FIELD REVIEW -1

CIRENCESTER ACTION – by Martin Preedy







The 2020/21 campaign, is Evesham's 29th consecutive season as a Southern League club, (which includes last season's void campaign) with Manager Neil Hunt being the new man at the helm. Since their return to Division One South & West in 2012/13, they have finished 14th, 16th, 2nd (losing in the play-offs), 6th and 5th (again, defeat in the play-offs). They finished 4th in 2017/18 but lost on penalties in the play-offs to Swindon Supermarine. In 2018/19, they were 7th. They spent four seasons in the Premier Division from 2008/09 – 2011/12.

This is their ninth season at their new home at the Jubilee Stadium, Cheltenham Road, following their six seasons sharing Worcester City's St. George's Lane (2006-2011 inclusive). They had previously sold their ground at Common Road, for development, but it took quite a while, for their new ground to be built – hence the ground-sharing.

The Football Club that we know today, dates from just after the Second World War, when the club was re-formed by soldiers returning from action, and they immediately joined the Worcester League. After some early success, they moved to the Worcester Combination, taking the league title in 1952/53. In 1956, they joined the Birmingham League, and then the Warwickshire League in 1959. They returned to the Worcester Combination (now Midland), in 1963.

They moved to Common Road in 1968, and opened their clubhouse in 1975. In order for the club to realise their ambition of Southern League football, they had to bring the championship to Common Road for the first time since 1968/69, and in 1991/92, they rewrote the record books by lifting the Midland Combination Premier Division title and the Combination Challenge Cup. United also reached the Quarter-Finals of the FA Vase, losing to eventual finalists Guisely. After ground improvements were put in place, The Robins finished 15th in their first season in the Midland Division.

The 2007/08 season proved to be one of the more memorable in the club's history. They took Conference side Halifax Town to a replay in the 4QR of the FA Cup, losing 1-2 at The Shay. In the FA Trophy, then Manager, Paul West saw his side beat higher graded Bromsgrove Rovers and Corby Town enroute to the 3QR, before going out to Conference North side Redditch Utd, after a replay. Their league form caught the imagination, as they put together a rather remarkable run of form.

Despite suffering 3 defeats in their opening six matches, they stormed to the top of the Midlands Division, only losing twice in the next 34 matches. 91 points were bagged and a staggering 22 clean-sheets were kept in 40 games, with the experienced Mark Owen topping the goalscoring charts, with 33 goals, which included two hat-tricks.

Over the last 6/7 years, Managerial changes have seen *Paul West & Leon West* in charge, succeeded by *Matt Clarke & Rob Elmes*, then *Paul West* return, followed by *Shaun Cunnington*, *Paul Collicutt* and lastly *Carl Abbott* as 'The Robins' look to reclaim their place in the Premier Division.

Aaron Basford - Forward

18-year-old Aaron Basford joined Evesham United this summer. He had previously been at the Jubilee Stadium last season on loan from Cheltenham Town where he had been within their scholarship programme. Aaron also had loan spells with Cinderford Town and Worcester City.

Adam Mace - Defender

25-year-old, Adam Mace joined Evesham this summer from Bishops Cleeve where he had been the captain. He was also at Cheltenham Town as a junior, before also playing for Shortwood United and Slimbridge FC.

Ben Hayes - Forward

26-year-old Ben signed during the summer, his previous club was Westfields whom he spent 4 years playing for. He previously played for Malvern Town and Bishops Cleeve. Ben was at Evesham previously making a substitutes appearance for the first team in 2014.

Calvin Dinsley - Midfielder

29-year- old Calvin signed from Swindon Supermarine in the summer. He started his career at West Bromwich Albion in the youth set-up. He then had spells with Cambridge United, Evesham United and Stourport Swifts, before playing in the National League South with both Gloucester City and Hereford.

Dan Tustin - Midfielder

21-year-old, Dan is a former youth team captain at Evesham United, who has progressed through to the first team squad. He spent most of last season playing at Pershore Town to gain valuable match time.

Harry Franklin - Defender/Midfielder

20-year-old Harry joined Evesham from Redditch United in October 2019 becoming a regular in the starting line-up. Harry has previously played for Hereford and Merthyr.

Jack Horrell - Midfielder

26-year-old Jack re-signed for Evesham in the close-season, Jack has also played at Slimbridge, Circncester Town, Bishops Cleeve and Brimscombe &Thrupp.

