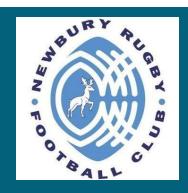

but following strict Covid-19 restrictions. See <u>pg2</u> for the plan for the next few weeks. It may seem cautious but we are feeling our way. The Club needs your support so we look forward to seeing you.

As we close on Month 5 of lockdown we should now be looking forward to the 20/21 season just one month away!!. The RFU's six step 'Return to Rugby' still see us at Step B, so unfortunately a September start is unlikely, but hopefully we will move on in the next few weeks. The good news is the club is re-opening the Kickers bar from the beginning of August on selective dates for pre-booked gatherings, subject to the restrictions imposed on us. The senior players will trial the bar opening this weekend. Pre-booked tables of 6 in the Kickers Bar and outside will become the new normal. We hope this will be the beginning of renewed activities and a welcome back to meet up with old friends and the Blues family at the club!!

This will be followed with something similar on the 15th August for the Mini & Junior coaches and parents and will be repeated if successful later in the month. We also want to get the youngsters back as soon as we can.

A golf day to raise money for a specific project for the club has been arranged for the 21st August and we are planning an all day Sponsored Team Relay Fun run/walk on the 12th September to raise money and get the season underway. More to follow on this!!

The Club's financial year officially closed in June and the figures were read out by Club Treasurer, Adam Prickett at our first ever Zoom AGM. This time last year the club's operating loss pre-depreciation amounted to an unsustainable £135,000 despite the last land sale. We were facing a disastrous situation in 3 to 4 years' time. Despite Covid, which prematurely ended the season in March, with some fantastic financial and club management we have reduced this position by over £100,000 to end with a loss of approximately £28,000 pre-depreciation. An amazing effort and on behalf of all club members I would like to thank those on the management board especially, but also all volunteers for their support and efforts. The financial team (Rob, Adam and Steve) now have the challenge of putting together this year's budget. It will require a number of assumptions at this stage but one clear message is that without your support of activities as and when we can do them, income generation will be very hard. Please support your club and let us build on last year's incredible efforts and not waste them. We are not out of the woods yet!

Thank you to the new volunteers who have emerged during this shut down period; fresh input is always welcome and in particular, it would be good to hear more from the mini and junior sections.

Hopefully we will see you at the club (or the golf course on 21st August) very soon. Any form of rugby would be good but in the meantime I hope you will get behind the family sponsorship day which we hope will mark the beginning of the season and all activities which will help support YOUR club.

Spotlight UK

work to increase confidence, self esteem, social interaction and mental wellbeing as well as provide a safe and fun environment for young people to have fun.

Over the last 11 years they have put on over 100 musicals and shows and for the last three years have taken over 185 per year to perform on a West End stage. It is about giving children the chance to engage with the arts at very low cost and have fun, make new friends and build in confidence and self esteem.

Spotlight's aim is to raise a further £24000 per year to pay for 2 x full time youth workers who will provide youth activities across West Berkshire 5 days a week and also provide 1-2-1 mentoring for young people in schools. They will also deliver courses on supporting young people who have experienced trauma including abuse, loss and separation and mental health issues. They will also look into work experience opportunities using the BNI networks through Julian Lewis and Linda Gale.

SUPPORTING THE CLUB - GOOD EXCHANGE PROJECTS

GOOD EXCHANGE MATCH-FUNDING PROJECTS FOR THE NEW FINANCIAL YEAR

Back in May, in Newsletter 4, we outlined how the club has been using the Good Exchange match-funding scheme for community-benefit projects on the building and grounds. Each year the Good Exchange will match fund approved projects to a £10k maximum, with individual projects capped at £5k.

Our 25+ year-old building is the envy of many other Rugby clubs but requires increased maintenance & investment.

For FYE 20/21, we now have a detailed & costed plan of Exterior/Interior maintenance works, along with new capital expenditure proposals, some of which are Covid-related. From this we have identified items that may be suitable for match-funding:

Description	Benefit / Aim	Cost (ex VAT)
Further LED lighting up-grading around the building and relevant Motion Sensors	Significant savings in utility costs and improved efficiency	£4,500
Repair / refurbishment of the Balcony	A must do as this is the main fire exit from the first floor	£8,500
Improved car park signage & CCTV	Safety and security	£2,500
Maintenance works to Top Pitches	To provide good pitch facilities for M&Js and for Senior Mens, Womens and Colts training	£4,500

The above alone cost c.£20k – and, provided the projects are approved for match-funding if we can raise 50% of the cost, they will provide the remaining 50%. <u>A £10k saving would be a significant and material sum for the club in</u> the financial year ahead.

