THIS SUMMER THE HEPWORTH WAKEFIELD PRESENTS THE LARGEST EXHIBITION OF NEW WORK BY MAGALI REUS

This summer The Hepworth Wakefield presents a new exhibition by Magali Reus (b.1981), one of the UK's most exciting young sculptors.

For her largest exhibition to date, and first solo show in a UK institution, Magali Reus: Particle of Inch will showcase the significant commission of two new series of work following their premiere in America earlier this year at SculptureCenter New York. The exhibition will comprise 20 new sculptures presented within a site-specific architectural environment constructed within The Calder, our 600 square metre art and events space situated opposite The Hepworth Wakefield in a 19th century mill.

In the two new series of work commissioned for this exhibition, Reus' sculptural 'curbs' transform pavements into abstract structures that support intricate fragments. Manhole covers, cracks and graffiti become graphic inscriptions, while casts of ceramic mugs, plant pots and wire coat hangers suggest the ever-changing life of the street.

Reus' second series of new works use enlarged padlock forms, with their pierced cases revealing exquisite interlocking interiors built from hundreds of layers of cut metal and plastic.

In her sculpture Reus draws on the unassuming details of everyday life, from domestic and crafted objects to the aesthetics of functionality and industrial design. Using casting, moulding, airbrushing

and other fabrication techniques to create her precisely rendered forms, the familiar is made uncanny through Reus' material manipulations and shifts in scale. Her work revels in the messy residues of human activity and the clinical precision of mass-production, via references to the history of 20^{th} century abstract sculpture.

Reus' exhibition will open alongside *Caro in Yorkshire* – a major exhibition of work by Anthony Caro presented by the Yorkshire Sculpture Triangle across two sites, The Hepworth Wakefield and Yorkshire Sculpture Park. Reus' exhibition provides a dialogue with the eminent British sculptor's work, which has been hugely inspirational to her art.

Particle of Inch will be Reus' largest exhibition to date and her first touring museum show, co-commissioned by The Hepworth Wakefield with SculptureCenter, New York USA; Westfälischer Kunstverein, Munster, Germany and the Fondazione Sandretto Re Rebaudengo, Turin, Italy. Reus has a forthcoming solo exhibition at The Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam, The Netherlands in 2016 and has been selected for British Art Show 8, which opens at Leeds Art Gallery on 9 October 2015.

Magali Reus (born 1981 in The Hague, The Netherlands) is based in London, UK. Recent group exhibitions include *The Noing Uv It* at the Bergen Kunsthall, Bergen, Norway (2015), *Theater Objects* at the LUMA Foundation, Zurich, Switzerland, *nature after nature*, Fridericianum, Kassel, Germany, and *Pool*, Kestnergesellschaft, Hanover, Germany (all 2014).

Magali Reus is also producing a limited edition art work for The Hepworth Wakefield's limited edition series of original art works. The limited edition cast of a broken tea cup, without handle or bottom, reprises an object that appears in several of the works in her exhibition and will be offered at an introductory price of £400 until 2 August, after which the edition will cost £440.

THE HEPWORTH WAKEFIELD

The Hepworth Wakefield takes its name from the internationally acclaimed sculptor, Barbara Hepworth, who was born in Wakefield in 1903. At 5,000 square metres, The Hepworth Wakefield is the largest purpose-built gallery outside London.

The gallery showcases Wakefield's nationally important collection, which includes major works by Barbara Hepworth and her contemporary Henry Moore, born nearby in Castleford in 1898. The Wakefield Permanent Art Collection also holds key works by other leading British artists including Ben Nicholson, Jacob Epstein, Ivon Hitchens, Graham Sutherland, John Piper, Paul Nash, Patrick Heron, L.S. Lowry and Lucie Rie. The displays are enhanced by loans from the collections of Tate, the Arts Council, the British Council and private lenders. The Hepworth Wakefield's temporary exhibition programme features the world's leading contemporary artists. Past shows have included Eva Rothschild, Franz West, Philip-Lorca diCorcia and Haroon Mirza.

The gallery is a major cultural asset for Yorkshire, enhancing the region's reputation as one of the world's leading centres for the exhibition and appreciation of sculpture and is at the heart of Wakefield's regeneration. In 2013, Yorkshire Sculpture Triangle was established by partner venues, The Hepworth Wakefield, the Henry Moore Institute, Leeds Art Gallery and Yorkshire Sculpture Park as an umbrella brand to celebrate this heritage and to promote sculpture in Yorkshire.

Designed by the internationally acclaimed practice, David Chipperfield Architects, The Hepworth Wakefield is the UK's largest purpose-built gallery since The Hayward in London was built in 1968. It acts as a catalyst for tourism andhas attracted in excess of £350 million inward investment. The on-going development in Wakefield city centre includes a new retail project Trinity Walk, a £140 million transformation of Wakefield Merchant Gate, which has created a new business quarter for Wakefield, and an £8 million development of Wakefield Westgate train station. The ambition is to further develop the historically important Waterfront area of the city, with its listed mills and warehouses.

The Hepworth Wakefield is funded by Wakefield Council and Arts Council England and an increasing number of charitable trusts, private individuals, Patrons and Members. The gallery opened on 21 May 2011 and welcomed its millionth visitor on 5 December 2013.

THE CALDER

The Calder is The Hepworth Wakefield's contemporary art space which opened to the public on 30

August 2013. Located on the ground floor of a 19th century former textiles mill, the new contemporary art space is situated adjacent to the main gallery site, on the banks of the River Calder. The Calder adds 600 square metres of exhibition and event space to the existing 10 gallery spaces within The Hepworth Wakefield and presents a mixed programme of art, music and events that runs in parallel to the visitor offer at the main gallery.
