KESWICK RFC

I'm not aware that Wilmslow and Keswick have ever come up against each other before. We've played most, if not all, of the north westerly Cumbrian clubs at different times and it's a rare season that we don't visit one or other of Carlisle, Penrith, Wigton or Aspatria and not so long ago, Netherhall, remember them, and Egremont featured in what was then known as North West 2. Going even further back in the mists of time, Barry Fisher remembers playing at Whitehaven and

Workington at a time when Wilmslow would travel to take on a combined West Cumberland selection.

It was after one of the periodic league re-organisations circa. 2000 that trips to Cumbria dropped out all together, when Wilmslow played in the South Lancashire and Cheshire League, and only returned when we graduated to this level around 2007-08. So we're delighted that Keswick can now be added to the list of Cumbrian opponents and we'll look forward to the return trip in early April. Unfortunately, 4th. April clashes with the Easter school holidays so if anyone is thinking of making a weekend out of it, they had better make their bookings pdq., if they're not too late already.

Nevertheless Keswick RFC have unwittingly had a huge impact on this club's wellbeing. Back in the early 1980s, G G H Baker, then active at the club, went to Keswick with other luminaries of the time and participated in the Keswick Half Marathon, a circular sort of a run around Derwent Water, organised by Keswick Rugby Club to raise funds for the development of Junior rugby in the area. Graham was hugely impressed and came back with a proposal that Wilmslow Rugby club should do the same and a year later the inaugural Wilmslow Half Marathon took place on a route through

Mobberley, Great Warford, past the much lamented Stag's Head, into Alderley Edge and back down the A34. A few years later, the event's organisation passed to Wilmslow Running Club, the route was changed but ever since it's been a major local event every year and Wilmslow Rugby club, in common with other local sports clubs, have substantially benefited from grants that the Half Marathon committee have been able to make from the funds that the event generates from sponsors and over 4000 runners taking part each year. We have Keswick Rugby Club to thankfor the inspiration which made it all happen.

Keswick were promoted to North 1 West this season after winning both the Cumbrian League and then winning a four club play off against Aspatria, Wigton and Cockermouth last season. The Cumbrian League is populated

almost exclusively by the West Cumberland clubs and until this season the winners would move up into the North Lancs and Cumbrian League, before joining this one. Whether or not it will prove to be a step to far for Cumbrian League clubs to come straight into North 1 West, time will tell. Keswick are the first to come up through the current arrangements and they've found it hard going since. In 2017-18, they had finished 4th. In NLC 1 behind De La Salle (Salford), Aspatria and Bolton, all clubs with a recent short tenure in N1W. Aspatria who finished second in the play off matches last season went up to the North 2 West league, where they're currently in the second half of the table



Pictures from Keswick v Northwich 26th. October Keswick's one success has been at home against Warrington last month. Two tries, one in each half, the second one after 73 minutes, were enough to despatch Warrington to the foot of the table for a week. It was an edgy affair at the end as Warrington pressed hard for a late score to salvage the game but Keswick held on. They then travelled to Bowdon a week later to go down by 36 - 5 and last week, they went down at home to Firwood Waterloo by 8 - 25. It was a cold drizzly afternoon at Davidson Park last weekend but by all accounts Keswick refused to be overrun. They

took an early lead but Waterloo had four tries by half time. Keswick though put on a good show in the second half which was shared, a try apiece. They could easily have had a second right at the end had the final pass not gone to ground.

Nothing is certain in rugby and we can be sure that our visitors will be up for this one. To head back home for Christmas with the Wolves scalp in their bag would give them no end of hope for the New Year and the second half of this season's campaign. The Wolves should take nothing for granted.

Wilmslow coach Chris Jones was in no doubt last week. Keswick is now the most important game of the season for us, he said, just after the Wolves had won at Birkenhead Park.

The Wolves winning streak continued with six unanswered tries in their most complete performance of the season thus far against a Waterloo side, fancied by many to be in the promotional mix come next April.

Waterloo saw their fair share of possession, particularly in the second half, when their dangerous back three hoovered up any loose or misdirected kicks and initiated a series of threatening counter attacks, which had the Wolves penned back for lengthy periods. The Wolves defensive line though retained its discipline throughout and did well to restrict Waterloo to just two first half penalties.

