

SEASON REVIEW 2021-2022

THE CHAIRMAN

elcome to the Review of the 2021–22 season. It is 2 years since we were last able to publish the Review and the intervening period has, said with typical British understatement, been interesting! A lot has gone on, but I first want to thank the small group of people who have steered us through Covid-19, who got us back on the pitch when it was safe for us to do so, and who found interesting and imaginative ways of keeping us engaged in what our plans were going forward. Thank you, Lucy Woodside as club Covid Officer, Beth Alvey as Ms Sensible & Practical in getting things done, and Dickie Wallis who has the great capacity to make the complex, even government regulations, look relatively simple and straightforward so that we could plan with certainty. Well done team!!

After two years of disruption and the resulting challenges we could have done without the huge change programme that England Hockey chose to throw at us. New league structures, new regulations covering league hockey, a new administrative system (GMS), a stated intention to reshape junior hockey, and yet a further change to the talent development framework – the third iteration in the last 8 years. I often wonder if those sitting in Bisham Abbey creating a raft of change initiatives really understand the practical implications of grassroots execution of their initiatives.....

That said being Deeside Ramblers we have got on with the task at hand and have played our part in this most significant of change programmes. A particular thanks goes to Yvonne Meadows who was my partner in crime with the GMS implementation and Yvonne made many new friends with those on the GMS Support Desk as we worked through uploading of fixtures, player registration, match card preparation, and umpire registration to a system that was poorly designed, difficult to use, and where the technical implementation failed due to insufficient capacity and inadequate 'road-testing'. And it is going to be used for junior hockey next season!!!

So, in the background there has been a lot going on but let me now get back to the important stuff – playing hockey.

I start with the Ladies' section - wow, wow, wow - what a season!

The Ladies' is started off the season somewhat nervous of what might lie ahead – the league reorganisation meant they had achieved the equivalent of two promotions within the old structure. So they needed to step-up their game and achieve a consistency of performance which they certainly did remaining unbeaten until early February and by finishing fourth in the league. Fantastic.

To the Ladies' 2s. What a sequence of fine performances we have seen throughout the season with a rock-solid defense being married with an outstanding scoring record of nearly 4 goals per game. On the penultimate game of the season they were crowned league champions and at the end of the season remained undefeated. I believe Hannah Aldridge is still tallying her goals scored for the season. An Outstanding team performance.

The Ladies' 3s found themselves in the same division as the 2s – two teams from the same club in the same division is never easy but they have dug in, secured enough points to sit in a group of 4 clubs in the middle of the table. This is a young side with some exciting talent coming through who will be pushing for starting places higher up the club when it comes to next season.

The Ladies' 4s also had a great season, finished in 3rd place and are ready to push-on next season. The development pipeline is strong in the Ladies' section and, together with success in getting more senior players back to regular playing, we will be entering a 5th team in the league next season.

The story with the Men's section is patchier with player retirements from the top sides, some definite post-Covid changes in player's commitment to regular hockey, and the dynamics of the league reorganisation all making for a difficult season. Pre-pandemic we had been considering if we could sustain an 8th team. However, we are now going to have to try to understand the change in the 'commitment' dynamic as this is an important ingredient in any successful club and we need to do what we can to correct the current 'drift'.

However, there was also another feature of the season which I shall call 'the curse of the red x'. On a Monday night the selection committee meet, select the teams from the list of players making themselves available through Pitchero with the aim of producing squads with a minimum of 13 players. Each week this has been achieved – and then 'the curse of the red x' strikes. We realised that we would have Covid related withdrawals but we have been losing 10 or more additional players each week post-selection who decide for whatever reason they are now not available. There is too often no communication with team captains and Thursdays and Fridays have become a mad scramble to rebalance selection with 'phone calls and WhatsApp messages pinging about until late on the Friday night and I know of a few instances when the 'red x' appeared on a Saturday morning.

Too often we have ended up fielding a bare-11 against a full-strength opposition including subs, and with no consistency in who is in a particular side it makes playing a team sport pretty difficult. Please, please, please think and communicate – the 'red x' should be the last act and should serve to confirm you have communicated via 'phone or message. That said whilst many clubs have been folding teams and failing to fulfil fixtures, we have managed to get all our sides out each week and the club greatly appreciates the hard work from team captains and the selection committee in making this happen. The results on the pitch reflected this rocky road – the Men's 1s and 2s held on to their current league status, but only just, as did the 4s, 6s and 7s, but unfortunately the 3s and 5s were relegated. I will let the team captains tell their own stories in the pages that follow.

