbroken partnership did the necessary. James had earlier taken 4 wkts in an impressive all-round display as Stockport fell away after a solid start and remained mired in the relegation spots. Barrow are also still there although their tense 19 run win over Upton boosted morale. Chasing 184, Upton reached 152-6 in reply, but the last four fell for just another 12 runs, 4 wkts for **Sultan Raja** a key element. There were hearteningly comprehensive wins for Stockport Georgians and Ashton-on-Mersey on a lovely afternoon, both sides shrugging off indifferent recent form. Georgians' massive 144 run win over high flying Christleton was perhaps the biggest surprise of the day, the visitors all out 91 as **James Locke** led the attack with 5-25. Earlier, a quickfire 46 from Neil Pennington helped get Georgians to a healthy 235-8. Ashton OM likewise had a three figure win, 82 from Miraj Patel and 56 from James Marshall taking AOM to 248-7 against Haslington, who tumbled from 96-4 to 138 all out and a 110 run loss. Mobberley's consistent inconsistency continued. this time in a good way with a thumping - and speedy - 8 wkt win over Hale Barns, who, thanks to Abdul Ageel's 7 wkt haul, could only manage 92.

### 24/25 July

Romiley soon had the scoreboard whizzing round as Ans Rashid Muhammad and Tom Rolph plundered 140 for the 1st wkt on their way to a 136 run win over Hale Barns, and top spot. Lindow had an equally profitable time with the bat, Jadan Jones making 97 as they declared on 269-9 and gave Haslington an extra eight overs to chase. At 96-7 Haslington hopes

were not high, but resolute stands led by **Tom Gledhill** (49\* off 103) helped them survive on 207-9. The Stockport bowling figures are not for those of a sensitive disposition but to their credit they had a good go in reply, Kyle Gavin hitting a splendid 95 off just 79 balls as Stockport made 221, their highest total of the season. Mobberley's 10 wkt hammering of Barrow took barely 40 overs, while AOM made it three wins out of four with a tense 4 wkt win over Upton. Alvanley got a first win in four with an unprepossessing 6 wkt victory over Georgians. On the Sunday, Christleton's batting returned to the ranks making 179-9 against Mobberley. The Mobb got themselves to 130-2 in the 35th but Arslan Dar and Aamir Afzaal turned the tables. Mobberley needing two off the last ball, their last man run out going for the win and a thrilling tie (and 16 pts each) the result.

### 31 July / 1 Aug

Four very close games in the division on the Saturday. Take your pick as to whether Alvanley's last pair putting on 19 to win with four balls to spare over Haslington is a tighter finish than AOM's 6 run win defending 101 against inconsistent Mobberley, but no doubt the two winning teams will both be checking their heart rates. No such dramas for leaders Romiley, Alex Hooton's 5 wkts and Andrew **Harrison's** 63\* the leading acts as bottom club Barrow fell even further from safety after a 7 wkt defeat. Stockport Georgians also made merry against struggling Stockport, Ben Jones scoring 114 and George Hardman then taking 6-52 in a 138 run derby day demolition which leaves the Cale Green side 59 points adrift of third bottom Upton and, like Barrow, needing a miracle. Lindow and Alvanley rearranged their Covid-postponed game for the Sunday, but with Alvanley involved in the National Village Cup, their makeshift 1st XI couldn't cope with a strong Lindow side and slid to 49 all out and a chasmic 199 run defeat. However, the main 1st XI won their q-f and are still in touch in third spot, with both sides facing leaders Romiley in successive weeks in August.

# CCCL 2ND XI



Didsbury 2s have been tightening their grip on the 2nd XI Premier Division after three straight wins left them with a 37 point advantage over second place Toft. Didsbury made short work of the two bottom sides. beating Macc by 5 wkts on July 17th and following that up with a 9 wkt triumph at home to Marple on the 24th, Mathew Laker 5-33 as the visitors could only manage 102. Dids then beat Hyde by 5 wkts on Saturday. Toft are still going well in second, but after beating Hyde on the 17th they were then involved in two thrillers, firstly a level scores draw at Bowdon on the 24th. The hosts declared after 48 overs on 232-6. Thomas Graham 77\*. Graham later took 2 wkts as Toft found themselves needing 10 off the last over and two off the last ball, but skipper Paul Ashley was restricted to a single. Toft then beat Nantwich by one wkt off the last ball of the match on Sat. Hyde themselves got a much needed win on the 24th, Jason Ebbrell 4-53 and 40 off 26 as they beat Macclesfield. That came a week after drawing with Chester BH, who played twice in two days to catch up after Covid postponements and drew both, a losing one at Neston where they were left hanging on at 192-9 chasing 237, and a winning one against Hyde in an 80 over game, CBH 192-9, Hyde 182-4 and presumably the more frustrated not to have won. CBH finally claimed 25 pts on Sat after beating Marple, who, like Macc (who lost to Bowdon on Sat) remain in the relegation spots but are still very much in touch with the other strugglers. Alderley Edge are one such, despite winning two in a row, including over third place Neston on the 24th, which renewed their hopes of survival, although a desperate draw against Cheadle on Sat gained them only 5 pts. After a 5 wkt defeat at Nantwich on the 24th, and then another loss at Neston on Sat Oulton Park slipped further down the table. They do, however, have games in hand and will hope latter getting a much needed to find dates and venues to play these.

