## FROM THE



I've had a few half-decent cricket related ideas in my time involved with umpiring and scoring. Some have unaccountably failed to gain any traction - for example, when scoring I have had more than enough problems of bowlers getting through overs too quickly, so I wanted it writing into the laws that all bowlers had to have a minimum 15 yard run up. Scorers everywhere would surely rejoice, but alas, the po-faced lawmakers were having none of it. What about different coloured helmets for each batsman depending on their position in the batting order, so that a no.1 batsman always had, say, a yellow helmet, a no. 2 burgundy,

etc. Bound to be a big hit with scorers as it makes our job that bit easier, and a boon for spectators too. On a more serious note, I did actually once put it to a senior member of the MCC Laws Committee that there was an omission in the laws that could potentially lead to the batting side being awarded penalty runs on numerous occasions in their innings. It's true, as well - and the omission is still there, and all batting sides, if only they knew the laws well enough, could regularly enquire of umpires for a penalty runs award! I shall reveal more in future newsletters (well, I have to think of ways to keep the circulation up!). But one innovation that is also well worthwhile - but would never cause the laws to be rewritten - is a change in player thinking regarding their own personal fortunes in a game and those of their team. When I'm scoring, it's a common enough thing to be asked "how many did I get?" or "how many balls did I face?". And that's fair enough I suppose. But I am trying to get more of the players at my own club to ask instead "how

many runs were added while I batted?" Imagine getting that as the default question! Because after all, that's what really matters in the context of a team game, isn't it? The team, and the total. I recently described partnerships as the bacon sandwiches of the game on our club website, and it's true - partnerships are the key to good totals, and winning (or saving) games. The Ben Stokes/Jack Leach Headingley Ashes Test is the most famous in a long line of examples of partnerships where one player heavily outscores the other, for examplebut it doesn't matter. This year already there have been many fantastic partnerships in 1st XI cricket, and probably others too, but the details aren't always available sadly. So why don't we encourage players to focus less on their individual stats and more on the impact their contribution has on the team performance? Just an idea!

# CCCL PREMIER LEAGUE



Nantwich shrugged off their Cheshire Cup disappointment with a second successive comfortable win on 19th June, this time bowling out a strong Neston side for just 113, Olly Griffiths and Mitchell Spencer taking 9-47 between them as they won by 7 wkts. The victory saw them open up a 20 point gap at the top after the battle between second and third ended in a thrilling draw at Wilmslow Rd. Michael Robinson led visitors OP's solid 248. but they gave an over to Didsbury, which looked to be of no consequence after Dids slumped to 96-5 (Ben Gibbon 5-54). Fred Kamstra (62) dug in and helped the hosts stabilise, adding 90 with skipper Nick Anderson (who had earlier taken 4-72) who went on to hit 4 sixes in his fine knock of 97 (98 bs). That extra over suddenly swung into view, Didsbury needing 9, but Anderson was bowled first ball and James Green was then caught off the last going for the 6 that would have won the match. Sam Perry hit a fabulous 133\*, his third ton of 2021 for AE, putting on 134 for the 1st wkt with Ed Foster (69) as their 291-5 proved way out of Toft's reach, who put up a dogged rearguard and got to the 53rd over before the tireless Chris Sanders claimed his 7th victim, the 41 extras conceded by AE of no account. It was also a day of elation for struggling Timperley who recorded a brilliant 5 wkt win at Chester BH. The hosts declared after 52 overs on 268-7 but Furgan Shafiq swept all before him with a magnificent 139 (136 bs), putting on 131 for the second wkt with Ed Galley (57) as Timpers reached their target in the 50th over, leaving the hosts to reflect on a fourth straight league loss. Widnes also claimed a heartening 25 pts after James McCoy's 91 helped them to a healthy 258-7 at home to Hyde, who were just 3 balls shy of safety when their last wkt fell, and all out 185. With Oxton defied by Cheadle's last pair in their drawn game at Kingsway, 18 pts separated 6 clubs at the foot of the Prem. The final Saturday of the month brought no relief to Cheadle's struggles, as they limped to 78 off a suffocating 46 overs at Nantwich, who to precisely no surprise made it three straight wins after just over an hours' batting. The Dabbers lead the Prem from Didsbury, who recorded a terrific win at Neston. The hosts were 143 -3 after 39 overs but 6-31 from Steve Green saw them all out 182. A nip-and-tuck reply, including 4