In contrast, the visitors had no answer when the cavalry in the Wolves lethal back division got going. Sean Street, Bob MacCallum and Jonny Kennedy are as dangerous a midfield as any in this league, add Kieran O'Rourke, whose influence just grows week by week, the in form James Coulthurst, the powerful Mark Jennings together with Ethan Harding and Ben Day, when both are fit and available, and you have a unit capable of shredding any defence at this level on their day. And this was their day! Wingers Jamie Kingdon and Sam Cutts are also well capable of providing the finishing touches when given the chance. Up front, a recast pack, still short of several automatic first choices, more than held their own. The return of prop Adam Taher showed in a much improved scrummaging performance from the one that was pushed about the previous week at Vale of Lune. It was also gratifying to see players such as Conor McMurdock, the newcomer Ollie Stockwin and Jack Masters make full contributions at hooker, prop and No. 8 respectively.

Waterloo were first off the mark and had the better of the opening fifteen minutes, forcing the Wolves back and into early handling errors. After eight minutes, they deservedly took the lead with a simple penalty from their full back Darragh O'Brien. They were looking dangerous on the attack again when they were rightly penalised for crossing in the Wolves twenty two and the game then changed with a pair of line breaks from Wolves full back Mark Jennings, leading to the first of three scores for winger James Coulthurs. Five minutes later, quick clean scrum ball in the Waterloo twenty two released a bit of Merlin like wizardry from MacCallum, which opened up a channel for the Wolves second try from Kieran O'Rourke. The third followed two minutes later when Waterloo got turned over at the breakdown in the Wolves' half and a long kick and chase ended with Coulthurst prodding the ball over the line for his second touchdown.

Wilmslow were down to fourteen players, Sam Cutts being Yellow Carded for an unintended tip tackle, when O'Brien kicked Waterloo's second penalty. Then as half time approached a clean take in the lineout by Seb Pemberton was the prelude to the ball being fizzed across the line to Jennings, who created the space for Coulthurst to complete his hat trick on the stroke of half time.

In the second period, the Waterloo back three of full back Darragh O'Brien and wingers Jacob Allen and Luke Nelson were adept at fielding and running back any marginally inaccurate kicks coming in their direction but despite forcing the Wolves to defend deeply for lengthy periods, the visitors were unable to breach the Wilmslow line and their moves eventually broke down when they were forced into a loose or dropped pass. The Wolves still added two more tries, both absolute beauties. When the Waterloo hooker got Yellow for a piece of skulduggery, ten minutes into the half, MacCallum planted the kick well into the Waterloo twenty two, the lineout drive was then held until the ball was moved across the back line and a sizzling exchange of passes between MacCallum, Coulthurst and back to MacCallum had the No. 10 scampering in for the fifth try. The final try had its origins from a late scrum in the Wilmslow twenty two. Jennings made the initial foray down the narrow side and a multiphase passage of play from backs and forwards alike the length of the field ended with hooker McMurdock producing an outrageous side step and finding nobody in front of him he just trotted in to score under the posts. Arguably it was the best of the Wolves tries and a fitting final flourish.



One just had to applaud both the Wolves back play when they had possession and their achievement in denying Waterloo a try during their periods of ascendency. As one of the old Wilmslow hands said afterwards, Coaches Chris Jones and Mark Jennings are clearly making progress on the training field, there was a growing accuracy and structure to the Wolves play and on this showing they deserve to be where they are.

Here are a couple of recipes which should go down well over the holiday period. The terrine is particularly powerful and tasty and good as part of a Boxing Day lunch or dinner.

Saturday Suppers after Rugby

PORK TERRINE WITH APRICOTS AND PRUNES

250g minced pork (and/or diced pork belly), 150g sliced streaky rashers, 200g chopped pig liver, ½ chopped pig kidney, 50g unsalted butter, 200g chopped onions softened in 50g unsalted butter, 10 crushed juniper berries, 10 crushed black peppercorns and/or green peppercorns, 1 tsp salt, 2 cloves crushed garlic, ¼ tsp mace, ¼ tsp nutmeg, 1 tsp chopped thyme, beaten egg, 100g quartered dried apricots or prunes, 1 tsp shelled pistachios, 25ml calavados, 25ml fino sherry, bay leaves.