Other major projects being considered include the replacement of the passenger lift, up-grading floodlights on the top pitches to LED and the eventual replacement of the boilers. While too big for the normal match-funding some of these may be suitable for other grant schemes which are being explored.

Fundraising is therefore key to achieving the above and current restrictions around events don't help. It will require yet again contributions across the Club – from members and supporters/companies/charitable foundations. Any suggestions on grant providers or ideas for Covid-compliant fund-raising activities would also be very welcome.

COACHES' CORNER



ROSS NEWTON

By their very nature second teams can be very exciting or downright disappointing to play for. Young players, A's one week, potential shown and then Stags the following week. Wow. On the other hand Blues one week and for whatever reason, a tactical decision, players returning from injury, Stags the next week. Massive disappointment. This makes managing match days potentially quite difficult and it is testament to Ross Newton he has done this remarkably well, helped by a fantastic attitude from the players, all doing their best, in some cases despite obvious disappointment. Here Ross reflects on season 2019/20.

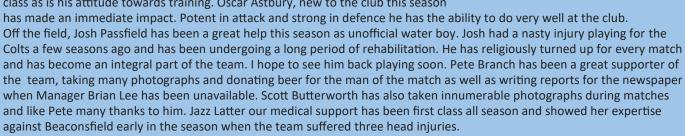
The Stags had a very successful season, finishing second in Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire 1, winning 13, drawing 1 and losing only 3 games all season. The aim for the season was to better the fifth placed finish of the previous season and after a somewhat rocky start the self belief began to grow, particularly after the draw against perennial league winners

Chinnor III, who have proven to be unbeatable in this league for a good number of seasons so second place represents a fantastic effort from all players. In fact that 31 all draw against Chinnor was one of he highlights of the season and as the opposition said at the end of the game that was the hardest game they had played in for a good number of years. Stags had a strong team out that day and each and every one of the eighteen players produced a sterling performance, which they then maintained for the majority of games.

Psychology in sport is everything and in a season of disappointment for the Blues, the Stags players found a great deal of positivity and a number of the players pushed hard for a Blues spot, regularly turning up for training, developing a unity of purpose, all aiming for the same outcome. So often during games the players went through their processes and at times they showed a ruthlessness which one could only admire. Some games saw a number of Blues players selected for the Stags and this proved to be helpful to the team, with some of these established players helping the younger Stags players. There was certainly a great team ethos during the season and the very fact the team is called the Stags rather than the second team has helped develop this ethos and a pride in playing for the team.

In my second year with the team it has been important to get to know the individuals on a personal level and this has helped motivate the different individuals who make up the squad. Encouraging decision making within the group has also been important as has sharing a few beers with them after games. Getting to know them in this way makes it easier for individuals to accept constructive criticism to help improve their game.

A team game, yes, but within the team environment there has been some significant contributions. On the field, Ed Gavin has hopefully shown the way for other Colts to make the transition to senior rugby. As a rugby player Ed has a maturity beyond his years and has produced consistently high quality performances throughout the season. Tom Cole is another who has impressed this season. Tom is only in his second year playing rugby, having made the switch from football two years ago. A natural kicker of the ball he was top points scorer this season. Harry Waye Branch played in all bar one game this season and could have been given man of the match for virtually every game he played. His throwing into the line out is first class as is his attitude towards training. Oscar Astbury, new to the club this season



I have enjoyed this season and look forward to seeing his group of players develop even more next season in whatever format that will look like.



MINI & JUNIOR SECTION



UPDATE FROM CHRIS SMITH, CHAIR OF NRFC JUNIOR SECTION

Thanks everyone for your input at our meeting last week and based upon this I have pulled together the following schedule for pitch use:

We will have to review these timings at the beginning of September to accommodate the minis if they decide to return.

As discussed last week and confirmed by the RFU yesterday, we remain at Phase B on the return to rugby roadmap. This means groups of a maximum of 6 including a coach, social distancing to be maintained, no physical contact and strict cleaning of any equipment used. The way the seniors have achieved this is by having 4 groups of 6 per pitch with a 4 meter path down the centre in both directions. This allows coaches to control multiple groups without being part of the 6.

The other important thing is that you will need to have a register of everyone who is at training and which group they are in. They have to stay in the one group for the whole session but can be in a different group for the next training session.