Jamie Clarke - Striker

30-year-old Jamie is one of the local players, taking his opportunity to impress, Jamie has signed for Evesham United having previously played for a number of sides including Pershore Town, Studley and Littleton. He has represented both England and Great Britain at the Deaf World Cup and Deaflympics.

Jamie Lucas - Striker

24-year-old Jamie was on-loan here last season from Halesowen Town. Jamie started his career with Bristol Rovers and made four appearances in the Football League. After several loan moves, Jamie went on to play for Bath City, Brackley Town and Weston-Super-Mare all in the National League South or North.

Joe Heywood - Defender

20-year-old Joe is another product of the Evesham United youth set up, having played for the U18's under then manager Neil Hunt. He spent most of last season on loan at Fairfield Villa gaining valuable experience.

Jordan Lymn - Defender

22-year-old started his career at Cheltenham Town, before joining EUFC for the first time in 2017. He re-joined the club in the summer, having played at North Leigh, Westfields and Bishops Cleeve.

Jordan Staten - Defender

21-year-old Jordan was signed from Redditch United during last season, Jordan is a former England School boy International. He played at Burton Albion and Cheltenham Town before going to study at Hartpury College. He has also played for Bishops Cleeve.

Lewis Clayton - Goalkeeper

20-year-old Lewis signed for EUFC this summer having played at Circncester Town last season, he was also registered for Gloucester City. A former Cheltenham Town youth player, Lewis has also featured for Bishops Cleeve and IFK Mora (Sweden)

Matt Williams - Defender

26-year-old Matt rejoined EUFC this summer. He had two spells with Gloucester City after initially joining them in 2014. He then had his first spell at the Jubilee Stadium, before joining Hungerford Town in December 2017, where he stepped up two divisions to play National League South football. He then returned to Gloucester City for the 2018/19 season, but a few months in he joined Swindon Supermarine. Matt started his football career at Football League side Cheltenham Town, where he was captain of the Under 18s team.

Ryan Paddock - Defender / Midfielder

31-year-old Ryan is another player in his second spell at EUFC, originally signing in 2016. Ryan has also represented the British Army and has previously captained the side. Ryan has played for Bristol Rovers, Weston-Super-Mare, Bishops Cleeve, Cheltenham Saracens, Cinderford Town, and Hinckley AFC.

Lorcan Sheehan - Midfielder

31-year-old Lorcan re-signed for EUFC during the summer, having previously played here between 2016 and 2018 during which time he made 51 appearances. He has also played for Bishops Cleeve and Cinderford Town.

Josh Rogers - Goalkeeper

21-year-old Josh has been a part of the EUFC set up for a number of years having played within the youth and U21 set up. He has also made appearances for local sides including Malvern Town

Josh Hunt - Striker

26-year-old Josh joined the club in the summer, he has previously played for Cinderford Town and Malvern Town.

Charlie Johnson - Defender

19-year-old Charlie has signed for Evesham this season – he was previously with Cambridge United and Royston Town

Will Davidson - Defender

20-year-old Will has previously been on the books of Redditch United, Forest Green and Studley. He signed for EUFC during the summer.

Will Holland - Midfield

18-year-old Will has come through the youth team set up at Evesham, featuring for the U18's last year.

Henry McMahon - Striker

17-year-old Henry is another of the EUFC juniors he broke into the first team squad last season, making his debut, whilst also featuring regularly for the U18 squad.

Callum Clayton - Midfield

17-year-old Callum has been a regular for the U18's over the last season, he has now become part of the first team squad.

Neil Hunt – Manager

Neil stepped up from being the U18's manager in March. His involvement at Evesham has been over a number of years, including being the assistant manager here in the past. Neil's other management experience has seen him in charge at Malvern Town, Stourport Swifts and Pershore Town. He is focussed on helping the club to develop a pathway for the juniors to have opportunities to make it to the first team. Neil had been on Cheltenham Town's books as a youngster.

Pete Haynes – Assistant Manager / Coach

Pete has joined the club as the First team coach. He is combining this role with his position at Cheltenham Town FC, where he is the Professional Development Phase Lead Coach within the academy and the U18's Manager. Pete holds the UEFA A Licence and was one of the youngest people to achieve this qualification. He had previously been a Cheltenham Town academy player.

Pete Sollis - Physio

Pete has returned to EUFC as the club's sports therapist / physio, having previously been here up until 2017. He had been working at Kidderminster Harriers in the interim. Pete brings a wealth of experience and qualifications to the role and will also be helping the youth section with their fitness.

