STICKING WITH YOUR CLUB

Just out of interest, I looked at Vale of Lune's side against Altrincham Kersal a fortnight ago and then compared it with the Vale side selected for the game here last December.. Out of the eighteen selected that day only seven of them turned out against AK. Stuart Vernon's report refers to 'defections' from last season's Vale squad.

A move from Wilmslow for an ambitious player would only make sense if he were going to at least a level 3 side.

NORTHERN PEMIER LEAGUE AND NATIONAL 2 NORTH

Our neighbours have made a mixed start to their campaigns in this league. Macc lost away to Blaydon but won at home by 33 -21 against newly promoted Morpeth, who have now lost both their opening games.

Likewise, Lymm started with a home win against promoted Blackburn but lost last weekend at Alnwick by 20-17

Promoted Carlisle have won twice now, away at Morpeth and at home against Ilkley by 26-23. Blackburn also held on to secure a 33-31 home win against Blavdon.

So after two weeks, Harrogate and Rossendale are top with four sides, Ilkley, Kirkby Lonsdale, Morpeth and Wirral still to get off the mark.

At level 4, last season's winners of the Northern premier, Hull, have started with a win and a draw. Sedgley Park and Caldy both have the maximum 10 points from their first two games...

If they make it, the winnings could then be paid out as a bonus. If you're a top flight club, of course, this would be strictly illegal but at our level it's a different matter so I don't think Alan would be in any risk of being arrested, shackled and paraded before the beak!



2017 - 18 produced two excellent matches between Wilmslow and Northwich. Both games were nip and tuck all the way and come the season end Wilmslow had to win their last game against vale of Lune to claim the runner up spot in the league, consigning Northwich to 3rd, place.

Nobody could really have wished to either play in or watch a better game of rugby than these two old feisty opponents put on at The Memorial Ground in November 2017. There was just a nip of winter to

come in the breeze but otherwise a weak autumn sun made for a pleasant No Matches afternoon and the rugby kept everyone on their toes. For much of the game 10 March 18 Northwich 29 - 30 Wilmslow Wilmslow were forced to defend against a Northwich side, lying second in the 11 Nov 17 Wilmslow 19 - 11 Northwich table but they dug in deep and continually frustrated the talented Northwich back 25 March 17 Wilmslow 29 - 36 Northwich division. They did this well and then in the last fifteen minutes or so, it was as Northwich 6 - 21 Wilmslow 19 Nov 16 though the 'feinn' of old finally awoke to rise up against their foes. With renewed 2012 - 2016 No Matches aggression, cussedness and belief, they scored two late tries to eventually run 10 Dec 11 Wilmslow 29 - 11 Northwich out as deserved winners by three tries to one. Northwich 27 - 19 Wilmslow 10 Sep 11 16 Apr 11 Northwich 41 - 7 Wilmslow Two penalties from Nick Baldwin and a try from Matthew Poste propelled 4 Sep 10 Wilmslow 19 - 7 Northwich

Northwich into an early 11-0 lead. By half time though, Adam Hewitt had scored to reduce the deficit and although Northwich continued to dominate in the second half, the Wolves held them out. James Coulthurst was then taken out with a high tackle and a penalty try edged the Wolves in front. Northwich, yellow carded to fourteen, were clearly rattled as they lost their cool and a late late Ethan Harding try, converted by MacCallum settled the issue.

The return on the back pitch at Northwich the following march was another thriller. There were less than two minutes still on the clock when Northwich full back Joel Barbour broke the Wilmslow defensive line deep in his own twenty two and then proceeded to hold off any covering defence for a length of the field try. It was the kind of try which would have deservedly won any match. His side only had to field the restart, to run down the remaining time with a couple of narrow drives around the fringes and to bang the ball out of play. They would have scored four tries and earned the maximum five league points to retain their challenge for second place at the top of the league.

