

U13s won their Aylesbury District League title with the help of a couple of talented girls as we were short!














YOUTH CRICKET REPORT 2018 **Junior Cricket**




Introduce a new member - 50% off your fees

CCC - 2018 Finance Report

The 2018 accounts have not yet been finalised but the Club's financial position remains stable and secure, but we must not be complacent.

We have had great support from our sponsors and generous club members, which has compensated for the marked reduction in income from social events and membership numbers. Subscription collection via Pitchero and the Club website has gone relatively smoothly, with some useful learning for next year, particularly around new members. Match fee collection has continued to be much more efficient and is an important income stream. The sad loss of Niall Mackay has meant that a significant income stream from eBay sales has ceased and any volunteers to step into that role will be very welcome.

Our major outlays have been focused on maintaining and improving our highly regarded 'square' and ensuring that we have the quantity and quality of machinery to maintain high standards throughout the season. Bucks CC are always keen to host county events at Cublington, which is testament to the work put in by both volunteers and our regular contractors.

Our commitment to having an overseas player/coach each year is a significant cost to the Club, but is one that helps to differentiate us. As always, it will be important to ensure value for money with next year's recruit.

To ensure that the Club thrives we need to increase our membership numbers next year, generate significant income from social events and retain and develop our sponsors and advertisers. Many costs are unavoidable, but there is always scope for savings. By keeping a keen focus on both sides of the balance sheet the Club will continue to be a very viable enterprise to support the increasing success of the on-field activity.

A draft copy of the full years accounts will be available at the AGM in January and the full audited accounts will be posted on the Club's website as soon as they have been approved.

Chairman's View

The end of another season, with mixed success and many challenges. The main success has been the strength of the Junior section, the increased interest in girls/women's cricket and a well attended All Stars programme as well as a great showing in the Last Man Standing midweek format. The junior talent that Cublington has is incredible and I look forward to seeing many more junior players break into the senior sides during 2019. Well done to Garth Taylor, Catherine Rodnight, Debbie Knights, Gordon Sparke and all the superb junior coaches and team managers! However, the 2018 senior season in the Cherwell League saw both our 1st and 2nd team relegated - dropping down to Division 4 and Division 9 respectively.

The main challenge for our senior sides is player availability. In 2016 the English Cricket Board conducted a major survey on the state of cricket across England and Wales. The data collected resulted with the conclusion that as of September 2016 approximately 278,600 adults in England play cricket on a monthly basis. As of 2015 there were approximately 292,600 cricket players participating on a monthly basis in England. Since 2008 the number of cricket players has thus been decreasing from 428,000 players. This makes a decrease of about 35 percent over seven years. When compared to the share of children and adolescents playing cricket it shows that the decline in cricket players is not as apparent. Compare this trend with cycling. In 2016, a Social Attitude concluded that 1.9m adults over the age of 18 cycle every day! The growth in this sporting activity has been astounding, and reflects a change in how young and more mature adults wish to use their recreational time, and how much time they want to allocate to their chosen sport. We ask a lot of our members with the current format employed by the Cherwell League. Early departures, 100 over formats, some hefty miles to travel and late back to home. Some have no issues with this, but many do as their leisure/ work and home priorities change. Not surprisingly, we seldom have a problem fielding a Sunday side (limited overs, early finish). But even with Sunday sides we have seen an increase in cancelled fixtures.



Cricket is responding - we have seen the popularity of T20, 100 ball cricket and indeed Last Man Standing. Exciting formats, full of action and crucially quick to conclude. Increasingly, leagues are responding to the challenges but change seems painfully slow for the Cherwell League as big towns dominate the league and have the population to field two teams as well as the financial resources.

If every senior member of the Club could encourage one new senior member, the challenge soon dissipates! I urge all the Club members to take as a personal objective the recruitment of at least one new player for the 2019 season. As Chairman, I have spoken to many club members about what CCC's cricket development plans need to look like? This reflection is ongoing, and we may have to make decisions over the winter to ensure we deliver on our vision - enjoyable sport for all, inclusive, greater participation and value for money! Our priority is long term sustainability of the cricket club - we have superb members, superb coaches, great juniors and a great ground. Let's work for a great 2019 season, and hope that leagues and national cricket officials make the right choices, as we at Cublington must make, to ensure the long term success for the sport we love.

Finally, my sincere thanks to all members - especially

the Coordinating Action Group, the captains, the coaches, the team managers, the tea rota, the umpires, the scorers and all other volunteers.

A club such as ours has many moving parts we cannot thrive without you!
