MATCH REPORT: WESTFIELD 1-3 SOUTHALL

Southall emerged victorious between the two in-form sides, despite some controversial decisions, to keep them well in the title fight.

After Billy Montague opened the scoring, with a well-placed finish, despite protestations from the crowd that he was in an offside position.

After the break, the Field looked the better side, and this dominance paid off as Field skipper Luke Elliott found the back of the net, following a scramble in the box.

The Field continued their dominance, looking for a winner, before another controversial decision saw Southall awarded a penalty, which Jaden Thompson-Brissett finished with ease.

It was then game over as Thompson-Brissett picked up the ball just outside the box and shot, which was blocked by Sonny Wheeler, but the rebound fell to him again, before he was able to finish to give the visitors the 3-1 lead, and the three points.



MATCH REPORT: HARTLEY WINTNEY 0-4 WESTFIELD

A fully dominant first-half performance from a energised Field side saw them take all three points in Hampshire.

The beginning of the first half saw both sides go end-to-end to try and draw first blood, with Wheeler making an unbelievable save onto the post to deny former Field player Mason Obeng the opener.

It was the Field who opened the scoring, as a slice from Baxter saw him hit the ball with enough power to worry the Hartley 'keeper, who parried the shot away, only for it to fall to Baxter, who finished well from a tight angle to put the Field 1-0 up.

It didn't take too long for the second to come as the Hartley 'keeper wiped out Breckon, leading to a penalty. Baxter took the ball and delivered from the spot, sending the 'keeper the wrong way to give the Field a 2-0 lead in just six minutes.

It was then heaven for Baxter, who completed his hattrick with a fine lob over the Hartlry 'keeper, who was well off his line, to secure a 8-minute hattrick.

Crossley then took over, as Caleb Wright, on his first start since returning from injury, chested the ball down and held it up before passing into the feet of the oncoming Crossley, who taps it home to make it 4-0 going into half-time.

Whilst the second half had its chances, there was little to write home about and, despite coming out the traps more energised in the second half, Hartley were unable to gain a foothold into the game, meaning the Field's first half display had sealed them a return to form.





Westfield Football Club was formed in 1953 as Westfield Boys Club, playing in the Woking and District League and also running a youth team.

The 1950s

From the start the Club had success in the competitions it entered. Among the trophies won in the early years were the Surrey Youth Invitation Cup in 1953/54, the Surrey Junior Charity Cup in 1954/55 and 1955/56, the Surrey Junior Cup (at the first attempt) in 1955/56 and the Surrey Youth Cup in 1956/57.

Following several seasons in local league football, the Club made the break into Surrey Intermediate football using the present ground at Woking Park, Kingfield. Successes soon came and, after becoming League Champions and Cup winners on several occasions in the subsequent seasons, the Club decided to apply for senior status. The application was accepted in 1964 and after one season in the Parthenon League, Westfield met the necessary ground grading requirements and joined the Surrey Senior League.



The 1960s

Westfield's future success in senior football sprang from their ability to attract the best local youngsters, ably coached by manager John Martin and assistant Kenny Moody, with Les Butcher in a scouting role, and they were successful in winning the Surrey Youth Cup again in 1966/67 and 1969/70, and the Surrey Youth Shield in 1969/70 and 1970/71. This talent matured and there followed three tremendous seasons for the senior side, when they won the Surrey Senior League Cup in 1971/72, followed by the League and Cup double in 1972/73, and the League Championship again in 1973/74.

The 1970s and 1980s

The Surrey Senior League was disbanded and reformed as the Combined Counties Football League in 1978, and Westfield FC became founder members and retained membership until 2018. Success, however, was more difficult to achieve and in recent times the closest the senior team came to honours was in 1989/90, when they lost the final of the Combined Counties League Cup to Hartley Wintney in extra time. Westfield's Youth team won the Surrey Youth League's U18 Division Cup in 1978.

2000-2003

During the early 2000s, with former Woking player John Cassidy as manager, the senior side improved their league position, finishing sixth in season 2000/01. That season saw the Club enter the FA Vase again, having only previously entered in 1974 for 3 seasons, performing beyond expectations before losing in the Fourth Round to Ryman League Arlesey Town, on the way beating Wantage Town, Sidley United, Lewes and Bowers United.

Season 2002/03 saw Westfield enter the FA Cup for the first time, losing at home to Dorking in the Preliminary Round.

Westfield continued to compete at youth level and they won the Combined Counties Youth League Cup in 1991/92, as well as being runners-up in the League. Following the installation of floodlights in 1999, the U18 team joined the Southern Youth Floodlight League as members of the Western Division.