Begin by cutting the liver and kidney into rough pieces, then place them in the food processor bowl and process until quite finely chopped. Now mix with the pork mince. Next stir in the onion, crushed juniper berries, crushed peppercorns, salt, mace, thyme, garlic and egg. Make sure everything is well distributed so the flavours merge. Add the dried fruit, pistachios, calvados and cider and then set aside for 2 hours.

Lay some of the bay leaves on the bottom of the terrine tin, pack the pork mixture on top, spread a few more bay leaves and juniper berries on the surface and bake for about 1½ hours in a bain marie (that's a roasting tin half filled with water.

Allow to cool with cling film and a brick on top to weigh it down so that it's not too crumbly to slice. Serve with cornichons, watercress and crusty bread or toast.

TURKEY, HAM AND PISTACHIO PIE

Puff pastry, 250g pieces of diced ham, 400g turkey pieces from the joint, 2 diced onions, 2 chopped garlic cloves, 200g button mushrooms, 250ml chicken stock, 100ml double cream,1tbsp ground black peppercorns, 100g shelled pistachios, 2tsp mixed herbs

Save yourself the bother of making the pastry. The ready rolled shop stuff is perfectly good. Simply line a pie tin with butter so the pastry doesn't stick to the sides. Now pick up the rolled pastry and carefully lay it in to the tin, trimming the excess away from the edges.

Soften the onion and garlic in butter and then stir in the ham dice, turkey pieces, mushrooms, pistachios, pepper, herbs cream and stock. We're looking for a thickish meat, mushroom and stock mixture, which we now tip onto the pastry. Now roll out the remaining pastry until it fits nicely on top as a lid. Prick a few times to allow the steam to escape, brush with a beaten egg and bake for 30 minutes or so until golden brown. Serve with a buttered baked potato.

To drink: Most medium bodied red wines will accompany these two dishes very well. Try a Kiwi Pinot Noir.

David Barker on Birkenhead Park

David Pike asked me after the game last week to pen a few words about my memories of matches over the years with and against Birkenhead Park.

Right at the top of the list is last Saturday's game which was not only one of the most exciting between the clubs I have ever seen ,but also, from our point of view, the most heroic. What a game and well done to all the players.

In no particular order, other memories are that I got my very first Cheshire Cap at Birkenhead Park v. Northumberland in 1963. A 3 – 0 win for Cheshire! Barry Fisher tells me that his first Wilmslow cap was against Birkenhead Park, playing as a prop, in 1958!!

Other wonderful memories were winning the Cheshire Cup v. B.P. in 1973 at Chester after extra time. The team included amongst others, Steve Smith, John Hitch, brother Jim Barker, the great GWM Jones and Peter Shufflebottom our giant of a I second row. The picture shows a disgruntled Richard Haselhurst handing over the cup!



Beating B.P. in the second round of the John Player National Cup in 1972 as a prelude to stuffing Harlequins at Twickenham in the quarter final but sadly going out in the next round to Moseley.

Rick Green missing the final of the Cheshire Cup as his wife Dee was delivering her first baby and Alf Hitchcock in another match v. B.P. actually leaving the field of play as his wife was also producing.

In 1968 Tim Holloway and I went on tour with B.P. We first played Blackheath in London (won) then flew to Rome where we played Roma Olympic. At half time instead of oranges they brought on chilled glasses of Frascati (the Pope's favourite drink we were told !!!). Finally we flew back to Paris to play Stade Francais – an evening match under lights which again we won. The powers that be were so upset that they turned off all the lights in the stadium and our wonderful band of supporters had a hell of a job getting out! Others on this tour were Mike Elphick who transferred to us from B.P. and played second row for us for many years and Mike Chapman who played centre and wing. Both were fine additions to WRUFC.