Also, we need to adhere to the regulations regarding pre-season training, in particular Regulation 15 (specifically Reg 15.8.5) whereby:

15.8.5: "... except that no training, matches and competitions involving contact are permitted save that"

15.8.5 (d): "in the last two weeks immediately prior to the start of the Season pre-season training and training matches are permitted"

Or put more simply there can be no contact training until two weeks prior to the start of the season. As junior rugby will not start until we reach Phase F, that could be months away. We all need to make sure we adhere to this as the RFU is keeping a close eye on what's happening at a community level. Which means we need to be innovative in how we deliver and manage our pre-season training. At this stage in most of the boys' rugby careers it's about having some fun with their mates. So, can I encourage you and your coaches not to focus on fitness training, but on fun activities that keep everyone engaged. There's a great deal we can share with each other and learn from other sports that have returned to action.

And finally, we must adhere strictly to the Covid-19 protocols that have been developed by the club. I havae circulated a number of documents that should inform and help you and your coaches run your sessions in a Covid prevention compliant manner. Any questions please come back to me.

Through the Eyes of the Players - Neil Hunter (Coach, Senior Men)

Ben Mercer. Heard of him? Me neither until he published his book Fringes-Life on the Edge of Professional Rugby. Selling more copies than Warren Gatland's book by all accounts. He is destined to become more well known for his writing than anything he did on a rugby field playing for Plymouth Albion, Cornish Pirates or Rouen. I've got no financial interest in the book but it is up there as one of the best rugby books I've read and it gave me the idea for theses series of articles called, "Through the Eyes of the Players," which will hopefully give a selection of players past and present a chance to reflect on their career to date.

First up is Neil Hunter, one of our senior coaches who started coaching at the club in December 2019. When he came to us, one of his immediate impressions was the number of asterisks in match day programmes, showing how many Blues players had come up through our Junior and Colts sections.

Before coaching Neil had a pretty good playing pedigree, being capped at U16 and U18 for England when he was at Merchant Taylor's school in Liverpool. He also played for his home club Waterloo and Sale Jets U21. Heady days. International schoolboy success led to a contract to play at Gloucester. Being brutally honest Neil says this was a big mistake because he turned down a place to study Economics at Loughborough University, to head to the West Country. He would urge any young player not to make the same mistake as so very few make it to the top in the game and an educational qualification, a successful apprenticeship or some other form of training is very important for life after rugby. As it was, two of the important rugby influences on him were associated with Gloucester at the time, Henry Paul and Paul Turner, so Gloucester it was rather than returning home and resuming his career at Sale. Things didn't really turn out well at Gloucester for Neil. A string of injuries as a result of too much emphasis on weights to bulk up was one of a number of reasons Neil didn't play much at Gloucester. But what an experience. He remembers fondly the passionate support, the high expectations, the calibre of team mates, although being a known face in the city was not that appealing to him as a somewhat reserved 19 year old lad.

For all the highs of playing professionally, Neil feels clubs back then did not do enough to encourage young players to become rounded individuals, to get an education, to support their studies. He recalls an incident at Gloucester where he was called in to speak to the Director of Rugby because he had missed two training sessions due to him considering taking up a place at Gloucester University. He was asked if he wanted to be "a full time student or a full time rugby player". Nothing in between, no compromise, one or the other. A surprisingly very unenlightened attitude and one which is hopefully changing for young professional rugby players.

It was whilst at Gloucester the phone rang one day and John Jeffries, the ex Scotland flanker and then Manager of Scotland U21 asked Neil if he wanted to play for Scotland U21. Neil's family heritage was Scottish and not surprisingly Neil accepted the invitation and played for the Scotland U21 team in the World U21 Championships, playing against people like Bryan Habana.

Neil briefly considered moving to Scotland to play club rugby and in retrospect feels this would have been a better option but by now Neil said he had lost the appetite to chase the rugby dream. He then decided to belatedly follow a degree course, this time in Law and Sports Science and started coaching rugby at Magdalen College School in Oxford. From there to Abingdon School and almost New Zealand but a first child saw him stay in the UK and then to NRFC.

In reflecting on his playing career Neil feels the game became almost too serious, it became a job and it was too easy to dwell on mistakes, mistakes which have to be parked almost immediately in professional sport and then move on. "This is what marks the Dan Carters. Jonny Wilkinsons. Tiger Woods. from the majority of other sports players."

At Blues games you will most likely see Neil behind one of the posts, watching running lines, scrutinising support play of players and making a mental note of player skills to be worked on. And a tip from Neil for young players, go watch the best player you can in your position. See what he or she does, watch as if you are a coach not a fan and keep watching this player rather than the ball.

So, a Liverpool lad who made his way to Newbury via that iconic club side Gloucester. From one great club to another.