If only! Obligingly, from the Wilmslow point of view, the Northwich forwards conspired to drop the restart, worse still to allow the chasing Wilmslow forwards to grab the loose ball. All afternoon, the Wolves had chased kicks ahead and at the restart with a venom not seen much recently, harassing their opponents whenever possible. Whether this was on the mind of the Northwich receivers, who knows! Wilmslow now had one last chance. Any fumble or knock on, momentary loss of possession or breakdown would signal the end of the game. Everything had to be perfect and it was. The ball was spun from left to right and back again, it was taken on up the middle and slowly the Wolves worked their way to within a few strides of the Northwich line where once again the ball was recycled to Sean Street. The scrum half some how, like a weasel, squeezed himself into and through the slightest of openings, where none seemed to exist, slipped a tackle attempt, lengthened his stride and crossed the

line under the posts. The Northwich players looked shell shocked as they might well have been; Wilmslow's euphoric as they delightedly mobbed their No. 9. Bob MacCallum added the extra two points and referee Kieran Henry blew for no side.

Northwich started the season with a 35-20 loss away at Birkenhead Park. Despite scoring three early tries to go 7-15 ahead, they were eventually overhauled by the home side. It ended four tries apiece but 15 points from the boot made all the difference for Park..

Last week they won at home against Burnage by a narrow four point margin, the same that Wilmslow had achieved the previous week. There was no bonus point for Northwich but Burnage picked up one. to make it three bonus points for them on the road.



Saturday Suppers after Rugby

I've chosen devilled lamb kidneys as a starter to be followed by sticky lamb chops.

DEVILLED LAMB KIDNEYS

Kidneys quartered with the core removed, glass of sherry, ½ glass of white wine or white wine vinegar, 1 tsp redcurrant jelly, a few good shakes of Worcester sauce, pinch of cayenne, 1 tbsp English mustard, 1 tbsp double cream, chopped parsley

Trim the kidneys and then sizzle and brown them in hot oil for about 1 minute. Add the sherry, let it bubble for a few moments, then add the white wine or vinegar and red currant jelly. Allow the jelly to dissolve, then add the Worcester sauce, mustard, cayenne and seasoning. Finish by adding the cream and stir until the sauce is reduced and glossy. Add the parsley and season to taste. Serve with simple boiled rice

STICKY LAMB CHOPS WITH A MINT, PEA AND SCALLION RELISH

First marinate the lamb chops for an hour or so in 3tbsp olive oil, rosemary, chives, 2 bay leaves and 2 chopped garlic cloves. Then use a pastry brush to coat them with a glaze of Dijon mustard and runny honey. Just grill until done.

For the relish, cook the peas and when cool blitz in a blender with chopped scallions, chopped mint, 2tbsp cider vinegar and 50g cherry tomatoes

To drink, let's go for a Malbec red wine from either Argentina or France. Malbec produces a rich red wine which goes down well with red meat when the weather is beginning to cool down a bit. Le Grand Retour from Cahors is reasonably priced in Majestic and should hit the spot. Malbec has become Argentina's signature grape so there's no end of choice on the shelves if you're a fan of South American wine.

Saturday 7th. September 2019 North 1 West Wilmslow 36 – 32 Burnage

The Wolves put their supporters through the proverbial wringer before staggering to the narrowest of wins. As the game entered its final phases, they had several opportunities to close it down but a turnover at the breakdown, from which Burnage broke away for their final score, a forward pass and then a dropped pass in the final lineout all conspired to give Burnage the chance to snatch a last gasp winning try before they too knocked on and a relieved Wilmslow scrum half, Sean Street, booted the ball out of play for no side.

It ended five tries a-piece. Influential centre Mark Jennings, without whom the Wolves would have lost, got three of them and flanker Seb Pemberton the other two. The difference on the scoreboard was fly half Bob MacCallum, whose goal kicking was on target five times out of six. In response, Burnage No. 10 Rhys Evans kicked a first half penalty, left winger Josh Miller scored twice and three other Burnage tries followed in a hectic second half.

Wilmslow were slow to get going and as the half hour approached found themselves trailing 3 – 8 but they then had a purple period which took them to a 22-8 half time lead. First a series of forward drives were held up on the Burnage line but when the ball was released MacCallum put Pemberton through a gap for the Wolves opening try. They then added two more just before the break. Mark Jennings' break before he was high tackled took the Wolves back to the Burnage line and, although they fouled up a lineout and then got themselves penalised at a scrum, they kept the pressure on. Winger Jamie Klngdon ran back a loose Burnage clearing kick and when the ball went to Jennings, there was no stopping him from close range. From the restart Sean Street got the Wolves on the front foot again and when the ball was recycled the Burnage defensive line was broken and Jennings timed his pass to Pemberton perfectly for the flanker to gallop in from close to halfway for his second touchdown.

