Annual Report – 2022-2023

We have had a successful season and community rugby seems to be going well despite the concern regarding the Competition restructure from the RFU. We continue to ensure that any information from the RFU and from Hampshire RFU gets out to all the clubs as soon as possible to assist them. To catch all demographics, we have been using email, website, Facebook Page and Group and Twitter to get the messages out there. WhatsApp groups have also proved very useful and supportive, especially for the CSOs and RSLs.

The team in the County Office have been continuing to work hard for our Hampshire clubs and schools and are doing our best to make Hampshire a leading Constituent Body (CB).

Hampshire Rugby and its Clubs are fortunate to have the incredible support of its volunteer members, without whom rugby in Hampshire would just not happen.

I would therefore like to thank all the officials, club volunteers whether it be a manager, coach or parent; who stand on the touchline in all weathers, and of course the players themselves from U6s and upwards who commit on a weekly basis so that they can enjoy the game we all love and enjoy.

Hampshire's Men took part in the top tier of Division One the Bill Beaumont County Championship. During this season in the top tier the squad performed really well closely losing two of their matches in the last 5 minutes. My thanks go to Team Managers Mike Greenslade and Rob Batley, Head Coach Ian Chandler and all the support team who have worked so hard for the squad. These three key members are now stepping away from the County management team and we wish them well in any new adventures.

The U20s Hampshire squad played in the Jason Leonard County Championship; Division 2 and won two matches and lost to Kent. Due to a Mix-up in the registration of players Hampshire U20s went through to the LSE Final and beat Essex. They then beat Dorset and Wilts in the National Semi-Final and played a cracking match in the National Final losing to a very strong Durham. My thanks go to Arthur Rabjohn and his excellent team of coaches. Arthur is also stepping away from County Rugby and we wish him well.

The Hampshire Women have played in the Gill Burns County Championship – Division 2 Pool 2 winning all three of their pool matches. They then played against Cornwall away in the Semi-Final winning the match. This took them to the final of the Division 2 Championship at Ealing Trailfinders on June 4th against Eastern Counties. The women did us proud bringing home the trophy. My thanks go to Team manager Sam Cobb the coaching team.

The U16 Girls enjoyed a new format of ERDPP sessions through the season rounding off with an Intra DPP match and then two County festivals. The U18 Girls again had a good season playing Kent, Surrey and Sussex, winning two matches and losing one. The U18 Boys had a good squad formed but alas came away with no wins against Sussex, Surrey and Kent. The U17 Boys had 97 players to choose from just one squad. They played Surrey, Middlesex and Kent winning just one of their matches. My thanks go to all these Managers and their coaching teams, Amie Boyes, Alison Denmead, Mike Greenslade, Pete Smitha and Rudi Kochinowski.

As for the senior male leagues in the county, congratulations go to Jersey RFC who won the Counties 1 Hampshire league and the 'NEWS' Challenge Trophy. Ellingham & Ringwood RFC walked away with the Counties 2 Hampshire league and the 'ECHO' Cup. Guernsey Raiders 2nd XV won the Counties 3 Hampshire league and the 'Pinnock Cup'. Counties 4 Hampshire league winners were Christchurch RFC. Counties 5 Hampshire North league winners were Andover III. Counties 5 Hampshire South West league winners were Lymington Mariners. Counties 5 Hampshire South East winners were Trojans II.

Some of the Hampshire Cups were completed this season. Hampshire Challenge winners were Millbrook RFC.

For the Hampshire Cups, Hampshire Shield winners were Winchester 2. Hampshire Veterans Cup winners were Havant Mariners and the new Hampshire Village Cup winners were Lymington Mariners RFC.

The Hampshire women's teams also gave us good results with some finishing in the top 3 of their divisions. Trojans placed third in the Women's Championship SW2. Havant were placed second in the Women's NC1 SW(East) division with their second team finishing second in the Women's NC3 SE(South) division. Jersey finished second in the NC2 SE(South) Division.

Hampshire RFU held a Honda volunteer award evening on June 1st where 43 volunteers were recognised from 17 different Hampshire Clubs. There will also be some Hampshire volunteer awards that will be handed out at the AGM.