Let us just therefore concentrate on tonight's game in this shortened column & see if we can break our duck this evening — COME ON THE FIELD!!

NOW I WAS AWAY IN EAST CORNWALL for the whole of last week, in which we lost 3-2 to SLIMBRIDGE, 3-0 at BASINGSTOKE in midweek & then 3-0 at home to CIRENCESTER on Saturday. I haven't seen any of the reports, although I know we were very unlucky to lose to Slimbridge, so I can't really comment on any of those scores. 

WHAT THE PAPERS SAY



Looking Back.....

"THERE IS A PERCEPTION ALL OVER THE WORLD THAT THE FANS CARE ABOUT MANCHESTER UNITED MORE THAN THE PROFESSIONALS DO. THAT IS TOTALLY WRONG, TOTALLY WRONG. NOBODY IN MANCHESTER, OR CONNECTED WITH MANCHESTER — CARES MORE ABOUT THE CLUB THAN ME. WE, THE PROFESSIONALS AT THE CLUB, FEEL EVERYTHING ABOUT THE CLUB — EVERY SECOND, EVERY DAY". The words of Jose Mourinho, as quoted in The Sun on 12 December 2018, as once again, he opened his trap to (yet again) antagonise the United fans, who — by and large — remained TOTALLY unconvinced about this bloke managing their team, because, more often than not, the media circus was all about HIM. Thankfully, he was SACKED a short while later!

Look, Manchester United are one of the biggest clubs in the world, possibly even THE biggest. They have fans in all parts of the UK & all across the globe. Those who attend games spend a fortune on tickets & travel & merchandise. Those who don't go to games just concentrate on live TV showings & merchandise. United fans in all parts of the globe spend a LOT of hard-earned money supporting their team – and then up popped Mourinho, on his multi-million pound contract, to say that HE & the players, who are also multi-millionaires, care more about the club than the fans do. ABSOLUTE NORTHAMPTON TOWN – and you know what their nickname is! Mourinho & the players are just employees. A fan is a fan for LIFE & most are glad that Jose has gone.

Mourinho's comment was patronising & insulting – and he came out with stuff like that a lot more these days than he ever did before, and because the team were under-performing as well, it's no wonder the United fans were angry up there. Less so now though!

But maybe we here at MANGOTSFIELD United (the "other" Man United) do have something in common with our most illustrious almost-similar namesakes at Old Trafford. Not so long ago, after one particular defeat, we had a manager here at MUFC who used social media to verbally criticise (1) the fans who HAD attended that game, and then (2), the fans who had NOT attended that game – and he was gone soon afterwards. A manager should never criticise the fans, or patronise them either & for me, I thought at the time that Mourinho was on very dodgy ground, particularly at their high level of the game, where media attention is relentless & before you knew it, he was indeed gone too. Ole Gunnar Solskjaer has prevailed in charge & Jose is now history!

He could also have added the icy rain & wind that hit the Oxford ground, and indeed, the whole southern half of the country as well. We had plenty of it here at Cossham Street on the same day as well, but at least our showers were warm enough!

MANGOTSFIELD UTD - A BRIEF HISTORY

The 2020/21 season is Mangotsfield's 21^{st} campaign as a Southern League club, which includes the voided 2019/20 season. This is their twelfth season in the Pitchin In Southern Football League - (Division One South), previously finishing 9^{th} in 2009/10, 3^{rd} in 2010/11, (but losing the play-off seminal, 1-3 to Frome Town), 14^{th} in 2011/12, 13^{th} in 2012/13, 11^{th} in 2013/14, 10^{th} in 2014/15, 14^{th} in 2015/16, 8^{th} in 2016/17, & 16^{th} in both 2017/18 and 2018/19. The Board of Directors comprises, Mike Richardson as Chairman, & Pete Crowley as Director of Football Club Development.

There has been football in the village since 1888 and four years later, Mangotsfield FC became a founder member of the Bristol & District League (later to become the Western Football League in 1895) but the club folded after 10 years. From 1898 until the 1950s, Mangotsfield FC was disbanded and subsequently reformed on several occasions. In January 1951, the parent club dispensed with the Reserve X1 for financial reasons leaving many local players without a team to play for. These players decided to form a new club in the village and at the start of the 1951-52 season, the newly-established Mangotsfield United FC was entered into the Bristol & District League, Division VII. They achieved five successive promotions and gained entry to the Bristol & District Premier Combination in 1957. The club remained there until 1972-73, when it was accepted in to the Western League.

