GOOD AFTERNOON EVERYONE AND WELCOME TO COSSHAM STREET for today's home game against our old friends from MELKSHAM TOWN. Thank you all for your attendance today and for reading this programme on-line! We extend a hearty greeting to everyone connected to MTFC, plus we welcome back a few old friends who currently either play for the Wiltshire club or are within their officialdom, so a warm welcome back to those lads too!

Melksham are handily placed in mid-table & make a quick return to Cossham Street, following their 6-0 League Cup win here, earlier this month, so they will know us & we will know them too. Our Boyz will want to make amends for that League Cup loss, for sure, especially with 11 men on the pitch this time, so please give Our Boyz all your support today as we strive to pick up the 3 points on offer, but overall, enjoy the game & **COME ON YOU MANGOS!**

SO, WITH NO GAME FOR US LAST WEEKEND, let's take stock on what's happened so far this term. WELCOME TO MELKSHAM TOWN!!

Club History

The club was established as Melksham Football Club in 1876. In 1894, we were founder members of the Wiltshire League. We were Division One champions in 1903–04 and won the Wiltshire Senior Cup the following season. In 1920, the club was renamed Melksham & Avon United as a result of their new ground being owned by Avon Rubber, before reverting to our original name in the 1926–27 season. They were runners-up in the league in 1924–25, 1929–30 and 1936–37. In 1951 the club adopted our current name and went on to finish as runners-up in Division One in 1959–60 and 1971–72, also winning the Wiltshire Senior Cup again in 1969–70.



We moved up to the Western League in 1974. After finishing third-from bottom of the league in 1975–76, we were demoted to the new Division One as the league expanded to two divisions. We won the Wiltshire Senior Cup again in 1977–78 & were Division One champions in 1979–80, earning promotion to the Premier

Division. Their first season in the Premier Division saw us win the Wiltshire Premier Shield, a trophy they retained the following season & won again in 1984–85 & 1985–86. However, we were relegated to Division One again at the end of the 1987–88 season.

In 1992–93, we finished bottom of Division One and were relegated to the Premier Division of the Wiltshire Football League. We won the Premier Division and the Senior Knock-Out Cup the following season and were promoted back to the Western League at the first attempt. In 1996–97, we were Division One champions and were promoted to the Premier Division. Winning the Wiltshire Premier Shield the following season, and again in 1999–2000, before winning the Wiltshire Senior Cup in 2002–03 and 2007–08. Although we were relegated to Division One in 2009–10, we were Division One runners-up in 2010–11, earning promotion back to the Premier Division.

We won the Wiltshire Senior Cup in 2012–13 & 2013–14, before winning the Western League Premier Division title in 2014–15. However, delays to making ground improvements meant that we were denied promotion. The following season saw us win the Senior Cup again. The club were runners-up in the Premier Division in 2017–18, earning promotion to Division One West of the Southern League.

Our stadium

We played at Challymead Common until moving to the Old Bear Field in 1883. Relocating to the Conigre in 1920; the ground was part of the Melksham House estate, centrally sited in the town & had been purchased in the same year by Avon Rubber, with the house turned into a social club. A wooden stand was erected on one side of the pitch and wooden fencing installed around the ground. During the 1960s, covered stands were built behind the Rugby Club End and on the other side of the pitch and floodlights were installed in 1986. The wooden stand was demolished in the early 1990s and replaced by a modern metal stand in 1994.

In 2017, in preparation for redevelopment at the Melksham House site, the club moved to Oakfields, a new £7.3 million facility shared with Melksham Rugby Club on the eastern edge of the town. The first match at the new ground was played on 14 January 2017 against Bristol Manor Farm in the FA Vase, with the visitors winning 5–3 in front of a crowd of 1,215.

Matthew Hurley



A real gladiator in the middle of the park, Matt has earned himself a reputation as being a composed, calming midfielder, but does have the odd magic moment such as his 'wonder goals' that he provides. Signed in 2019, Matt offered a seriously impressive season – something manager Richard Fey would be accustomed to having worked with the midfielder at Street.



I had forgotten, though, that Carlisle HAVE been in the National League once before; that was back in 2004-2005, when they bounced back after just one season, so they know what to expect if they did go down again & clearly, they don't want that again, hence the sacking of the manager the other week!