wkts for the recalled Harry Donlean, kept the game finely balanced until Dids' 8th wkt pair calmly added the 18 they needed for a 3 wkt win. OP, bottom of the May form guide, shot to the top (and third in the league) after an impressive June, although they were again frustrated to have a team 9 down, the Toft last pair surviving 16 deliveries in a gripping encounter at Booths Park. With a touch of inevitability, former Toft favourite Rob Sehmi hit a brilliant 117\*(105 balls) in OP's 243-6, Henry Hughes' 73 leading the Toft response which finished on 228-9. CBH got a much needed 25 pts to stop the rot with a 6 wkt win at Hyde. 3 early wkts for Luke Young and 5-63 from Jack Williams left CBH needing 153, which 55 from Alex Money helped them to surpass in the 30th over. Widnes were also rejoicing after winning by 22 runs at Oxton, leaving the hosts one of four clubs separated by 4 pts at the foot of the table. Timperley are among that number after being swept aside by AE on Sat, an opening stand of 92 between the prolific Sam Perry (72\* off 57) and Ed Foster setting up an 8 wkt win.

# **CCCL DIVISION ONE**



19th June saw Bollington top of the pile after their narrow 2 wkt win over Sale in a tense tussle at the BRG. The visitors' 151 didn't seem enough but they made early inroads into the Bolly batting and the game was in the balance throughout, with the hosts just doing enough. They came off the field no doubt as surprised as everyone to learn that Brooklands had been skittled for just 81 by Grappenhall, 3 wkts each for Sam Guest, Lewis Porter and lan Hall. Grappers did the necessary in under 18 overs. Another one sided match was unfolding at Booth St as Ashley West (8-22) became the second Bramhall bowler this season to take an 8-for, Congleton also totalling 81 as Jack Clark's rapid 53\* settled the result within 42 overs of play. Lowly Warrington got a much needed 61 run win at struggling Marple for whom **Andy Wylie** took 6-43 as the visitors made 172-8. Jake Liddle (5-21) took a triple wkt maiden as only Conor Ramsay (42) got a score of substance. Despite batting their allocation and reaching 200 for the first time in 2021, Davenham lost again as **John Birchall's** powerful 87 (88 bs) helped Macc to a valuable 3 wkt win at Butcher's Stile. The game of the day unfolded at Moorside Rd where in -form Urmston had a thrilling level

scores draw with Bowdon. The visitors were rescued from a dicey 108-6 by 61 from Sid Mahadevan who combined with skipper Matt Tully to add 74. Bowdon finishing on 206-8. Urmston were progressing safely enough at 158-3 but Bowdon held the required rate in check, and when skipper Lewis Jackson (51) was the first of 3 wkts to fall for one run. Urmston stuttered with the winning post in sight. Veteran Ritesh Shetty (3-51 earlier) then helped heist the 12 needed to level the scores before Rudra Singh was run out off the last ball of the match going for the win. June 26th saw an equally thrilling finish in the meeting of the top two, leaders Bollington winning by one run at Brooklands. A good all round bowling effort by the hosts had seen Bolly needing a 17 run stand by their last pair to reach 141. Brooklands had a poor start of their own but got into a great position before Jack Ward intervened, his remarkable spell of 8.4-4-5-4 when Brooklands needed 4 with 3 wkts in hand snatching it for Bolly. It was much more clear cut at Bowdon after the hosts

overpowered lowly Marple, Pat Ashling's 83\* (82 balls) and an opening stand of 92 with Jack Tipton setting them well on their way to a handsome 9 wkt triumph. Earlier all the Bowdon bowlers shared the wkts between them as Marple fell away again, this time 88-2 becoming 139 all out. Grappenhall recorded an impressive 8 wkt win over form side Urmston, for whom only Matt Kilcourse (52) and skipper Lewis Jackson (31) played innings of any substance. 50\* from **Grant Hodnett** led the Grappers successful pursuit of 132 with heaps of overs unused. Bramhall and Sale met at the Richard Cragg Memorial Ground, playing out a wiry draw. A stand of 103 between Greg Dixon (82) and Nick Cantello (56) inched the hosts to 192-7, before Tyrone Lawrence's 60 helped Sale do just enough to survive on 162-8. The basement battle went decisively the way of Warrington, as Patrick Tyrell's late 54\* helped the hosts reach 199-7. Only Christian Kouris (59) stayed around for long as Warrington used 8 bowlers (and conceded 31 extras) in dismissing Davenham for 140. Covid related issues saw Macc v Congleton postponed.

