Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen, welcome to LifeSkills@Westfield Lane for today's BetVictor Northern Premier League South East Division game, against Wisbech Town. We give a warm welcome to their players, officials and supporters and hope they have a safe trip home after the game.

The big news here at The Lane over the last seven days is that Manager Craig Spink resigned from his post in the aftermath of last weekend's home defeat against Ilkeston Town. Then in midweek we announced that David Frecklington has been appointed as the new First Team Manager (see the feature later in this issue for more info). David took charge of training last Thursday and his first game is today's game against Wisbech.

We welcome the new Gaffer and hope his stay is a long and successful one.

The club would of course also like to thank Craig Spink for his hard work and dedication during this period and we wish him and his family all the very best for the future.

Craig stated "Thank you to everyone who made my return, although brief, a very enjoyable time, from Spencer, to the media team, to the fans, to all the volunteers."

Back to the small matter of today's game, visitors Wisbech Town currently sit in 17th place on 4 points after 5 games. The Fenmen have not had a wholly dissimilar start to their league season. Wisbech opened with 3 straight defeats, without

scoring, at the hands of Leek, Worksop and Stamford before getting a creditable draw at Newcastle Town. But in midweek the Fenmen got their first league win of the season, dispatching Lincoln United by four goals to one.

The Blues come into today's game in 20th place in the league, still on nil points after 6 games. This on the back of defeats at home to Ilkeston last Saturday, a disappointing 3-1 reverse, followed by a chastening 6-0 defeat in our derby game at Sheffield FC on Tuesday. This was compounded by the late sending off of Todd Jordan for a second yellow card.

Last season's meetings saw the Frickley nick a 1-0 win at the Fenland Stadium on the first day of the season. Tyler Walton's early goal put us ahead but it took a fine second half penalty save by Hugo Warhurst to secure all three points for the Blues. In the return at the Wezzie in December, the two sides played out a one-all draw. Jacob Hazel's strike cancelling out Sam Gaughran's opener for the visitors.

Expect a close encounter as both sides go all out to get another crucial three points.

Our next game will be on the road as we make the long journey to Market Drayton Town on Saturday 21st September, 3pm kickoff.

Then the Blues are next in action at Westfield Lane on Tuesday 24th September, when we welcome Glossop North End for a 7.45pm ko. We hope to see you all there.

Enjoy the game and thank you for your continued support.

Meet the visitors 1

Three local clubs amalgamated in 1920 to form a Town football club which then entered the Peterborough and King's Lynn Leagues – the latter won at the first attempt.

The Peterborough League Championship was won in 1925, 1928, 1929, 1932 and 1933. The club then turned semi-professional, entered the United Counties and the East Midlands Leagues, and the UCL Cup was won at the first attempt.

When football restarted after the War, Wisbech reached the First Round Proper of the F.A. Cup, losing to Ipswich Town over two legs. In 1947 the club purchased its own ground, Fenland Park, where the UCL title was won in 1947, 1948 and 1950.

A switch was then made to the Eastern Counties League, and, after winning the League Cup during a two-year stay, the club gained entry to the old Midland League. In the last of their six seasons of membership - 1957/58 - the Town finished as runners-up to Peterborough United who provided the opposition when the record gate of 8,044 was set. That season they reached the Second Round of the F.A. Cup by beating Colchester United 1-0, only to lose 2-1 at Reading.

The Fenmen went in for star players and former England Internationals Jesse Pye, Bobby Langton and Billy Elliott were just three who graced Fenland Park.

The club entered the Southern League in 1958, winning the Division One title in 1962. Floodlights were installed in 1964, while in the F.A. Cup the First Round Proper was reached in 1959, 1960, 1965, and 1966, when the Fenmen lost 10-1 at Brighton.

Lack of finance caused the return to the ECL and the title was won in 1972, 1977 and 1991, while the League Cup was lifted in 1971, 1972 and 1995.

In the FA Vase, Wisbech have reached the Semi-Finals twice, losing to Halesowen in 1985 and to Southall a year later.

In 1995 The Fenmen again reached the First Round Proper of the F.A. Cup before a Second Round appearance two years later against Bristol Rovers at Fenland Park.

Promotion was won to the Dr Martens Midland Division in 1997 before relegation back to the ECL four years later.

The next few seasons were disappointing, even flirting with relegation.

In 2006, financial problems led to the sale of Fenland Park, the Fenmen's home for 61 years. The Fenland Stadium hosted its first game in August 2010, an FA Cup tie against St Andrews. The Fenmen went on to finish the season fourth in the league and also won the League Cup. 2011-12 saw fourth place secured once again.