The Game Development Committee has been run by Rob Matthews and together with the Competitions committee they implemented the new league structure for 2022-23. The coaching committee have arranged some great CPDs in the county for all our club coaches which have been well attended. Their Hampshire Annual Conference is lined up to take place on Sunday 2nd July at Totton College. The safeguarding team has been run very well this season by Sarah Whatmore. The Discipline committee have had a very busy job and we need to remember our TREDs in all aspects of community Rugby. RugbySafe lead Michele Amos has also been busy ensuring our clubs are ready for the Regulation 9 changes coming in next season. Thank you to everyone in the Game Development committee for all the hard work this season.

The Club Development Committee has been reformed this season with a new Chair in place – Steve Benson, who then recruited a new Facilities lead – Terry Foreman and a new Volunteers lead – George Winch. This new team have quickly proved themselves to be an excellent addition to Hampshire RFU and will continue to enhance what Hampshire RFU can offer for our clubs. Thank you.

FINANCE REPORT 2022-23

I am shortly to complete my seventh year as Finance Chairman, and my special thanks to our Executive Director, Julie Greenslade, and to members of The Board, for their support on all financial matters.

The final June 2022 Accounts showed a surplus of £2,904 which was in line with expectations. This compared to a loss of £5,880 for the previous year. As a result, our reserves increased from £96,235 to £99,139. For the 2022-23 season we have budgeted for a break-even situation, bearing in mind the huge reduction in funding from The RFU following the pandemic. However, the financial outcome for the current year to June 2023 is difficult to predict, as the final costs associated with Club Hampshire are unknown at the time of writing. I currently estimate this year's result will be close to break even, or a small deficit depending on the costs of our successful County Championship campaign.

Our "core funding" from The RFU has historically been just over £68,000 per annum for several years, but for season 2021/22, this was effectively cut to zero, and we received just over £20,000 for 2022/23. We have received some other "targeted" funds, for spending in designated areas. However, the LRP fund for the 2022/23 season was clearly still well down on the pre-pandemic levels. We await news of LRP funding for the 2023/24 season. There are some positives to report, in that we have received £12,500 for Age-grade County rugby, and we had contributions from parents and supporters which remain unused and which we have carried forward. Many thanks to all those who have made donations for Age-grade County Rugby. These are greatly appreciated. There is unlikely to be anything beyond minimal RFU funding for senior County rugby, but we are very appreciative of some sponsorship funds received this year which have helped greatly towards a successful County Rugby season.

I am hopeful that our administration costs will come in under budget (again) this year, and our Executive Director has remained ever vigilant in controlling and reducing the costs of running the County Office. These costs are mostly covered by the charges to the clubs and the subscriptions from Associates, together with a 25% contribution from our Core RFU funding.

And so, in summary, my feelings are that we will end the year to June 2023 with a near break-even situation, although there are some uncertainties which might have an impact on this year's figures. The detailed report and final figures will be provided at The Financial AGM, of course, in November. As I said at last year's AGM, my aim from now on will be to have a balanced budget, but the unprecedented nature of the current situation may require us to provide further and unforeseen financial support, but at least we will still be doing so from a position of relative financial strength.

A final word of thanks to our Clubs, particularly their Treasurers, who have managed the Clubs' finances extremely well through a very difficult period, and I fear that the problems in financing the game at grass roots level are far from over, with the expected substantial increase in costs, particularly for energy and fuel, and from the effects of inflation.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT REPORT 2022–2023

Our club development committee helps our member clubs provide a welcoming and safe environment for everyone. We work closely with the professional staff from the Rugby Football Union and help clubs access expertise, funding support and guidance.

Volunteers continue to be vitally important to the delivery of rugby in Hampshire, whether this is at club or county level. You can never have enough volunteers and the reality is that many clubs and county committees rely on a small and ageing group of the 'same old, same olds'. In February, we recruited George Winch from Locksheath Pumas as Hampshire's volunteer co-ordinator and he's made a great start. Liaising with professional staff from the Rugby Football Union he's already run three volunteer workshops across Hampshire at Farnborough, Romsey and Southsea Nomads. He's also led on the Honda volunteer recognition programme. This included the Honda awards evening at Havant Rugby Club on 1 June, when volunteers from clubs across Hampshire were recognised and rewarded.

