This film, a sensitive study of everyday rural life on a countryside farm in postmodern Holland, portrayed such mundane routine tasks as mending tractors and chopping wood in an altogether more natural setting where farm workers of both sexes (Holland is after all, very liberated!) combined in numerous thought provoking (not to say mind boggling) and imaginative cameos illustrating the need of simple country folk to ensure the continuation of their bucolic existence. With camera work of searching quality, the story line was a little difficult to follow mainly due to the fact that the dialogue was spoken in Dutch and subtitled helpfully into Danish. Or was it the other way round? This however did not detract too much from the film's essential message which was clearly visual in nature and very much a metaphor for the human condition with life's constant need to perpetuate its existence no matter what the physical environment being the key underlying theme of the work. In this sense, the spoken word at the oft repeated moments of high tension and climax was rendered redundant, being realistically substituted by a universal language of primeval grunts and gasps. Thus as Reevesy, the informed critic who had clearly studied the film in some depth, so perceptively noted, Joey's groans and moans poignantly reflected the delicious narrowness of the dividing line between agony and ecstasy. Both such emotions are expressed through similar verbal outpourings and here we witnessed in the space of a mere couple of hours physical manifestations of the same, thus giving the weekend that valued and essential metaphysical tinge!

In fact it was a splendid weekend all in all and a big thanks to Greg Pandit and Robbie Harrison for their effective organisation.