The 2012-13 season saw the club finish runners-up to Dereham Town in the League but gained some consolation winning the Red Insure (ECL) Cup with a 2-1 win over Stanway Rovers. Promotion to Step 4 was declined during the close season and instead the club transferred to the United Counties League. In 2013-14 club made it through to the quarter-finals of the Carlsberg FA Vase, losing 1-0 to eventual winners Sholing. In the League, seventh place was achieved. This was followed by three seasons of top ten finishes and included a UCL League Cup Final appearance in 2016-17.

Gary Setchell took over the managerial reigns 11 games into the 2017-18 season for his second spell in charge of the Fenmen (his first being in 2008-09). Just three league defeats for the Fenmen over the next eight months meant that a win over Daventry Town on the final day of the season would see the team crowned UCL champions. Unfortunately, the match finished one-all and so the Fenmen had to make do with the runners-up spot. However, this finish secured promotion to the Northern Premier League in 2018-19.

The Fenmen's first season at the new level proved to be a difficult one, with a record low of only six wins in the League all season, but relegation was avoided thanks to 13 draws which meant the team finished in 17th place.

Gary Setchell decided to end his tenure as manager after the end of the season and the club appointed Seb Hayes as his replacement to lead the club in the BetVictor Northern Premier League South East Division in 2019/20.





Meet the visitors 2

Seb Hayes (Manager):

Took over the Fenmen hotseat in May 2019. Managed Huntingdon Town to the runners-up spot in the United Counties League and Hinchbrook Cup success in 2014. He won the same trophy when in charge of Peterborough Northern Star, whilst he secured the Lincolnshire Senior Trophy with Holbeach United in May 2018.

Scott Goodwin (Assistant Manager):

Joined the club in 2019. Scott's playing career took in Coventry City, Hereford United, Grantham and Kettering amongst others whilst his management credentials include Gresley, Leicester Nirvana, Long Buckby and Northampton Sileby Rangers.

Kevin Ward (Assistant Manager):

Returns to the Elgoods Fenland Stadium after a season away coaching at Oadby Town. His playing career took in Barnsley, Gainsborough Trinity, Harrogate Town, Grantham (from where he was briefly loaned out to the Fenmen) and locally for King's Lynn, Holbeach United, Spalding and Stamford. Previously coached at Spalding, Stamford and Corby Town.

Dan Farrell (Goalkeeper):

Signed in the summer of 2019. Previously with Brackley Town and Brackley Town Saints, Dan has spent his recent career at Steps 5 and 6, appearing for Northamptonshire sides Long Buckby, Rushden & Higham, Northampton Sileby Rangers and Bugbrooke St Michael in the UCL.

Aidan Bradshaw (Defender):

Arrived in Summer 2019 from Desborough Town. Previous clubs include Kettering Town, AFC Rushden & Diamonds, Thrapston Town and Northampton Sileby Rangers.

Dan Farrell (Goalkeeper):

Signed in the summer of 2019. Previously with Brackley Town and Brackley Town Saints, Dan has spent his recent career at Steps 5 and 6, appearing for Northamptonshire sides Long Buckby, Rushden & Higham, Northampton Sileby Rangers and Bugbrooke St Michael in the United Counties League.

Joel Earps (Midfielder):

Another summer signing from Oadby Town. Spent some of last season with Ashby Ivanhoe, having appeared for Dunkirk and South Normanton. Joel's older sister is England and Manchester United goalkeeper Mary Earps.

Ollie Gale (Midfielder):

Now in his third spell with the Fenmen. Played for the Youth and Reserve sides before stints with Yaxley and Huntingdon. Briefly returned to Wisbech before joining local rivals Holbeach United in 2016. 45 appearances (32 starts; 13 sub) last season; 161 (96 starts; 65 sub) in total.

Callum Milne (Midfielder):

Signed in July 2019 from Harborough Town. Was on the books of Kettering Town during last season and also turned out for Eynesbury Rovers in the United Counties League.



**Callam Traynor (Defender):**

Signed in July 2019 from Harborough Town. Previously with Desborough Town and Rothwell Corinthians.

Jay Whyatt (Defender):

Signed in July 2019 from Holbeach United, for whom he made his debut as a 16-year-old last season.

Aaron Hart (Defender/Midfielder):

Originally joined the Fenmen on work experience loan from Peterborough United in the Autumn of 2017. Was recalled by Posh in January 2018 but re-joined Wisbech in April for the UCL run-in. Spent most of last season with the Fenmen but left in February to play nearer his home in Rutland.