We've continued to fund our Hampshire Rugby Force initiative this summer and 25 clubs will be receiving grants of £500 for their projects. This supports clubs in the recruitment and engagement of a wide variety of volunteers to carry out work to improve their facilities over the summer in preparation for next season.

Terry Foreman, the Hampshire facilities co-ordinator has continued his sterling work supporting clubs to improve their facilities. Terry liaises closely with professional staff from the Rugby Football Union and together they carried out an audit of facilities in Hampshire clubs earlier this year. 20 Hampshire Clubs have benefited from the Rugby World Cup 2025 Impact Programme, which is focussed on improving facilities for women. This includes improving toilet facilities, sanitary provision and the environment in club houses. Terry also supports clubs in a variety of ways including signposting them to a wide variety of opportunities to access grants and support from local authorities and Sport England.

In response to a request at a club's meeting, we invited bids from clubs for energy support initiatives. Six clubs applied and received grants of £250 towards their projects. Most were for low energy lighting and one was for a new boiler. These grants were awarded on condition that the clubs supply us with an impact report by September 2023, so we can share the learning and savings with other clubs

Thank you to everyone on the club development committee for their support, help and innovation over the last season and we look forward to preparing for next season.

CLUB DEVELOPER REPORT 2022/2023

It's been a great year working with various clubs across Hampshire and IOW and looking forward to continuing this work in 23/24. I have included some main highlights below from the past year and some focus areas for the coming season.

22/23

- The RFU identified clubs in Hampshire who we thought would benefit from targeted support around the Adult Male Game around this time last year (June 2022). We worked with these clubs to offer workshops, 1-2-1's, transition coaching support and other support to help these clubs put themselves in a better position, and we had some good

success working with these clubs who were in a better position playing number wise throughout the 22/23 season, compared to the previous season.

- Whole Club Workshops – I have delivered Whole Club Workshops to Alresford and Kingsclere this past season. These are workshops based around bringing various volunteers, players and committee members together in a room, and looking at the goals of the club, action planning, and a club development plan. I would be happy to look into doing these at any other clubs in the area as they can be very beneficial.
- Hampshire Women and Girls Development – I have hosted several virtual Hampshire meetings over the past season, working with Hampshire RFU to review the season at different points, and also offer resources and guidance which the RFU have to help the development of the female game. This ends with Face-to-Face workshops around Action planning in June at Basingstoke and Trojans (14th / 20th).
- Volunteer Workshops – March/April 23 – Great to have seen clubs who identified volunteer recruitment and retention as an area they wanted to work on, and attending the Volunteer workshops at Farnborough, Romsey and Southsea Nomads. Feedback from these were great and working with George Winch (HRFU Volunteer Lead) we will continue to focus on ways we can support clubs around this area.
- Over the past season, the RFU have offered various club development support through the Governance and Transformation project, Volunteer bursary (£500), U12 Girls funding and Summer Activity Equipment vouchers to name a few. I will continue to share info on these with clubs / Hants RFU as they come about.

23/24 Season

Focus for next season

- We have already identified a few clubs to be part of our targeted support for clubs who may struggle for players in both Male and Female 15 a side rugby. I will be getting in touch with these clubs (if I haven't already) in the next month or so. I would ask any clubs to get in touch with me during the season if you think you may struggle to put a league side out (Male or Female)
- Rugby World Cup – With the start of the RWC fast approaching, I will be keen to support clubs on running events and using the world cup as a key club development opportunity. I will be getting in touch with clubs at the start of the year to hear clubs plans and hope to even get to some of these!
- In the lead up to the Women's RWC 2025, the next few seasons the RFU will be looking at how we support the female game. We have employed two new staff members across the London South East region, and both are active in Hampshire. Vicky Alexander (RFU Growth Activator South) and Kesha Drain (RFU Competition Activator LSE) will both be looking to work with clubs/partners across Hampshire and female participation in both comps and clubs will be something that they will be pushing.

