
Identify: What are the risks? These may be physical (e.g. trailing wires), environmental (e.g. noise), or mental (e.g. workload)

Who: Who would be at risk of harm?

Evaluate: How can we reduce the risk? Use the hierarchy below

Record: Complete this Risk Assessment with all relative information

Review: The same task can have different risks on different days, often depending on variables such as people / weather. Review the Risk Assessment prior to beginning the task to ensure it is still suitable.



It is the statutory duty of all staff and coaches to explicitly follow all control measures identified in this document Consider all possible control measures to ensure the risk is as low as is reasonably practicable.

Remember: PPE is the last line of defence and will only reduce the severity of an accident that has already happened. Consider if there are other controls that will reduce the chances of the accident happening in the first place.

Completion Notes:

- Consider each hazard individually, and what the outcome would be if the risk materialised e.g. the hazard may be some trailing wires, the risk would be somebody falling over and injuring themselves.
- Using the table above, consider the likelihood of each risk materialising, and then the severity of the outcome. Multiply these together for the initial risk rating.
- Detail what control measures will be put in place to reduce the overall risk, e.g. Good housekeeping prior to beginning the task will reduce the chances of somebody falling over a trailing wire.
- Now that the control measures are in place, review the likelihood and severity, taking the control measures into account. Multiply these together for the residual risk rating ideally this should have decreased.
- If there are any additional control measures that are required but are not yet in place, detail these in the commentary along with any actions required to put these in place, e.g. order some tie wraps to help avoid trailing wires.

Coronavirus disease (Covid19) is an infectious disease caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome. The virus is primarily spread between people during close contact via small droplets produced by coughing, sneezing and talking. People can also become infected by touching infected surfaces and then touching their face. Symptoms include: A new and continuous cough; a high temperature; or a loss of or change in normal sense of smell and taste (anosmia).

it with their bat. Equipment must be
kept at each players cone at a two-
meter distance these will be provided
by HCC there will be 8 designated
cones per net. If after using the nets
attendees feel unwell, or any
member of the household tests
positive for Covid 19 the Attendees
agree to inform HCC of this as soon
as possible. Players should remain
socially distanced at all times with
exception of the wicket keeper
standing up to the wicket and slip
fielders. Non-striker should social
distance from umpire and run on
opposite side to the batter on strike.
A hygiene break is to take place every
six overs. The wicket keeper is
required to return the ball directly
back to the bowler. Only one person

					is allowed in the score-box at a time. When the ball leaves the field of play it must be retrieved by an on-field player. Players must return to their vehicles in the event of inclement weather.