Layton Maddison (Midfielder):

Former Peterborough United Youth Team player. Joined Wisbech in August 2018 having spent some time on work experience loan from Posh the previous season. Layton was the first player born in the 2000s to sign for Wisbech.

Liam Marshall (Defender):

Signed in July 2019 from Spalding United. Vice-Captain. Was skipper of the Peterborough United Under 18 side before joining up with his former manager Gavin Strachan at Ilkeston in the Northern Premier League. Joined National League North side Corby Town in February 2016 and Stamford in the NPL a year later. Was with Peterborough Sports for about 12 months before moving to the Tulips.

Rheiss Mclean (Midfielder/Striker):

Most recently with Shepshed Dynamo having been part of Mansfield Town's Brook House College Academy side.

Jurelle Philip (Defender/Striker):

Signed in July 2019 from Oadby Town. Former Antigua and Barbuda Under 20 International who was a youngster at Leicester City before joining Watford's Academy at the age of 17. Was on the books of Mansfield Town and has also appeared for United Counties League sides Burton Park Wanderers and Harrowby United.

Sam Spencer (Defender):

Joined the Fenmen in July 2019 from Yaxley. Club Captain. Aside from his previous Step 4 experience with the Cuckoos, Sam has also played for Soham Town Rangers at this level. Earlier in his career he captained St Neots Saints and was also at Huntingdon Town.

Frickley Athletic 5 Bishop Auckland 0

Blues beat Bishops in fine display

ANDY HAYWARD got his second hat-trick of the season as Frickley Athletic conquered Bishop Auckland 5-0 in the Northern Premier League last Tuesday to move into the top six.

It was an impressive display by the Blues. Hayward going close in the 14th minute with a 25-yard free kick which was tipped over the bar by the visiting keeper.

Five minutes later the Bishops goalkeeper was left stranded as Hayward raced onto a pass by Henry Templeton and sent a 20-yard angled drive whistling into the net.

Hayward was the provider of Frickley's second goal in the 31st minute, squaring an accurate pass for Mark Hancock to lash home from the edge of the penalty area.

Bishops could make little impression on a well-drilled Blues and fell further in arrears after 58 minutes, a deep cross by Templeton falling to Simon Fuller who struck a thigh high volley into the far corner.

Hayward hit the visitors with a two-goal burst in as many minutes, the first coming in the 66th minute when he played a slick one-two with Billy Whitehurst before blasting a low drive under the keeper, while the second saw him collect a pass from Templeton and finish in the same deadly fashion.

Kevin Kelly replaced Hancock and almost got on the scoresheet, unleashing a 30-yard drive in the 76th minute which the Bishops keeper just managed to divert over the bar.

Frickley Athletic 5 Matlock 1

Happy Frickley in charge

A SHARPSHOOTING second half saw Frickley Athletic turn the tables and gain their first Northern Premier League away success with a 5-1 triumph at Matlock Town.

Unbeaten in the League, Town held command in the first half and went ahead in the 29th minute when a through ball was collected by Burton who lobbed over the advancing Ian Wardle.

It was a different story after the interval, however, the Blues getting on terms in the 50th minute when Henry Templeton lobbed a free kick from the edge of the area and Simon Fuller made sure the ball rolled in.

Templeton was causing the Matlock cover all kinds of problems, and he was pushed after weaving into the goalmouth area in the 55th minute, Gary Hatto making no mistake from the resultant penalty.

It was another spot kick, converted by Hatto, which improved Frickley's advantage ten minutes later, Templeton being fouled by the keeper. Substitute Ian Garnham whipped over a low cross for Billy Whitehurst to tap in two minutes later.

Matlock were in disarray and when Ian Thompson put over an accurate centre in the 86th minute, Templeton pounced to lob over the Town keeper.

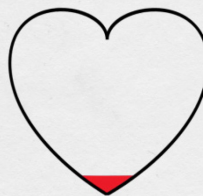
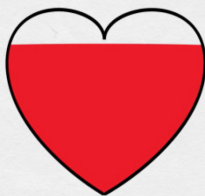

Frickley 1 Ilkeston Town 3

Newton's 3rd Law states that every action has an equal and opposite reaction and this was certainly the case yesterday. Having served up the best 45 minutes of the season in the first half at Carlton last Saturday, we were given possibly the worst 45 minutes of the season in the first half yesterday and Ilkeston put the game to bed before half time.