GAME DEVELOPMENT REPORT 2022–2023

It has been a year of multiple challenges where we have seen changes to the tackle height laws, new league structures following the Future Competitions Review and the introduction of a National Cup competition. The Committee has been working hard to ensure that the views of Hampshire clubs are used to shape the future, whilst at the same time, looking at the influences and embracing these to help grow the game across men, women, boys and girls. The performance of our county sides suggests that the game in general is in reasonable health but we are aware that new challenges are on the horizon for next season.

I would like to thank all the members of this committee for their hard work in trying to maintain and drive forward the game across Hampshire. We meet regularly and have been very focused on Competitions, and the impact on clubs, and coaching, with the preparation and feedback for the upcoming change on tackle height. Rugby Safe and Safeguarding are at the cornerstone of all that we do, and there has been significant work in preparation for the change to pitch side first aid provision that is coming in for next season. We continue to focus on schools and girls/women's rugby, recognising the opportunities that we have with the upcoming Women's World Cup in 2025. Finally, there is continued attention on discipline, where referee and volunteer abuse has been front and centre on the agenda, and linkage with Hampshire referees has seen a number of impact presentations at clubs.

We are in a period of flux, where we continue to work to ensure that the game grows across all sectors and in all parts of the County. We are here to listen to clubs and use this to shape our agenda for next season and whilst the foundation work that has been completed will be used to drive us forward, we also appreciate feedback from the playing community on what they see as the challenges for the next 1-3 years so that we can ensure that we remain on the front foot.

DISCIPLINE REPORT 2022-23

There were 50 dismissals at senior level compared with 41 in 2021/22, a disappointing increase.

Punching remains the most common offence with 16 cases followed by dangerous tackle 11 cases and abuse of the match official 10 cases. The number of abuse cases is still far too high.

There were 19 dismissals at age grade level compared with 24 in 2021/22 a slight improvement.

I must remind Clubs that any red card offence must be notified to either the Disciplinary Chairman, the County Office or myself within 48 hours of the end of the match. Failure to notify will result in an additional penalty of £40. The matter will not be dealt with until the Club submits notification.

Similarly, I must remind Clubs that the completed Plea Form must be returned within 14 days of receipt, failure to return the form within that time limit will result in an additional penalty of £40. If the period is longer than 28 days the penalty will increase to £60. A player who has been sent off is suspended until the sanction has been ratified by a Hampshire Panel.

Yet again, I must remind Club Disciplinary Chairman that any offence that involves contact with the head/neck area of the victim the entry point is Mid – Range.

With many clubs now using VEO we have further evidence available when reviewing a red card offence. However, this type of evidence is not always conclusive as the match official may see the offence from a different and closer angle. In reviewing VEO footage provided for some cases during the season we have noticed that coaches are beginning to encroach on to the field of play

leaving the technical area. A final reminder to all coaches, substitutes and spectators you should not enter the field of play.

Girls Rugby

This has been a learning curve season for all age groups with the new age grade boundaries being brought in.

U12 age grade use to be part of the U13 but has now become an age grade of its own – luckily we are able to evaluate U11 girls to play up into this age group which has helped the sections to grow encouraging some new clubs, who previously would have lost girls to more established clubs, to start the girls journeys through their own clubs.

U13 & U15 girls became U14 and U16 and were not really affected as none of their girls moved up. This has created a stable environment, growing numbers ready for next season when the older ages will be moving on.

U18 stayed as U18 but unfortunately still lost older players to ladies' squads. With no feed from players coming up from U15's, this age group has struggled the most. However, a positive from this was that clubs worked well together to still get game time for all players.

At the request of clubs last season, we joined the Hampshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire (HOB) league this season so that we were able to offer more competitive game time to the age groups. Alongside this, there were Pitch Up and Plays added to the fixtures. This worked well and meant teams could form new relationships with other teams and fix up independent fixtures throughout the season.

All in all, we survived a tricky season and are looking forward to lots of new opportunities for the girls in the future.

