Harland, Harrington and Morton made useful contributions to the total of 114. Dogmersfield made a good start in reply, thanks to Ross, Green and Dickson and were at one time 84 for 3 with Morton capturing the first 3 wickets. The home side lost 2 wickets for 30 runs but Goldsmith and Tizzard had no trouble in knocking off the remainder of the runs against some loose bowling. Goldsmith scored an excellent 78 not out.