There were early finishes and low scores galore on June 19 as Div 2 took another twist. Without the prolific Ed Faulkner, (injured) Ashton OM were skittled for just 59 by struggling Barrow, and in particular Ryan Holloway who took a spectacular 9-25 in the bowling performance of his life. Barrow had early reached 212-5 and Holloway's heroics thus led to a whopping 153 run victory. Hale Barns fared even worse, surprisingly all out for a grisly 50 (Alex Matthews 5-22) at a rampant Lindow who were soon in the bar reflecting on their fourth straight win after less than 27 overs cricket. Romiley were another side enjoying a quick 9 wkt victory, although they had the long journey back from Upton to enjoy their third win in a row. Dan Owen's 65 was the only resistance offered by the hosts, who struggled to 106 and then found Ans Rashid Muhammad in the mood again, his 55 the top score of the day. Alvanley moved into second after a 2 wkt win over visiting Stockport in an arid encounter, no batsman reaching 30 as Mark Green's 4-35 at least made a fight of it for the bottom club. The other two games were in a totally different vein, Haslington racking up 254-9 against visiting Christleton, Ben Istead with 70 and Jack Taylor with 67

providing the power after **Jack** Moran's 58 had earlier rescued the hosts from 19-3. Tom Gledhill then took 4 wkts as a bright start to Christleton's reply faded, losing 5 wkts for 33 after being 64-0 and eventually needing the last pair to survive 11 balls for the draw. Mobberley's Osman Butt scored a superb 101\* in their 233-4 at Stockport Georgians, which proved to be not quite enough. Ned Bailey (73) and Dan Box (55) laid the foundations for the hosts reply, adding 113 for the second wkt, but when Bailey was caught he was the first of 5 wkts falling for just 24. Jordan Richards and James Locke then joined forces, Richards hitting the penultimate ball of the match for 6 as their psp of 56 off just 6.5 overs led to a pulsating victory. Even more low totals on June 26th as only 5 of 12 teams passed 100 and no team surpassed 180. Lindow rounded off their perfect month with an untidy 5 wkt win at Barrow, who totalled just 67. Jadan Jones hit 34 off 16 to take Lindow to 63-2 before 3 wkts fell in 9 balls. Romiley, the month's other 100 points club, walloped Mobberley after Paul

Garner's 6-29 helped dismantle an adhesive Mobb inns which lasted nearly 45 overs but only reached 104. No such dillydallying for Ans Rashid Muhammad (55 off 33) as the hosts charged past the winning line in under 19 overs. Stockport Georgians enjoyed the late afternoon at leisure as Ashton OM again suffered a horrendous batting seizure, this week an attenuated 52 off 31 tortuous overs. George Hardman took 5-13 and James Locke 4-4 as Georgians knocked off the paltry requirement in under 12 overs. Haslington (98-3) were scarcely any more extended in winning by 7 wkts at Stockport (96), but Hale Barns needed a stirring effort to end their poor run after managing just 120 against high-flying Alvanley. Ben **Hicks** (5-33) led a fine bowling reply as Alvanley, well placed early on, fell away dramatically and were all out 84. Dan Owen top scored with 72 as Upton posted a respectable 171 at Christleton, but the hosts Joshua Joseph (63\*) led a composed chase as they recorded a first win in four games and remained in touch with the top.

Didsbury chose to bat but a burst of 5-10 in 3 overs from Nevan Meisuriya left them reeling at 30-5. Lower order determination and invention - aided by 35 extras - revived the visitors who ended on 144-8 (Meisuriya 6-13). Hyde were pegged back in their reply by accurate Didsbury bowling and despite a spirited late rally in a lively atmosphere, the hosts found the 22 they needed off the last over just out of reach.





# CCCL 2ND & 3RD XI



Didsbury 2s went top of the 2nd XI **Premier Division** on the 19th June after a 5 wkt win at OP, 57\* from Hashir Khan the highlight, after leaders Neston lost by 2 runs in a thriller at Nantwich, for whom Jake Pearson scored 73. 6-56 from Simon Dimelow put the skids under the visitors but a fighting last wkt stand took them to within touching distance of a famous win, before the final ball of the match saw the last wkt fall. Macclesfield feared the worst seeing Lee Dixon striding out to opening the batting for CBH and his sizeable opening psp with Matt Hodges paved the way for a 121 run Chester win which sent Macc to the foot of the table, 92 from Alex Read, batting at six for Cheadle, helped them to an important 51 run win at Bowdon who needed a defiant 65\* from no.9 Alex Robinson to rescue them from complete ignominy after four of the top six bagged ducks. Toft flaved the AE attack at Booths Park, calling a halt after 45 overs on 265-7, but the visitors held on in reply at 183-8. But it was struggling Hyde who recorded the day's highest total, 92 from Robert Brierley the biggest of several good innings as they declared on 298-4 against beleaguered Marple, who subsequently folded in a buttock-clenching 219 run loss. On June 26th Didsbury maintained top spot with a surprisingly easy 7 wkt win over Neston (Marcus Fisher 92\*). Toft went second after a 174 demolition of OP, while Rob Venables' 7-30 for Cheadle was not enough as they lost by 45 runs to Nantwich, for whom Adam Simpson made 95 and Simon Dimelow again got among the wkts with 5-43. Chris France hit 101 as Macc had the better of their basement battle draw with AE, for whom Andrew Kennedy hit a superb 104 out of 215-9.