HOW TO WRECK YOUR CLUB

Last season Leicester South and Peterborough Lions were relegated from 2 North into the Midlands Premier League. Their respective committees then set about 'revising' their players' terms and conditions to reflect their new status at Level 5.

The result seems to be that Leicester South have lost all their players and have had to withdraw from the Midland Premier League, citing no front rows, player safety, blah...blah..blah. ! Their second team also appears to have withdrawn from the leagues and the club will now play only friendly non league rugby until they are ready to be readmitted to the Midlands set up. At least, that's what it says on their web site.

The situation at Peterborough Lions is not just as drastic, not yet anyway, but all their first team players from last season have also b******* off in a huff and they've lost all ten of their matches this season, some of them by huge margins.

Reverting to amateurism is clearly not without its risks if vou've been a paying club.

Our neighbours at Macc, who were the third club relegated from 2 North last season, are amongst the front runners in

the Northern Premier League and clearly haven't suffered the traumas affecting Leicester South and Peterbororough Lions. Were Macc able to retain most of their players from last season or is it that they have just been able to bring in players from their 2018/19 Cotton Traders Premiership second team? Certainly this season's Macc Lions side doesn't seem to be doing quite as well as in the recent past.

In our league, our friends at Vale of Lune also suffered an exodus of players after their relegation from the Northern Premier League last season, we are told to financial inducements elsewhere but their new players appear to have settled down and now have close to a 50% win/lose record.

Of the relegated clubs from Level 5 last season, Wilmslow are not the only one amongst the leaders at Level 6.. Syston, Derby and Lichfield are all doing well in Midlands 1 East and West respectively.

I wonder what makes these three different from the rest. All amateur clubs, like us, I would guess, with probably much the same group of players as before

Kendal are mid table in North 1 East so it looks like the vast palatial set up at Mint Bridge will have to wait a bit longer for the level of rugby and kind of team it aspires to.

Most of the other relegated clubs from Level 5 in the London and South Western divisions are all mid table, at best, this season. ...

Cheshire Vase

Despite sub zero temperatures and threatening swirling mists, a decent crowd, winter mufflers and all, turned out to witness this semi final Cheshire Vase game. Visibility from the touch lines was poor so it was not always possible to see clearly which side was doing what, especially when play was on the far side of the pitch and at the far end. The players though could see well enough and produced a decent enough fast moving game in freezing conditions.





Sandbach have been plying their trade in the Midlands Premier League for several seasons now, a level above Wilmslow who are so far this season's pace setters in North 1 West, a level lower. It was an opportunity, therefore, to assess the difference between a fourth placed level 5 side and one at the higher levels of the grade below. In many respects, it turned out to be 'Déjà Vu'. Last season the Wolves found Level 5 rugby more than they could cope with. The pace of the game was just quicker, the skill levels and athleticism of the players higher. On the evidence of this game, one would conclude that not much has changed and that the chasm between the two levels is as much as ever. Last season though, the Wolves would have shipped a barrel load of points in this kind of game and it would have been out of sight by half time. This time, although well beaten at the end, they were not overrun, the two Sandbach tries arose more from their good play than any careless defensive lapses by Wilmslow, and mathematically it was a contest right to the final whistle. Nevertheless, should the Wolves retain their current league position for the season, they will now be in no doubt, if any ever

existed, that they will need to raise their game significantly to do

these players though, there would have been a big difference between playing against sides in the North West Intermediate League Division 2 South and one from the Midlands Premier League.

There wasn't much to choose between the sides in the first quarter. Sandbach looked dangerous and fluent when they passed the ball wide whilst Wilmslow made several promising line breaks, which unfortunately just fizzled out when the ball carrier got isolated. A marked difference between the two sides was that Sandbach always seemed to have players running off the ball in support of their ball carrier and their handling was more secure, which, of course, enabled them to retain possession for longer and to build periods of pressure on the Wolves defence.

On the quarter hour, Wilmslow took the lead when they won clean lineout ball in mid field and the ubiquitous Ben Day, playing at No. 14 this week, came in off the wing to break the Sandbach line and a couple of passes later, full back James Coulthurst was powerful enough to hold off the Sandbach tacklers to go in under the posts. It was a smart sequence which would have shown the visitors that the Wolves could play a bit with go forward ball. Unfortunately, they didn't have much more of that for the remaining sixty minutes.

