Guiding Principles

- We believe it is about enjoyment for all (coaches, parents and most importantly the players).
- We will encourage strong participation of the parents.
- We expect only positive encouragement from parents and coaches.
- Our aim will be for long term player development.
- We will foster a squad based approach, the best help the worst improve.
- We will have an emphasis on development of skills and a "team ethos".
- We will support our volunteers in obtaining knowledge and skills to help develop individual players in line with latest FA concepts and guidelines.
- Our Coaches, Parents and Players sign up to and uphold the FA respect codes of conduct.
- We have a vision to grow to U18 & U21 and provide our children with continued playing opportunities as they become young adults.

FA Long Term Player Development Model

Coaching Principles

Colts: U7 to U10

- Open to all not selected to join on perceived ability.
- Fun based approach, enjoyment is key.
- Equal participation of all, as far as possible each player should get equal pitch time.
- Training combination of "learn by playing" and drills to develop ABCs (agility, balance and co-ordination) and football skills.
- Players should not be rigidly picked in fixed positions.
- Winning is not the object of the game.
- Team and squad based approach allowing individual expressions.
- Emphasis on learning skills as opposed to always having to win.
- Teamwork and skills development are the key.
- No competitive matches played against other teams, participation in friendly games per FA guidelines (NB: will apply to U10 from 2014-2015).