In 2nd XI Div 1 Oxton already seem to have one foot in next year's Premier Division. Two century opening stands in two matches - 128 between Jack Perry (80\*) and Will Clayton (53) in their 7th wkt win over Lindow on the 19th and 119 (Perry 59\*, Jack Breheny 53\*) in their rapid 10 wkt win over H.Mersey on the 26th have given them a 69 pt advantage. The prolific Mike Bishop hit 85\* as second place Sale were held by Romiley on Sat. Also on the 26th, lowly Upton recorded a heartening first win of the season over Timperley, but remain one of four clubs separated by 19 pts at the foot. Back on the

19th, 100 from Ben Bodha and 85 from Paul Radage helped second place Grappenhall to a 141 run win over Brooklands, on the 19th, whose 86 was two runs more than their 1st XI counterparts on the same day, Ross Arrowsmith taking 6-29. Another 6 wkt haul was recorded by Timpers' Jordan Ruff, 6-30 in their 7 wkt win over bottom club Davenham. Warrington were 0-4 against Heaton Mersey who won by 5 wkts.

In 2nd XI Div 2, leaders Didsbury 2A and Widnes both had two comfortable wins in 2 weeks to maintain their places at the top. Despite losing to Bolly on the 26th, AOM's 4 wkt win over Upton on the 19th keeps them third. Also on the 19th, Bollington's Cameron **Mackinnon** took 5-52 and then top scored with 70 as they won at Neston. On Saturday C.Hulme's Adil Khan took 4-24 and hit 60\* in their 7 wkt win over Tattenhall. Despite 24 and 5-32 from **lan Sharrock** leading to an 18 run win over Urmston, Upton remain stuck at the bottom, 21 pts from safety.

#### 3RD XI CRICKET

Romiley continue to lead the way in the 3rd XI Premier Division as the division looks to be more tightly contested than in recent seasons, with Toft's 4 run win over third placed Sale on Sunday taking them second. Toft host Romiley next Sunday as the campaign reaches its halfway stage, 26 pts currently separating the top four teams. Dan Ward, pushed up to open the Didsbury inns, has responded with 55\* and 72 in successive games, while AE's Calum Wilson hit the only century of the Prem season so far, 125\*

in their 6th June draw with Heaton Mersey, who are currently the only team without a win. In Div 1, Brooklands head a congested table, an unceremoniously swift 9 wkt win over second placed NE Cheshire on Sunday giving them a 2 pt advantage for now. Jon Jessop scored 106\* for Ashley but it wasn't enough as Marple beat them by 2 wkts. Bredbury SM are bottom with an unwanted 100% record to date. losing all 6 of their matches (the other 2 cancelled). In Div 2, Lindow made an astonishing 421-5 (yes really) in their 40 overs at OP on Sunday, including Finn Gavaghan at no.7 scoring 104\* off 38 balls. Joe Ashworth



made 88 off 48 while **Ben Hamilton-Ryan** was unbeaten on 151 (101 bs) as OP used 10 bowlers in an increasingly painful afternoon - their eventual 306 run loss is fully documented online. **Joe Hodson** scored 104 for **Elworth** in their comparatively narrow 229 run win over **Bowdon**, which keeps them top as second place **Stockport Trinity** lost at AOM. # 1ST XI T20 FRED GRAHAM TROPHY

CHESTER BH will host 1st XI T20 Fred Graham Trophy Finals Day on July 11th, meeting Alderley Edge in one semi-final, Oxton and Nantwich meeting in the other. Here's how all the action played out in the elimination match and quarter finals:

ELIMINATION QUALIFIER: Brooklands Sports Club, June 17th: BROOKLANDS (157-8) beat Didsbury (141-8) by 16 runs

A tightly contested match between two in-form teams went the way of the then 1st Division leaders as they made it successive Premier League scalps in this year's competition. Dropped when 44, Kevin Carroll's 28-ball 56 along with three other 20+ knocks gave the hosts a competitive total. Earlier, Scott Wardley was the pick of a generally impressive bowling display, his 3-23 setting the tone, Phil Stockton and Ray Doyle following up with 2-23 from 6 overs between them as only Thomas Roe (30) and Jackson made scores of any substance.


