Maldon & Tiptree have another reason to celebrate tonight; their rivals at the top of the North Division slipped up.

Bury Town lost for the first time this season as Tilbury travelled to Ram Meadow and stunned them by going two goals up, both from Marlon Agyakawa. Ryan Jolland halved the arrears just before the break, but the equaliser wouldn't come. Town stay second, a point behind the Jammers but having played two matches more. Tilbury climb to ninth.

Grays Athletic could have gone second, but Adam Watkins had other ideas and got the only goal of the match at Parkside for Cambridge City.

Aveley climbed to fourth with a two-one win at Witham Town. Alex Akrofi and Firmin Ngandu put the Millers two up, and although George Bugg got one back the equaliser wouldn't come for Witham.

Histon were the big winners of the day, scoring four goals in the last eleven minutes of the first half to defeat Great Wakering Rovers. Dan Brown got three of them, Ed Rolph the other, and Jake Gordon's second half goal for Rovers made no difference to the outcome. Histon go eighth- and Hullbridge Sports are tenth, after defeating Felixstowe and Walton United three-one. The Seasiders took a first half lead through Jack Newman, but Sports hit back after the break and Joseph Wright, Timothy Monsheju and Yemi Ogunfunmilade made victory comfortable.

Dereham Town finally got the impressive victory their performances have hinted at, travelling to Coggeshall Town and winning two-nil. Toby Hilliard got the first after eleven minutes, Ryan Hawkins the second after the break.

Brentwood Town picked up their first victory of the season, defeating AFC Sudbury 3-1 at the Arena. Andy Freeman gave them the lead early on only for Tom Maycock to equalise, but Zak Pianim put the Blues ahead once more just before the break from the spot, and a second spot kick thirteen minutes from the end, this time converted by Jason Williams, made it three.

Basildon United and Heybridge Swifts cancelled each other out. Kris Newby put the Bees ahead, Elliott Ronto equalied seven minutes before the break, and that was that. Swifts are fifth, Basildon eighteenth.

South Central

We've new leaders at the top of the South Central Division, Hanwell Town taking over at the summit after they comfortable beat Chalfont St Peter whilst Westfield fell to defeat at Barking. Dwayne Duncan, Gareth Chendlik and Jeremiah Miah scored for the Geordies in a three-nil win, whilst a goal in each half from Junior Dadson gave Barking the points at Mayesbrook Park.

Harlow Town fell behind in two minutes at Ashford Town, Dan brown with the goal, but equalised five minutes later through Oliver Gnadi and then completed a smash and grab in the last minute when Matthew Rush scored the winner. The Hawks go fourth, and Bracknell Town are fifth, a Nathan Minhas hat trick helping the Robins to a four-two win over FC Romania. Seb Bowerman got Bracknell's other goal whilst George Taban and Dinu Barcari found the net for the Wolves.

Uxbridge climbed to seventh, early goals from Mark Bitmead and Mahlondo Martin enough to beat Chipstead, whilst Waltham Abbey scored SIX at Northwood. The Abbotts took a second minute lead through Aron Gordon only for Harry Lodovica to equalise a quarter of an hour later. After the break, however, it was one way traffic- Darrelle Russell, Gordon again, Nathan Koranteng, Louis Bowen and Leonne McKenzie finding the net for the visitors, who climb to eighth.

Our other two matches were drawn. Andy Ali gave Bedfont Sports the lead at Marlow only for Kelvin Bossman to equalise, whilst Hertford Town and South Park couldn't manage a goal between them.

James – a QPR fan – came up with the concept when he visited Tavistock Town in a pre-season game in 2010 and that led to him visiting local club Harrow Borough. So each season during an international break, NLD encourages fans down to their local team. From there it has grown and grown. In the build-up to this weekend, Premier League clubs were tweeting about their local clubs and Prostate Cancer UK and Kick It Out continue to show their support each year.

Perhaps you're reading this today at your first Non-League game – we're sure you will enjoy the experience.

Many clubs have benefited from the extra publicity and media spotlight the day brings and that is something to be welcomed. It's not easy when the game at the highest level is everywhere. Finding column inches or air time often needs an angle and NLD is just that.

Of course, we can trot out many clichés about Non-League football. The players don't dive – some do – that clubs are more welcoming – most are – and you can speak to the players in the bar after the game. And it's affordable!

Non-League football will mean different things to different people but there's no doubting it is at the heart of the game in this country.

Where else would four-figure crowds watch a game in the eighth tier? Sometimes even lower.

Non-League football is to be celebrated and treasured. But we shouldn't be blind to the fact a number of clubs are struggling to make ends meet. That getting through the season is an achievement. Costs are high and it is hard to compete. For those that have the resources, there are more that don't.

A particular issue facing these levels is volunteering. There aren't enough of them! Look at yourself, you will have skills that are invaluable to a Non-League club even if you don't realise it.