U15/16's

U16 Competition

24 teams initially entered the competition with 21 teams finishing the 5 round league competition in 4 Divisions, 44 games of the scheduled 45 were played. The Division Winners were:

All 21 teams then progressed to a 3 round waterfall cup competition that saw the following teams win the 5 winners' plaques:

U15 Competition

A record 28 teams initially entered the competition, with 2 dropping out, 26 teams went on to complete the 5 round league competition in 5 Divisions with cross divisional games adding to the mix between Divs 3 & 4. 5 clubs entered 2nd XV's that played each other in Div 5.

59 games of the scheduled 60 were played. The Division Winners were:

CLUB HAMPSHIRE REPORT 2022-23

It has been a very successful season across all the Club Hampshire programmes with plenty of successes to celebrate. My thanks go to all the volunteers who have given freely of their time to benefit those players who have been coached and managed by them.

The senior County men played three games in Division One of the Bill Beaumont Cup and gave a very good account of themselves. The game against Cornwall at Havant was an exciting spectacle and Hampshire were only pipped at the final play denying what could have been a famous victory. The defeat against Kent and Somerset were much closer than the scorelines suggested bearing in mind that Kent won the trophy at Twickenham. There was a great deal of hard work involved in selecting and preparing this squad and they definitely confirmed their status as a Division One side. We are bidding farewell to the Lead Coach and two team managers after many years of service and we are very grateful to them for all their efforts.

The women's squad have gone one better than last season and won the Gill Burns Division 2 trophy in emphatic style by beating Eastern Counties in the final at Ealing Trailfinders. Having won all three of their group games against Kent, Sussex and Essex before traveling to Launceston to defeat Cornwall in the semi-final they may have been considered as favourites but their performance in that final was a real joy to watch.

Both men's and women's managers have presented the newly acquired Hampshire Caps to their players who have represented the county seven times or more and the players have been delighted to receive this accolade.

The Under 20 squad has emulated their senior partners and they finished Runners up in the final of the Jason Lennard National Cup after a defeat to Durham. Victories over Sussex and Surrey in the pool games were emphatic before a defeat to Kent might have ended their campaign. However, Kent fielded ineligible players resulting in them being deducted points and Hampshire progressed to the LSE final against Essex which they duly won and set up a mouthwatering national semifinal against close rivals Dorset and Wiltshire. This was probably the best game of the whole programme and a narrow victory was just reward for a brilliant come back after they seemed to be down and out just after half time. Several players were involved in a Divisional training day last weekend and we are hopeful that further representation at national level may follow for some very talented young men. We bid farewell to the Under 20 team manager and again, we are very grateful to him for all his hard work and attention to detail.

There was also success for both the men's and the women's Under 18 Hampshire squads during their playing opportunities earlier in the year. Both squads were well prepared and several players from the squads have progressed to higher levels of Rugby as a result of their experience. Ninety-six Under 17 men arrived at the first trial to select the Hampshire squad for their three playing opportunities. This has been a more developmental programme which will inform selection for the Under 18 squad later in the year. The games have all gone well and players from many different clubs have represented their county. The Under 16 Girls DPP has gone from strength to strength in its first season and has undergone an RFU review. I am delighted that the coaching team will remain in place for next season although the manager has decided to step down. Interviews for her successor will take place shortly.

I have very much enjoyed my first season with Club Hampshire Rugby and my thanks go to all concerned but especially to Julie and Georgia who have administered the whole programme with incredible efficiency.

Item 6 – To receive a Financial Report – The President invited Board Chair Ed Neville to read the financial report, as Richard Showan was absent: -
Dr Neville read the report

"I am shortly to complete my sixth year as Finance Chair, and I now feel as though I am beginning to have a better understanding of the financial situation as a whole, and of the financial workings of The RFU in particular! Once again, my thanks to my predecessor, Jed Stone, for his willingness, always, to offer help and advice, and my special thanks to our Executive Director, Julie Greenslade, and to members of The Board, for their support on all financial matters.

The final June 2021 Accounts showed a loss of £5,880 which was in line with budgeted expectations. This compared to the loss £5,452 for the previous year. As a result, our reserves decreased from £102,115 to £96,235. For the 2021-22 season we had budgeted for a small loss, bearing in mind the huge reduction in funding from the RFU following the pandemic. However, the financial outcome for the current year to June 2022 is indeed likely to see a further loss, although I think it will be less than the £7,000 loss which I thought likely at the beginning of the season. I currently estimate this year's loss to be around £3,000, which will clearly reduce our reserves still further to approximately £93,000.