Frickley were better in the 2nd half - Jack Mc pulled one back with a great hit from the edge of the box, the ref missed a stonewall pen and Haze hit the post.

This was a result of collective improvement but also Ilkeston taking their feet off the gas.

Here's what a thespian thought of it all:

The hosts had a pair of early long efforts from Rieves Boocock and Cody Prior, both on loan from Doncaster Rovers. But it was the visitors who took

the lead in the 7th when Shaun Harrad nodded in unchallenged from a corner.

Two minutes later Blues' Jacob Hazel hit the side netting from 25 yards with a rasping drive.

Ilkeston almost got another after 24 minutes when a Frickley head flicked a corner onto his own bar. Ilkeston did double their lead in the 37th minute when Jermaine Hollis netted from the edge of the box. And there was still time for Harrad to knock a bouncing ball over Frickley keeper Tom Jackson from 12 yards for The Robins' third right on the stroke of

half time.

Ilkeston came out with similar intent in the second half, with a near miss in the just after the restart.

Hazel broke though for Frickley in the 55th minute but fired straight at the keeper from a narrow angle. Then sub Jack McMenemy reduced the arrears 7 minutes later with a

fine strike from 18 yards.

Hazel kept the pressure on, hitting the post in the 75th minute, then moments later Jake Currie forced Ilkeston's Ross Durrant to push his shot wide and out for a corner.

Boocock had a late stab at goal diverted

but Ilkeston saw it out to take the points.

WEBMASTER MOTM - firstly a word for the back line, take Todd out of the equation and the average age is 19 (Joel Fiern pictured bottom). Liam Carrick put in a shift at centre half. Jack Mc made a difference up front

when he came on and that meant Jake Currie dropped back into midfield and occasionally defence. But the stand out for me was Cody Prior (pictured top) - pretty much covered every blade of grass and generally got

stuck in.

The Roaring Twenties (#6)

The sixth in a series of articles by the author of the book 'A History and Guide to Football Programmes' describing how programmes have changed over a century-and-a-half of Association Football.

Everybody's Doing It in the 1920s...

Programme issuing by clubs and associations became the norm in the 1920's, resulting from the example shown by those clubs whose pre-Great War programmes had proved to be good sellers, and significant profit makers. Another reason for the explosion of issues was the widespread provision of "Half Time Scoreboards" around football grounds. In the days before radio coverage and teletext, football crowds had to rely on the "half times" from other grounds being displayed on enormous fixed boards (either at the back of the terracing or at the trackside), to ascertain how rivals were faring. The only means of deciphering the mixture of letters and numbers was to refer to the coded list of fixtures printed in the match programme. In this way, the programme had evolved from being a means of identification of players to being a vehicle for even more spectator information.

Part of the sudden upsurge in programme production was the virtual doubling of the size of the Football League in the early 1920's, by the formation of Division 3 North

and the transfer of clubs from the Southern League to form Division 3 South. Thus we have the first regular issue of programmes from Rochdale in 1922/23, Halifax Town in 1921/22 and such long forgotten ex-League clubs as Wigan Borough and Stalybridge Celtic (both 1921/22) and Nelson (1924/25). Of clubs to join the League in subsequent years, York City issued an 8-page programme in 1924/25 in the Midland League, and Torquay United first issued (starting with FA Cup ties) in 1923/24.

Chelsea, host club of the 1920, 1921, and 1922 FA Cup Finals, set a fine example by publishing the first truly official, and substantial, FA Cup Final programmes. Featuring classical sketches by Bernhard Hugh on the cover, these were 24, 20 and 8-page programmes respectively, the last bearing a very close resemblance to the standard Chelsea programme of the inter-war years.

The 1920's was the decade in which football programme production became the norm throughout the Football League, and for all major non-league clubs, and it was also the era in which programmes adopted the format we associate with them today. Henceforth, matchday programmes would be multi-page, stapled, liberally filled with advertisements and including as a minimum; team selections, fixtures/results, league tables, half-time scoreboard and editorial.