That was quite long enough for Sandbach to get into gear and the longer the game went on the more they forced the Wolves back into their den. To add to their difficulties, the Wolves increasingly fell foul of referee Henry's whistle at the breakdown and the pressure just built. But their defence got stuck in and it wasn't until half time approached that Sandbach were able to create the space on their left wing to reduce the deficit.

Mark Jennings, something of a talisman for the Wolves, had to be replaced at half time and Sandbach then dominated the second half, which was conducted almost exclusively in or around the Wolves twenty two. When the Wolves did get their hands on the ball it was deep in their half, they were rarely able to get beyond halfway and when they did, it wasn't for long as the siege on their line was soon resumed. Almost inevitably the pressure finally told when well into the final quarter Sandbach sucked the Wolves defence in close and created the space out wide again on their left wing for the match winning score. They then only had to control events for the ten minutes or so remaining to run out winners, which they did without allowing the Wolves any real sniff of a chance. In fact, the Wolves were once again stuck back in their twenty two, when the game was brought to a close.

Sandbach were clearly the better side, a good shade faster all around the pitch with the skills and organisation to match but the Wolves had faced up to them for the duration and gave nothing away easily. They can take solace from having restricted Sandbach to just two tries.

WHAT THEY SAID AT WATERLOO

Firwood Waterloo's hopes of extending their five match winning sequence came to an abrupt halt away at Wilmslow, as they conceded six tries in a 34 – 6 loss.

This was always set to be a tough fixture against a side that has only failed to take a try bonus point once this season and picked up a losing bonus point in both of their only losses. Yett the boys in myrtle started confidently, as has become their custom, taking the game to Wilmslow. They had good early spells of possession through keeping play close to the forwards. This helped them to a 0 - 3 lead through the boot of the ever dependable Daragh O'Brien.

Wilmslow remained patient and inevitably worked their way into the game as their forwards established a platform for the backs to score. They were very clinical in converting the few chances that were presented. Their third try started from deep in their 22 when they kicked long for their winger to win the chase for the ball and to cross the whitewash.

Following a high tackle, the home side were reduced to 14 but 'Loo were unable to properly capitalise as the home defence held firm. A penalty from a deliberate knock on was their only score in this period, reducing the deficit to 14.

Wilmslow's bonus point try came towards the end of the first half as their impressive backs engineered an overlap to score for a lead of 22 - 6.

In the second half the boys from Blundellsands again started with an attacking intent yet despite good periods of possession failed to add to their tally. The forwards maintained pressure on the home defence but they lost possession through slips at vital moments. Whilst there were good individual breaks from midfield notably by Captain Jack Weare, Daragh O'Brien and Kurt Riley, they made too many unforced errors in their opponent's 22. They needed quicker ball to threaten the home side more consistently, although they did restrict them to two second half tries.

The large travelling contingent from Blundellsands witnessed an accomplished performance by the home side who continue to make a strong case for the automatic promotion place at the end of the season. After the match coach Stuart Turner was realistic in commenting, "Not a good day at the office for us. We knew how good they can be and we needed to be on our top form to compete. I thought we competed well in many phases of the game, but we needed to convert our chances. Few sides will leave Kings Road with points this season."

In the end it was strength of character, willpower and a never say die spirit which enabled the Wolves to hold on for five more league points against their closest challengers at the top of the North 1 West League. If you had been expecting a close hard fought tense encounter, befitting a top of the table clash, then you wouldn't have been disappointed

In the face of relentless attack from Birkenhead Park in the final, seemingly interminable, play of the game, the Wolves defence was just heroic. Park threw everything they knew at Wilmslow for the single score which would have tied it up for them. Their forwards, as they had done all afternoon, drove again and again, wedged together in a kind of medieval phalanx and when they stalled, the cavalry in their backs tilted their lances and charged at Wilmslow's blue line. It wasn't for bowing, the tackles just flew in and when one man was stopped, the tackler just got to his feet and covered across to take out the next one. It was one for all, all for one amidst a backdrop of high drama but in the final analysis, you just wonder how Park failed to get that winning score. They created plenty of chances for themselves, not least when they spurned a very kickable penalty in this final phase. Why on earth didn't they take the three points on offer and settle for a four point league win? Had their thinking fallen victim to 'White Line Bonus Point' fever? If the roles had been reversed, what would Wilmslow's Bob MacCallum have opted for?