Our "core funding" from The RFU has historically been just over £68,000 per annum for several years, but for season 2021/22, this was effectively cut to zero, although we received some other "targeted" funds, and monies remaining in the (COVID) "Immediate Support Fund" were "allowed" to be re-designated as LPR funding. However, the LPR fund for the current season was still only £17,000 compared to the £68,000 prior to the pandemic, a reduction of 74%, which has obviously had a significant and adverse effect on our spending on the "Local Rugby Plan" (LRP). We await news of LRP funding for the season 2022/23 season. There are some positives to report, in that we have received £12,500 for Age Grade County rugby, and we had contributions from parents and supporters which were unused because of the pandemic and which we have carried forward. Many thanks to all those who have made donations for Age Grade County Rugby. These are greatly appreciated. There is unlikely to be anything beyond minimal RFU funding for Senior County rugby in the immediate future.

I am hopeful that our administration costs will come in under budget (again) this year, and our Executive Director has initiated and overseen the move to smaller premises in Wickham, resulting in a substantial saving in rent. These costs are normally funded two-thirds by the RFU from the Core funding received and one-third by our Clubs and Associates, but the reduced funding from the RFU will mean not only that we will be much less able to provide funding for the Local Rugby Plan (LRP, but also that our fixed costs of administration and of running the office at Wickham will, in part need to be funded from own Clubs, Associates and from our reserves, until the RFU funding returns to previous levels.

And so, in summary, my feelings are that we will end the year to June 2022 with a small current year deficit, although there are some uncertainties which might have an impact on this year's figures. The detailed report and final figures will be provided at The Financial AGM, of course, in November. As I said at last year's AGM, my aim from now on will be to have a balanced budget, but the unprecedented nature of the current situation may require us to provide further and unforeseen financial support, but at least we will still be doing so from a position of relative financial strength.

A final word of thanks to our clubs, particularly their Treasures, who have managed the Clubs' finances extremely well through a very difficult period, and I fear that the problems in financing the game at grass roots level are far from over, with the expected substantial increase in costs, particularly for energy and fuel and from the effects of inflation.

The President declared the Financial Report received, and there were no questions.

As in previous years, the President requested it minuted that he expresses his thanks and appreciation for the work of our Chair of Finance Richard Showan and our office team in managing our finances.

The Robbie Keast Awards 2020

His family and friends made a very generous donation to Hampshire Schools RFU which has enabled two awards to be made in his memory – one for U16's and one for U18's. The Awards are in recognition of commitment, dedication and to a player who shows true qualities of sportsmanship.

Robbie's parents were unable to attend to present the Robbie Keast Awards but send their congratulations to both winners.

The Robbie Keast U16 Award 2020 goes to Ethan Thorn – Ethan was unable to be present.

Ethan has been instrumental in the U16's team performance this year providing great drive, enthusiasm and communication from his scrumhalf position. He is very coachable and has put considerable effort into building his positional knowledge and skills over the year. He demonstrated great team spirit and work ethics during squad training but also took the initiative to join all extra

forward set piece sessions. This ensured his understanding of their objectives, together with when and how he would expect the ball to be presented. Ethan not only marshalled and drove the forwards, he released the backs at opportune moments making his decision making, a stand out, both in training and games. The Club Hampshire U16 Management and Coaching team have no doubts that he will progress further in the game and be a great ambassador for youth rugby pathway

Thomas Furtado Mills (Millsy) came to the County game late, he was first selected for the Under 17 squad. Although joining a well-established squad, his enthusiasm and infectious nature enabled him to quickly become a key team member. Whilst observing a specially arranged coaching session held at the club and delivered by London Irish DPP coaches for the U14/15 Age group, an innocuous collision happened. This resulted in a player being knocked to the floor. The quick observations and actions by Brendan and Jayne meant that that an ambulance was called and on the advice of the medical professionals at the other end of the phone, Brendan delivered mouth to mouth on two occasions. The quick actions and immediate care ensured Matthew did not receive any adverse long term side effects and that he was able to make a complete recovery. Brenda. The Ambulance and police arrived at the incident very promptly. Brendan and Jayne thoroughly deserve to be recognised for their wonderful efforts and post care support that they offered Matthew.

