
Key Knowledge:

- Europe is a continent located entirely in the Northern Hemisphere. It is bordered by the Arctic Ocean to the north, the Atlantic Ocean to the west, Asia to the east, and the Mediterranean Sea to the south. It is the 6th largest continent in the world.
- The UK neighbours several countries by sea including France, Belgium, Germany, Spain, Norway & Denmark.
- The closest capital city outside the UK would be Brussels in Belgium. The next closest is Paris in France.
- The largest city in Europe is Istanbul, Turkey, with a population of 14.7 million people.
- Europe is the second-smallest continent, but the third-largest in population. Around 10% of the world's population lives in Europe, with approx. 741.4 million people.
- Russia is the most populous country in Europe as well as the largest by area. It also has Europe's longest river, the river Volga. Other European countries with sizable populations include Germany (82.2 million), the United Kingdom (66.5 million) and France (65.2 million).
- Norway has the longest coastline in Europe.
- European countries can be grouped into northern, southern, western and eastern and can share similar climates.
- There are 44 European Countries
- Countries that form the EU:: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Republic of Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden.

- Latitude imaginary 'horizontal' lines that circle the globe, with the Equator the
- Longitude imaginary 'vertical' lines from Pole to Pole
- Northern Hemisphere The half of the Earth that is north of the Equator.
- Europe A continent of the Northern Hemisphere. There are 44 countries in Europe.
- Continent A very large area of land that consists of several countries. There are 7 continents: Asia Africa Europe North America South America Australia Antarctica
- Population all the people who live in a country or area

- Country An area of land that has its own government.
- Capital city The city where the government of a country functions. They are usually large cities but not always the largest city in the country.
- Human Geography Geography that focuses on human activity such as population, life expectancy, settlements, food, trade etc
- Physical Geography- Geography that focuses on the natural world such as rivers, mountains, volcanoes and other physical features
- Trade the activity of buying, selling, or exchanging goods or services.
- Language the communication of a particular country or people
