



From the 29th March 2021 until the start of step 2, which shall be no earlier than 12th April 2021 of the roadmap, changing rooms are not allowed to be used, except for emergencies, access to toilets or for reasons of disability. Toilets will be open 30 mins before and 30 mins after games, otherwise they will be closed. From start of Step 2 of the roadmap the following will apply: -

Changing rooms should be avoided for training sessions and friendlies, and only used on competitive match days by a maximum of 6 players at a time

Changing rooms should only be used for changing and showering and should be done so as quickly as possible, with 1m plus separation. Where possible substitutes should use the facilities separately to the starting XI