Once again, coach Chris Jones had had to wrestle with a lengthy list of injuries. By his reckoning, eleven of his squad could not be considered for selection but there is more strength in depth at the club this year, witness the second string Vikings carrying all before it. On paper it didn't quite look the Wolves strongest selection but with Street, MacCallum, Harding, Day and Coulthurst in the back line, there was still plenty of potent running fire power, which was to prove decisive. A word too for Harry Patch, who had answered the call from afar for an all too rare appearance. Up front the smallest man of all, Conor McMurdock, playing at hooker was simply outstanding in everything he did. The front row was up against arguably the strongest and heftiest pack in the league. Ms. Taher, Parker and Stockwin all acquitted themselves with distinction and there were no slouches in the back five either. Coach Chris Jones was full of admiration for his players afterwards. 'Performances like that, he said, just don't happen by chance. It was testament to all the hard work and effort from the players since last summer. Their defence has been getting stronger week by week but on this occasion it was unbelievable.'

But it didn't start at all well. Within a minute, the Wolves had meekly coughed up possession at the breakdown, which should have been much more secure than it was. Park then got the benefit of the bounce of the ball and a delicate cross kick by their scrum half Sam Orr sat up perfectly for right winger Sam Tyrer to gather the ball and from just a metre or so to touch down.

Wilmslow's ball retention continued to be insecure in the tackle and at the breakdown but on the half hour it all came together when left winger Jamie Kingdon breached the home defensive line and when the ball was recycled, centre Ethan Harding's judgement to straighten the line was spot on and his perfectly timed pass to Ben Day gave the outside centre all the space he needed to run in for the equalising score, converted by MacCallum. Moments later Park were awarded a penalty in mid field and from the ensuing lineout, they drove and picked and drove again to regain the lead, lock jack Ashcroft touching down. It was then the Wolves turn to show that they also knew how to score from a close in lineout as they worked one of their favourite front of lineout moves to put Alex Taylor over in the corner for twelve apiece at half time.

The second half got underway in much the same vein. Park tended to rely on their pack to bludgeon its way up the field, whilst the Wolves would counter with enterprising penetrative running from their backs. Park went ahead again, when they opted for three points from a penalty. This was followed by an excellent piece of handling by the Wolves, backs and forwards alike, which ended with lock Seb Pemberton running clear down the left wing for an inside floated pass that saw scrum half Sean Street cross unopposed. Cue for Park's forwards to force themselves over from yet another of their well drilled forward drives, flanker Sean Mooney getting the try. Once again though, the Wolves responded by running and punching hard at the Park defence and when it opened up, Street was off again for the fourth try. Mauled again by these opportunistic Wolves, Park raised the tempo and the Wolves had to dig deep to keep them at bay. They then nearly had a fifth try, which would have put them out of sight when Street broke away again from half way but he knocked on when trying to collect his own kick ahead at full gallop.

And so to the final pulsating play of the game. Park were on their own line but they worked their way slowly down the field, making no mistake which would have been terminal. They lay siege to the Wilmslow line, got awarded a couple of penalties when the Wilmslow defence was forced to infringe but when they finally got turned over on the Wilmslow line after a multitude of phases and the ball was blasted into touch, the local referee, Jimmy Taggart, making no new friends at Park, blew for no side.

It had been a real top of the table encounter between two sides, both show casing their respective strengths. Park though will be kicking themselves for not taking the opportunity but in mitigation, they were up against a Wilmslow side, who have only once failed this season not to score at least four tries and whose defence must now be one of the hardest in the league to break down.

Chris Jones soon turned his thoughts to the visit of Keswick next week. 'That now becomes the most important game of the season, he said, they're a proud club, they have nothing to lose and they'll be up for it'