It doesn't have to be all the hours under the sun. Just putting up posters to advertise games or delivering leaflets in the local area can make a big difference. And that all makes for a healthy, thriving Non-League.

Today's Visitors



Westfield Football Club was formed in 1953 as Westfield Boys Club, playing in the Woking and District League and also running a youth team.

The 1950s

From the start the Club had success in the competitions it entered. Among the trophies won in the early years were the Surrey Youth Invitation Cup in 1953/54, the Surrey Junior Charity Cup in 1954/55 and 1955/56, the Surrey Junior Cup (at the first attempt) in 1955/56 and the Surrey Youth Cup in 1956/57.

Following several seasons in local league football, the Club made the break into Surrey Intermediate football using the present ground at Woking Park, Kingfield. Successes soon came and, after becoming League Champions and Cup winners on several occasions in the subsequent seasons, the Club decided to apply for senior status. The application was accepted in 1964 and after one season in the Parthenon League, Westfield met the necessary ground grading requirements and joined the Surrey Senior League.

The 1960s

The 1970s and 1980s

Westfield's future success in senior football sprang from their ability to attract the best local youngsters, and they were successful in winning the Surrey Youth Cup again in 1966/67 and 1969/70, and the Surrey Youth Shield in 1969/70 and 1970/71. This talent matured and there followed three tremendous seasons for the senior side, when they won the Surrey Senior League Cup in 1971/72, followed by the League and Cup double in 1972/73, and the League Championship again in 1973/74.

The Surrey Senior League was disbanded and reformed as the Combined Counties Football League in 1978, and Westfield FC became founder members and have retained membership to date. Success, however, has been more difficult to achieve and in recent times the closest the senior team has come to honours was in 1989/90, when they lost the final of the Combined Counties League Cup to Hartley Wintney in extra time.

2000-2003

In recent seasons with former Woking player, John Cassidy as manager, the senior side improved their league position, finishing sixth in season 2000/01. That season saw the Club enter the Carlsberg FA Vase for the first time, performing beyond expectations before losing in the Fourth Round to Ryman League Arlesey Town, on the way beating Wantage Town, Lewes and Bowers United.

Season 2002/03 saw Westfield enter the FA Cup for the first time, losing at home to Dorking in the Preliminary Round.
Westfield continued to compete at youth level and they won the Combined Counties Youth League Cup in 1991/92, as well as being runners-up in the League. Following the installation of floodlights in 1998, the U18 team joined the Southern Youth Floodlight League as members of the Western Division.

The Club also run an U16 team playing in the West Surrey Boys League. This is currently the Club's most successful side, last season competing at U15 level the team won the League Championship, the League Cup and the Surrey County Cup.

2003-2006

Following the end of the 2003/04 season, Westfield lost both First and Reserve Team managers. John Cassidy moved to Frimley Green, and thereafter back to Farnham Town, and Graham Pope moved to Godalming & Guildford to manage their reserve team in the Suburban league. Westfield recruited Paul Donaghy from Guildford-based Merrow as first-team manager, and Dave Robson - long-time Westfield player – took over the reserves. At the end of 2005/06 Westfield were relegated to the 1st Division, due to new ground-grading regulations after a very acrimonious conflict with the league. Numerous commitments from league officials were reneged upon, and after months of appeals and meetings, Westfield had to accept their unwelcome fate. After a mid-table Division 1 season and partly because of the league-enforced relegation, Manager Paul Donaghy decided to resign as First Team manager to join Godalming and Reserve Team manager Dave Robson also quit. The team of ex-player Martin Powell, ex-Spurs stalwart David Howells and coach John Comer took over the running of the senior teams for the start of the 2007/08 season.

2007-2010

In the close season of 2007/08, following a highly credible 4th place finish, Martin resigned as manager due to personal circumstances; his departure signalled the exits of both David Howells and John Comer. In July 2008 the position of 1st Team Manager was filled by Steve Plunkett, the ex-Godalming Town Reserves boss, though he was replaced within 4 months by the returning Dave Robson, as the club attempted to rebuild following a mass exodus of players.

Dave Robson did a fine job stabilizing the club, but after an indifferent 2009/10 was replaced by joint managers, Craig Moore and John Comer.

Off the pitch there was good news, as building of the new facilities commenced in 2010/11 and it promised to be a good season as the management duo assembled the best squad since the 2008 season. However, despite some wonderful results, the team struggled to find consistency, and finished a disappointing 13th in the table. There was better news for the reserves who finished 4th in the reserve league, and reached the final of the league cup, where they went down to double- winning side Mole Valley SCR. 2011-2015

decided to step down to concentrate on playing, leaving John Comer as sole manager. He promoted Kevin Bailey from the reserves to be his assistant, and following Dave Kelly's resignation as reserve team manager appointed David Robertson.