As the second half started it looked good for the Wolves but not for long. They soon conceded a penalty lineout on their twenty two from where the Burnage pack drove to under the Wolves posts and when the ball was released Miller found himself with space to score his second of the afternoon. Back they came again with an Evans kick into Wolves territory where it was taken by the Wolves No. 14 James Coulthurst, who mistimed his clearing kick into empty space where an almighty hoof from the chasing Ethan Harding propelled the ball well into the Burnage half. It bounced kindly for Ben Day, who gave it another whack, and when it sat up again, Jennings was on hand to grab it for his second try of the game. Fortuitous for the Wolves doesn't go close to describing it.

Wilmslow then fouled up another lineout which allowed Burnage to break away and although the initial danger was cleared, the visitors recycled and found space to score under the posts. The Wolves then drove from a scrum and when they were awarded a second scrum, quick passing put Jennings in again. It was now 36 – 20 going into the last quarter. Burnage stole the restart with an athletic bit of play to quickly run in a fourth try and although their No. 8 Ralph Lawson was deemed to have knocked on at the restart, they soon won the ball back, as Wilmslow lost it at the breakdown, and countered for their fifth try with just five minutes still on the clock. It could now have gone either way but the Wolves managed to keep Burnage bottled up in their own half, albeit not without a few alarms, and held out for the win.

Coach Chris Jones afterwards acknowledged that Burnage had executed their game plan well and had pushed his side all the way. Nevertheless, there had also been some good attacking play from his side, everybody contributed, he said, and once again, like last week, they had taken their chances. He was less happy with the number of forced and unforced handling and lineout errors, which wasn't much different from the previous week. Referee Kieron Henry reckoned afterwards that Burnage had enjoyed about 60% of the possession throughout, which partly explained why the penalty count was so much in their favour. 'I'm surprised by that, he added, it didn't feel like that sort of the game, players from both sides were listening to what I was saying and there was no consistent pattern to the infrincements.'

The Rugby World Cup started yestrday. It appears a long time since New Zealand, who seemingly invented rugby union hosted, dominated and won the first RWC in 1987 in their own back garden. Since then we've seen some magnificent games, some great moments of tension (Kick it Johnny!) and some iconic images...the shot of Francois Pienaar and Nelson Mandela having a chat about the weather, smilling about at each other with one wearing the others jersey handing over William Webb Ellis cup has to be up there as a defining moment of rugby. We dare to dream too - as Japan did beating South Africa at The Shed in 2015. My own favourite is the grinning and snarling Martin Johnson, captain fantastic gripping the cup like a poor scrum-halves' head.

And what of the home nations - how have we fared? The Women's World Cup is a brilliant addition to world rugby's fayre, as is the Under 20's World Cup, where we at Wilmslow were privileged to host the Italian side a few years ago.

I read recently that RWC is the 3rd most-watched sporting event in the world, behind the Olympics and the FIFA World Cup. The game has certainly come a long way since those days of 1987 with David Kirk touching down in a iersey three times too big for him.

The reality is that all of the players who represent any country started their rugby journey somewhere. They were all dragged down kicking and screaming to a humble rugby club just like ours to learn the game from men in tight tracksuits and beards. And that game, in turn, provided them with a 10-year nursery where all shapes and sizes, abilities and genders could fall in love with a game that gives us all a thousand memories, a hundred best mates and a template for good behaviour...as we come back in from the field of toil we unanimously thank our Fathers, our brothers, and our mates for bringing us to the rugby club, teaching us crap rugby songs as we celebrate just being together.







Saturday 14th. September 2019 Stockport 22 – 29 Wilmslow

North 1 West

This was another nail biter of a game between these two well matched old rivals, which went right to the wire. As you would expect, it was a tousy sort of a match with no shortage of incident, whether fair, foul or feisty. In a frantic finish, Stockport laid siege to the Wilmslow line as they tried everything they knew to salvage a match saving score. Both sides made errors in these tense last few minutes but the Wolves just managed to hold on to take another five league points.

