

AMERICAN SELECTIVE PORTFOLIO



SECOND HALF REVIEW 2023

The American Selective model delivered a total return of 4.5% in the second half of 2023 and 18.7% over the full year. The US market increased by 8.0% in H2 and 26.3% over the year, driven by a disproportionate contribution from the technology sector, to which this model has a more modest exposure by comparison. Since inception in January 2015, the portfolio has achieved an annualised return of 10.5%, whilst the US market has returned 11.8%.

After an otherwise turbulent year, equity markets embarked on a significant rebound over the last few months of 2023, driven by hopes of rate cuts on the horizon. This positive sentiment was reaffirmed by a welcome Santa Rally which was driven by supportive economic data releases and comments from central bank policy makers. In dollar terms, world equities climbed 10.7% during the fourth quarter, providing robust full year returns of 20.1%. This was hugely influenced by the stellar growth of the 'Magnificent 7' technology stocks, which account for over a quarter of the US equity market and close to one-fifth of the global market. In the United States, whilst its equity market had a stellar run over the year owing to the previously mentioned tech stocks, it is essential to note that the strength of the stock market does not necessarily reflect the strength of economy. Concerning the latter, the data is good. Inflation is well on its way to returning to the Federal Reserve's 2% target with a November reading of 3.1%, while GDP growth is expected to be amongst the strongest of the developed economies this year. Yet, there is a lot of debt across the non-tech business landscape and some companies could be vulnerable to a reduction in demand from lower consumer spending. Whilst market commentators are largely optimistic about the US economy experiencing a soft-landing, it is still not entirely clear to what extent the pandemic-driven build up in excess savings has delayed the impact of higher interest rates. If families have been dipping into these pots to maintain their standard of living, despite rising prices, then consumer demand could still be impacted, to the detriment of those companies with less resilient balance sheets. That said, the US accounts for two thirds of world markets and, within the last two years, the US Government announced stimulus packages amounting to around \$10tn. This suggests that a significant amount of cash is still being made available, from which a wide range of companies are well placed to benefit. The year ahead is also set to include a rematch between Donald Trump and Joe Biden. Whilst this will doubtless be an unpredictable presidential race, election seasons are statistically beneficial for US equity market. The resulting political volleyball may set the stage for additional volatility, but this should present investors with attractive opportunities over the next twelve months.

Chubb was the strongest contributor to performance with a total return of 18.3% in H2 and 4.2% over the year. This marks a strong rebound after a weaker start to the year, as the company was able to deliver solid numbers despite weakness in the agriculture insurance unit. The company has been successful in raising prices (+13.9% in North America and 11.7% in the international business) and the latest quarterly results also showcased a 9.1% increase in net premiums written, excellent underwriting profitability and a strong combined ratio. This means it is well placed to benefit from today's favourable demand environment. Nvidia Corp was also an excellent performer with a total return of 17.1% in H2 and 239.0% over the year. This return was weighted to the first half owing to a surge in demand for chips used for Al processing, a market within which Nvidia sits as a clear leader. This company is one of the 'magnificent 7' stocks, alongside Microsoft, and given their disproportionate influence on market returns over the year, it's unsurprising to see it contribute so much to full year returns.

Hormel Foods Corp was the portfolio's largest detractor, declining by 18.9% in H2 and 27.5% over the year. The company has struggled recently in the face of elevated food price inflation which in turn has placed a squeeze on already narrow margins. International revenue has been impacted by continued softness in China driven by lower branded export demand.