THE WORLD OF SOCCER

WELCOME TO "THE WORLD OF SOCCER", the column that brings you news stories from around the globe. Let's begin in **BRAZIL** once again:

A Brazilian player was recently charged with attempted murder (!) after kicking a referee in the head during a lower league match. Sport Club Sao Paulo player William Ribeiro attacked Rodrigo Crivellaro after he awarded a foul against him. The match v Guarani was suspended in the 2nd half & Crivellaro was taken to hospital. The referee was later released from hospital, while Ribeiro was sacked by his club.

The club said the incident, which happened in the year of their 113th anniversary, was "*one of the worst in its history*" and that they are evaluating what further action to take.

Sport Club Sao Paulo are based in the city of Rio Grande, 200 miles south of the state capital Porto Alegre, and play in the second division of the Rio Grande do Sul state championship. Guarani won the restarted match 1-0 a day later, apparently.

Now, **POLAND**'s recent World Cup qualifier v Albania in Tirana was suspended for over 20 minutes after home fans threw objects at the visiting players!



Karol Swiderski gave the Poles the lead with 13 minutes remaining in their Group I fixture. But he and his teammates were then pelted with plastic drinks bottles from the stands, (see photo) prompting the players to leave the pitch. Play

resumed and Poland leapfrogged Albania into second spot.

Before the incident which prompted the lengthy delay, Poland midfielder Piotr Zielinski was also targeted with an object from the crowd. A post-match interview with Swiderski was also cut short as Poland manager Jakub Kwiatkowski encouraged him to leave as bottles were again thrown at him. The Poland players were also forced to protect themselves from bottles thrown by Albania fans.

"After the goal there were full bottles flying in, so it was a bit dangerous, but we came back and finished the game," said Poland captain Robert Lewandowski.

Albania, bidding to reach the World Cup finals for the first time, travel to Wembley to face England next month, prior to completing their campaign at home to Andorra. Poland, who are three points adrift of Gareth Southgate's side, travel to Andorra before hosting Hungary in November for their final two qualification games. In the meantime, there'll be more from THE WORLD OF SOCCER again very soon.

ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

WHAT would football look like if heading didn't exist? The other Sunday we found out at Spennymoor Town's Brewery Field.

The National League North club – see club badge – hosted the first adult football match without heading to raise money and continue the conversation about the safety of players.

The fixture, organised by charity Head for Change, only allowed headers in the penalty area for the first half and then restricted all heading during the second.

Professor Willie Stewart from Glasgow University published research showing that footballers are up to five times more likely to suffer from dementia than the general population.

He believes that neurodegenerative brain disease is linked to heading after further studies showed that defenders were more at risk than goalkeepers, who rarely head the ball.

Dr Judith Gates, co-founder of Head for Change, set up the charity after her husband Bill, who played for Middlesbrough and Spennymoor, was diagnosed with dementia in 2014. Bill, 77, was forced to retire aged 29 after regularly suffering migraines.

"I want people to come away from today with knowledge and the facts that the dangers of heading in football is not a myth," said Judith, who saw her husband kick-off the special match. "We are not proposing to ban heading but there needs to be a discussion about how to protect people who are playing football.

"The time for action is now, the weight of evidence from the studies in this country and the USA means we can no longer ignore this. There are too many former players who are no longer with us because of neurodegenerative disease. "My husband Bill is here today, but he will not remember it tomorrow. We have to protect the players of the future."

The unique match, which ended 5-5, featured ex-Spennymoor and Middlesbrough players and ex-professionals, some with Premier League and international experience, representing the two teams, Head for Change and The Solan Connor Fawcett Family Cancer Trust.

Team Solan won on penalties in front of 390 people, who witnessed potentially the start of the biggest change the game will have ever seen.

Heading is a fundamental part of football, but it is without doubt damaging to the human brain and that's why options are being explored to lessen it.

Being only allowed to head the ball in the penalty area, during the first-half of the fixture, meant there was still a goal threat from crosses and set pieces and long balls could be played forward.

Ironically, James Marwood, the former Gateshead and Forest Green Rovers striker, scored the opener with his head after Gavin Cogdon had hit a post with a diving header at the other end.

There was just one incident when the rules were forgotten and a defender nodded down a long ball forward resulting in a free-kick awarded to the opposition.

When heading was removed entirely from the match in the second half, the change was evident, played more like a 5-a-side game with shorter passing and where aerial duels don't exist.

But this was why the match was an important practical experiment to discover how football would be affected and to keep the conversation going.