Administrator of the year award 2020– Andy Gay was unable to be present – the award was passed to an Alton Rep.

Andy is an ever-present volunteer for the Junior and Age Grade sections of the club. This year, interim fixture secretary for every squad, responsible for Headcase and concussion reporting, opens and sets up changing rooms, sets up pitches, organises external refs, meets and greets teams, new members, refs. Tidies the kit store far too regularly, takes all team kits to and from the laundry. Liaises with local schools to support their rugby initiatives. Organises the annual junior/Age Grade awards day. Andy has done this and Junior Secretary since his son joined the club nearly thirty years ago.

Item 12 – Presentation of Awards 2022

The First Award is the **FMT Bunney Trophy** for the County Championship Player of the Year. This is awarded to **Liam Perkins** – **Liam was unable to be present so the award was passed to his club.**

Liam plays his rugby at Worthing RFC and embodies the continued commitment and deep connection players feel towards representing Hampshire. Liam was a unanimous choice, both as skipper for this seasons County Championship campaign and given the outstanding way he led the side, he was also the clear choice for the FMT Bunney award.

After a 2-year break in the County Championship programme and with questions over its long-term future, it was heartening to see the level of commitment and enthusiasm displayed by all the players selected to represent Hampshire this season. Liam led the squad from the front with passion and great intelligence and was the driving force in pulling the squad together and motivating the side for training and especially for the two fixtures. This came to the fore most obviously for the long and challenging trip to Redruth, where Hampshire had to face a very strong Cornish side and their passionate army of spectators. Liam's performance in this fixture was outstanding and worthy of the man of the match award, in what was a losing cause.

Sean Shepherd and Ben Holt (both Havant RFC) were two players who featured prominently in the County Championship games, which was a shortened campaign due to the late withdrawal of Surrey from the pool stage, leaving us with only games against Kent and Cornwall. With both Counties being able to draw from club sides playing at much higher levels than Hampshire, the effort and commitment from Liam and the other players at the end of a long season cannot go unrecognised and is hugely appreciated by the County.

Liam is a credit to Hampshire Rugby and fully deserves the award of the FMT Bunney trophy for 2022

The Brian Short Memorial Trophy 2022 –

Brian Short, former County President, was an enthusiastic supporter of County youth rugby and wanted an annual award to go to a young Hampshire player who epitomised the spirit of Hampshire rugby: not necessarily the best player, but one who put in the effort and was a team player. I have great pleasure in announcing that this year's winner is **Camren Coffin**.

Cameron has been a member of the County squads from U15 to U18. Playing at hooker, he was not necessarily first choice for the A's or B's and caused more discussions at selection than he realised. Bouncing between squads and starting XV's never changed Cameron's attitude or commitment. He was happy to be playing no matter what and always gave 100 percent when given the opportunity. Ever present at training and games, even when injured or not selected, he supported the team enthusiastically while taking on board advice about his own development. Cameron rightfully took his place as starting hooker in the last U18 match V Kent having lifted his game and forced his way to first choice.

He has shown commitment, enthusiasm and resilience through out his time with Hampshire and shown great spirit to bounce back from selection disappointment while listening to coaches and learning along the way.

The Robbie Keast Awards

Robbie Keast, who had played for the County U15's, 16's and 17's; at the age of twenty-two and having just gained first class honours in Engineering at Warwick University, died in a road accident. His family and friends made a very generous donation to Hampshire Schools RFU which has enabled two awards to be made in his memory – one for **U16's** and one for **U18's**. The Awards are in recognition of commitment, dedication and to a player who shows true qualities of sportsmanship.

Robbie's parents usually attend our AGM to present these awards but are unable to be here this evening; they send their congratulations to both winners.

The Robbie Keast U16 Award 2022 goes to Reuben Cobb.