In May 2011 the old pitch was dug up and

During the summer of 2011, Craig Moore

In May 2011 the old pitch was dug up and raised a metre, before being re-seeded and in June the old clubhouse was demolished. The club moved into the new facilities in August 2011 with a thrilling opening match in the FA Cup against Peacehaven & Telscombe, in which the Sussex side eventually ran out 6-3 winners, in front of a crowd of 190. The following month a new record attendance for a league fixture at Woking Park was set when 325 witnessed the fixture against Guernsey. The season saw another improvement on the pitch, where a position of 8th was achieved and the team reached a cup final for the first time in nearly 20 years.

However they went down 4-2 to Warlingham on the day.

The following season the Club gained promotion in third place, and played Walton Casuals Reserves in the final of the Surrey Premier Cup, going down 2 goals to 1 in a close game.

In season 2013/14, with John Comer

continuing as manager, the Club had their best league finish since 1981, ending in fourth place. With John Comer's departure, Martin Bea

With John Comer's departure, Martin Beard was appointed for the 2014-15 season. After a run of indifferent results, Martin was replaced by Dan Snare, who improved the side to finish mid-table.

For the 2016-17 season, Tony Reid was

appointed manager, and enjoyed a stunning

2016 to date

season, finishing second in the League and winning the League Cup in May. The following season the Club continued to play exciting, attacking football, scoring an amazing 145 goals, whilst only conceding only 45, and became deserved Champions with a fantastic 106 league points. As the 2018-19 season began, we said farewell to the Combined Counties League after 40 years of continuous competition, and started an exciting journey into Step 4 of non-league football. Having lost some key players from the previous campaign, it took several months for Tony Reid to find a settled side, but then after Christmas a wonderful run of 13 wins, 4 draws and 4 defeats saw Westfield finish in fifth place, to gain a play-off place and our highest-ever league finish. A close semi-final play-off defeat to Bracknell Town did little to detract from a remarkable achievement, and the return of most of the 2018-19 squad bodes well for another great season.




ON THIS DAY



Ledley Brenton King (born 12 October 1980) is an English former footballer who was a one-club man, spending his entire career playing 321 competitive matches for Tottenham Hotspur from 1999 to 2012. Highly rated as a central defender, in 2009 he was named by The Times as Tottenham's 25th best player of all time. From 2002 to 2010, King made 21 international appearances for England, scoring twice and representing the nation at UEFA Euro 2004 and the 2010 FIFA World Cup. In the latter part of his career, King was plagued by

chronic knee problems, for which no effective treatment or remedy was found. Instead of training with the rest of the squad King undertook fitness exercises on his own, allowing him to play one first team game per week. His former manager Harry Redknapp called King "an absolute freak" for being able to perform at Premier League level despite not training. Whilst playing, King was cited by opponents and pundits as one of the best defenders in the Premier League. King announced his retirement from all forms of football on 19 July 2012 as a result of the chronic knee injuries that plagued much of his career. He continues to represent Tottenham Hotspur on an ambassadorial level

King was born in Bow, London in 1980. As a youth footballer, he played for Senrab F.C. and the Tower Hamlets district representative team. He attended the Blessed John Roche RC School, which is now closed. King joined Tottenham as a trainee in July 1996 and progressed through the youth system. Whilst a trainee, he was identified as having qualities and instincts similar to Bobby Moore.



Henri George Lansbury (born 12 October 1990) is an English professional footballer who plays as a midfielder for Premier League club Aston Villa. He previously played for Arsenal, where he ascended from the club's academy. Lansbury also had spells with sides Scunthorpe United, Watford, Norwich City, West Ham United and Nottingham Forest. He achieved consecutive promotions to the Premier League in 2010–11 with Norwich and 2011–12 with West Ham. Lansbury also played for England as a youth international.

Lansbury has featured for England as a youth international. He captained England's U-16 side and helped take their U17s to the final of the 2007 UEFA U-17 European Championship. He went on to miss the final due to a concussion that he suffered during the semi-final of the tournament. Lansbury also held the captain's armband at the U-19 level where he took England to the 2009 UEFA U-19 European Championship final against Ukraine where they emerged as runners up. He scored three goals to end up as the second highest scorer of the tournament altogether.

Lansbury made his debut for the U21 team in a game against Portugal in November 2009. On 16 November 2010, in an England Under-21 friendly to Germany, Lansbury replaced Jason Steele in goal when he was red carded. He let in the resulting penalty by Cenk Tosun but then kept Germany at bay for the rest of the match. Lansbury was called up to England's U-21 squad for the 2011 UEFA Under-21 Championships featuring in all three group stage matches as a substitute. On 1st September 2011 he started for England in an 2013 UEFA Under-21 Championships qualifier against Azerbaijan. In an impressive display he scored twice, assisted two further goals and was named man of the match as England won 6–0. On 29 February 2012, he scored two goals as England U21 secured a play-off spot for Euro 2013 with a 4–0 victory at The Riverside over Belgium U21.