On an agreeable late summer afternoon, Stockport were first out of the blocks. They forced the Wilmslow receivers into an error right from the kick off and from the ensuing scrum, a gap quickly opened up in Wilmslow's defensive line through which Stockport scrum half Rory Austin sped away without any hand being laid on him for the opening score in less than a minute. For the next fifteen minutes or so, Sockport's rugby was nearly fault free as they retained possession with accurate passing and support of the ball carriers. Wilmslow had at least two narrow escapes during this period but they couldn't do anything about left winger Dudley Southern's try on the ten minute mark to put Stockport 12-0 to the good.

Of course, it couldn't last and the Wolves eventually got their hands on the ball from a turnover. Stockport started to play like mere mortals and the Wolves began to create their own opportunities. From a penalty lineout, centre Mark Jennings was ruled to be held up over the line but soon after from a scrum ten metres or so out in front of the Stockport posts, crisp passing on the narrow side released scrum half Sean Street for the Wolves first try. It was nip and tuck for a while after that but Wilmslow seemed now to be creating the better chances. 'The only



reason, we're not winning this game, bawled Bob MacCallum to his team mates, is that we're making too many careless mistakes and not taking our chances.' It wasn't until the last play of the half, when No. 8 Alex Taylor caught the Stockport defence in two minds as he broke from a scrum twenty metres out to run in the score, which put the Wolves 14-12 ahead at the break. Two more scores followed in the third quarter. First Adam Taher broke from a catch and drive to touch down in the corner and then moments later from the restart, MacCallum, playing at full back, found space to split the Stockport defence and to time his pass to Jonny Kennedy for the centre to run in from halfway.

Stockport looked down and out as the Wolves advanced again from the restart but this time they forced a turnover in the tackle and from a penalty lineout a few moments later, their forwards drove to put substitute Jordan Pearson in for their third try. They kept possession for the next few phases and



League Round Up

Richard Hart stepped in at scrum half and Shaun Burmah came in following the late withdrawal of Dave Ellis due to injury. Burnage drove the blacks backwards in the opening scrum, won possession and went through the phases for an opening try. In the early stages, e it was all Burnage and on the 18th minute they extended their lead with a penalty for a deliberate knock on. Two minutes later the blacks started to put some phases together and when Burnage were penalised, barber took a quick tap penalty for Northwich's first try. Burnage were still in the game though and after 24 minutes scored a fine on the back of a good line out. with some smart handling. The extras were added and a 10 point margin created. An exchange of penalties left it 10-20 at half time. The second half saw Northwich build some continuity to their game. then with sufficient time still on the clock, they opted for three points from a penalty to make it a four point game. Unfortunately for them, they then got penalised at the breakdown and MacCallum planted his kick close to the Stockport line. The Wolves forwards couldn't get their catch and drive going and the ball was released into midfield where the Stockport defenders strayed offside. MacCallum took the points on offer to restore a seven point lead. The Wolves should really have cleared their lines from the restart but they allowed the Stockport forwards to steal the ball and for the remaining minutes it was it all hands to the pumps to keep the Wilmslow ship from going down. In their eagerness, Stockport were penalised several times for offside and breakdown offences, which eventually enabled MacCallum to put the ball out of play for no side.

Coach Chris Jones would have had plenty to have been pleased about, not least a hard fought win. The return of Jonny Kennedy to partner Mark Jennings in the centre added an extra dimension to the Wolves midfield play, even though the dangerous duo were in the main well marshalled by their Stockport opposites. Ethan Harding moved into the No. 10 spot and hardly put a foot wrong, whilst MacCallum at full back seemed to revel in the extra time and space he enjoyed there. Up front, the forwards generally held their own even though, the Stockport pack seemed to just have the edge in the scrum. without ever gaining much advantage from this. The Wolves lineout was an improvement on the previous fortnight but still not quite functioning as well as it could be, especially in catch and drive situations. Do the coaches need to work on the forwards' body positions? There were still too







many relatively unforced handling errors in close play, probably caused by impatience as much as anything else, and the restart needs to be worked on but the biggest improvement was at the breakdown where there was a big reduction in the penalty count against the Wolves. Clearly, this wasn't by chance as you could hear MacCallum from full back regularly barking out instructions to his forwards to keep their hands off the ball. The best back row forwards have an uncanny knack of knowing when to go for the turnover, normally when a ball carrier becomes isolated, and when to let the opposition have it. The impact though of MacCallum's on field coaching from full back should not be under estimated.
