Match Results/Reports

Saturday 20th December

2nd XV v Collegiate, home, won 60-0; something of a pre Christmas canter this one, with tries from Steve Wallace (2), Steve Roberts, Graham Davies (2), Dave Baldwin, Mark Astbury, Matt Houston, John Burgess and Chris McHugh. Man of the Match, caught by ace cameraman Joe Fisher on video, was Peter Collins who played full back for the visitors. At one point, he was taken head on and bounced out of the way by a rampant Steve Wallace en route for a try. "After I realised what I had done," said Wally, with much sense, "I promptly apologised to him and promised I wouldn't do it again." Matt Houston converted five of the ten tries.

3rd XV v Collegiate, away, lost 12-17; clearly the better Collegiaters had chosen not to travel as we faced a pretty stiff side here. Tries were scored by Jason Holland and Alan Roberts and Mush Cotgrave converted one for a creditable performance in the circumstances.

Saturday 27th December

1st XV v St Edwards, home, won 10-5. This was an excellent win against a side which blended some hard experience with a set of talented student backs who were home on holiday. We won through a Peter Lewis try, converted by Gary Furlong, the latter also slotting a penalty.

2nd XV v St Edwards, home, won 21-5. Terry Baker was our outstanding player, filling in at number 8, and our scores came from tries by Bongo Elkerton and Matt Houston who also kicked a conversion and three penalties. It was a bit of a mixed day for Bongo who was supposedly subbing for the firsts (he got changed in their dressing room, the elitist sod) and pressed into action for the 2nds spent much of the game watching the firsts from the 2nd XV pitch! Saturday 3rd January