The Club also ran a Youth team playing in the West Surrey Boys League, winning the U14 Challenge Cup and Premier Division in 1999/00, the U15 Premier Division, Challenge Cup and Surrey County Cup in 2000/01, U15 Division 2 in 2002, the U16 Premier Division in 2001/02, and the U15 Division 2 in 2002/03.

2003-2006

Following the end of the 2003/04 season, Westfield lost both First and Reserve Team managers. John Cassidy moved to Frimley Green, and thereafter back to Farnham Town, and Graham Pope moved to Godalming & Guildford to manage their reserve team in the Suburban league. Westfield recruited Paul Donaghy from Guildford-based Merrow as first-team manager, and Dave Robson – long-time Westfield player – took over the reserves.

At the end of 2005/06 Westfield were relegated to the 1st Division, due to new ground-grading regulations after a very acrimonious conflict with the league. Numerous commitments from league officials were reneged upon, and after months of appeals and meetings, Westfield had to accept their unwelcome fate.

After a mid-table Division 1 season and partly because of the league-enforced relegation, Manager Paul Donaghy decided to resign as First Team manager to join Godalming and Reserve Team manager Dave Robson also quit. The team of ex-player Martin Powell, ex-Spurs stalwart David Howells and coach John Comer took over the running of the senior teams for the start of the 2007/08 season.

2007-2010

In the close season of 2007/08, following a highly credible 4th place finish, Martin resigned as manager due to personal circumstances; his departure signalled the exits of both David Howells and John Comer. In July 2008 the position of 1st Team Manager was filled by Steve Plunkett, the ex-Godalming Town Reserves boss, though he was replaced within 4 months by the returning Dave Robson, as the club attempted to rebuild following a mass exodus of players.



Dave Robson did a fine job stabilizing the club, but after an indifferent 2009/10 was replaced by joint managers, Craig Moore and John Comer.

Off the pitch there was good news, as building of the new facilities commenced in 2010/11 and it promised to be a good season as the management duo assembled the best squad since the 2008 season. However, despite some wonderful results, the team struggled to find consistency, and finished a disappointing 13th in the table. There was better news for the reserves who finished 4th in the reserve league, and reached the final of the league cup, where they went down to double-winning side Mole Valley SCR.

2011-2015

During the summer of 2011, Craig Moore decided to step down to concentrate on playing, leaving John Comer as sole manager. He promoted Kevin Bailey from the reserves to be his assistant, and following Dave Kelly's resignation as reserve team manager appointed David Robertson.

In May 2011 the old pitch was dug up and raised a metre, before being re-seeded and in June the old Clubhouse was demolished. The club moved into the new facilities in August 2011 with a thrilling opening match in the FA Cup against Peacehaven & Telscombe, in which the Sussex side eventually ran out 6-3 winners, in front of a crowd of 190. The following month a new record attendance for a league fixture at Woking Park was set when 325 witnessed the fixture against Guernsey.

The season saw another improvement on the pitch, where a position of 8th was achieved and the team reached a cup final for the first time in nearly 20 years. However they went down 4-2 to Warlingham on the day.

The following season the Club gained promotion in third place, and played Walton Casuals Reserves in the final of the Surrey Premier Cup, going down 2 goals to 1 in a close game.



In season 2013/14, with John Comer continuing as manager, the Club had their best league finish since 1981, ending in fourth place.

With John Comer's departure, Martin Beard was appointed for the 2014-15 season. After a run of indifferent results, Martin was replaced by Dan Snare, who improved the side to finish mid-table.

2016 to date

For the 2016-17 season, Tony Reid was appointed manager, and enjoyed a stunning season, finishing second in the League behind Hartley Wintney and winning the League Cup in May. The following season the Club continued to play exciting, attacking football, scoring an amazing 145 goals, whilst conceding only 45, and became deserved Champions with a fantastic 106 league points.

As the 2018-19 season began, we said farewell to the Combined Counties League after 40 years of continuous competition, and started an exciting journey into Step 4 of non-league football. Having lost some key players from the previous campaign, it took several months for Tony Reid to find a settled side, but then after Christmas a wonderful run of 13 wins, 4 draws and 4 defeats saw Westfield finish in fifth place, to gain a play-off place and our highest-ever league finish. A close semi-final play-off defeat to Bracknell Town did little to detract from a remarkable achievement.

2019-20 saw Tony's team again keep up the pressure at the top of the table, and were lying in a playoff position before the season was curtailed by Covid-19 cancellations, leading to the whole Isthmian League being declared null and void with 28 out of 38 league games played. By that time, the manager had decided to look for a new challenge and unfortunately many of our long-standing players took the same decision. It was a disappointing end to a great few years.

Into the fray for season 2020-21 stepped new manager Simon Lane, who had the not inconsiderable task of building a team almost from scratch, and his young team began to build some momentum, but with only 5 league and 2 cup games, the season was again curtailed in November.