Reuben was part of the London Irish DPP for the majority of the U16 season. He was always very attentive and diligent in reviewing his own performance and asking for direction and feedback on how he could improve aspects of his play. In the fixtures against Sussex Reuben always showed his abrasiveness assertiveness and tenacity in the tackle and breakdown, Setting the tone for how we would like to play. He never stopped working hard for the team.

Reubens commitment to improving his performance led to him gaining opportunities to play in the PDG. He showed great resilience to return to DPP and continue to work on improving his game and developing his positional knowledge playing in the back row. He worked hard in every activity in every session.

Reuben learnt to jump in the lineout part way into the season and by the Hampshire campaign was a lead jumper in the forward pack. His willingness to learn and develop was evident when he really focused on making his areas for development his strengths, such as his lineout and his offloading. Reuben disclosed towards the end of the year that after every DPP session he'd been noting down feedback and any work-ons, make these a focus for next session. This reflective approach we believe is the reason Reuben began to stand out against other players later in the season. We wish him all the best in his next steps in rugby.

Jack Pawson has been a member of the County squad since U15. He has gone about his business quietly but effectively, making a physical impression on every game he played. Getting himself noticed on match day and in training he forcing his way into the A squad at U16 before leading the U18 as captain in our final two games. Ken was chosen by the RFU as our overall HONDA winner and national finalist and will be invited (with a plus one) to a day up at Twickenham. Ken was awarded a bottle of Bollinger.

The President then addressed all at the AGM...

The last time I was at Ellingham & Ringwood was shortly before the pandemic. I was here to present an RFU club accreditation certificate, was well looked after and watched an enjoyable home win on Pitch 1.

It has been a unique term of office, not least because it has covered four years. The first 21 months from 2018's AGM to March 2020 were pretty normal. Then came the pandemic for the rest of that season and practically the whole of the next one. In 2021, we started the return to rugby.

My main recollections from this period of office can be summarised as follows:

- recovering my own enthusiasm for age group rugby simply by watching much more of it than I had for some time, being impressed by the numbers, the skill levels, the commitment on and off the field and the work put in by coaches and supporters;
- my continuing appreciation and high regard for the literally hundreds of volunteers and coaches in all our clubs at all levels and in all categories of our game;
- I have been pleased to see the expansion of the game despite Covid, especially the women's game, but at the same time have become increasingly concerned for the senior men's game and the difficulties of many clubs in trying to run only two sides where there used to be four or five; there are healthy exceptions and we should note what happens in those clubs, largely around the playing and coaching experience;
- the difficulty in men's playing numbers sits uncomfortably alongside the illogicality of the RFU reducing funding to counties and grass roots rugby as a percentage of its own revenues, whilst expecting those counties to deliver more and more every year. Expanding the game and meeting compliance issues requires greater resource, not less, in terms of both funds and manpower. The last two years have seen both go the other way.
- during the pandemic, there was a much more positive observation. When clubs' income had all but disappeared, it was fantastic and heart-warming to see the multitude of projects that our clubs put together for their communities. I talked about this at last year's AGM and it has been one of the most striking features during my period as President, and one which filled me with great pride. Rugby people are magnificent. And generous. If the RFU wants examples of diversity being embraced by our game, they need only look at some of those community projects. The beneficiaries are more diverse than our players though.

And so four years have flown by and it is time to move on. I have been involved in Club or County committee work since 1987. Having that culminate in serving Hampshire as its President has been a privilege and a real honour, for which I thank you most humbly.

Your Board has improved and relocated the office functions, reduced costs, improved communication and provided as much as possible with severely reduced funds. Competitions will be interesting this year – my thanks and admiration go to that sub-committee, who can never please everybody and are following guidelines from the RFU in defining our offerings for next season.

When you hand over the Presidential reins, you want a successor who will be what you hoped to be yourself, or better. Someone, ideally, who has made a positive difference in every aspect of their life, at home, at work, in the community and in our game - a real achiever but with a measured approach and sound judgement. Well, these are rare animals, but we're in luck! Your man has already given years to Portsmouth and Hampshire Rugby, most recently for Hampshire as Board Chair for the last four years. He has also already received a lifetime achievement award in London today for a stellar medical career. To give you his inaugural thoughts and then close the meeting, please welcome your new President, Dr Ed Neville.