Having confidently predicted Oxton's winning of the 2nd XI Div 1 title in the last edition, the runaway leaders have been pegged back somewhat by a Covid postponement, then just holding on to draw with visitors Romiley on the 24th, before losing by 21 runs to Timperley on Sat. It was a shame for the division that Oxton's Covid postponement was against second place Sale, who have moved to within 50 points after a crushing 10 wkt win at Grappenhall on the 24th, Viraj Sorathia (pictured below) 79\* and Joe Molloy 51\* in an unbroken 151 stand, although Sale were then frustrated by the last Brooklands pair on Sat in a tense draw, Sorathia again top scoring with 70. Prior to beating the leaders. Timperley had two centurions, and two big totals, in successive weeks, 126\* from Rob Matthews helping beat Georgians by 89 runs on the 17th. Aadam Hasan then hit 141 as Timpers racked up 291-7 at Warrington on the 24th, the hosts batting out for a draw and with work to do to get out of the bottom two spots. Like their 1st XI counterparts, Davenham are rooted to the foot of Div 1 and must hope for a huge upturn in their remaining games, after anither heavy defeat on Sat at the hands of Heaton Mersey, for whom Hassnain Shah took 6-13. Ben Bodha hit 100\* for Grappenhall in their 97 run win over Upton on the 17th, the



third win of the season with a three wkt win over Lindow on Sat.

In 2nd XI Div 2, leaders Didsbury 2A have opened up a bit of a gap to second place Widnes, the former with three straight wins. On the 17th (by 7 wkts over Bollington) and 24th (by 62 runs over Tattenhall, Dan Ward 6-33) things were pretty straightforward, but having skittled Hale Barns for a palsied 29 on Sat (extras top scoring) their 4 wkt win was nothing like as polished as it should have been. Widnes also won a low scoring scrap against Cheadle Hulme (59 all out), in complete contrast to an altogether more commanding 281-3 against Urmston on the 17th, Matt Burns (131) and Shashwat Rusia (72) putting on a large 1st wkt stand, matched by the visitors as Hamza Ahmed (55) and Josh Espley (94) set the visitors up for a decent crack at the target, ending on 250-8. Widnes then needed a chunky 8th wkt stand to see them to a 3 wkt win on the 24th over Bollington. Extras top scored in both innings as Congleton (134) beat Upton (55) on the 17th, on which day Ashton OM and Bramhall both had 10 wkt wins. AOM's Norman Ghous took 8-24 as they beat Cheadle Hulme, and then hit 57\* on Sat in their successful chase of 200 to beat Neston and stay third. Urmston's last pair put on 20 to take them to a nailbiting one wkt win at Congleton, while Bramhall's Tom Mason (91\*) and Rhys Mallard (57\*) raced to 149 in just 17.1 overs to conclude matters against Tattenhall on the 24th. Tattenhall lost again on Saturday and, along with Upton (who conceded their fixture with Bramhall) are getting further adrift in the bottom two spots.



A string of fascinating results has left the 3rd XI Premier Division intriguingly poised as the final weeks of the season, and 1.00pm starts, come into view. Romiley suffered only their second defeat of the season on Sun 25th, even more surprising given that they required just 85 from 60 overs to beat Georgians. Romiley could only manage 63, as Neil Pennington's 5-18 and James Tilley's 10-5-9-4 led to an astonishing SG win. Romiley were then reliant upon a blockade to avoid defeat at the hands of a resurgent Alderley Edge on Sunday, finishing on 145-8 after AE reached 234-5. AE beat Didsbury for the first time since their return to the Premier Division, on the 18th - with plenty to spare - but the reigning champions shook off their torpor to win their next two. First, a dramatic victory with two deliveries remaining, as Grappenhall collapsed from 99-1 to 140 all out to give Dids a 35 run win on the 25th, before a more convincing 6 wkt win over second place Sale on Sunday, a stand of 72 for the 4th wkt between **Enam Hoque** (60\*) and Hashir Khan (55) the crucial factor. Toft are top of the pile though, having put Grappers to the sword on the 18th, where Tom Maddocks and George Muirhead hit 104 apiece, putting on over 200 for the 1st wkt. Grappers replied with a creditable 214-8. Toft then had to cling on themselves the following week to draw at Hyde,

the last pair blocking out three overs, before a resounding 7 wkt win over Nantwich on Sunday gave them top spot. But it is the closest contest in many years, just 12 points separating Toft, Didsbury, Romiley & Sale, and games between the sides all coming up. With a finals day commitment, Didsbury's league campaign will probably be extended, as will Grappenhall's for the same reason, although after their humbling 38 all out at Hyde on Sunday - 4 wkts for 5 runs on debut for **Kathryn Axon** - they have got a job on. However, the foot of the table is as congested as the top, with Nantwich and Heaton Mersey both well within Grappers' range, HM's Gautam Narayanan hitting 127 in their chunky 246-4

against the Dabbers before Ali Raza's 6-30 helped HM to a whopping 154 run win. In Div 1, James Massey hit 109 on Sun as Marple & Compstall beat Bramhall by 92 runs and went top, two points clear of Timperley and four clear of Brooklands. Bredbury SM and Hale Barns are closest to the exit. In Div 2, Elworth's Joe Hodson hit 104 as they knocked off 231 to beat Lindow by 5 wkts (for whom Henry James hit 114) and go 10 pts clear at the top. Trafford Metrovicks have won all 13 of their games in Div 3 West and are the champions-elect, while Didsbury 5s, Prestbury & Haslington are all on 40 pts atop Div 3 Central & East.