Season 2021-22 began with more hopefully signs of completing an entire campaign, and with Simon having been able to retain around half of his squad, there were positive signs all round. However, it was not the season to be for Westfield, as the side finished 16th in the Isthmian League South Central Division, still clear of relegation but a bad regression in comparison to the 'pre-Covid' seasons.

The 2022-23 season saw the expectation of survival as the main goal, but both the dominant 4-0 wins over league favorites Leatherhead and eventual league champions Basingstoke Town saw the club changes expectations to a top-half finish. The club also had a good run in the FA Cup, making it to the Second Qualifying Round for the first time in their history, bowing out in that round to 2-1 defeat to Carshalton Athletic, despite a strong showing in the game.

However, it was all change at Westfield soon thereafter, as Simon Lane left the Field half-way through the 2022/23 season, for Isthmian Premier side Kingstonian, leaving the club on the hunt for a manager.

They eventually settled on former Arsenal and Woking midfielder Ian Selley, who had managerial expeirence with both Chertsey Town and Hartley Wintney in recent years. In the half-season that followed, Selley guided the Field to a respectable 12th place finish in the Isthmian League South Central Division, as well as the final of the Aldershot Senior Cup, in which they took on Combined Counties side Badshot Lea at the EBB Stadium. However, it was heartbreak for the Field as they lost 2-0 in the final.

The first mention of forming a football club in Hungerford was in the parish magazine of November 1873 when those interested were invited to send their in their names but it wasn't until October 1886 that Hungerford Town Football Club was officially founded. The club has come a long way since its formation with a vast number of volunteers, supporters and players contributing to its 134 year history. The original name of the team was Hungerford Swifts and this link with the club's heritage is maintained to this day with a community team now playing under that name in the Hellenic League. Matches were originally played on "the Downs" (now Hungerford Common) and then subsequently on the western edge of the town before the club moved to its present ground in Bulpit Lane shortly after WW1. Initially, with no organised leagues or cup competitions in existence, the club played only friendly matches but soon became a powerful force in local football and won its first recorded trophy in 1905, beating Newbury Union Jack in the final of the Newbury Challenge (Graystone) Cup. They first entered the Hungerford League and later the Newbury & District League, winning their first league title in 1912/13, before all competitive football ceased during WW1. The club was immediately successful when the league restarted in 1919 and picked up where they had left off. An influx of new players produced a successful 1st team and Reserve XI and the club won the Newbury League in both 1920 and 1921.



That era saw the emergence of Reverend Denning, known locally as "the old man", as a driving force and benefactor of the club and the team included many names still familiar in the town to this day. Hungerford Town continued playing at intermediate level with mixed fortunes in the Newbury & District and the Swindon & District Leagues before senior status was finally achieved in 1958 when joining the ranks of the Hellenic League. The history of those formative years and the period up until the 1960s is neatly captured in a small booklet called "75 years of Football" written by Frank Horwood in 1961.

The 1970s

After a period of team rebuilding in the 1960's Hungerford began the new decade in fine form and won the Hellenic League Division One and League Cup double in the 1970/71 season. The 1970's were a "golden" decade for the club and memorable times. We entered the F.A. Cup for the first time in 1973 and the facilities were improved with the opening of a new clubhouse in 1974 and new changing rooms and floodlights added in 1975. The club reached three Berks & Bucks Senior Cup Finals in four years and although defeats by Chesham United, Slough Town and Wycombe Wanderers were disappointing it was a sign that the club was making significant progress on and off the field. In 1974 Don Revie brought his England side, featuring the likes of Kevin Keegan, Mick Channon, Trevor Brooking and Ray Clemence, to Bulpit Lane for a training session. The 1977/78 season saw Hungerford finish third in the Hellenic League, win the League Cup and produce a fairy tale run in the F.A. Vase eventually losing out to Barton Rovers in a semi-final replay. These achievements enabled the club to gain election to the Isthmian League in 1978. Hungerford Town soon established themselves as a force in the higher level and just missed out on promotion by finishing third in 1979 and 1980 and created history in 1979 by reaching the 1st round proper of the FA Cup for the first and to date only time, losing 3-1 away to Slough Town. That same season they reached their second FA Vase semi-final but were again denied a place at Wembley when losing to Guisborough Town 5-3 on aggregate.



The 1980s

Season 1980/81 brought more disappointment with yet another 3rd place finish in the league but there was some consolation when the club was invited to compete in the prestigious Anglo Italian Semi-Pro tournament. 1982 finally brought a major trophy when Hungerford defeated Wycombe Wanderers 1-0 at Wokingham Town to win the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup. Promotion was again narrowly missed in 1984/85 however the club were about to enter a turbulent period for the club when after 9 successful years as manager Jim Kelman left the club. 1988/89 saw a return to prominence under joint managers Gary Goodwin and David Dodds who guided the club to sixth place in the table and a third FA Vase Semi Final appearance. This time it was Sudbury Town who denied Hungerford its much deserved trip to Wembley.