On the flip side, these boys showed that they can play. And when you remember how very

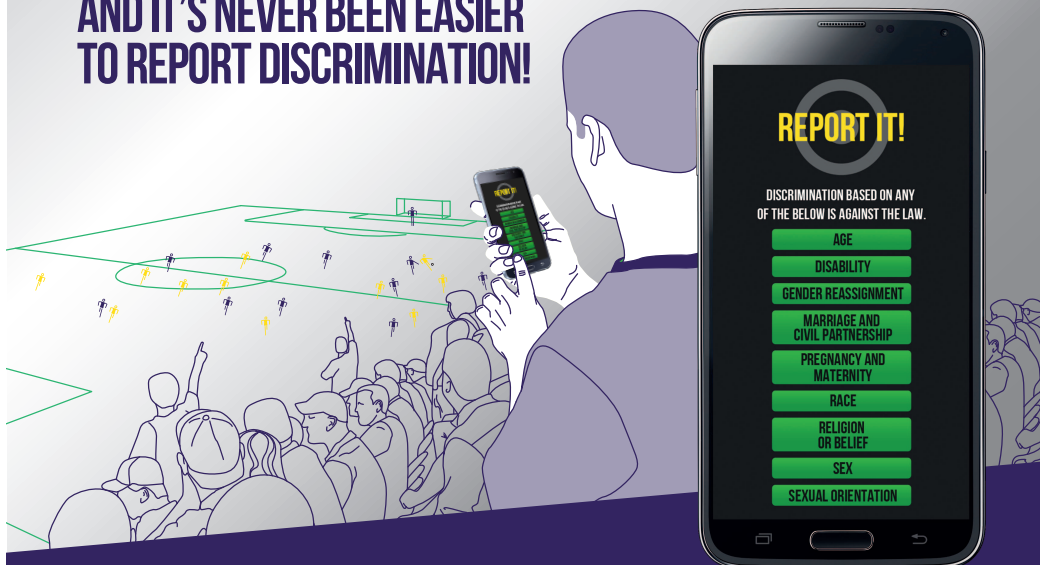
young most of these lads are then their game management can only improve. Better times are coming, folks, just keep the faith.

Playing by the NEW rules...

The International Football Association Board (IFAB) have announced a number of rule changes that come into play for the 2019/20 season, meaning that The Blues will have a few new rules to adhere to this season.

Below are a summary of the rule changes...

Dropped ball - Laws 8 & 9

If play is stopped inside the penalty area, the ball will be dropped for the goalkeeper.

If play is stopped outside the penalty area, the ball will be dropped for one player of the team that last touched the ball at the point of the last touch.

In all cases, all the other players (of both teams) must be at least 4m (4.5yds) away.

If the ball touches the referee (or another match official) and goes into the goal, team possession changes or a promising attack starts, a dropped ball is awarded.

Free Kicks - Law 13

When there is a 'wall' of three or more defenders, the attackers are not allowed within 1m (1 yd) of the wall; an attacker less than 1m (1yd) from the 'wall' when the kick is taken will be penalised with an indirect free kick.

When the defending team takes a free kick in their own penalty area, the ball is in play once the kick is taken; it does not have to leave the penalty area before it can be played.

Goal Celebrations - Law 12

A YC for an 'illegal' celebration (e.g. removing the shirt) remains even if the goal is disallowed

Goal Kick - Law 16

The ball is in play once the kick is taken; it can be played before leaving the penalty area

Handball - Law 12

Deliberate handball remains an offence

The following 'handball' situations, even if accidental, will be a free kick:

The ball goes into the goal after touching an attacking player's hand/arm.

A player gains control/possession of the ball after it has touched their hand/arm and then scores, or creates a goal-scoring opportunity.

The ball touches a player's hand/arm which has made their body unnaturally bigger.

The ball touches a player's hand/arm when it is above their shoulder (unless the player has deliberately played the ball which then touches their hand/arm).

The following will **not** usually be a free kick,

unless they are one of the above situations:

The ball touches a player's hand/arm directly from their own head/body/foot or the head/body/foot of another player who is close/near.

The ball touches a player's hand/arm which is close to their body and has not made their body unnaturally bigger.

If a player is falling and the ball touches their hand/arm when it is between their body and the ground to support the body (but not extended to make the body bigger).

If the goalkeeper attempts to 'clear' (release into play) a throw-in or deliberate kick from a team-mate but the 'clearance' fails, the goalkeeper can then handle the ball.

Kick-Off - Law 8

The team that wins the toss can now choose to take the kick-off or which goal to attack.

Medical Breaks - Law 7

Difference between 'cooling' breaks (90 secs – 3 mins) and 'drinks' breaks (max 1 min).

Penalty Kick - Law 14

The team's penalty taker can have treatment /assessment and then take the kick.

The goalkeeper must not be touching

the nets /goalposts/crossbar; they must not be moving.

The goalkeeper must have at least part of one foot on/in line with the goal line when the kick is taken; cannot stand behind the line.