Sustaining the pipeline of talent development has always been a club strength and that continues to be the case with some 280 players aged 18 or under. Our 3 Badgers and Beavers teams have produced consistently strong results through the season – one stat that continues to impress me is that in October our Badgers and Beavers racked up 57 goals and only conceded 9. Feeding into Badgers and Beavers we have the outstanding work done by the Sunday morning crew and also players transitioning from Sunday to Monday evening. The strength of that is shown by the under-10 girls reaching the Northwest finals of the In2Hockey competition where they finished third and the under-12 boys winning the Northwest finals and they now progress to the National In2Hockey finals in early May.

I hope this overview gives you a shared sense of pride in what we do and the way in which we do it. As you read through the review it helps you appreciate the breadth of achievement and participation right across our II league teams, our three junior Saturday teams, our multiple cup teams, and with our junior members on a Sunday morning as they start their hockey journey.

For long-term and sustainable performance success you need a consistent talent pipeline but what you do with that talent requires coaches and match day management including umpires. I would encourage all of you to think about how you might be able to contribute as a coach, as an umpire, or team manager, and then do something about it – courses are available throughout the summer via the EH website.

Beth Alvey and her Social Committee has breathed new life into the club's social programme post-Covid and I would ask you to support these and hopefully have some fun whilst doing it. Our focus is on fun but our events do also have a fundraising element to them as we seek to close out the financial blackhole of £25,000 created over the last two years and also pay for the new LED floodlights.

The 'Dawn-To-Dusk' hockey event will hopefully be as much fun as the first one was back in 1996, and this time 50% of the funds raised will go to the oncology unit at Alder Hey Children's Hospital, where the 2 year-old son of one of our players is receiving treatment. Lucy Woodside has already raised over £2,000, of which the entire sum will be going to Alder Hey, by running 5km every day of the month through February and I do hope that we can smash that incredible personal achievement with a real Deeside Ramblers collective effort.

So, enjoy the read about our season, reflect on what you can do for the club because each one of you is an equally-important part of our family, and enjoy our summer hockey programme.

As the mistress of understatement, Lady Whistledown notes that the 1s play in a tough league. In the South you play club sides (if you include Team Bath Buccaneers in that category); in the North you enter the semi-professional world of University hockey where half the teams play and train 4 or 5 times a week, with some players on scholarships and most of them supported by a whole range of facilities from nutrition, strength & conditioning, psychology, video analysis, and injury management. That said, we choose to play at this level and the best strategy is to just get on with it - but it is also good to remind ourselves of how well we do as a club to be competing at this level.

What we didn't plan for was a change of jockey halfway through the race. Never to be put off in the face of adversity, we asked Ali Ghazanfar to take over as head jockey with the redoubtable and indefatigable Andy Mitchell as head groom and stable lad. Changes were made to how we approached the game; we managed to secure a recruit or two and to bring some junior talent through, whilst the senior players played their part and showed real leadership.

Yes, we scraped through to safety, but in doing so we ended up regularly giving 5 or 6 U20s a great hockey experience that they can carry with them through their hockey careers. And even when the results on the pitch were against us it was noticeable that the players were sticking together; much of that is down to James Pratt as captain - he galvanised the troops, the players were confident in his leadership, and a number of umpires and match officials have commented how well he carried himself and kept control of the team.

From her observation point, Lady Whistledown notes that you can tell a lot about a group of people by how they interact even if things have not gone their way and the post-match gathering orchestrated by James Pratt and Macca showed just what a cohesive group of players they had become.

The Men's 2nd XI finished 10th in the North West Men's Premier League. The 2s followed the 1s as closely as they could - both finishing 3rd from bottom and both going into the final game of the season with relegation very much a possibility. The 1s did gain 1 more point than the 2s (14 to 13) but the 2s had 1 more win (4 to 3) and scored 2 more goals than the 1s (38 to 36) albeit in four more games. No one pulled at the last minute - except Cope, Daddo-Langlois, Dodd-Moore, Fearnall, Hayton, Lamont, Leonard, Millard-Smith, Price, Ryan-Beswick, Tenner and Ward. My Friday nights were free from worry. No issues with duplicate shirt numbers or me having to provide a shirt.