The 1990s

The club finished in the top ten of the league table 1991, 1992 and 1993 under Gary Goodwin and later ex-Manchester United player Wilf Tranter before a dismal start to the 1992/93 season saw the departure of Tranter at Christmas. Former Hungerford goalkeeper Jimmy Greenwood briefly returned to the club as manager and achieved Division 2 safety before two ex-players, Gerald (Cabbie) Smith and his assistant Norman Matthews combined to keep the club ticking over in the Isthmian League for the next two seasons. 1996/97 brought the club its highest finish for several seasons but the club entered a transition phase in the late 1990s and although former Swindon Town legend Don Rogers took over as manager, and despite a good run to the 3rd qualifying round of the FA Cup, the league form was disappointing and Rogers resigned just after the start of the 1999/00 season.



The 2000s

Gary Ackling took over as manager and sought to change the emphasis of the club by looking for local youth talent and produced a strong mid table finish in 2002. Unfortunately for the club, the deadline for ground improvements was not met at the end of the 2001/02 season, and a relegation to the newly restructured Isthmian Division 2 followed. Despite still holding their own the decision was taken for the long term benefit of the club to re-join the Hellenic League for the 2003/04 season and the club stabilised once more and began the process of rebuilding on and off the pitch. Alan Clark was appointed manager in 2006 and the league and cup form gradually improved and a push for promotion was mounted once again. The election of Nigel Warrick as Chairman in 2008 kick started a refurbishment program for the club's facilities and fresh impetus for the team. Despite a sticky start in the league the team went on a 22 match unbeaten run and won the Hellenic League title and promotion to the Southern League.



The 2010s

2010/11 began with a new man in charge, Bobby Wilkinson, and so began the club's most successful decade in its 125 year history. Undeterred by a play-off defeat in 2012 the team finished as runners-up to Poole Town in the league in 2013 and this time there was to be no heartache in the play-offs as Hungerford beat Paulton Rovers and Merthyr Town to win promotion to the Southern League Premier Division, their highest ever level. Wilkinson steadily improved his squad and the team settled into Premier League life well. A run of ten wins on the bounce between March and April 2014 took the club to within a point of the play-offs and a magical run to the last 16 of the F.A. Trophy evoked memories of the wonderful F.A. Vase runs of the 70s and 80s. The 2014/15 season saw another strong challenge in the league and the side hit form in the second half of the season to eventually finish 4th and this time a play-off place. Despite losing to the eventual promotion winners Truro City Bobby Wilkinson and his team were not finished there and vowed to come back stronger than ever. The 2015/16 season began indifferently with an early F.A. Cup exit and some inconsistent performances in the league but a run to the 2nd Round of the F.A. Trophy, losing to National League side Chester, augured well for the season. A powerful second half of the season produced a 4th place finish and yet another crack at the play-offs. Things looked bleak in the semi-final when the team were two goals down at Hitchin Town on the hour but came back to win 3-2 and on a never-tobe forgotten rainy Bank Holiday Monday at Bulpit Lane another great comeback saw Hungerford beat Leamington FC 2-1 to achieve promotion to the Vanarama National League South. Hungerford's first season in the National League proved that the team could survive at this level despite "punching well above their weight" as a club. At one stage the side was in the play-off positions but eventually finished in 6th position and the team reached the final of the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup for the first

time in 35 years, losing to National League South champions Maidenhead United.



The 2017/18 season began with thoughts that the side could improve on their position in the League but in August long serving manager Bobby Wilkinson resigned along with his entire backroom staff. Senior players Jon Boardman and Ian Herring stepped up to the plate as joint managers and steadied the ship before the departure of Chairman Nigel Warrick and necessary cuts in the club's playing budget forced a re-structure and Herring being handed sole charge of the team. Two seasons of fighting relegation on and off the field ensued but despite the financial struggles Herring and his players kept the club in the National League with successive final day results against East Thurrock United in 2018 and 2019 avoiding relegation. In March 2019, following the announcement that several key club personnel would be stepping down, Patrick Chambers stepped forward to become the new Chairman and provide a welcome boost to the club. Things on the pitch however looked bleak with the team struggling at the bottom of the league. But, just as results picked up, and with an albeit slim but mathematical chance of staying up yet again, the Covid-19 worldwide pandemic struck and all football in the UK was suspended. In unprecedented circumstances Hungerford were handed a reprieve and live to fight another day at their hard earned high level of football.

The 2022/23 National League South season saw Hungerford finish 24th, bottom of the league, subsequently relegating them to the Southern League Premier South, where they sit 11th after 13 league matches.