Players' Equipment - Law 4

Multi-coloured/patterned undershirts are allowed if they are the same as the sleeve of the main shirt.

Quick free kick and YC/RC - Law 12

If the referee is about to issue a YC/RC but the non-offending team takes the free kick quickly, the referee can delay the YC/RC until the next stoppage if the offending team was not distracted by the referee.

Substitutes - Law 3

A player who is being substituted must leave the field by the nearest point on the touchline/goal line (unless the referee indicates the player can leave quickly/immediately at the halfway line or a different point because of safety, injury etc.).

Team Officials - Laws 5 & 12

A team official guilty of misconduct will be shown a YC (caution) or RC (sending-off); if the offender cannot be identified, the senior coach who is in the technical area at the time will receive the YC/RC. Law 12 will have a list of YC/RC offences.

The NPL Column: Passing the test?

The demise of Bury should be the turning point for football regulation across all levels in the country.

On Monday (September 2) The Football Supporters' Association met with the Alliance Committee – the National League, Northern Premier League, Southern League and Isthmian League - to put forward proposals on how to protect football clubs.

The FSA's proposals – which they believe should apply to all levels of football including Steps 1-4 in Non-League – have two key principles: the community significance of football clubs and avoiding conflicts of interest in regulation.



The FSA believes The Football Association should be the overall regulatory body following the failure of clubs self-regulating under their respective leagues. It would eradicate conflicts of interest in the way that rules and regulations are set and administered by the leagues, and especially where some of the decisions on the conduct of owners and directors of clubs are taken by the owners and directors of other clubs.

"We will be emphasising the need for reform of the regulations around ownership of clubs because we want to protect clubs and protect football's assets from speculators and chancers coming into the game," Andy Walsh of the FSA told The NLP in the wake of Bury's expulsion from the EFL.

"Football clubs in this country still represent the biggest expression of community identity of any organisation in towns and cities up and down the land.

"Some football clubs sit on very healthy assets, pieces of land that their ground has been built on and have been in the club's ownership for generations. That is quite an attraction to some speculators. Those assets deserve some

protection. The FA can provide that. The FA would deter speculators and chancers from taking over our football clubs.

"You can't expect clubs to regulate themselves. You need some independence in the regulation. We believe the most appropriate regulator is The FA.

"The leagues are privately owned entities owned by the football clubs themselves and they are going to be less likely to vote for stronger regulation.

"Self-regulation in the EFL has been shown to have failed and it's now time for The FA to step in and apply that regulatory structure.

"If The FA doesn't step in then it should be government because football clubs are not just like any other businesses, they are cultural and community assets in their local towns and cities and therefore they deserve a greater level of protection."

The FSA are also calling for the Owners' and Directors' Test to be strengthened with a more stringent process put in place.

"The provisions within the Owners' and Directors' Test we believe to be inadequate," said Walsh, referencing the ownership of Steve Dale at Bury and Bolton's Ken Anderson. "Those tests clearly need to be strengthened.

"We also believe there should be greater scrutiny of spending at football clubs to ensure they are being run in a sustainable manner. "Stewart Day, who owned Bury before he sold to Steve Dale, racked up millions of pounds worth of debts incurred because of over spending. No action was taken by the Football League or The FA.

"There needs to be a review of the finances in the game. We would argue there needs to be a fairer distribution of wealth but that should be done within a regulatory framework because we equally do not want to see owners such as the Oystons, who took advantage of their stewardship of Blackpool to enrich themselves. One thing is for certain, we cannot stand still."

The Daniel Wilkinson Foundation has been set up to raise awareness of SCD and to provide funding towards heart screening, defibrillators and CPR/defibrillator training primarily for grass-roots sporting teams.

Tragedies can be prevented through cardiac screening. It is vital that young people are identified and treated.

Up next – Market Drayton Town

Market Drayton Facts: Market Drayton is a town in north Shropshire, close to the Welsh and Staffordshire borders. In 1245 King Henry III granted a charter for a weekly Wednesday market, still held to this day, giving the town its current name. The great fire of Drayton destroyed almost 70% of the town in 1651. The buttercross in the centre of the town still has a bell on top for people to ring if ever there was another fire. The Old Grammar School's former pupils include the controversial Robert Clive (aka Clive of India), and a school desk with the initials "RC" may still be seen there. Another person of note connected with the town was John Lewis, born in Market Drayton, who was one of the founders of Blackburn Rovers. He also refereed 3 FA Cup Finals and, whilst in his 60s, the 1920 Olympic Football Final.