The Club became established in the Western League during the 1970's and despite being relegated to the first division in 1981-82, "The Field", as they were affectionately known, bounced straight back the following season and under the guidance of the charasmatic Ralph Miller, who as Chairman, undertook the task of improving the ground and its facilities, became a force in the Premier, mainly featuring in the leading positions.

In 1991, the club, managed by Harold Jarman and assisted by Terry Rowles, achieved regional glory by taking the (then) Great Mills League Premier Division title, ahead of runners-up Torrington. Disappointingly, they were denied promotion to the Southern League as their ground failed to meet the grading requirements and there followed several lean seasons as the team disbanded. Under newly-elected Chairman Richard Davis, however, off the pitch, things were improving.

Terry Rowles returned to manage the club himself in 1995 and kept them in the spotlight by consistently finishing in the top three/four in the Great Mills/Screwfix League and an appearance in the FA Vase semi-final (losing to Clitheroe), but their ambitions of promotion and Southern League football were always thwarted by the continual success of Taunton and Tiverton Town. It was considered very important to establish a sound working base, improve ground facilities and secure a long-term tenure on their Cossham Street ground.

In earlier years, the Roger Pullin / Richard Davis partnership had seen many improvements take place, with the installation of Conference-style floodlights and at the end of the 2003/04 season, the Cossham Street end of the ground was covered, together with new toilet blocks and social club improvements. Ex player Andy Black returned to the club as Manager in 1999 and guided the club to promotion to the Dr. Martens Southern League and three successful campaigns. The 2003/04 campaign did not go too well and just before Christmas, Black was replaced by Martyn Grimshaw. Towards the end of the campaign, Nigel Webb came in as his Assistant, but the club could only finish in 13th place, which was not high enough for the planned re-structuring of the Pyramid.

The Management duo made promotion their priority in 2004/05 and the club headed the table for most of the campaign, eventually taking the Division One West title with a 21 match unbeaten run. After 28 seasons at Western League level, the club had spent just five campaigns at Southern League level before reaching the Premier Division. In April/May 2005, Roger Pullin left the club and Mike Richardson took over as Chairman, with a new Board. The club have looked for financial stability in recent years, with the need to reach out to the community and attract a broader fan-base and local sponsorship. There has been only limited success in that area.


Sometimes now referred to as "The Mangos", the 2020/21 campaign, started with Glyn Ashton, at the helm. He had previously been in charge of the U18s Floodlit Youth side, then took over as temporary Manager, with the immediate aim of survival at Step Four level.

The ultimate aim is to stabilise the club, linking it to the **SGS College** and a re-introduction of the Youth team, and eventually return to the Southern Football League, Premier Division, where they spent four seasons from 2005-2009, finishing 10th, 9th, 14th and 22nd.

Striker **DARREN EDWARDS** plundered a hat-trick as Mangotsfield stepped up their outside promotion bid with a superb victory at fellow high fliers Bilston Town. The win pushed The Field into third place, just a point behind second-placed Bilston, with a game in hand. It was Mangotsfield's first season at **Southern League** level and under the guidance of Manager **ANDY BLACK**, they were scoring goals for fun.

Despite finishing in 5th place, they were the third highest scoring team in the division and only promoted HINCKLEY UNITED and TIVERTON TOWN scored more.

ROBBIE CLARIDGE gave The Field an idea start with a goal in the 11th minute. Edwards did the spadework with

a good run down the right flank and Robbie finished off the move with a volley which went in off the underside of the bar.

Edwards then crashed the ball home from an acute angle five minutes later to make it 2-0. With **DAVE ELSEY** suspended, The Field gave a debt to ex Bristol Rovers defender, **MARK SMITH** and he played at the heart of the defence. The Steelmen had previously only lost three league games in 29 outings and they were again stunned after 34 minutes when **Edwards** scored the third, following a break when **NICK BROOKS** released **CHRIS CHURCHILL** and Edwards was clinical in his finish.

But Bilston were not riding high for nothing and in SCOTT VOICE, they boasted the league's leading scorer and he struck twice in the 62nd and 83rd minutes to drag the Steelmen back into the game. Mangotsfield keeper **PAUL THOMPSON** was called upon to make several important saves as the home side threatened to turn the game around, but with two minutes left, the visitors made the game safe and completed a superb double over the Black Country side. It was Mark Smith who broke through and presented **Edwards** with the opportunity to complete his hat-trick


