Underneath all the surface complexities of classroom learning there are only four main dynamics at work. In each dynamic Going Visual makes a significant difference.

1 Teacher  $\rightarrow$  Student: The teacher is giving information to the students who receive it. There is no, or little, interaction.

No Visual Students have to unravel the teacher's words. They guess what's in her head



Go Visual Teachers show students the ideas in their heads along with their explanations.



Go Visual Teachers and students have a common point of reference with the shared visual.



**3 Student ←→ Student:** Students work independently of the teacher. They interact and collaborate with each other.

No Visual Students have to unravel each other's words. They guess what's in their heads.




Go Visual Students have a common point of reference with the shared visual.



**4 Information** → **Student:** Students work independently and individually. The information is one-way from source to student.

Go Visual Students have a visual summary of the main points as well as the narrative.
